Med school report is issued

A decision on the proposed Marshall University medical school is anticipated by about July 1, Dr. Charles D. Corman, associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and project director, said Tuesday.

In a news meeting with President Barker, Dr. Corman told reporters the university would probably be notified of the application action by the end of the current fiscal year.

Dr. Barker released a 67-page progress report detailing the narrative portion of the voluminous application presented to the Veterans Administration top officials last month. Dr. Barker accompanied Gov. Moore and West Virginia Sens. Jennings Randolph and Robert C. Byrd for the presentation.

The school would begin with an initial class enrollment of

24 students with probable growth to a class size of 72.

A proposed budget of \$984,765 has been suggested for fiscal year 1975, effective July 1. Under the proposal, the Veterans Administration would provide more than two-thirds of this amount.

Further development plans include preparing for site visits by accrediting groups and VA officials, organization of a committee to develop the framework of the school and the future search for a medical school dean.

Dr. Barker also told newsmen assurances of support for the school from the West Virginia Board of Regents should be forthcoming.
