## MED COMMITTEE IS NAMED

President John G. Barker Tuesday announced the names of nine persons who have accepted appointment to the new Marshall University Medical School Committee. He previously had designated Dr. William K. Easley, vice president for academic affairs, to serve as chairman.

Others named to the committee:

--Dr. Albert C. Esposito, Huntington physician who has been a leader in efforts to obtain a Marshall-Veterans Administration medical school for Huntington.

--Carl Cossu, assistant administrator of the Huntington Veterans Administration Hospital.

--Dr. Sam Clagg, chairman of Marshall's University Council.

--Dr. Robert Alexander, chairman of Marshall's Academic Planning and Standards Committee.

--Dr. J. Holland Hoback, professor of chemistry at Marshall.

--Dr. Howard Mills, director of medical technology at Marshall.

--Mrs. James L. Chambers and Richard Spurlock, Marshall students.

--John S. Callebs, assistant to the vice president for academic affairs, who will serve as secretary of the committee.

The ad hoc committee will coordinate Marshall's efforts toward development of the medical school, and will accumulate and make available information needed by other agencies involved in the establishment of the proposed facility.

The announcement was made during Dr. Barker's weekly meeting with representatives of the area news media. The news meeting was videotaped by WMUL-TV (Channel 33) and will be broadcast this Sunday at 4 p.m.

### Low bid for Prichard

Neighborgall Construction Co. of Huntington was the apparent low bidder on a contract to renovate Prichard Hall with an offer of \$671,400. The West Virginia Board of Regents opened bids on the project Feb. 21.

Other bidders were C.H. Jimison & Sons, Inc., \$677,500, and E.P. Leach & Sons, Inc., \$689,470.

Prichard Hall, formerly a dormitory, will be renovated to house classrooms, offices and the Computer Center.

Robert Allen, director of physical facilities for the Board of Regents, said the board would study the bids before awarding the contract, but did not speculate on a date for the award.

### \$500 presentation made

A check for \$500 was presented to the School of Business Development Fund by Eugene Collins and Edward King, representatives of the Peat, Marwick and Mitchell Foundation at a luncheon meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 13. Representing the School of Business and Applied Science were Charles Webb, chairman of the accounting department, and Dr. Fu Tung Chen, associate professor of accounting.

### Music faculty member presents voice recital

Kathleen C. Duck, instructor of music, will present a voice recital Tuesday March 13, at 8 p.m. in Smith Music Hall. Dr. James Taggart, associate professor of music will be the pianist for the recital.

Selections include arias by Handel, aria from "The Abduction from the Seraglio" by Mozart, songs by Franz Schubert, songs from the "Nuits d'ete" by Berlioz and others.

The recital is open to the Marshall and Huntington communities.

## WHTN-TV SCHOLARSHIP

A \$150 scholarship will be awarded annually to a Marshall University student majoring in broadcasting by WHTN-TV of Huntington, Charles Harper, operations manager of the station, announced today.

The scholarship is to be awarded on the basis of academic merit and financial need. The recipient will be chosen by a faculty committee of Marshall's department of speech and the management of WHTN-TV. Any full-time student enrolled in the Marshall University broadcasting program may apply.

The first award of this scholarship will be made this April.

"This scholarship has been established to recognize the vital role the university is playing in developing talent for the broadcasting industry and for WHTN-TV in particular," Harper said.

Currently, four Marshall students are employed at the station in various capacities: Linda Painter Espinosa, who telecasts the midday news report; Steve Gill, a newsman, and Arnie Harrah, and Lewis Rowan, cameramen. Former Marshall broadcasting students who now hold full-time positions at WHTN-TV are Bob Smith, news director; Bob Burks, sports director and newsman, and Tom Tanner, newsman.
