### Gilley to address Marshall faculty Sept. 11


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Marshall University President J. Wade Gilley will address the first general faculty meeting of the 1997-98 academic year, Thursday, Sept. 11, at 4 p.m. in the Joan C. Edwards Playhouse.

Gilley's topic will be "Marshall's Paradigm Shift."

Dr. Corley F. Dennison, president of the Faculty Senate, said the new Marshall University Graduate College will be a priority for the Faculty Senate this year.

"With the merger of Marshall and the former West Virginia Graduate College to



Dennison, an associate professor in the W. Page Pitt School of Journalism and Mass Communications, was elected Faculty Senate president in the faculty election last spring. He succeeds Dr. Elaine Baker, professor of psychology.

Marshall University will be sponsoring a bloodmobile visit with the American Red Cross on Friday, Sept. 12, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Don Morris Suite, rooms E10 to E13 in the Memorial Student Center, according to Pat Miller, Donor Resources Consultant with the American Red Cross.

Healthy MU employees and students who are at least 17 years of age and weigh over 110 pounds are encouraged to donate blood. Less than one pint of blood is taken, which will be processed to help as many as four different patients.

"There is no possibility of getting an infectious disease from donating blood, because each needle is used one time and is then discarded," Miller said.

The need for blood remains constant as a result of accidents, surgeries and diseases, according to Miller. "Hospital patients use blood every two seconds," she said. "With the help of Marshall University staff, faculty and students, the Red Cross can continue to meet the blood needs of area hospitals."

People wishing to donate blood may sign up at Holderby Hall, Twin Towers cafeteria or the Memorial Student Center between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 10 and Thursday, Sept. 11.

"While sign-ups are encouraged, walk-ins are welcome the day of the bloodmobile visit," Miller said.

gave me some good advice," Dennison said. "I look forward to the next two years. Marshall is going through some major changes at this time.

"When the new Graduate College was created, Dr. Gilley issued two interim orders dealing with the new structure of Marshall University, following guidelines set by the State Legislature," Dennison said. "Now we have to work on establishing a permanent set of rules following those guidelines," he said.

"There are two amendments dealing with the Graduate College that the Faculty Senate will examine in our next meeting," Dennison said.

The Faculty Senate consists of 45 full-time MU faculty members. Each college is represented, with the amount of representation from each college determined by its number of faculty members.

"The Sept. 11 meeting is a general faculty meeting. We also have a regular Faculty Senate meeting Sept. 25," Dennison said. "All of our meetings are open to the public."

Electronic courses is another subject being examined by the Faculty Senate, according to Dennison. "We are currently looking into the possibilities of offering courses electronically," Dennison said, "and we are taking recommendations as to how they should be offered."

# MU awarded \$60,000 for research project

Marshall University has been awarded \$60,000 by the Northrop Grumman Corporation for a project involving image processing research, according to Dr. Herbert Tesser, coordinator of Integrated Science and Technology in the Department of Computer Science.

Tesser is principal investigator on the project, which focuses on analyzing high altitude and satellite digital imagery equipment. Its goal is to develop a program which allows the equipment to automatically recognize features in the image such as roads, railroads and rivers.

The work is part of Tesser's research activities which focus on providing computers with sensory capabilities and building reusable software tools for managing sensate systems.

Northrop Grumman will use the results of the project as part of the \$3 million Advanced Technology Demonstration for the Air Force. Before coming to Marshall in 1993, Tesser led a proof-of-concept project which was a precursor of the Advanced Technology Demonstration.
