Kenneth E. Blue, director of counseling and group resources in the Student Affairs Division at Marshall University, has been promoted to associate dean for student development.

Blue assumed his new duties Aug. 20, according to Dr. Richard G. Fisher, vice president for student affairs.

In addition to teaching classes program coordinators are responsible for developing, refining and evaluating the programs and work closely with their program's advisory committee.

Blue succeeds Dr. Richard W. Waite, who has resigned to become dean for student affairs at Ohio Dominican College in Columbus.

The announcement marks Blue's second promotion within a month, Fisher noted. Blue has been a staff counselor in the student affairs area prior to assuming his present position.

"While we regret very much losing an administrator as highly qualified as Dr. Waite, I am pleased that we have on our staff a person of Mr. Blue's caliber who can move into the position immediately and maintain a high level of service to students," Fisher said.

The associate dean for student development has administrative responsibility for the human relations area, which includes minority, women's, international students and vocational rehabilitation programs. He also is responsible for the counseling, health and student orientation programs, as well as special learning services provided for disadvantaged students.

Interim dean named for College of Education

Dr. Jack Jervis Jr., chairman of Marshall University's Curriculum and Foundations Department, has been named interim dean of the MU College of Education, according to Dr. Noel J. Richards, MU vice president for academic affairs.

Jervis will head the college while a search committee, composed of faculty, administrative staff and student representatives, screens candidates for the position, Richards said. The post became vacant July 1 when the former dean, Dr. Bernard Queen, became director of development for the university. Jervis' appointment is effective immediately.
