Dr. Leaming authors 'The College Yearbook'

"The College Yearbook" by Dr. Deryl R. Leaming, director of the School of Journalism at Marshall University, has just been published by Josten's/American Yearbook Co. of Minneapolis, Minn.

The book, produced in a format which resembles a modern yearbook, also was designed by Leaming. Available at the MU Bookstore, it emphasizes organization, design, preparation of final copy and sales promotion of yearbooks.

Basic purpose of the book is to assist yearbook staff members, advisers and college presidents "in understanding the many functions of a college yearbook, and to provide an understanding of its potential worth," Leaming said in the book's preface. "It is hoped that 'The College Yearbook' will help staffs produce publications that fulfill the several functions of traditional yearbooks and yet, are responsive to today's potential readers," he added.

Leaming has had extensive experience as a yearbook adviser and currently serves as adviser to Marshall's "Chief Justice" publication. He also teaches a course dealing with supervision of high school yearbooks and newspapers.

## 'Bowl' competition ahead for MU team

The Marshall University College Bowl team will participate in the state College Bowl Tournament scheduled Feb. 16 at Morris Harvey College, according to Rob Mutchnick, MU assistant professor of criminal justice, who serves as coach and faculty advisor to the team.

The Marshall team, which defeated West Virginia University, Morris Harvey College and Bluefield State College in invitational tournaments, also is scheduled to compete in the regional College Bowl competition Feb. 23-25 at Morris Harvey College.

"We will be competing in the regional tournament no matter what the outcome of the state tournament," Mutchnick said. In the regional tournament Marshall will

be competing with schools from West Virginia, Maryland, the District of Columbia and Pennsylvania.

Last year Marshall placed second in the state tournament and third in the regional, according to Mutchnick. The winners of the 16 regional contests will appear on the nationally televised Readers' Digest College Bowl.

Members of the MU team are Nick Maddox, Charlotte, N.C., graduate student, David Nunley of Charleston, Ken Wright of St. Albans, Kurt Taube of Chesapeake, Ohio, and Michele Hoffman of Huntington, all juniors.
