Two-month, \$2,000 stipends from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) are available to humanities teachers for study in the summer of 1976, according to Dr. Paul D. Stewart, dean of the Graduate School. Applications must be in Washington, D.C., by Oct. 14.

Stewart said humanities is defined by the NEH as history, philosophy, language, linguistics, literature, jurisprudence, history and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion, and those aspects of the social sciences employing historical or philosophical approaches.

Bicentennial studies are encouraged. Nominations for the stipends will be made by the employing institutions.

Miss Robinson, retired MU professor, is dead

Miss Ruth Robinson of Huntington, retired Marshall University professor and former head of women's physical education at MU, died Tuesday, Aug. 26. She was 81.

She was a native of Saginaw, Mich., and received her B.S. degree from Michigan State University and her M.A. from Columbia University. She also studied at Harvard. She joined the Marshall faculty in 1932, after teaching in Michigan public schools and at Oregon State University. She retired from Marshall in 1962.

She was a member of the First Congregational Church and the Altrusa Club of Huntington.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Theodore Thomas of Turock, Calif.
