Morris C. Shawkey memorial on Sunday

Memorial services will be held at 2 p.m. Dec. 16 at the West Jefferson, Ohio; United Methodist Church for Morris C. Shawkey, 80, who died Dec. 2 at his home in Darby Crest, Ohio.

Shawkey, a Marshall alumnus, was the son of the late Morris P. Shawkey, who served as Marshall's president from 1923 to 1935 and for whom the Shawkey Room in Memorial Student Center is named.

Shawkey's varied career included business, journalism, government service and National League Baseball. Serving in the U.S. Foreign Service, he was assigned to the ambassadorial staff of the American Embassy in Rangoon, Burma, from 1955 to 1957. Returning to the U.S., he became member-secretary of the West Virginia Board of Probation and Parole and later was appointed state liquor commissioner by then Governor Cecil Underwood.

Shawkey, once a reporter for the former Huntington Advertiser, later was associated with the Spencer Newspapers Inc., and was named editor of the Madison (Ohio) Press. In 1971, he retired from the Ohio Department of Urban Affairs.

Shawkey is survived by his wife, Marie; a stepson, Michael N. Cox of Columbus, Ohio, a grandson and a brother. His first wife, Helen Wilmer Shawkey, died in 1976. Shawkey donated his body to Ohio State University for science.

Special evacuation procedures established for handicapped

Special procedures have been established for assisting handicapped persons in the event of a campus emergency situation, according to Stephen Hensley, assistant dean for student development.

"It is imperative that arrangements be made in advance to provide this assistance," Hensley said. Instructors with handicapped students in their classes should ask for student volunteers to aid those students with disabilities, he said.

In the event of an emergency, the fire department recommends mobility-impaired students be taken to the nearest clear stairwell, so that when fire department personnel arrive they can carry the disabled person to safety.


Dear Students, Faculty and Staff,
