ALUMNI GIVE MU \$5,000

Meeting Dec. 6, the Board of Directors of the Marshall University Alumni Association voted unanimously to present a gift of \$5,000 to the university, Alumni President Robert P. Alexander announced.

The money will be derived from proceeds of the Alumni Association-sponsored Marshall Memorial Invitational Basketball Tournament. This year's tournament, which opens tonight, is a complete sell-out.

This is the second gift to the university from the Alumni

Association in recent weeks. Earlier, the association contributed \$1,200 as an academic-athletic scholarship.

In other action, the Alumni Association's board unanimously approved a motion which "commends and supports the actions and decision of Dr. John G. Barker, president of Marshall University, in regards to the drug problem on the campus."

The motion refers to Dr. Barker's decision to enforce provisions of the Student Code of Conduct against six students charged with on-campus drug violations.

Lectureship program

Contributions totalling \$1,000 have been received by the Department of Political Science at Marshall for use in funding the political science lectureship program.

Established in 1970, the program allows the department to bring outstanding scholars to the campus for lectures on topics of current interest.

The 1972-73 lectures will be funded by a \$700 contribution from the Twentieth Street Bank of Huntington, which has supported the program since its inception, and a \$300 donation from Charles M. Polan Jr., Huntington businessman and legislator-elect.

Dr. Clair W. Matz, assistant professor and coordinator for the program, said the next lecture will bring Duke University professor Dr. Sam Cooke to the campus. Planned for March or April, Dr. Cooke's talk will reflect his specialization in political

The programs are open to the public and provide enrichment for students, faculty and the community by bringing prestigious scholars to the region, Dr. Matz said.

Past lecturers included Dr. Duane Lockard of Princeton University and Dr. James David Barker of Yale, both native West Virginians.

Campus landmarks restored

Near the southeastern corner of Old Main is an upright green standard with a large white "M" on top. The identity of this landmark has been lost, according to a recent inventory taken by Joseph Soto, Marshall's director of plant operations, and Steve Szekely, superintendent of buildings and grounds.

It is this anonymity of campus landmarks which President John G. Barker hopes to prevent in the future. There are many such time-worn plaques, markers and monuments on the Marshall campus, presented to the school by various student organizations and graduating classes. At least 11 have been located and identified in the inventory.

Dr. Barker has asked that the markers be refurbished and restored to the best condition possible. Marshall students have given proudly to MU and these reminders of alumni should be an important part of Marshall's present, Dr. Barker indicated.

ATTENTION FACULTY!

The attention of the faculty is drawn to the new policy of faculty loans of Library materials (see Faculty Manual - p. 17). Due to the press of an extraordinarily large amount of work at the loan desk, it may be very difficult to provide the faculty with a list of books still checked out in their names. The volume of such an undertaking could be tremendously reduced if faculty members would make an effort to return or renew their materials on or before the end of the semester, according to Kenneth Slack, director of libraries.

The new policy has enabled the Library to clear the card catalog of many dead cards for books that were charged to faculty and lost many years ago. Clearing the catalog or replacing the titles when possible has eliminated many frustrations in using our collections. Most faculty members have responded favorably to this new policy and have paid for the books that they could not return. There remains a few faculty members who have considerable numbers of books charged in their names which evidently they cannot account for. It would be appreciated if some accounting could be made on or before the end of this semester.

Williams granted leave

Duncan Williams, professor of English at Marshall, will assume the position of Director of Research for the Farmington Educational Trust, Oxford, England, on Jan. 1, 1973. The Trust functions as an advisory body to British universities, teacher training colleges, and schools in matters dealing with curriculum and other related affairs.

Professor Williams will be on leave from the Marshall faculty while serving in England and will resume his teaching duties on the MU campus at the beginning of the fall semester, 1973.

Professor Williams also has been named editor of the "Farmington Journal." According to Williams, "The first issue of the journal will appear in May/June 1973 and will appear thereafter at six-month intervals."

Williams is the author of the controversial "Trousered Apes," published in 1971 in London and published this month in the United States by Arlington House Publishers. "Trousered Apes" is a study of the influence of literature on society.
