Nursing graduates score high on test

Marshall University's 1990 nursing graduates achieved a 97 percent passage rate on state licensing examinations, according to School of Nursing Dean Carolyn Gunning.

The 97 percent rate compares to a 90 percent rate for West Virginia as a whole, Dr. Gunning said.

"We're particularly pleased to see such good results from our students because this is the first class that has graduated from our four-year baccalaureate degree program," she said. "It's very encouraging that the first group through the new curriculum has done so well."

Before 1986, Marshall had two separate but related nursing degrees: an associate degree program and an upper-division bachelor's degree program for registered nurses who were already licensed.

"I think this year's licensing exam results indicate that, despite shortages nationwide, we are attracting extremely well-qualified students and that we have a solid program that prepares them for success in nursing," she added.

The licensing exams are administered by the West Virginia Board of Examiners for Registered Professional Nurses.

"In fact our grant graded out at 94.5 percent, the highest scoring Student Support grant submitted by the university during the program's 20-year history."
