Jerome A. Gilbert: Being here feels like coming home

I am truly honored to lead Marshall University and become part of the fantastically rich tradition of this institution and this community. It is indeed difficult to express the overwhelming excitement my wife Leigh and I feel as we start to become part of Marshall and Huntington.

I already have found that one of the most compelling things about our university is the hope, love and unity of spirit embedded in the refrain "We Are Marshall." I knew from my first visit to campus last October that phrase was an inclusive one and that the word "we" really reflects acceptance and respect - a family. Marshall is a special place and I feel like I have come home.

I am blown away by the world-class facilities, the talented and passionate faculty, and our outstanding students. I'm equally impressed by our alumni, many of whom are incredibly successful.

Just as extraordinary is the connection between the university and the Huntington community. It is unlike any "town and gown" relationship I have ever seen. The resiliency and optimism I have found here are inspiring.

I have already come to love Marshall University and am committed to seeing it develop into an even more highly recognized and revered university. Remarkable strides took place at Marshall over the last decade or so and all the pieces are here to take us to the next level and, at the same time, bring significant economic development growth to the entire region. Fundraising will be another of my top priorities. I have some aggressive goals in this arena and will be spending a great deal of time cultivating donors and seeking private money. I have already started reaching out to our alumni and other supporters to seek their partnership to enhance Marshall.

Another important element in our future success will be enhanced marketing of Marshall. We need to sharpen our image and play up our strengths, and reach out to a broader, national market.

Developing a five-year salary plan for faculty and staff also will be part of the strategy to raise our national stature. To be a great university, we need the very best faculty and staff we can get. To maintain and increase our academic quality, we are going to have to have more competitive salaries. It is a critical need.

In closing, I want to thank you for welcoming me to the Marshall family with open arms. I am extremely proud to be here and look forward to working with our students, faculty, staff, alumni and community to do everything we can to make Marshall even better.
