United Way campaign extended

Marshall drive reaches 78 per cent

The United Way campaign on the Marshall University campus has been extended two weeks until Nov. 25, according to Neal G. Adkins, assistant professor of accounting and co-chairman of the MU drive.

At the end of the normal campaign period Wednesday, the university community had pledged or donated a total of \$10,300, or 78 per cent of the \$13,250 goal.

Dr. Neil L. Gibbins, professor of education and the other co-chairman, reported that approximately half of the 1,177 people in the university community had made pledges or donations.

"If the people in the other half can find it in their hearts to give an average of \$5 to \$6 each we can make our goal," he said.

Gibbins asked members of the university community who have not made pledges or donations to contact him (696-6430), Adkins (696-2310) or any of the 21 United Way campus division leaders.

Faculty voting on Senate issue ends today

Today (Friday, Nov. 14) at 4 p.m. is the deadline for voting in the current faculty election on the University Senate document introduced at the Oct. 28 faculty meeting and discussed in the Nov. 4 meeting.

Ballots have been sent to each voting faculty member. Completed ballots must be delivered in person to the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Old Main 110, where a ballot box has been placed.

Terming the University Senate question "a matter of tremendous importance to Marshall University and particularly to the faculty," President Robert B. Hayes earlier this week urged "that each faculty member exercise his or her right and responsibility to vote on this issue."

Under provisions of the current faculty constitution, two-thirds of those voting must favor the proposals to adopt a new constitution and new by-laws for the question to be approved.
