Red Cross commends MU student body

The Marshall University student body was commended earlier by Tri-State Red Cross Blood Center officials for its response to an emergency blood drive on Jan. 18.

"Weather conditions throughout the region have hampered our normal collections, creating an emergency situation," said Joyce Snyder, public relations director for the center.

"The campus response has helped us in making up for many of this week's cancellations," she added.

Given only 24 hours notice, the student response was "fantastic," said Tom Browning, recruitment coordinator

Dr. J.T. Richardson is claimed by death

Funeral services were held Saturday, Jan. 21, for former Sociology Department head Dr. James T. Richardson of 1415 Morris Court, who died Jan. 19. Burial followed in Woodmere Memorial Park.

Richardson, 77, came to Marshall in 1949 and served as departmental chairman until 1965. He retired in June, 1969 with the rank of professor, and later served as principal of St. Joseph's Central Catholic High School.

A native of Texas, he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Texas and held a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri.

He is survived by his wife, Lela Mae White Richardson, and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Grissom of Mount Pleasant, Tex.

Marshall student to attend IRTS meet

A Marshall University junior is one of 25 college and university students selected nationally to attend the Sixth Faculty/Industry Seminar and College Conference sponsored by the International Radio and Television Society (IRTS).

John Sadler of Charleston, a broadcasting major, was selected by IRTS on the basis of a paper written on "Broadcasting in the Year 2000." He will participate in seminars on new technology in broadcasting and workshops on career preparation during the five-day conference at the Harrison Conference Center, Glen Cove, N.Y., Feb. 2-6.

for the Huntington/Cabell County Chapter, American Red Cross.

Records show that 148 persons showed up at the Campus Christian Center to donate and only 18 were deferred, according to Mrs. Snyder. Forty-two of these were first-time donors, she said.

"The overwhelming majority were students, too," Browning said. "We were really surprised. I believe the response shows a real sense of responsibility on the part of Marshall's students," he said.

The university's fraternities and sororities had scheduled a bloodmobile visit to the campus Wednesday as a Greek service project, according to Dr. Richard G. Fisher, MU vice president/dean of students. "In view of the emergency situation, the decision was made Tuesday to turn the visit into a campus-wide collection. I am very proud of our students for their response," Fisher said.

The bloodmobile will visit the campus again Feb. 8-9 at Memorial Student Center.

The Tri-State Red Cross Blood Center serves 95 hospitals in 53 counties in West Virginia, Ohio, Kentucky and Virginia.

Foundation receives gift from Ashland Oil
