Stephen W. Hensley appointed special services program head

Stephen W. Hensley, Marshall University assistant dean for student development, has been named director of the Special Services Program, Associate dean for Student Affairs Ken Blue announced today.

Hensley, who will continue as assistant dean, succeeds Dr. Edythe Taylor in the Special Services post. Dr. Taylor resigned earlier this year to accept an assistant professor position in the MU College of Education.

A federally funded program, Special Services provides counseling and tutoring in skills development for disadvantaged college students, Blue said. "Steve Hensley's past experience and interest in counseling made him an ideal choice for this particular position," Blue said.

Hensley, a Huntington native, earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Marshall and is enrolled in the Ed.D. degree program offered jointly by Marshall and West Virginia University.

A member of the MU Student Affairs staff since 1972, Hensley has served as a counselor and assistant director in the Special Services Program.
