Noted cancer researcher to speak at med school

The former head of the Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research will discuss new developments in cancer research and other topics during a two-day visit to the Marshall University School of Medicine on Thursday and Friday, March 18-19.

Dr. Robert A. Good, currently with the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, will serve as the Wellcome Visiting Professor in Basic Medical Sciences, according to Dr. Albert G. Moat, MU Microbiology Department chairman.

Good's appearance at Marshall is sponsored by the Burroughs Wellcome Fund, a private, non-profit foundation dedicated to advancement of medical knowledge through research and education.

Good, who was president and director of the Sloan-Kettering Institute from 1973 to 1980, will present the "Wellcome Lecture in Basic Medical Sciences" at 4 p.m. Thursday, March 18, in the Multi-Purpose Room, Memorial Student Center. His topic will be "Diet, Immunity, Diseases of Aging and Cancer."

At noon that same day, he will discuss "Promising Initiatives in Cancer Research" at a Biomedical Science Seminar in Memorial Student Center 2W22.

After appearing at Pediatric Grand Rounds at 8 a.m. Friday at St. Mary's Hospital, he will lead a Basic Science Seminar at noon on "Immunodeficiencies of Man" in Memorial Student Center 2W22.

"We are extremely fortunate to have a physician/ scientist of Dr. Good's stature here," Moat said. "His lectures will be stimulating and informative experiences not only for the students, but for the science faculty and medical community as well," he added.
