### Administration division established

### Egnatoff named to vice president post

Karl J. Egnatoff, director of plant operations at Marshall University since April, 1976, is being promoted to vice president for administration, Marshall President Robert B. Hayes announced.

The promotion is effective with the beginning of the new

fiscal year, July 1.

In the new position, Egnatoff will be responsible for five support areas, each headed by a director or superintendent: Personnel, Administrative Services, Facilities Operation and Maintenance, Security, and Auxiliary Enterprises.

### Queen selected as development director

Dr. Bernard Queen, a member of the Marshall University staff since 1963, has been selected as the university's new director of development and executive director of the Marshall University Foundation, Inc.

The appointment is effective July 1.

Queen currently is dean of the College of Education, a position he has held since July 16, 1974. In assuming the development post, he succeeds Jack C. Phillips, who resigned in January to become president of the United Methodist Foundation.

As development director, Queen will be responsible for the university's fund-raising program. He also will have administrative responsibilities for the Office of Alumni Affairs and the Office of Grants,

"In filling the position, we decided we needed an outstanding administrator who knows our region and its people, as well as a person totally familiar with Marshall University and our objectives for its future," MU President Robert B. Hayes said. "Bernard Queen meets all of those qualifications and we are looking forward to an excellent Development Office operation.'

### **Emory Carr to head** modern language dept.

Emory W. Carr, assistant professor of modern languages, has been appointed chairman of the Marshall University Department of Modern Languages, effective with the beginning of the summer session June 13.

A member of the Marshall faculty since 1966, he also has taught at West Virginia University and Savannah (Ga.) State

College.

Carr served as acting chairman of the Department of Modern Languages during the 1975-76 term. He has been on sabbatical leave during the past academic year in order to work on his doctoral dissertation for the State University of New York at Binghamton.

Harry E. Long, appointed manager of administrative services in February, will become director of that area, which will have responsibility for purchasing, space planning and utilization, receiving and inventory reporting, transportation and vehicle maintenance, safety and property risk management, and communications services. John C. McKinney, presently director of publications, will become communications manager. In addition to the publications operation, he will be responsible for printing and duplicating services, mail room operation and the telephone system.

Gene G. Kuhn, assistant superintendent of buildings and grounds, will become superintendent of the Facilities Operation and Maintenance section, responsible for building and equipment maintenance, custodial services, utility systems, grounds maintenance, waste disposal, and major

repairs, renovations and alterations.

Warren S. Myers, director of university housing, is being promoted to director of auxiliary enterprises. His area, in addition to student housing, will include campus food services, Memorial Student Center and the University Book Store.

Donald L. Salvers will continue as director of security. "The establishment of the Administration Division enables us to bring together a number of important support services

in a more efficient organization," Hayes said.

"I am pleased that Karl Egnatoff has accepted the challenge of administering the new division," Hayes added. "During his 14 months at Marshall he has demostrated that he is a skilled administrator and that he is willing to put forth the extra effort required to do a job well. I believe this appointment signals a major step forward for Marshall."

### Hanrahan to become science college dean


Dr. E. S. Hanrahan, Marshall University professor of chemistry and departmental chairman, will become dean of the university's newest academic unit, the College of Science, effective July 1.

Hanrahan joined the Marshall faculty in 1963 and has directed the chemistry program--considered one of the university's strongest undergraduate/graduate programs--since 1967.

"Dr. Hanrahan's leadership abilities are well recognized by the university community," MU President Robert B. Hayes said. "Perhaps even more importantly, he has earned the respect of his peers in both the academic and industrial worlds.

'Dr. Hanrahan has served effectively not only in the classroom, but he has kept the development of Marshall's chemistry program in step with today's technology. We believe he will be equally effective in developing the College of Science," Hayes

Hanrahan was one of 120 applicants considered for the position, according to Dr. Paul D. Stewart, MU Graduate School dean, who headed the search committee for the new

### Death claims department head, retired librarian

A Marshall University department chairman and a retired head librarian died earlier this month.

Funeral services were held June 10 at Bates Memorial Presbyterian Church here for Samuel T. Stinson, professor and chairman of the Engineering Department. He died June 6.

Stinson, a native of Cabell County, joined Marshall in 1940 as an instructor and became department head in 1960. A veteran of World War II, he served as a Naval officer from 1943-46 and again from 1950-51.

Stinson, 58, was a member of several national and state professional organizations and the Huntington Engineers' Club. He and his wife, Geraldine Chaney Stinson, made their home in Ona. Survivors in addition to Mrs. Stinson include: two sons, Spencer of Huntington, and Scott of Wilmington, Del., and a sister, Mrs. Ona Frances Gadd of Charleston.

### SID position is filled

John Evenson, former assistant director of public relations with the New York Jets of the National Football League, has been named sports information director at Marshall University. His appointment was effective earlier this month.

Evenson, 28, succeeds Sam Stanley, who resigned last fall. Evenson began his professional career in 1967 as a sports writer with the Fort Myers News-Press and later was a member of the Asheville (N.C.) Citizen sports staff. He served one year as director of sports information and promotions at East Carolina University, before becoming director of public relations for the North Carolina Medical Society. He later became public relations director of the Charlotte Hornets in the now-defunct World Football League, and joined the Jets staff in early 1976.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday, June 15, in Roxboro, N.C., for Miss Rosa V. Oliver, 86, of 527 16th St., with burial following in the Leas Chapel Methodist Church cemetery. She died June 13.

Miss Oliver came to Marshall in 1926 as assistant librarian and served from 1934 to 1956 as head librarian. After retiring from Marshall, she headed Substitute Parents, a local babysitting service.

A member of the American Association of University Women and Altrusa, she was a past president of Alpha Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma, educators honorary, and a former treasurer of the West Virginia Library Commission. Miss Oliver was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church. She is survived by a sister and three brothers, all of North Carolina.

## State mental health head joins medical school faculty

Dr. Mildred Mitchell-Bateman, director of the West Virginia Department of Mental Health, has accepted an appointment with the Marshall University School of Medicine, according to Dr. Robert W. Coon, vice president for health sciences and medical school dean.

Dr. Bateman has been named chairman of the school's Department of Psychiatry and will hold the rank of professor. "We expect that she will be able to join us by July 1," Coon said.

"The school is indeed fortunate to have such a distinguished leader in the mental health field on its staff," Coon noted. "Dr. Bateman's contibutions in her field have been recognized not only at the state level, but nationally as well. She will be a great asset to our medical education program."

A native of Georgia, Dr. Bateman first came to West Virginia in 1947 as a staff physician at Lakin State Hospital, where she also served as clinical director from 1955 to 1958 and then as superintendent until 1960.

She has been directing the state mental health program since 1962 and prior to then was supervisor of the department's Professional Services Division.

A cum laude graduate of Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C., Dr. Bateman earned the M.D. degree from the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania and served a rotating internship at Harlem Hospital in New York City.

## Taft seminar draws political figures to campus

Nearly two dozen national, state and county political figures will be the speakers for the three-week Taft Institute of Government Seminar, which began Monday, June 13, at Marshall University.

The seminar, held annually in West Virginia for the past nine years, is co-sponsored by the Robert A. Taft Institute of Government and Marshall's Political Science Department.

Thirty West Virginia secondary and elementary school teachers, librarians and school administrators will take part in the seminar on practical politics, according to Dr. Troy M. Stewart, MU assistant professor of political science and seminar coordinator.

Professor William R. Ross of the West Virginia University political science faculty is the semianr director. He also lectures and leads the discussions on American governmental and political processes.

Heading the list of political figures scheduled to speak during the two-week seminar was former West Virginia Governor Arch A. Moore Jr. Another former governor, Cecil H. Underwood, will address the seminar banquet, scheduled 7 p.m. Thursday, June 30, in Memorial Student Center.

### Note: change in policy

Because of some students' evasion of the requirement to obtain the instructor's signature on the withdrawal form for dropping individual courses, the following policy has been adopted by the academic deans, effective immediately:

When a single course is dropped, if the withdrawal form does not have a valid faculty signature, the action is nullified, and the instructor will

assign the appropriate grade.

This statement is recommended as part of the official withdrawal policy printed in the university catalog. It will require the student to contact his instructor prior to dropping a course.

For students who withdrew entirely from the university, the deans' offices will notify the instructors

through the use of the ususal reporting forms.

### WVU professor accepts post with medical school

Dr. Frederick J. Lotspeich, professor of biochemistry at West Virginia University's School of Medicine, has accepted an appointment with the Marshall University School of

A member of the WVU medical school faculty since 1956, Lotspeich will become chairman of Marshall's Biochemistry Department, effective July 1, Dr. Robert W. Coon, MU vice president for health sciences and medical school dean, said. He will hold the rank of professor.

"Dr. Lotspeich is well known to his colleagues for his work in medical education and his research on cancer and Vitamin Coon said. "We are very pleased to have him join the faculty and believe his appointment will do much to enhance

our medical education ties throughout the state.'

A 52-year-old native of Keyser, W. Va., Lotspeich earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees in chemistry from WVU. He received the Ph.D. degree from Purdue University. He was a graduate

teaching assistant at both WVU and Purdue.

A former research chemist for E.I. duPont, Lotspeich also taught at Simpson College. He has received nearly \$300,000 in research grants from the National Institutes of Health and WVU. Lotspeich has had more than two dozen articles published in scientific and professional journals.
