# Recommendations for long distance calling

Curtailment of direct dialed long distance calls is placing a heavier burden on the Marshall University telephone system, according to John McKinney, communications manager.

Impact of the cut can be lessened, McKinney said, if university employees follow these suggestions:

-Eliminate long distance calls whenever possible.

-If the call can't be eliminated, dial the university centrex console attendant ("0") for assistance. The attendant will help determine the most economical method of making the call.

-Exercise patience! The capacity of the university telephone system and the capacity of the state

government telephone system in Charleston are limited by the number of available lines.

-Be brief! If possible, limit the time of the call to three minutes. The number of calls that can be handled depends on the amount of time each call consumes.

-When possible, make necessary long distance calls in late afternoon and evening when the lines are not as busy.

The curtailment is part of the university's effort to meet recent budget reductions ordered by Gov. John D. Rockefeller IV.
