1982-83 Artists Series program scheduled

A renowned piano duo, an outstanding opera company, a ballet company with pianist Ruth Laredo as accompanist, a holiday musical, and a major symphony orchestra will be the offerings for subscribers to the 1982-83 Marshall Artists Series' Baxter (Community) Division.

"We are pleased to announce an expanded Artists Series schedule for next year," Mrs. Nancy P. Hindsley, MU cultural events coordinator, "Community support of past seasons, including that of the Philharmonick Club membership, has made it possible for the Board of Trustees to offer five programs of superb quality—one more than we have been able to bring area arts lovers in recent years," she added.

The 1982-83 Marshall Artists Series' community programming includes:

-Sept. 22, the highly acclaimed husband and wife classical piano duo of Misha and Cipa Dichter.

-Oct. 27, the 14-member touring company of the San Francisco Opera performing Verdi's tragic opera "Rigoletto" in English.

-Dec. 3, the Omaha Community Playhouse's musical adaptation of Charles Dickens' immortal "A Christmas Carol."

-Feb. 21, the Hartford Ballet, celebrating its 10th anniversary with a special repertory program highlighted with pianist Ruth Laredo as guest artist.

-April 21, the Houston Symphony under the baton of its artistic advisor Sergiu Comissiona, who also is the Baltimore Symphony music director.

All performances will be staged at 8 p.m. in Huntington's Keith-Albee Theater.

"It will be a most exciting season, but even more exciting is the fact that the cost of season subscriptions for five events is only \$4 more than that for last year's four events," Mrs. Hindsley said.

"A season subscription, which assure's you of a reserved seat for each production, is a real bargain and, when you divide the cost by five programs, is less per event than that of the 1981-82 season," she said.

Season memberships for the five-program series are priced at \$52 for choice orchestra and loge seats, \$44 for remaining orchestra and loge seats, and \$36 for seats located in the balcony. There is a special \$18 youth rate for seats located in the balcony only which is applicable to young people age 17 or under.

"It is important that current subscribers act quickly to renew their memberships," Mrs. Hindsley said. "We can only hold those seats for a limited time," she said, adding that April 8 would be the deadline for renewals.

Tri-State Area residents who are not current season members, but who wish to become members should reserve memberships as soon as possible, according to Mrs. Hindsley. "We have only 1,200 seats available and many of those are held by long-time subscribers."
