

Journalism Department awarded research grant

The Department of Journalism at Marshall University has been awarded a \$500 grant from the Reader's Digest Foundation, according to Dr. Deryl R. Leaming, chairman of the department.

"Grants will be made out of this fund to students to cover their expenses for news research projects," Dr. Leaming said.

He pointed out that money from the Reader's Digest Foundation will be used primarily to assist students involved in news research projects with their travel expenses.

"Any student who needs to travel to complete a news research project may apply for money to offset the cost of travel as well as incidental expenses related to the project itself," Dr. Leaming said.
