UW contributions assist 27 local agencies

Money contributed to the Cabell-Wayne United Way remains in these two counties and is used to assist 27 different social services agencies, according to Dr. Mahlon C. Brown, co-chairman of the MU campus United Way drive.

"Of course, it is important to understand that the United Way funds are not the sole source of support for these agencies," Brown said. "It would be most unrealistic to assume this," he added.

Area agencies receiving funding include: American Red Cross of Cabell and Wayne counties, Association for Retarded Citizens, Barnett Child Care, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Black Diamond Girl Scout Council, Boys' Clubs of Huntington, Cammack Center, Cerebral Palsy Council, Ceredo-Kenova Community Center, Children's Dental Clinic, Family Service, Inc., Good Samaritan Center, Goodwill Industries, Huntington Pediatric Clinic, Huntington Special Olympics;

Kiwanis Day Care, Salvation Army, Scott Community Center, Senior Citizens Center, Stella Fuller Settlement, Tri-River Council Campfire, Tri-State Area Boy Scouts, United Way of Cabell-Wayne, USO, YMCA and YWCA.

Reception scheduled Sunday for Dr., Mrs. D. Banks Wilburn

Friends and former campus colleagues of Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, former Marshall University College of Education dean, are invited to attend a reception honoring the former dean and his wife from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 10, at the Birke Art Gallery in Smith Hall.

At the reception, a portrait of Dr. Wilburn, president emeritus of Glenville State College, will be unveiled. The portrait is the work of Mrs. Joyce Samples Tucker.

Wilburn resigned as College of Education dean in 1964 after 17 years as head of the teacher training program to become president of Glenville State College. He served in that post until retiring in 1977.

A native of Jefferson County, Wilburn received his early education at Shepherd College and West Virginia University. He earned the Ed.D. degree from George Washington University.

PHILIP W. CARTER, assistant professor of sociology/anthropology and DR. JAMES L. TAG-GART, professor of music, were the winners of the faculty election held recently to select two additional members for the Athletic Committee.

Carter, who received the highest number of votes, will serve the longer term which expires in 1985. Taggart's term expires in 1984. The pair were elected from nine candidates nominated at the Sept. 14 faculty meeting. Allocations to these various social agencies are determined by a committee of volunteers, members of the communities served by this United Way, Brown said.

In talking with the campus division workers for the drive, Brown compared the United Way program to a church mission, noting that instead of being in a country somewhere else that this was a mission to help people right here.

"We give of our means to such agencies as UNICEF and CARE to help them aid the poor and suffering in foreign lands," Brown said. "Through the United Way we can do these things for ourselves, for our own community. It is a way of providing-through cooperation-those services which we need but cannot afford on an individual basis," he added.

"Working together we can provide services to improve the quality of life in the community where we live. Our community is what we make it and it is up to us," Brown said.
