Title

- Must include 1 of the types of retirements listed below in the title.
- Format example:

Reflections on Retirement: Lessons from a Forced Retirement

Reflections on Retirement: Forced Retirement from the Military

Full Time Career Retirement: What to do next after Teaching for 40 years

- Interviewees must fit within one of the 10 recognized retirement types:
 - 1. Full-Time Career Retirement
 - 2. Early Retirement
 - 3. Mandatory Retirement
 - 4. Phased or Gradual Retirement
 - 5. Semi-Retirement
 - 6. Retirement Due to Health
 - 7. Retirement for Personal Pursuits
 - 8. Career Change Retirement
 - 9. Forced Retirement
 - 10. Entrepreneurial Retirement

1. Introduction (≤300 words)

- Briefly introduce the type of retirement your interview discusses and why it is a relevant topic in adult development/aging or mental health/counseling.
- Include a reference to one of the 10 retirement types, situating the story in that context.
- Explain the purpose of the manuscript (e.g., to present a unique retirement story and extract lessons for counseling practitioners and researchers).
- Optional: 1–2 sentences on why interviews are important, highlighting the value of lived experience and narrative in understanding retirement transitions.

2. Literature Review (≤1000 words, max 5 references)

- Summarize key findings from research that is related to your topic.
- Discuss how the literature informed the choice of interviewee and guided the creation of additional interview questions (up to 4).
- Emphasize the link between retirement experiences and implications for counseling practice.

3. Interview Approach (instead of "Method")

Rationale for Choosing the Interviewee (≤200 words)

- Explain why this person was selected, including relevance to the retirement type.
- Highlight any unique perspectives or experiences that make the interviewee a valuable source.
- Note confidentiality: the person may choose a pseudonym if desired.

Interview Questions

- Include the four standard questions:
 - 1. Can you share your career journey and describe what led to your decision to retire?
 - 2. What have been the most significant challenges and rewards you've experienced in retirement?
 - 3. How did you prepare for retirement, and what surprises did you encounter?
 - 4. Do you think counseling, or mental health support is helpful during retirement; if so why and what kind of support would be most useful?
- List the **up to four additional questions** developed based on the interviewee's context and retirement type.
 - Example: If the person had a **forced retirement**, one question might be, "What strategies helped you navigate an unexpected transition?"

Background of the Interviewee (≤300 words)

- Provide relevant personal and professional context:
 - o Age range/life stage at retirement
 - o General professional background (not limited to counseling)
 - o Social/family context if relevant
 - o Hobbies, interests, or post-retirement activities
 - o Anything that helps readers understand the individual's experience

4. Interview Section

- Present the interview in full narrative or **Q&A** format.
- Include direct quotes and stories that reflect the interviewee's experiences and reflections.
- Emphasize personal narrative over completeness; richness and depth of story are key.

5. Discussion (≤1000 words)

- Synthesize the interview: summarize main themes, reflections, and lessons learned.
- Connect insights to existing theory and research as relevant.

6. Implications for Practitioners (≤250 words)

- Offer concrete guidance for counselors informed by the interview.
- Tie recommendations to relevant counseling theories where applicable (e.g., lifespan development, adult transitions, role theory).
- Suggest approaches for supporting clients approaching retirement, navigating unexpected transitions, or reflecting on life stages.

7. Implications for Research (≤250 words)

- Highlight areas for future study inspired by the interview.
- Emphasize the value of qualitative, narrative-based insights for understanding retirement experiences.

8. Conclusion (≤100 words)

- Summarize the unique insights gained from the retirement story.
- Reinforce the contribution to understanding retirement transitions and their relevance to counseling practice and research.

• End with a reflective statement about the power of individual stories in guiding practitioners and informing future research.

Key Notes for Authors

- Must select an interviewee fitting one of the 10 retirement types.
- The type of retirement **must appear** in the title.
- Literature review is ≤ 1000 words with max 5 references.
- Interviewees may use a pseudonym to protect confidentiality.
- Focus on narrative richness and relevance to counseling practice.
- Provide the interview questions to the interviewee at least one week prior to the interview and provide them again the day of the interview.
- Use APA format for headings, citations, and reference page.
- The full manuscript must be no longer than 10 pages single spaced, times new roman, 12-point font. Submitted as a word document.
