Two MU programs retained

The West Virginia Board of Regents, meeting Tuesday at West Virginia Institute of Technology at Montgomery, voted to retain two Marshall University programs which would have been terminated under the board's "Plan for Progress," the plan for West Virginia higher education in the 1970's.

Basing its action on additional information supplied by Marshall, the board voted to retain the Master's-level program in Speech Pathology and Audiology and the Baccalaureatelevel program in Cytotechnology.

Noting that Marshall President John G. Barker had submitted a four-page document in support of his recommendation that the two programs be retained, Chancellor Prince B. Woodard said the Regents' decision Tuesday was a "classic example of the board's flexibility in its recommendations."

Self Study copies being distributed

Copies of the Institutional Self Study have been distributed to members of the North Central Association visiting team, to many campus administrative offices, and to most academic departments, according to Dr. A. Mervin Tyson, director of the study.

Additional copies are being distributed daily, as rapidly as binding is completed, Dr. Tyson said. Completion of the printing and binding is scheduled for Feb. 15.

Phillips has text published

Bernice Maxine Phillips, associate professor of English at Marshall, has just had published a textbook entitled "How to Visit a Tombstone: A Creative Guide for Freshman Writing."

The textbook consists of nine chapters containing autobiographical essays with an analysis of each to demonstrate to freshmen that writing can be fun and that student essays can be interesting reading.

The text was published in January by Kendall/Hunt Publishing Co., Dubuque, Iowa, and is on sale in the Marshall Bookstore.

Miss Phillips began writing the book two years ago and completed it in final form while on a semester semester's sabbatical leave from Marshall in 1971. The text has been adopted by Marshall's English department as a supplemental text for English Composition 101.

Credit Union meeting

The annual meeting of The Marshall Federal Credit Union will be held Mar. 14 at 4 p.m. in Smith Hall Room 161, according to Dr. E. S. Hanrahan. Tuesday afternoon directed Chancellor Woodard to negotiate a contract with a consultant to "finalize the data" concerning a proposed joint Marshall University-Veterans Administration medical school in Huntington. Dr. Woodard announced the decision following a closed session in his Charleston office. He said he would begin to contact a priority list of the possibilities given him by the committee and would attempt to "consummate the agreement as rapidly as possible." He said he has been asked to make the arrangements prior to the Regents' next scheduled meeting, March 6.

On another matter involving Marshall, the board voted to cancel a project recommended in the Campus Facilities Plan which would have resulted in the construction of several temporary classrooms on the third floor of James E. Morrow Library.

Dr. Barker earlier had notified the Regents that the classroom facilities could be found elsewhere on campus and recommended that the money be used in the development of permanent physical facilities. The Campus Facilities Plan had estimated cost of the project at \$47,300.

WMUL Radio expands schedule

WMUL-FM, the Marshall University radio station, has expanded its schedule into the evening hours three days a week, Station Manager R. Dean Sturm announced.

The station has been broadcasting from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each weekday. Now, however, it will remain on the air until 8:05 p.m. each Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Sturm said.

The station is operated by student volunteers. Graduate student Tom Hayes has joined the staff and is conducting the new evening broadcasts, Sturm said.

"The final two hours of the new evening schedule will be devoted to 'Evening Concert Hall' which will feature the best from our new recording library as well as performances taped in the Marshall recital hall of the university faculty and music students--including the recent Jazz Festival here," Sturm noted.

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RCIE under new leadership

The Regional Council for International Education has announced a change in leadership. Dr. Shepherd L. Witman, the founder and president during the fourteen-year history of the organization, is retiring. The RCIE Board of Directors has announced the appointment of Dr. Joseph J. Malone as the next president, effective Mar. 1.

Dr. Malone, a graduate of the University of Washington and King's College of the University of London, served as research analyst for NATO and the U.S. Army, and as a history professor of the University of Alberta in Canada before going to Lebanon in 1961. He also served for ten years at the American University of Beirut. Subsequently he assumed the chairmanship of the department of history at Kansas State University and is coming from that post to the Regional Council.

The Regional Council for International Education of which Marshall is a member institution was founded as a joint effort by 26 colleges and universities in Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia to strengthen the international dimension of higher education through interinstitutional cooperation. The primary concern was to provide programs for faculty and student development in overseas study and exploration of new avenues in international education.

Marshall's liaison to the Regional Council of International Education is Dr. A. Mervin Tyson.
