Registration

If any action of the Council does not appeal to your ideas don't go around on a whispering crusade (for they are very ineffective) but come to the next council meeting and state your complaints to us openly.

We as a Student Body have many things in front of us to accomplish, and in order to have our strength appreciated we must work together to make this the greatest year for Marshall College Student Government.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION OF MARSHALL COLLEGE

We, the regularly enrolled students of Marshall College, comprising the Student Association of Marshall College, in order to encourage active co-operation in the work of student government, to uphold the highest standards of honor and integrity in all matters of personal conduct, to strengthen cordial relations between faculty and students, to enact and enforce laws according to the grant of powers, to provide for the formation of an official body known as the Student Council, to give adequate and effective expression to the opinion of the student body in matters of general college interest, do hereby ordain and establish this constitution for student government of Marshall College.

ARTICLE I

SECTION I—All executive and legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in the president of the Student Association and the several members of the Student Council, elected as hereinafter provided.

SECTION II—The several members of the Student Council shall be:

1. Two representatives from each of the upper classes. Each upper class shall elect each year one representative for a term of two years, except the Senior class which shall elect a representative for only one year.
2. Two representatives from the Freshman class, one for a term of two years, one for a term of one year, elected by the Student Council from five nominees, elected by and

from the Freshman class at the time of the class organization.

3. Three representatives-at-large elected by the Executive Committee of Marshall College. These three shall be selected by the Executive Committee from six nominees, two from each of the three upper classes, said nominations to be made at the time of the organization of the classes at the beginning of the fall semester.

4. The president of the Student House Government Association.

5. The editors-in-chief of the official college publications, The Parthenon and The Mirabilia, as ex-officio non-voting members.

SECTION III—When vacancies occur in the representation, the vacancy shall be filled by the body represented as heretofore provided.

SECTION IV—

1. The Student Council shall be presided over by the president of the Student Association.
2. The Student Council shall choose at its first meeting from its membership, a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer, and any other officers deemed necessary.
3. In the event of a vacancy in any office of the council, the council shall fill the vacancy from its membership.

ARTICLE II

SECTION I—The powers and duties of the president of the Student Association of Marshall College, shall be:

1. Preside over all Student Council meetings, and call special meetings when he deems it necessary.
2. Appoint all special committees.
3. Make appointments to standing committees as hereinafter provided.

4. To present at the first regular meeting of the association each semester, a message, setting forth the principles, purposes, and aims of student government at Marshall College, and outlining any plans for the current semester.

5. Appoint two members of the Student Association to the Athletic Committee.

SECTION II—The powers and duties of the vice-president of the Student Association of Marshall College, shall be to assume the powers and duties of the president in the absence of, or at the request of the president of the Student Association.

SECTION III—The powers and duties of the secretary of the Student Association of Marshall College, shall be:

1. Conduct and preserve a written record of all Student Council meetings. At the end of the secretary's tenure of office, he shall deliver to the president-elect, his records, which shall, in turn, be entrusted to the new duly elected secretary of the council.

2. Carry on such correspondence as deemed necessary by the president and the council.

3. Dispatch any other duties as deemed necessary by the president and the council.

SECTION IV—The powers and duties of the treasurer of the Student Association of Marshall College shall be to be in general charge of all collections and disbursements of the finances of the Association.

ARTICLE III

SECTION I—The regular meetings of the association shall be the weekly assembly period.

SECTION II—A special meeting of the Student Association may be called by the president of the association, or by the president of the college, or by a petition signed by five per cent. of the association, which petition shall be filed with the secretary of the council.

ARTICLE IV

SECTION I—The first regular meeting of the Student Council shall be held the fourth week of the fall semester, the day to be selected by the president of the council.

SECTION II—The council shall meet regularly every two weeks following the initial meeting, except during vacations.

SECTION III—At its first regular meeting, the Student Council shall designate the time of its meetings.

SECTION IV—Nine regular members present at any meeting shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V

SECTION I—Nominations for the office of president of the Student Association of Marshall College shall be made at the first regular meeting of the association in May of each year. There shall be at least three nominees for the office of president. The nominees shall be academic, second-semester juniors. The student president, upon the assumption of his office, shall be an academic senior. The ballot shall be taken one week from the date of nominations, and in case there is not a majority vote, another ballot shall be taken one week later on the two candidates having the highest number of votes. A majority shall be necessary for election.

SECTION II—If the president be ineligible at the time of his assumption of office, the vacancy shall be filled by a regular election as hereinbefore provided to be held the third week of school of the fall term.

ARTICLE VI

Any member of the Student Council, or officers of the Student Association, may be removed from office upon a three-fourths vote of the Student Council. Charges shall be preferred by any member of the Student As-

sociation. The charges shall have been brought two weeks prior to the date of the vote, and each member of the council shall be notified of the nature of the meeting at least one week prior to the date of the meeting.

ARTICLE VII

Elections for all classes shall be held three weeks after the beginning of the fall semester. The officers to be elected by each class shall be: president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and representatives to the Student Council as hereinbefore provided.

ARTICLE VIII

The Student Council, as the duly elected representatives of the Student Association, shall have the power, subject to the approval of the State Board of Education, to enact rules and regulations in all matters of student activity not strictly academic.

SECTION I—The Student Council shall be in charge of assemblies, exercising this authority through a standing committee of five members, three of whom to be students appointed by the president of the Student Association, and two to be members of the faculty to be chosen by the president of the college from three nominees by the president of the Student Association.

SECTION II—(Student Activities Committee)

SECTION III—The Student Council shall arrange for the managing and publication of the Mirabilia, (college annual), and Parthenon, (college paper), through the appointments of editors and business managers upon recommendation of the predecessors in the respective offices the preceding year.

SECTION IV—The Student Council shall publish and circulate a handbook under the joint direction of the editors-in-chief of the Parthenon and the Mirabilia, containing the

constitution of student government, and covering one traditions and laws of Marshall College, and such other materials as may seem advisable.

SECTION V—The Student Council shall have the power to investigate any act of a student tending to jeopardize the good name of the institution, which charge may be preferred by a member of the association, and if it deems it necessary, the council may refer the case to a Judicial Committee, as hereinafter provided, for discipline.

ARTICLE IX

SECTION I—There shall be a Judicial Committee composed of four seniors and three juniors.

SECTION II—Members of the Judicial Committee shall be chosen by the Student Council from nominees by their respective classes.

SECTION III—One of the four senior representatives on the Judicial Committee shall be elected by this committee to act as chairman.

SECTION IV—The powers and duties of the Judicial Committee shall be to try all cases which are referred to it, coming under the constitution and rules made in accordance therewith. It shall have final judgment as to the constitutionality of acts of the Student Council under its grant of powers. The approval of the president of the college is necessary on all decisions of the committee involving suspension or expulsion of any student. Any student formally charged with any offense against regularly formulated rules and regulations, or having committed acts against the best interests of the college may, on vote of the Student Council, be prosecuted before the Judicial Committee. The committee, shall, as individuals, take the juror's oath of secrecy. No records, except final decisions, of the Judicial Committee, will be recorded and preserved.

ARTICLE X

SECTION I—Amendments to this constitution may be proposed, either by the Student Council, or by a petition signed by ten per cent, of the members of the association.

SECTION II—Amendments to this constitution will become valid and congruent parts of the constitution by a ratification by two-thirds of all the members of the association at a meeting called for that purpose, or, by a two-thirds vote of the members voting by ballot upon the proposed amendment. The method of voting shall be decided upon by the Student Council.

SECTION III—An amendment must be proposed at least two weeks before action can be taken upon it. The proposed amendment shall be given public notice on the college bulletin board, and advertised in the school newspaper at least ten days before a vote can be taken.

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Freshman Rules

These rules are drawn up in accordance with laws as outlined in the Constitution of the Student Association of Marshall College. They are strictly enforced by the Student Council through the Faculty "M" Association. As a class the freshmen will be expected to obey these rules and those functions as set forth in the Constitution.

Freshman Section

1. Freshmen will be expected at all times to be present for up-classes and to be ready for up-classes. They will be expected to be present for up-classes very early in the morning.

2. Freshmen must make to each enrolled student of Marshall College at all times. They must tip their hats to all faculty members.

3. Freshmen must yield their seats to visiting faculty members and up-classes in all meetings held on the campus and at all athletic events.

4. Freshmen must attend all pep meetings and athletic contests, all college meetings where their presence is desired, including their class meet-

Freshman Rules

These rules are drawn up in accordance with laws as outlined in the Constitution of the Student Association of Marshall College. They are strictly enforced by the Student Council through the Varsity "M" Association. As a class the freshmen will be expected to obey these rules and those functions as set forth in the Constitution.

1. Freshmen will be expected at all times to conduct themselves as underclassmen with utmost respect for upper classmen. This rule will be enforced very rigidly.
2. Freshmen must speak to each enrolled student of Marshall College at all times. They must tip their hats to all faculty members.
3. Freshmen must yield their seats to visitors, faculty members, and upper classmen at all meetings held on the campus and at all athletic contests.
4. Freshmen must attend all pep meetings and athletic contests, all college meetings where their presence is desired, including their class meet-

ings and must attend assembly in a body, sitting in the balcony.

5. All freshmen must carry the official Marshall cane to all football games.

6. Two weeks after matriculation, each member of the Freshman class must be able to recite on demand the college songs and yells.

7. Freshmen will not be allowed to use the walk up to the main entrance of the administration building. They will not be allowed to cut the campus.

8. All freshmen will use the side entrance to all college buildings.

9. Freshmen will not while enrolled at Marshall wear the athletic letter or any insignia of any other school.

10. No freshman will be permitted to smoke while on the campus or in the college buildings.

11. All male freshmen must wear the official green freshman cap at all times when on the campus, and in and around Huntington. While inside college buildings they may carry their caps in their hands.

12. All male freshmen will wear black ties and black sox exclusively.

13. Each freshman will be expected to purchase a copy of the Freshman Handbook.

14. Freshmen Rules will take effect Monday, September 16th, at 8 o'clock in the morning. They will continue until the end of the first semester. If the Thanksgiving Day football game is won (a tie does not count) the rules will be lifted on that day. Otherwise they will continue to be enforced until the time as stated above.

A Brief History

of

Marshall College

Marshall Academy, founded in 1837, was named after Chief Justice John Marshall. Until 1856, when it became known as Marshall College, it was a private institution. Experiencing a rapid growth in Civil War days, it was changed to a state normal school in 1867, although it remained academic in standing.

A practice school for teachers was established in 1902.

The college became a state teachers' college in 1920, and granted its first degrees to a class of four in 1921. In 1922, the state board of control granted the college the privilege to confer the bachelor of arts degree.

The college of arts and sciences was organized in 1924 with Professor R. J. Largent its dean. He continued in this office until June, 1928, when he resigned as dean because of ill health. He was succeeded by Dr. Hayes.

The only honorary degrees ever awarded by the college were degrees of doctor of laws to Ambassador

Dwight W. Morrow and Fielding H. Yost, athletic director of the University of Michigan at the 1928 commencement. Both of these men are natives of West Virginia, Mr. Morrow having been born in a room in College Hall. His father at that time was president of the school.

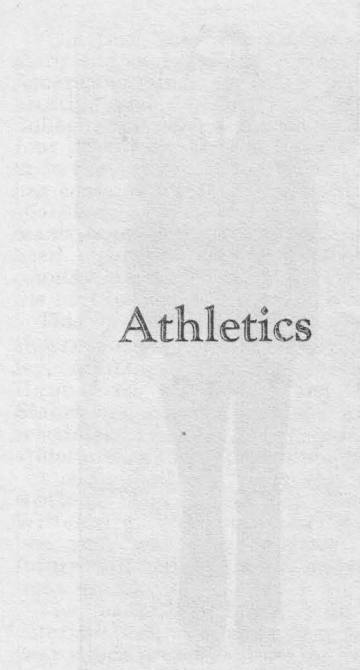

Athletics, the one factor that is more and more taking a hold of the American mind, is all supreme in prestige and popularity at Marshall College; for during the past three or four years no college in West Virginia, or in this section of the United States, has come to the front in the world of sportdom as has Marshall. Athletic teams representing this school have been victorious in all parts of the country and at the expense of some of the best nationally known universities.

This year under the continued supervision of Director, "Legs" Hawley, combined with the services of Head Coach Maebetsch and Coaches Staurt and Shafer, and the greatest schedules in history, much is in store, athletic speaking, for Marshall.

For football too much can not be written. The team that conquered Wittenberg, Wesleyan, and Louisville last year was great. However, the future will tell for itself, and predictions are sky high.

The basketball team, with many veterans back will face a schedule this year which promises to be the best yet, according to Director, "Skipper" Hawley.

For two consecutive years Marshall's baseball team has been declared state champions, defeating the University two out of two games last year, and doing the same job up at Rockne's school. The only defeat of the season came from Johnny Fulton's boys, from Barboursville, by the narrow margin of 8 to 7. "Doc" Noyes will captain the 1930 team.

This year "Legs" Hawley has given his word of honor that track will be revived.

The tennis team which had a very successful season last year will be continued with more scheduled inter-collegiate matches.

Wrestling, which had its inception at Marshall last winter, as a major sport, will be continued with a full schedule to be announced later.

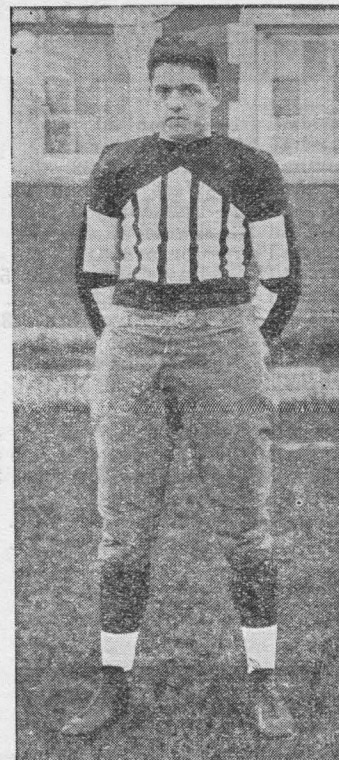

Inter-Fraternity Council

Rushing Rules

The Inter-Fraternity Council is composed of all of the social fraternities on the campus. These fraternities through the council have formulated the following rules which govern the pledging of prospective members.

(Note: A matriculate is a student enrolling in Marshall for the first time.)

1. Open rush season shall be the first three weeks of school of each semester.

2. Bids shall be extended between the hours of 7:00 and 11:30 p. m., Saturday evening of the third week.

3. A strict period must be observed by all fraternities from 12:00 a. m. of the third Sunday until 7:00 p. m. for the following Monday. During this time there shall be no communication between the fraternities and any Matriculate.

4. At the close of the silent period the Matriculate shall accept the bid of the fraternity he chooses by going, by his own free will, to the house of the fraternity.

5. A pledge to any fraternity must be a qualified student of Marshall

College and carrying at least 12 hours of college work at the time of pledging.

6. Any Matriculate renouncing his fraternity pledge shall not be extended a bid by any other fraternity until the following rush season. Any pledge being officially dropped shall be free to be pledged by any other fraternity.

7. In case of infraction of any rule or law formally stipulated by this council, the offender shall be tried by the council, and in case of a trial a faculty member shall act as judge, leaving to the council the power to give penalty.

Pan-Hellenic Association

Sorority activities at Marshall College are governed by the Pan-Hellenic Association, composed of representatives from each sorority on the campus. Pledging and rushing are governed by the following rules:

1. No girl shall be initiated into a Pan-Hellenic sorority until she has been a student at Marshall College for at least one semester, and during that time maintained an average of C or more in at least 12 hours of college work.

2. Rush week is the fourth week in each semester beginning Monday at 8 a. m. and ending Saturday night at 12 o'clock. After three weeks of silence from the day of pledging, there shall be open bidding. (That is, a sorority may bid a person at its will, but no parties are to be given.)

3. Invitations to rush parties must not be given before the Wednesday preceding rush week.

4. Rushees shall designate their preference of sororities to a designated member of the faculty who will notify the sorority of the acceptance.

5. Individual rushing prior to rush season is forbidden.

6. Any pledge of a sorority dropping a course within a month prior to

examinations taking place just before initiation time will be considered as failing the course dropped.

7. A mass meeting of possible rushees will be called by Dean Beaumont just before rush season opens. All rushees must attend this meeting.

8. Silence shall be maintained between rushees and sorority members from Saturday at midnight at the close of rush week until the following Monday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.
