## Musical revue opens forum series Tuesday

The Marshall University Community Forum Series will open its 1978-79 season Tuesday, Sept. 12, with the musical revue "Hot Licks and Vanilla." The performance will begin at 8 p.m. in Marshall's Old Main Auditorium.

The show originally had been scheduled for Sept. 21, but was moved up because of a change in the group's tour plans, according to Mrs. Nancy P. Hindsley, Marshall cultural events coordinator.

Ten attractions are scheduled on this year's Community Forum Series. Attendance is by season membership only. Mrs. Hindsley said the remaining season memberships will be sold at the door at \$20 per person. Marshall students with activity cards will be admitted free, while students without activity cards will pay \$1 upon presentation of their identification cards.

"Hot Licks and Vanilla" revives the music, dance and dress of the 1930s and '40s as it attempts to recreate the year when Swing was King and Big Bands reigned throughout the land. It was the basis of the critically acclaimed musical "The All Night Strut."

## Previous 'Greenbook' to remain in effect

The undated Greenbook issued to faculty in 1977-78 will remain in use during the 1978-79 academic year, according to Dr. Noel J. Richards, vice president for academic affairs.

Part III of the Greenbook, dealing with academic employment and related topics, has been under review since 1976-77. Several issues concerning Policy 36, including retrenchment guidelines, are still under discussion by the West Virginia Board of Regents.

A joint committee from the Regents Faculty Advisory Council and Academic Affairs Advisory Committee is involved in this review, Richards said. Dr. Frank Aldred, MU's representative to the Faculty Council and chairman of the council, is serving on the joint committee.

The revised Part III, pending changes effected by the Regents, will be in effect during 1978-79. The revisions followed an intensive review initiated while Dr. A. M. Tyson was vice president for academic affairs; conducted by the Deans Committee and Faculty Personnel Committee, and approved by President Hayes.

Faculty members interested in reading the revised Part III may obtain copies from their departmental chairmen, or the Academic Affairs Office, Richards said.
