45 newcomers join MU faculty

Forty-five new faculty members have joined Marshall University's full-time instructional staff for the 1977-78 academic year, according to Dr. Noel J. Richards, MU vice president for academic affairs.

Associate dean, director named for student affairs

Two key positions in the Marshall University Student Affairs Division have been filled, Dr. Richard G. Fisher, MU vice president for student affairs, announced.

Mary-Ann Thomas of Denver, Colo., and Ann E. Zanzig of DePere, Wis., have been appointed as associate dean for student life and director of residence life, respectively.

Ms. Thomas, who assumes her duties Oct. 1, will be responsible for coordinating all areas of student out-of-classroom programming, including student government, organizational activities, residence hall life and the entertainment and cultural aspects of campus life, Fisher said. "She also will be involved in helping set directions for the division in its relation to the university as a whole."

Ms. Zanzig, who joined the staff Sept. 1, will work with other student affairs staff members in selecting, training and supervising residence hall directors and advisors, and will be responsible for administering the Student Code of Conduct. Her areas of responsibility also include developing programming to enrich residence hall life. Ms. Zanzig will report to the associate dean for student life, Fisher said.

A candidate for a doctorate in educational psychology at Kent State University, Ms. Thomas currently is counselor and coordinator of student health services at Arapahoe Community College, Littleton, Colo. She also is an instructor in the college's behavioral studies division.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Akron and a Master of Arts degree from Kent State University where she majored in student personnel-counselor education. She has also taken postgraduate work at the University of Kansas.

Ms. Zanzig earned her B.S. degree in psychology from the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point and her M.S. Ed. degree from the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh.

She has been associate dean of student life at St. Norbert College, a private college in DePere, since 1974, where she was responsible for the 1,000 student capacity residence halls and off-campus housing. She also supervised the management of the Student Health Center, College Activities Board and the student newspaper.

DR. HOWARD A. SLAATTE, professor of philosophy and departmental chairman, has a new book out, "The Arminian Arm of Theology," published by University Press of America. The two-part work, his sixth book, deals with the thought of John Fletcher, first Methodist theologian, and his precursor by a century and a half, James Arminius, left-wing Dutch theologian at the turn of the 17th Century.
