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

Mrs. John F. McCuskey Will Seek Presidency

The Woman's Club of Clarksburg presents Mrs. John Fulton (Christine Young) McCuskey as a candidate for President of the West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. McCuskey's service record to her community, state and nation has been varied in scope and into many fields of activity. She has given unselfishly of her time and talents to youth projects, health, education, and is known throughout the state as an outstanding speaker on government and education. Consequently, many honors have been bestowed upon her.

In 1952 the United Church Women of America awarded her a National Citation for her day by day participation in Christian Citizenship; 1956 she received the first State Citizens Award for meritorious achievement in the field of Public Health. Governor Cecil Underwood has appointed her a member of the 1960 White House Conference on Education. She served as State President of the Woman's Auxiliary to the State Medical Association, National Treasurer of the Auxiliary to Southern Medical, and Regional Chairman of Nurse Recruitment for the American Medical Auxiliary. She served as President of the Clarksburg branch, American Association of University Women, is currently President of the Parent-Teachers Association Council, President of the St. Mary's Hospital Auxiliary and State Public Relations Chairman for the Union Protestant Hospital. She is a member of the Salvation Army Board and the Stealey Methodist Church Board.

Mrs. McCuskey participates actively in many sports. She was President of

West Virginia State Golf Association, 1954, and is one of the state's best tournament golfers.

Mrs. McCuskey taught for many years in the public schools of West Virginia, holding A.B. and B.B. degrees in languages and music. Many more of her presidential qualifications could be cited. Undoubtedly, each individual Woman's Club member could contribute to this summary of her unselfish service to mankind.

Mrs. McCuskey has a son, John Fulton McCuckey II, a seventh grade student at Central Junior High School.

Mrs. McCuskey's husband, the late Dr. John F. McCuskey, prominent Urologist and surgeon, was tragically killed in an automobile accident in October 1958. His death was a great loss to the medical profession and to his many friends—quoting the Clarksburg Exponent: "Today we sadly join the thousands who mourn throughout the State and Nation the passing of this great man—great as a friend, as a medical leader, and as a father, husband and family man."

"Creativity" Is Subject For GFWC Poetry Contest

"Creativity" is the subject for a new Poetry Contest sponsored by the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. G. William Jones, St. Johnsbury, Vt., chairman of the GFWC Fine Arts Department, will present a suitably inscribed silver "Paul Revere Bowl" to the winner during the GFWC Convention, June 13-17, 1960, at Washington, D. C.

Every club member, including those in the Junior Department, is eligible to enter the contest. Only one entry may be submitted by any member and it may be any type except light verse, not to exceed 32 lines.

Poems must be typewritten, with five copies of each entry submitted: the title of the poem to be printed at the top of the page. Contestants are told not to use title pages or pseudonyms, or to write name on entry. Inside a sealed envelope accompanying the entry enclose a paper listing the name of the entrant, her address and club affiliation. On the outside of the envelope, write only the title of the poem.

The contest will be a special classification in the annual poetry contest of the West Virginia Federation. The winning entry will be forwarded to the CFWC contest. Poems should be sent not later than February 25, 1960, to the state chairman of Literature and Drama, Mrs. James H. Nelson, 921 Beech Avenue, Charleston.


The president of the First Prize winning club will have her expenses paid to the General Federation Convention by Sears-Roebuck.
