There are Three Departments-Primary, Normal and Academical.

The Academical Department

Includes a full course of English and Classical studies adapted to fit young people for advanced standing in College, or for any kind of business. The studies of this are the same as those of the Normal Department given below, except that students are not required to pursue the professional studies connected with the Theory and Practice of Teaching.

Normal Department.

The arrangement of studies, and the methods of instruction used, are intended to furnish the students with: 1st. A thorough knowledge of the branches commonly taught in the schools of the State. 2d. A knowledge of the principles of education and of the art of applying them to practice in the school room.

There are two courses of study, namely: The Normal Training Course, arranged to prepare teachers for common ungraded and lower grade schools; the higher Normal Course, intended to qualify teachers to take charge of High or Union Schools, or to fit them to discharge the duties of Superintendent of county or city schools.

Primary Department.

The Primary Department, connected with the Normal School and under the supervision of the Principal, is so arranged as to constitute a model school, and intended to afford a practical exemplification of the principles and methods in an efficient course of Normal training.

Normal Training Course.

JUNIOR YEAR.

Mental and Written Arithmetic, Orthography, Reading, Penmanship, Geography, Botany, Vocal Music, Ethical Instruction, Composition, Grammar, Methods and Principles of Primary Instruction.





Particular attention is given, during this year, to the art of making the elements of learning interesting and attractive to the young, to the use of reading cards, primary school charts, and all kinds of primary school illustrative apparatus.

SENIOR YEAR.

Elocution, Composition, History of the United States, Drawing on Blackboard, Physiology, Vocal Music, Book-keeping, Natural Philosophy, Algebra, Etymology, Theory and Practice of Teaching, including the Principles and Methods of Organization, Classifying and Managing Schools, and the best methods of teaching the different branches.

Students not qualified to enter the junior class of the Normal Course, if of proper age and otherwise qualified, may receive in the school one year of preparatory instruction.

Higher Normal Course.

JUNIOR YEAR.

Higher Algebra, Trigonometry, Chemistry, Zoology, Surveying, General History, Composition, Botany, Geology, American Literature, History of Education.

SENIOR YEAR.

Mental Philosophy, Astronomy, Moral Philosophy, Analytical Geometry, Higher Natural Philosophy, Logic, Rhetoric, English Literature, Theory of Teaching.

Under "Theory of Teaching," in this course, the following topics will receive attention: The Mind, its nature and mode of action; the laws of mental growth and development, and the application of these laws to the business of teaching; school laws in general, and the school system of West Virginia in particular; School Supervision and Management; School House Architecture.

Students who do not wish to take the full course may join any class for which they are prepared.

DIPLOMAS.

Students completing any one of the several courses will receive a suitable diploma. The diploma of the Normal graduates will be signed by the State Superintendent of Free Schools, and will entitle the holder to teach in any county in the State, without further examination.



BUIL DINGS.

Our buildings consist of a main building, 40×70 , and one wing, 30×110 ; both three stories high, all fitted up and furnished in the best manner.

APPAR ATUS.

The school is now furnished with a good selection of Philosophical and Chemical 'Apparatus. A Geographical Clock; Terrestrial and Celestial Globes; Harper's Primary School Charts; Warren's Geographical Charts; McGuffey's Reading Cards, and a good collection of Hand Specimens for Geology and Mineralogy.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

A free Reading Room is kept open for the use of the students. It contains a selection of the leading papers and magazines in the country, with the school journals of different States.

We have now the nucleus of a circulating and reference library, containing about one hundred and fifty volumes.

TEXT BOOKS.

All Text Books and Stationery needed in the school can be procured here at lowest retail prices. Students should bring with them any books which they may possess; but are advised not to purchase any new ones till they arrive at the School.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS.

This institution being designed to serve the interests of all classes in the State, is, and always must be, unsectarian. All forms of private religious convictions will be respected. But while the sectarian part of religion is held in abeyance, sound morality and those great principles of revealed religion on which all sects are substantially agreed will receive due attention. The highest type of character is the intelligent Christian; to this all students will be urged to aspire. A student who does not possess and maintain a good moral character will not be allowed to remain in connection with the institution.

A Bible Class meets every Sabbath, and a Prayer Meeting every Wednesday evening. Attendance upon these exercises is optional with students. There is preaching either in the Chapel of the School, or in the church near by, every Sabbath.



Admission.

The Board of Regents of the State Normal School and its Branches held a called meeting at the Capitol, October 6, 1871, and made and ordained the following Rules and Regulations for the government of applications for, and admission into, the Normal Department of the State Normal School and its Branches:

RULE 1.—The number of students to which each county in this State shall be entitled to send to the Normal Department in the State Normal School, or either of its branches, free of charge for tuition shall be as follows:

2.—Applications for admission to the Normal Department of the State Normal School, or either of its branches, may be made to the Superintendent of Free Schools of the county in which the applicant resides; and said Superintendent shall select such a number as may be entitled to the privileges of the Normal Schools in his county in the foregoing apportionment.

3.—As far as practicable, males and females shall be selected in equal proportion.







- 4.—Male pupils must not be less than 15, and females not less than 13 years of age.
- 5.—No applicant for admission shall be selected by the County Superintendent unless he or she be of good moral character, and found upon examination to be entitled to a No. 4 teacher's certificate.
- 6.—The County Superintendent shall require each applicant selected to subscribe to the following declaration:

"I, ——, do declare that it is my purpose to become a teacher in	the
Free Schools of West Virginia; and I do solemnly promise that if admit	ted
to the Normal Schools of this State, I will, on completing the prescrib	oed
course of studies, spend one year in teaching in the Free Schools of this Sta	ite,
at the usual rates of compensation paid in the schools where my services in	ay
be rendered; or upon failure either to do so, or to complete said course	e, I
obligate myself to pay to the proper authorities of the school I may atte	end
the full amount of tuition fees charged to other students.	

- 7.— The County Superintendent shall give to each applicant selected the following certificate:

"Date---, 187-. ---- Co. Sup't of --- Co."

Provided, however, that the above rules shall not apply to certificates heretofore granted.

- 8.—The County Superintendent shall, immediately upon making a selection, notify the Principal of the school which the applicant may desire to attend, of the selection made by him, and keep a record of the same in his office.
- 9.—Each person selected by the County Superintendent upon having his (or her) certificate of appointment approved by his (or her) representative as aforesaid, shall file the same with the Principal of the school at which he (or she) may attend, who shall thereupon enter the name of said person upon his register of scholars, and file the said certificate and obligation with the archives of the school.
- 10.—All persons other than State students may be admitted to the Normal Schools of this State upon payment of such tuition fees and other charges as may be prescribed by the proper authorities.



11.—State students entering either of the Normal Schools may be transferred to either of said schools upon procuring a certificate of good deportment from the Principal of the School he has been attending, or by permission of the Board of Regents, but not otherwise; and the time he has attended shall be credited to him in course by the Principal of the school to which he is transferred.

To all persons appointed in accordance with the above provisions, tuition is free.

Students once admitted by appointment of a County Superintendent, can, by application to the Principal, obtain permission to be absent one or more terms, to engage in teaching, and again return to the school without a reappointment by the Superintendent.

If more than the allotted number from any county wish to attend, they are invited to correspond with the Principal of the school, in order that, if possible arrangements may be made to accommodate them.

Such as do not wish to avail themselves of this provision, can, by paying their tuition, enter the same classes and receive the same instruction as those who come on State account.

Students' rooms are furnished with stove, bedstead, mattress, washstand, table, two chairs, wash bowl, pitcher, pail, looking-glass, lamp and window blinds. Bed clothes and all other articles of room furniture other than those mentioned above must be furnished by the student. There is no provision for self-boarding in the buildings.

Board may be procured in private families in the vicinity at from \$3.50 to \$5.00 per week.

Board bill payable one-half at the beginning, the other at the close of the term.




Location.
