Harris, Buskirk Halls to be dedicated

Formal dedication ceremonies will be held Friday afternoon, Nov. 5, on campus for two Marshall University structures named for a former Graduate School dean and a long-time dean of women, MU President Robert B. Hayes announced today.

Plaques will be unveiled designating the four-story academic building, completed in 1975, and a women's dormitory, in use since 1965 and formerly called West Hall, as Arvil Ernest Harris Hall and Lillian Helms Buskirk Hall, respectively.

All friends of Dr. Harris and Mrs. Buskirk are invited to attend the ceremonies and the reception which will follow in the Special Dining Room of Memorial Student Center.

Search resumed for Academic Affairs head

Marshall University is resuming its search for a vice president for academic affairs to succeed Dr. A.M. Tyson, who will retire next summer.

About 100 applicants were screened by a search committee last winter and spring and several were brought to the campus for personal interviews. However, the search for a successor proved fruitless and President Robert B. Hayes asked Dr. Tyson to postpone his retirement, which had been scheduled last summer.

Members of the search committee are Dr. Mahlon C. Brown, chairman of the Academic Planning and Standards Committee; Dr. Merideth P. Wiswell, College of Business; Dr. Dorothy Hicks, College of Education; Dr. David Woodward, College of Arts and Sciences; Gene Murphy, an undergraduate student, and Nikki Humrichouser, a graduate student. Dr. Tyson is chairman.

Representatives of the respective colleges were selected in faculty elections last year.

Applications for the position will be accepted until Dec. 15, Tyson said. The committee will screen the applications and make a recommendation to President Hayes for the final appointment. Hayes said he hopes to fill the position no later than July 1, 1977.

The ceremonies will begin at 3:15 p.m. at Harris Hall, located at 18th Street and 3rd Ave. Mrs. Harris will unveil the plaque inscribed with her late husband's name. She will be introduced by Dr. Edwin A. Cubby, chairman of the MU Social Studies Department. Following the unveiling, Dr. Hayes will speak.

At 3:30 p.m., Buskirk Hall, located a few feet southwest of Harris Hall, will be dedicated. MU Executive Vice President Olen E. Jones Jr. will introduce Mrs. Buskirk, who will unveil the building's plaque. Comments by Dr. Hayes will follow.

Dr. Harris came to Marshall as a political science instructor in 1936. He later became chairman of social studies and was appointed dean of the Graduate School in 1948. He served in that capacity until shortly before his death, Dec. 29, 1964.

Mrs. Buskirk served Marshall from 1937 until her retirement July 1, 1970. During most of that 33-year period she was dean of women.

Mrs. Buskirk still makes her home in Huntington.

Death claims Dr. Harold E. Neely

Funeral services for Dr. Harold E. Neely, associate professor of political science and director of grants at Marshall, were conducted Monday at the First Presbyterian Church of Hinton with burial following at the Greenbrier Burial Gardens.

The 58-year old Hinton native died early Friday after

suffering a heart attack at his Charleston home.

In 1960, Neely was the Republican gubernatorial nominee, but lost the bid for the governor's chair to Democrat W. W. Barron. A former state insurance commissioner and commissioner of public institutions, Neely came to Marshall in August, 1972.

In addition to his bachelor's and doctoral degrees from West Virginia University, he earned an LL.B. degree from

Harvard Law School.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. R.C. Neely of Hinton; his wife, Betty; a son, Harold Neely Jr. of Morgantown; a daughter, Mrs. Jennie Martin of Atlanta, Ga.; two grand-children; one brother, and two sisters.

Marshall University's Oral History of Appalachia Program has been selected for inclusion in the New York Times Oral History Program, Dr. Michael J. Galgano, MU associate professor of history, announced today.

Transcripts of 125 interviews conducted with older Appalachians will be microfilmed and distributed to libraries and research facilities by Microfilming Corporation of America, a New York Times Company subsidiary, said Galgano, who directs the Marshall project.

As part of the NYT Oral History Program, Marshall joins such institutions as Columbia, Stanford, Hawaii and Texas universities, Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the American Film Institute.

EEO Conference to be here next week

Marshall University, in cooperation with West Virginia University, will conduct an Equal Employment Opportunity Conference Thursday and Friday in the Student Memorial

Marvin E. Billups, Marshall affirmative action officer, said the purpose of the conference is to provide representatives from both the public and the private sectors with an understanding of laws relating to job discrimination. The conference is designed for persons responsible for employment practices and affirmative action plans of their respective firms or organizations.

Representatives of the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and the U.S. Department of Labor will be among the speakers discussing legal, social and economic implications of Equal Employment Opportunity legislation and implementation of the laws, regulations and guidelines.

Among the topics to be discussed are "EEO Investigations," How to Conduct a Lawful Employment Interview," "EEO Awareness Program for Supervisors," "Equal Pay for Equal Work" and "Age Discrimination and Reverse Discrimination."

The Oral History of Appalachia Program was started in 1972 by Galgano and Dr. O. Norman Simpkins, MU professor of sociology and anthropology, with "bits and pieces" of funding from various community organizations.

In April 1974, however, the project received financial stimulation with a three-year grant of \$44,500 from the Marshall University Foundation, Inc. The oral history project was designated by the Foundation for funds from its successful Forward Marshall Campaign.

Royalties from the sale of the MU collection will be channeled back into the Foundation, earmarked for continuation of the project after the current funding runs out June 30, 1977.
