## WEST VIRGINIA LUNCHEON

The annual luncheon of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution was held April 16, 1957 at one P.M. in the Carlton Room of the Sheraton-Carlton Hotel in Washington, D.C., with Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent, presiding. Mrs. Russell J. Bergen, State Chaplain, asked the Invocation after which the assemblage joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Mrs. Phillips thanked Mrs. Rudolph S. Stoyer for the luncheon arrangements and asked Mrs. Edgar Williams and Mrs. T. B. Leith, her committee, to stand.

Mrs. Phillips announced that Mrs. Boggs, Mrs. Boggess and Mrs. Wagner could not be present. She then introduced the following State Officers present: Mrs. V. Mrs. Phillips introduced Mrs. William Hicks of Louisiana, Mrs. Robert Humpheries of Georgia, Mrs. George Baber of Missouri, Mrs. Harold F. Machlan of Florida, candidates for Vice President General. Mrs. Phillips read a note of greeting from Mrs. W. H. S. White, Honorary State Regent of West Virginia.

She pointed out that this is the basic committee of our organization as other groups can do the civic work. She asked the copying of old cemeteries as a special project.

Mrs. Phillips showed pictures taken at the 50th anniversary Conference in Bluefield. Mrs. S. L. Miller was to take orders later.

Mrs. Holcombe asked that messages be sent to the Honorary State Regents who were absent.

# STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The State Board of Management of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia met April 16, 1957, in the Carlton Room of the Sheraton-Carlton Hotel, Washington, D.C., following the West Virginia luncheon with Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent, presiding. Mrs. Russell J. Bergen, State Chaplain, led the Board

in prayer.

Mrs. Phillips announced that the meeting was for the purpose of discussing further the membership cards. Mrs. Allen had been authorized to order 4,000 cards; the supply was exhausted; Mrs. Allen had ordered 2,500 more cards. Mrs. Bergen moved that Mrs. Allen order cards at her discression. Motion seconded and carried. Mrs. Phillips reminded that all orders must be sent to Mrs. W. Carroll Boggs, State Corresponding Secretary, accompanied by check.

Mrs. S. L. Miller moved that Chapters order membership cards in lots of 100. Seconded by Mrs. Henry Bell. Motion carried. Mrs. Holcombe moved that chapters be required to include 30c per 100 for postage for the membership cards. Seconded by Mrs. Cunningham. Motion carried.

Mrs. Phillips announced that West Virginia has been given a beautiful illuminated copy of the Constitution. It is to be presented to Jackson's Mill on West Virginia Day, June 20, in the Mount Vernon Hall. Mrs. Phillips may invite only 50 D. A. R. members as 250 young people will be in camp then. She stated that Honorary State Regents and State Officers would be invited and that a few Chapter Regents may come. She would issue invitations.

The State Regent announced that Mrs. Grant P. Hall, Jr., is the newest Chapter Regent, the 48th chapter, Anne Bailey, being confirmed

on Saturday.

Mrs. Phillips has ordered a bronze marker carrying the insignia-6" x 10", price \$22.00—for the copy of the Constitution. Mrs. Bergen moved that the State Regent be reimbursed. Mrs. Allen seconded. Motion carried.

Jackson's Mill Luncheon was announced for July 6, with Kanawha

Valley Chapter as hostess.

Mrs. Phillips announced a Year Book Contest and display to be held at Conference in October. Yearbooks are to be sent to Mrs. Phillips and to Mrs. Vernon Rankin, State Chairman Program Committee. Mrs. Phillips asked that the Regent or a delegate bring the chapter scrapbook to the Conference for display. The State Conference will be October 10. 11, 12, at the Chancellor Hotel in Parkersburg. The Board of Management will meet for luncheon at 12 noon, October 10. Miss Louise Bullock is Conference Chairman.

Board members were urged to attend their own District Meeting and to ask Chapter members to attend. Dates were listed: Northern, Parkersburg, April 27; Central, Morgantown, May 4; Southern, Kermit, May 11: Western, Cedar Lakes, May 18; Eastern, Martinsburg, May 25.

Mrs. Leith, State Historian, asked that Chapters be reminded that Cedar Lakes, the FFA and FHA Camp and Conference Center near

Ripley, is our state project and we have pledged \$2500.

Mrs. Phillips read a money making idea used by Wheeling Chapter. Mrs. Leith described a bakeless bake sale.

Minutes of the luncheon and Board Meeting were read and approved as read.

The Board stood in appreciation of the State Regent's outstanding meeting. Mrs. Phillips announced an Executive Committee meeting at the Mill, July 6. The meeting adjourned at 2:50 P.M.

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# FANNY WILSON FIELD (MRS. THOMAS W.)

Mrs. Thomas Wilson Field, affectionately known by many as Aunt Fanny was born in Spring Hill, Kanawha County, West Virginia, September 12, 1869. She passed away January 6, 1957 at the age of 88.

Mrs. Field possessed a very warm personality and was a colorful democratic leader for many years.

Other affiliations were: Saint John's Church, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Colonial Dames of America, and was a member of Kanawha Valley Chapter D. A. R. for 42 years, serving the Chapter as Registrar from 1917 to 1919—also Regent.

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# EUNICE PROCTOR PERKINS (MRS. EUGENE KENT)

Tribute by Mrs. S. L. Miller

The Ravenswood Chapter N.S.D.A.R., of Ravenswood, records with deepest sorrow the passing of one of its most beloved members, Eunice Proctor Perkins, January first, 1956. She was one of the three women ever elected Life Honorary State Historian of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia.

She was born November 22, 1876, the only daughter of Winfield Scott and Sue Haymond Proctor. She was graduated by Ravenswood High School at the age of fifteen and rode her bicycle twelve miles on Monday morning and back again Friday evening, to attend the Teachers Institute at Ripley, W. Va. She attended Marshall College and later taught in the schools at New Martinsville, W. Va. She married Eugene Kent Perkins December 25, 1902.

Mrs. Perkins organized the Ravenswood Chapter July 25, 1922, serving as its first Regent, and filling a second term as Regent 1948-51. She also served in the offices of Chapter Historian and Chapter Registrar, contributing research and preparation of application papers for the entire membership. Her never failing support, mature judgment, and clear vision of the Chapter's work were invaluable.

She enlisted members and assisted in the organization of the Spencer-Roane Chapter, at Spencer.

In the State Organization, she was Chairman of Genealogy for three years and State Historian 1934-37.

Governor Herman Guy Kump appointed Mrs. Perkins as the only woman of the twelve member Governor's Commission on Historic Markers, to select sights for bronze markers commemorating Historic events along the Highways of West Virginia.

Mrs. Perkins collected data and wrote the Historic Pageant for the Ohio River Festival at Ravenswood in 1936 and 1937.

She was a member of the Institute of American Genealogy, the Pennsylvania Society of the Colonial Dames of America, the United States Daughters of the War of 1812, and the Pen Women of America.

Her life was fully dedicated to historical research and study. She gained the well deserved reputation of being one of the Daughters of the American Revolution's most valuable members. Her loyalty, faithful service, and charming personality endeared her to her many friends throughout the state. "To live in the hearts of those we leave behind is not to die."

# Theme "OUR GOODLY HERITAGE"

"God built a continent with glory and filled it with treasures untold. He bedecked it with soft, rolling praires, and pillared it with sweet flowing fountains, and encompassed it with long, winding streams. He graced it with deep shadowed forests, and filled them with song.

"These treasures would have meant little if myriads of people, the bravest of the races, had not come, each bearing a gift and a hope. They had the glow of adventure in their eyes and the glory of hope in their souls; and out of them was fashioned a nation, blessed with a purpose sublime and the hope of prosperity.

- 7. A typewritten copy of each report must be handed to the Recording Secretary, after it is read.
- 8. All main motions must be presented in writing and signed by the maker.
- 9. All resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee.
- 10. Robert's Rules of Order, (revised) shall be the accepted authority on Parliamentary Law.

Whereas, Only one Resolution has been sent in to this Committee by

any Chapter or individual, and

Whereas, Certain of the Resolutions adopted by the 66th Continental Congress of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution are of such interest as to deserve recognition by the members of our State Society,

Resolved, That the 52nd Annual State Conference reaffirm the following

Resolutions adopted by the 66th Continental Congress.

#### OUR GOODLY HERITAGE 1.

Whereas. A priceless heritage of courage and faith in the principles of justice and freedom has been bequeathed to the descendants of the Christian men and women who founded the Nation and made it

Resolved. That members of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution dedicate themselves anew to the preservation of this goodly heritage from their God-fearing forebears, to cherish and maintain American freedom at all times and under all conditions, and to resist all efforts to weaken the American way of life.

#### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION 2.

Whereas. The National Society Children of the American Revolution serves as a training ground for, and makes a vital contribution to our Society:

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughter of the American Revolution in West Virginia, urge that the members revitalize their interest in and support the Children of the American Revolution, who are the future leaders of our National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

# REAFFIRMATION OF POLICIES

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, reaffirm the action taken at consecutive Continental Congresses over a period of years, namely: commendation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the services rendered by Congressional Committees investigating matters pertaining to internal security: endorsement of the principles of an amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America to insure the fact that a provision of a treaty or other International agreement which conflicts with any provision of our Constitution shall be without force or effect: opposition to socialized medicine: opposition to Genocide Convention and Human Rights Covenant: endorsement of programs for the promotion of patriotic guidance for youth and urging that American History be a required study in the Nation's schools and the promotion of the program designating the month of February as American History Month.

# STATE RIGHTS

Whereas. The Federal Government has, over the years, far exceeded its delegated powers and made progressive encroachments into the Constitutional rights of the several states of the Union, with devastating destruction of their vested rights, abridgement of their liberties, control of their institutions and many other varied and obtrusive rights:

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, urge a cessation of these prejudicial practices and return to the forty-eight states of their soveriegn rights under the Constitution of the United States of America.

#### CIVIL RIGHTS

5.

Whereas. The right of trial by jury as guaranteed by the Constitution, is a basic civil right necessary for the protection of the individual from the tyranny of government; and

Whereas. The gravest peril exists today to the civil liberties of all the citizens of the United States of America as evidenced by the increasing tendency of the Federal Government to encroach upon and absorb functions properly belonging to the several states, and to exert the powers so usurped by means either of administrative rulings by commissions and other governmental agencies, or by judicial action based on the substitution of injunction and contempt of court procedures for the normal constitutional processes of trial by jury;

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, recommend that the Congress of the United States reject all pending civil rights legislation and recognize the rights of the states to protect all citizens as provided in the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the United States of America.

# 6. IMMIGRATION AND NATIONALTY ACT (McCarran-Walter Act)

Whereas, The House Committee on Un-American activities has recently revealed that the Communist conspiracy in the United States has created over 180 organizations for the purpose of bringing pressure on the Congress to weaken the McCarran-Walter Immigration and Nationality Act; and

Whereas, In addition to these Communist-controlled organizations, certain politicians are seeking to solicit the so-called bloc vote of nationality groups by sponsoring amendments to the Immigration and Nationality Act which would open the flood-gates, undermine the National Origins Quota System, and remove the principal security safeguards of that Act, and it is imperative that the voices of individuals and patriotic organizations at the crossroads of America be heard emphatically on this issue in the halls of Congress:

Resloved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, reaffirm its confidence in and support of the McCarran-Walter Immigration and Nationality Act, and urge that this legislation be preserved intact.

# 7. FEDERAL BUDGET

Whereas, The largest peacetime budget in history is now pending and the proposed budget is in precarious balance, depending on postal increases and steadily rising income, when neither is assured; and

Whereas, Current taxes from all sources are taking a full third of the income of all citizens, to finance government activities, the present tax take is approaching confiscation, the economy cannot much longer survive present tax rates on current sources and tax sources have been exhausted; and

Whereas, This increditable budget could be reduced (1) by curtailing foreign spending, (2) returning to the states sources of tax revenue preempted by the Federal Government, (3) discontinuing deficit financing and (4) decreasing Federal bureaucracy, and

Whereas, There is now available seventy billion in unexpended balance

of funds appropriated by previous Congresses;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia urge the President of the United States of America and the present Congress of the United States to effect reductions of the Federal appropriation and expenditure budgets as the only alternative in the federal financial situation confronting us and urge that the Nation's fiscal affairs be so arranged that further reductions can be made in the years immediately following.

#### LOYALTY OATH

Whereas, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution recognizes the influential position held by professors and teachers in training our children and youth in our philosophy of government.

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia urge its members to seek adoption of laws by their State Legislature, requiring teachers, professors and school administrators to take the same oath of allegiance or loyalty to the Constitution of the United States, as required of all public officials.

#### FEDERAL AID TO EDUCATION

Whereas, Professional educators have lobbied for federal aid to education for 30 years under any pretext and now are the chief advocates of federal aid for school construction; and

Whereas, No evidence was produced in recent congressional hearings on federal aid to school construction to prove any school district "too poor" to meet its own school needs with local and /or State aid; and

Whereas, The weight of the evidence was that the States were taking care of their own school building problems and did not want or need

federal aid to school construction;

Resolved. That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia reaffirm its opposition to more federal aid to education in whatever guise, and urge continued faith in the ability of cross-roads America to best know and meet its local needs without the risk of control which would be inevitable with so-called federal aid.

#### 10. UNESCO

Whereas, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution opposes the distribution of material distributed by the United Nations Educational, Scientific & Cultural Organization and by the United States Commission to teachers and students in our schools; and

Whereas, The contents of this material weakens supreme loyalty to the American Republic functioning under the Constitution of the United States of America and propounds world citizenship and adherence to world government as a criteria of education for Ameri-

can youth; and

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Whereas, The Senate Internal Security Report for 1956. Section III, states "what appears on the surface to be at least the worst danger spot from the standpoint of disloyalty and subversive activity among Americans employed by international organizations is UNESCO";

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, urge that the Congress of the United States of America by investigations should determine whether or not UNESCO has complied and is complying with the terms of Resolution #215 of the House of Representatives and Resolution #122 of

the United States Senate, 79th Congress, which resolutions were the

basis of participation in UNESCO; and

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution strongly urge the Congress of the United States of America to withhold contributions to UNESCO, the National Commission for UNESCO, and the UNESCO Relations staff of the Department of State, and prevent transfer of funds from the Technical Assistance Fund to UNESCO.

# 11. NULLIFICATION OF THE STATUS OF FORCES TREATY

Whereas, Ratification of the NATO STATUS OF FORCES TREATY and similar agreement with Japan deprives American service personnel stationed abroad of their rights for trial for off duty offenses which was guaranteed to them under the protection of the Constitution of the United States; and

Whereas, American service personnel are now subject to the courts and

laws of the country where stationed;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Congress of the United States to adopt legislation by joint resolution to nullify that part of the NATO STATUS OF FORCES TREATY stationed abroad of their rights to trial for off-duty offenses under the protection of the Constitution of the United States; and

Resolved, That State Legislature be urged to memorialize Congress to adopt such legislation

#### 12. RED CHINA

Whereas, The United States of America is under continuous pressure from the Soviet Union, her satellite nations, and certain of our allies to permit the admission of Red China to the United Nations and the United Nations through its specialized agencies is attempting to soften the American thinking to that admission:

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia declare its adamant opposition to the ad-

mission of Red China into the United Nations; and

Resolved, That in the event Red China is admitted to the United Nations, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Congress of the United States of America to adopt legislation to effect the withdrawal of the United States of America from the United Nations.

# 13. INTERNATIONAL LABOR ORGANIZATION (ILO)

Whereas, Individual liberty is guaranteed every American under the Bill of Rights of the Constitution and these guarantees assure every American worker the right to choose his own employment and

working condition; and

Whereas, Communist Countries have obtained membership in the International Labor Organization in which the United States is in the minority and is constantly outnumbered and outvoted by Communist representatives although 25% of the budget is paid by the United States of America; and

Whereas, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution has been consistently on record as opposed to the many specialized agencies which remain a part of the United Nations program;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Congress of the United States to withdraw American support of the International Labor Organization as detrimental

to the freedom of American workmen and to our National defense, and urge members to inform themselves on this important aspect of the world Communist movement.

# 14. INTERNATIONAL ATOMIC ENERGY AGENCY

Whereas, The world's best hope for peace rests in the superior knowledge of and possession by the United States of America of atomic energy materials and resources; and

Whereas, The Senate Foreign Relations Committee will soon consider the ratification of a statute of the International Atomic Energy Agency as a treaty, which, if ratified would place atomic energy knowledge and resources of the United State under the control of friends and foes alike; and

Whereas, A staff study of the 85th Congress listed 56 pages of Soviet Political Treaties and violations which demonstrate that so-called safeguards written into treaties are impossible to enforce;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Senate Foreign Relation Committee to refuse to recommend the ratification of the Statute as a treaty; and

Resolved. That if the proposed treaty is presented to the Senate, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge that body to refuse to give its advice and consent to such ratification.

## 15. FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Whereas, There is need for clarification of the existing Flag Code Law to avoid confusion of interpretation; and

Whereas, A Bill, House Resolution #609, was introduced in January which proposes to amend the Flag Code Law with respect to the display and use of the Flag of the United States of America, specifically the position of the Flag in all types of assembly regardless of whether on floor, platform or in chancel; the correct way to salute the Flag; and the asserton that the Pledge of Allegiance is an Oath, always to be spoken but never sung;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge the Congress of the United States of America to adopt that part of House Resolution #609, which specifically pertains to the above three points.

# 6. HOLIDAYS

Whereas, There have been introduced in the Congress of the United States, House Resolution #379 and Senate Bill #682 whereby the patriotic holidays: Washington's Birthday, Lincoln's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, would be changed from the traditional dates to Mondays, thus permitting extended weekends;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia vigorously protest against the downgrading of our great national heroes and occasions, and the regimentation of our holidays which were designated and set aside to commemorate those leaders and events in our historic past.

#### 17. TRAFFIC SAFETY

Whereas, The 65th Congress of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution added traffic safety to the work of the Transportation Committee and the reports from the President's Committee for Traffic Safety, as well as from the Governors Con-

ference on Highway Safety give facts and figures on the deplorable need for co-operation by every citizen in the establishment of official

traffic safety co-ordination in each state;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia urge its members to work individually and in whatever groups possible to further the program of the President's Committee for Traffic Safety and especially in the state for a traffic safety organization if none now exists, adapting such organization to the needs of the state, county or municapality but with the clear understanding that the adaptation does not mean the lowering of any minimum standard set by the program.

# 18. COMMUNISM IN THE CHURCHES

Whereas, Plans for the destruction of our Constitutional Republic call for socialistic indoctrination through four channels: religion, gov-

ernment, labor organizations and public education; and

Whereas, Many laymen and sound thinking clergymen are disturbed by the increasing propaganda in the churches—especially among the higher echelons and the church publications—for the United Nations, World Government, the destruction of our immigration laws, the release of Communists from jail, opposition to Military Training;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, urge every church member to seriously study the physchology of subversion in order to distinguish between

the Word of God and the voice of Moscow;

Resolved, To join with those of a like mind in a firm determination to correct the situation, realizing that as long as one supports such a program, one is a part of it.

#### 19. GROUNDS FOR RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

Whereas, Communism, backed by a well organized fanatically zealous and articulate force poses a threat to the freedom of liberty-loving peoples everywhere; and

Whereas, The ideology of atheistic communism is diametrically opposed in every way to the tenets of Christianity and religious freedom

upon which the United States of America was established:

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, reaffirm its faith in Divine Providence as the only enduring means of safeguarding the Nation against this evil threat, and strive toward a renewed spiritual emphasis in all phases of life in this Nation under God.

# 20. COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

Whereas, In as much as the State of West Virginia will celebrate the Centennial of its formation in 1963, and in as much as it is the customary procedure to honor such an occasion by the issuance of a Commemorative Postage Stamp.

Resolved, That the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, take the proper action to secure the issuance of a Commemorative Postage Stamp for the Centennial Celebration in 1963

of the formation of the State of West Virginia.

Mrs. Phillips presented Mrs. Herbert Patterson, Corresponding Secretary General, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, who spoke on "The Future of Our Youth." Mrs. Patterson reminded us that home, church, and school have the most potent influences in every young person's life. Our children should be tought to set their ideals

high. She stated that it is going to be our character that will make and keep us great. We must realize our duty to the children for their burdens are going to be heavy. Mrs. Patterson expressed her faith in our youth.

The State Vice Regent took the chair while Mrs. Phillips gave her report as State Regent. Mrs. Holcombe asked the Conference to stand in

appreciation of our State Regent and her work.

Mrs. Holcombe then gave her report as State Vice Regent. Mrs. Russell J. Bergen. State Chaplain, reported. Mrs. Phillips announced a round table discussion of National De-

fense with Mrs. Erb to be held after the afternoon session.

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### REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

#### STATE REGENT

Through an intensified youth program West Virginia Daughters have cherished and maintained American freedom. Our two projects are the building of the stage for the amphitheater at the West Virginia Youth Camp and Conference Center, and a Mechanical Arts Classroom at Kate Duncan Smith. An illuminated copy of the Constitution has been given us by the National Defense Committee for presentation to the State 4-H Camp.

American Indians—Reports from 25 chapters revealed an increase of Indian programs. \$62 in cash, \$231 in clothing were given to Bacone and St. Mary's; \$89.84 contributed to the general fund, a total of \$382.84.

American Music—34 chapters submitted reports. 22 had programs; 18 encouraged American Music in the schools; 23 sing the National Anthem at meetings.

Americanism—Members of 12 chapters attended naturalization courts and ceremonies; served as instructors for citizenship classes; gave receptions and programs for new citizens; presented flags and welcome cards; distributed 241 manuals. Two chapters cooperated in setting up a naturalization class and in preparing a series of radio broadcasts.

Approved Schools—45 chapters contributed \$1,686.52 in cash,

\$2543.91 in clothing and gifts; a total of \$4,230.43.

Children of the American Revolution—19 chapters sponsor 14 societies; one newly organized. West Virginia D. A. R. contributed \$172.80 to C. A. R.; furnished State and National Promoters, homes for meetings, chaperones for parties, housing and breakfast for delegates to C. A. R. Conference, transportation on pilgrimages. 14 chapters asked C. A. R. to present programs at meetings.

Conservation—65% of chapters had chairmen; conservation material placed in schools by State Chairman. Chapters reported programs and promotion of community beautification. One planted 800 trees.

Another sponsored a Conservation Essay Contest.

Community Service—43 chapters gave volunteer assistance to 21 organizations, including Red Cross, hospitals, and youth groups. 8 chapters served a total of 1183 hours. 21 chapters reported cash contributions to 19 organizations; 16 to Red Cross; 7 to Occupational Therapy Scholarship. 7 chapters carried on Girl Homemakers work.

D. A. R. Good Citizens-Certificates and pins awarded to 80 Good

Citizens by 25 chapters.

D. A. R. Magazine—Reports from 35 chapters disclosed extensive use of Magazine in meetings. 23 chapters have 20% or more, subscribers.

State Chairman prepared and displayed at the State Conference an excellent Magazine exhibit

D. A. R. Magazine Advertising-33 chapters sent advertisements

valued at \$3,771.50 for March 1957 issue.

D. A. R. Museum—An original piece of coin glass was presented; \$107.52 contributed for maintenance of West Virginia Room, \$30 to Museum.

Genealogical Records-18 chapters have chairmen; 8 reported projects. 69 pages of records were sent to Library.

Honor Roll—Gold 12, Silver 2, Honorable Mention 7.

Junior American Citizens-10 chapters had chairmen; 8 sponsored

250 clubs having 7,775 active members.

Junior Membership—Juniors comprise almost 10% of the membership. Their new project is a watering pool at Tamassee for the West Virginia Beef Herd.

Membership—New members by application 116, reinstatement 11. Total membership 3,536 in 47 chapters. One new chapter is to be presented for confirmation in April.

Motion Picture-Documentary films have been used for chapter

programs; patriotic films shown by two chapters in local schools.

National Defense—29 chapters reported devoting 5 minutes to National Defense at each meeting and 31 complete programs. 15 displayed National Defense material; 25 presented 1956 resolutions; 18 evaluated textbooks; 22 cooperated with community projects; 25 observed patriotic holidays. 38 Good Citizenship Medals, 6 Awards of Merit were presented; \$42 sent to National Defense Committee. The Governor and the mayors of 10 cities proclaimed Constitution Week.

Press Relations—25 chapters had 9,132 inches of publicity with 154 pictures; 750 inches for Constitution Week. Scrapbook won second place

in National Contest, 1956.

Program—Chapters showed a marked increase in the number of programs based on D. A. R. material with a corresponding increase in

member participation.

Radio and Television-15 chapters reported 30 radio broadcasts of 7 hours, 12 minutes, plus spots of 5 hours, 8 minutes over 16 stations value, \$1,592.90; 14 telecast of 4 hours, 25 minutes over 6 stations—value, \$1,682.50. 5 tape recordings and 5 scripts sent to National Office. Paul Harvey gave 10 minutes of radio time—Coast to Coast on ABC—to one chapter and the D. A. R. during Constitution Week.

Student Loan and Scholarship-Two chapter scholarships totaled

\$250; one State scholarship, \$250.

The Flag of the United States of America—19 chapters distributed 426 codes and 411 large and small flags. There were 19 programs, 28 news items, 7 pictures, 4 exhibits, 5 radio broadcasts, 4 telecasts.

Transportation—50% of the chapters had chairmen; majority reported programs on traffic safety and use of car pools to increase at-

tendance at meetings.

The State Librarian reports \$154.36 spent in library work: 4 requested books secured; D. A. R. Magazine placed in 18 school libraries and 200 issues dating back to 1933 in State Library. One Junior Group

supplied a library shelf of 250 children's books.

Former Governor William C. Marland proclaimed February as American History Month. The State Historian reports 31 historical tours, 86 programs; 60 Revoluntionary soldiers' graves located, 3 marked; 3 historic markers placed; 98 History Certificates, 105 Medals. and 16 gifts presented for proficiency in American History.

The thirty-five chapters reporting told of interesting and instructive work done in the historical field. Most chapters followed the program prescribed by the Historian General, awarding history prizes, marking graves of Revelutionary soliders and deceased members, observing anniversaries, and having interesting historical programs.

This being the James Monroe Bicentennial year, the National is sponsoring a nationwide essay contest on the Monroe Doctrine for high school students.

Our newest chapter, ANNE BAILEY, reports that they have not had time to organize their committees, but they have started a chapter scrapbook.

ANN ROYALL—Sponsored History Contest in County schools and gave prizes of \$5.00, \$2.50, and \$1.25. Three Good Citizens Awards.

BARBOURSVILLE—Gave 3 gifts for History Contest winners. Presented 4 History medals and 4 certificates. Had 6 historical programs and observed 3 anniversaries.

BEE LINE-Awarded 2 History Medals, observed 3 anniversaries. and had 6 historical programs.

BLACKWATER—Awarded 4 History Medals and 4 certificates.

Gave a cash prize for essay contest. BLENNERHASSETT—Had 96 spot radio announcements. Presented 2 History Medals. Had 9 articles in the local paper on "Men of the

Revolution." BORDERLAND—One historical TV program and 1 radio program. Gave 37 History Medals in local schools—high school, eighth grade and

fifth grade. BUFORD—Completed and distributed index cards to all members. Presented citizenship awards. Had 5 historical broadcasts.

Published 1 historical document. Marked graves of 4 deceased members. Displayed historical material in business windows during American History Month.

MONDONGACHATE—Made 4 History Awards and had 6 historical programs.

NATHAN DAVIS—Had special program for American History month.

PACK HORSE FORD—Had 8 historical programs and observed 2 anniversaries.

POTOMAC VALLEY—Presented History Awards in high schools and gave \$5.00 to school having best program for history month. Have contributed \$186.00 to upkeep of Ft. Ashby.

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### STATE LIBRARIAN

At the direction of the Librarian General, your State Librarian mailed to each Chapter a list of requested books, and a list of "needs" of our National Daughters of American Revolution Library in Washington. Information for sending contributions and printed material was also given to the Chapters in this letter.

It was the hope of your State Librarian that West Virginia could make the National Honor Roll by having each Chapter name a librarian, but only thirty-two Chapters have reported the appointment of such an officer.

Colonel Charles Lewis, Elizabeth Zane, Ravenswood and South Branch Valley Chapters have donated the total of \$26.00 to the National Library Fund.

Buford Chapter contributed three books; Potomac Valley, one; and Colonel Morgan Morgan Chapter, a 107 page book of geneological records to the National Library.

The following chapters have donated books or magazines to their local or county libraries: General Andrew Lewis, Kanawha Valley, Colonel Morgan Morgan, Elizabeth Zane and Major William Haymond.

The Chapters placing the D. A. R. Magazine in local school libraries are Wheeling, Colonel Charles Lewis, and John Young.

No doubt many other chapters have aided in library work in their communities and are making efforts to locate the books on our "Requested List" but have failed to make a report.

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### REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN

### AMERICAN MUSIC

"The Place Of Music In Our Daily Lives"

A letter was written by your State Chairman to Chapter Chairmen of the American Music Committee offering suggestions for carrying out the following projects of our National Chairman: Music in the Schools: Music in our Religious Lives; Music in Industry; Music in Hospitals; Music in our Chapters, and as recreation and service to our towns and State. Questionnaires were enclosed for Chapter reports and the following Music Report was compiled from the twenty-four received. Two of these Chapters were handicapped by the illness of their Music Chairman

for the entire year and two others reported no Chairman.

The following interesting ways were used to encourage Music in the Schools: Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter asked their County Superintendent of Schools to provide music teachers in all schools: Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter asked their County Music Supervisor to have school children memorize all verses of our National Anthem and sing it as often as possible and also to learn and sing "The West Virginia Hills." High school and grade school pupils were invited to sing on their Chapter programs; Barboursville Chapter distributed booklets to schools; Ann Royall Chapter had young people sing on many of their programs; Music in the schools was stressed by the Blackwater Chapter; Borderland Chapter had a group of teenagers sing American Music; John Hart Chapter also made use of young musicians; Col. Morgan Morgan Chapter reported their schools use music three times weekly and Elizabeth Zane Chapter reported their schools have an excellent music program: James Wood Chapter had High School Orchestra give concert preceding Chapter's presentation of Paul Harvey during Constitution Week: Music Chairman of Jennie Wiley Chapter, a teacher and former County Music Supervisor, furthers the cause of music in every way possible; Kings Wood Chapter Chairman, also a High School teacher, used records in connection with her English classes; Shenandoah Valley Chapter reported their County schools are carrying a full musical program all the time and their Chapter Chairman of Music teaches private organ and piano lessons with her pupils playing in churches and schools; Music Chairman of Wheeling Chapter also teaches piano; William Henshaw Chapter Chairman reported she was working at encouraging music day and night as County Supervisor and conducting college work shops.

Much space is given to the work in our schools because your Chairman believes we can accomplish more in this field for the advancement

of American Music than in any other.

Music in our Religious Lives as shown by the reports received:

17 members of Chapters reporting sing in Church choirs; 7 direct adult, junior or youth choirs (one directs all three); 9 play organ or

piano for Church services; 3 serve as choir mothers.

Music in our religious lives cannot be measured, but the above report shows some of the activities of musical members. I'm sure that all of our Chapter members get an inspiration from the lovely hymns of our many Churches.

Your Chairman hopes that next year's report can include progress

shown in Music in Industry.

Music in Hospitals: Shenandoah Valley reports that individual groups entertain at their Veteran's Hospital but not as a Chapter. however, students of the Chapter Music Chairman give musical programs at the hospital; Borderland Chapter reports a musical program for Veteran's Hospital is being planned but not accomplished due to illness in home of pianist; Barboursville Chapter gave a musical program for a Rest Home; Blackwater Chapter gave programs for a Rest Home and Shut-Ins; West Augusta Chapter entertained Shut-Ins and Ann

Royall Chapter entertained in Nursing Home.

Music in our Chapters, and as recreation and service to our towns and State: Eleven Chapters reporting sing the National Anthem at each meeting, with two singing it sometimes and another starting this custom. One is learning words of all stanzas. Sixteen Chapters reported they had had one entire program devoted to American composers, with one reporting more than one such program and two others planning programs for coming year. Eight Chapters had used musical compositions of State composers.

Fifteen have stressed the history and development of American Music in their Chapters. Eleven Chapters have used American Music on each program and four others on several programs. Seven Chapters

reporting observed National Music Week.

William Henshaw had two outstanding musical programs this year, and Ann Royall, Jennie Wiley and Wheeling Chapters each had one. Col. Morgan Morgan Chapter helped in housing and arrangements for State Chorus in April. James Wood Chapter members are working hard on the establishment of the Mid-Ohio Valley Symphony, some as Board members, patrons, and their American Music Chairman is regular member of Viola section. Two members of Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter are on Board of Directors and one is Division Chairman of Tri-County Community Concert Association.

While in Washington for Continental Congress your Chairman attended the American Music Committee Meeting at the Mayflower Hotel, at which Mrs. Marvin L. Reynolds, National Chairman, presided. Reports were made by the National Vice Chairmen attending and by the State Chairmen representing thirteen States. Reports of West Virglnia's Music Committee were also given at the Northern District Meeting in Parkersburg and the Western District Meeting held at Cedar Lakes in Ripley, the only two District Meetings it was my privilege to attend.

There is so much we can do to assist our young Indian Americans. Much consideration should be given to the two sponsored schools of the American Indians Committee; Bacone College at Bacone, Oklahoma, and St. Mary's High School for Indian Girls at Springfield, South Dakota.

Book review of Sequoyah Author, Alice Marriott and a paper on "The American Indian" compiled by Edna Law of the General Andrew Lewis Chapter were presented.

Boxes of good used clothing and beads were sent to the schools. Slides were shown of the St. Mary's School and movies shown by members who had visited the schools and also the Indian Reservations. Pageants were presented and displays of pottery, blankets, moccasins and other articles made by the Indians. Also felt hats and leather were sent.

Boxes of clothing sent Bacone College. Captain James Allen Chapter 1 box of clothing valued at \$50.00; Kanawha Valley Chapter 5 boxes of clothing valued at \$55.00; Mound Chapter 1 box of clothing valued at \$50.00. The total value of clothing sent \$155.00.

Boxes of Clothing sent St. Mary's High School. Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter 1 box of clothing valued at \$90.00; Ravenswood Chapter 1 box of clothing valued at \$25.00; and Matthew French Chapter 1 box

of clothing. Total value of clothing sent \$115.00.

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### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

As Senior State President of the Children of the American Revolution my duties overlap to some extent. The following I attended: The D. A. R. State Conference, October, 1956, in Martinsburg; C. A. R. National Board meeting and luncheon in Washington, April, 1957; C. A. R. National Convention; C. A. R. State Conference in Bluefield; tea given by Yomoka Society in Charleston; tea given by Colonel Andrew Donnally Society in Huntington to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the founding of the Society by Buford Chapter; preview of the motion picture "Johnny Tremaine" as guest of General Andrew Lewis Chapter, S. A. R.; meeting of Colonel Andrew Donnally Society and assisted the Society while the Senior President was out of town.

All Regents were written and all my reports were sent in on time. A questionaire in September was sent to all 48 Regents; 35 responded with the following results:

14 societies sponsored by 19 Chapters. One of these has just completed its organization by General Andrew Lewis Chapter in Lewisburg; 372 members last report; 24 transferred during the year to D. A. R.; 2 transferred to S. A. R.

The most outstanding service rendered to C. A. R. by D. A. R., on the whole, was financial. Matthew French and John Chapman Chapters gave outstanding service during the State C. A. R. Conference which was held at the invitation of their two C. A. R. Societies, Margaret Mc-Kenzie and Lydia Boggs. Eleven Chapters invited C. A. R. for a program. 5 reported taking C. A. R. on historic tours. Three reported a C. A. R. had won a Good Citizen Medal. 16 invited over-age C. A. R. into the D. A. R. Eight Chapters helped collect coupons for Tamassee. Five offered to provide ads for the March issue of the C. A. R. Magazine. Two reported they were interested in starting new Societies, perhaps next year. Fifteen grand parents reported serving C. A. R. in many ways—as State

and National Promoters, Senior Chairman, Senior State Officers, and Senior Presidents. Many provided refreshments for teas and the like.

Five citations were given. Four went to individuals: Mrs. Charles P. Walker, National Vice President, C. A. R.; Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, National Year Book Chairman; Mr. Wm. Morrill Parker, National Vice President, C. A. R.; and Mrs. Parker who was instrumental in the founding of a C. A. R. in Parkersburg and a past State President; and to Buford Chapter, D. A. R. for 30 years continuous and outstanding service to the C. A. R.

Achievements of the West Virginia Society, C. A. R.; The March issue of the C. A. R. Magazine contained 6% pages of stories and articles and 8 pictures. 2503 ½ coupons were sent to Tamassee. Pottery made in the 1800's was sent C. A. R. Museum by the Seneca Trails Society, of Parkersburg. Several Indian girls of St. Mary's High School were adopted by the Societies; gifts of clothing and money were sent, not only there but to Tamassee, Kate Duncan Smith, Crossnore, and Bacone College. Money gifts were contributed for the National Project and used for Mountain Schools and American Indians and for the restoration of the Chapel of the Cross in Mississippi and to the National Travel Fund for the C. A. R. National President.

National Recognition at the National Convention was given to John Augustine Washington Society for largest gift of money for the Tombstone of the Revolutionary Unknown Soldier. Also Betty Ann Mills of the same society won \$25 for an essay contest. Lydia Boggs, of Bluefield, won the coveted Gold Merit Award for excellence in the state. West Virginia had honorable mention in the National Conservation contest.

We are indeed grateful to the Ravenswood Chapter for presenting a cup and saucer painted by Caroline Scott Harrison. It has been officially accepted, thus giving West Virginia a part in the beautiful display including the gown of Mrs. Harrison, our first President General.

For some time we have talked about having the picture of Mrs. Charles Goff, West Virginia's first Regent copied in oils. This was first considered because the glass reflects the light from the window making it difficult to see the picture. We have tried to place it in a different position then it cannot be seen from the door of our room. Recently Mr. Klapthor, the Curator, wrote to your chairman and said he would advise us to leave the portrait as it is. He reminded us that it was done by Albert Steiner, an Internationally known painter, etcher, and lithographer. He inclosed much data on Mr. Steiner and said that he felt the present pastel was more valuable than an oil painting would be.

Mrs. Ralph Newland, our very capable Curator General, asks us to remind our members of the period of our Museum. It has been established as ending in 1830 and only items of significant, historical importance are the exception. We must hold a standard of authenticity above reproach. We are as responsible in the Museum program as the historian who is putting his facts and dates in book form.

If you have some treasure handed down from the period of 1830 or prior to that date, think seriously of placing it in our Museum or West Virginia Room. There is probably no place where you can share it with more people, or preserve it for posterity better.

Each year thousands of people from many different Countries visit our buildings, taking much time to study the interesting historical articles there. I can think of no better way to impress foreigners with our love and appreciation of our forefathers than to present for their viewing the tools and emblems of culture which have helped make America Great.

### MOTION PICTURES

One of the projects for this year was to get each chapter chairman to review pictures that are being shown in their communities, using the "D. A. R. Motion Picture Reviews" to estimate the films, and where possible have the local newspapers use these reviews; see that the Children of the D. A. R., get recommended pictures for "Family" and "Children." Each chapter chairman has been asked to subscribe to the

Motion Picture Review and a file kept for reference when pictures are shown in the community and a review given at chapter meetings.

The James Wood Chapter reported that the local theatres were asked to stress patriotism and the Constitution during Constitution Week. Four hundred children were shown a 16 Mm., sound and color film "The Constitution," also a film on "The Bill of Rights." On September 22nd the television audience over W. T. A. P., were shown a 16 Mm., colorsound film on "National Archives."

The Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter reports a list of approved motion pictures was sent to the Welch High School to be placed on the bulletin board of the school. Educational and historical films were secured for two chapter meetings. Two Educational films were procured for two civic club meetings. Educational films were shown in five schools in the County. At chapter meetings a list of approved films was read for information and guidance of chapter members and their families. The Pack Horse Ford Chapter also read the list of approved films at their meeting.

The John Young Chapter provided a movie trailer for one of the local theatres bearing a Constitution Week message. John Hart Chapter reported that a film on Alcoholism and Narcotic Addiction was shown in the schools and churches of the County. Colonel Morgan Morgan Chapter showed slides and films on Indian Life at a chapter meeting. Two films on National Defense were also shown at other meetings.

Major William Haymond Chapter reported that the films shown in the county schools were pre-viewed by a teacher from the Fairmont Junior High School and a teacher from Fairmont Senior High School. Five films pertaining to patriotism were shown to 2000 students in the county schools.

William Henshaw, John Chapman, John Minear and Shenandoah Valley Chapters reported that chapter members who had toured abroad showed films and slides of their trips at chapter meetings. All pictures were most interesting and educational.

Fifteen chapters reported no Motion Picture Committee Chairman. The reason given by several Chapters was that there are too few active members and not all committees are filled. It is hoped by next year all Chapters will have a Chairman of Motion Pictures which will be active. Your Chairman has catalogues of films which can be secured from many sources. ## NATIONAL DEFENSE

Forty-seven of the forty-eight chapters in West Virginia responded to my request for names and reports of chapter chairmen of National Defense. I regret that I cannot report all the work done by these chapters, but am happy to submit this summary.

Chairmen indicated that most chapters devoted five to ten minutes to National Defense at each meeting. Forty said their chapters would consider allowing at least ten minutes next year. Sixty-two complete National Defense programs were given in thirty-five chapters. Three Awards of Merit were presented in West Virginia during the year, but this award was discontinued by vote of the National Board in February.

Many chapters presented and discussed the President General's Message, and Mrs. Erb's informative and challenging National Defense article, both of which appear monthly in the D. A. R. Magazine. Thirty-two chapters studied the Resolutions of the Continental Congress, and

watched pending legislation relative to them. Through 140 letters and telegrams to senators and representatives, members influenced their

thinking on National Defense legislation.

World Government propaganda in church, civic, political and social groups was observed by fifteen chapters, but several said they had observed none. Many chapters concentrated on encouraging members. business houses, churches, and residents to fly the American flag on all holidays and throughout Constitution Week. Reports indicated wide interest in local civic affairs. John Chapman chapter sponsors a room for juvenile detention in their local jail, and several chapters partici-

pated in naturalization ceremonies.

Most chapters indicated efforts to reach West Virginia youths by sponsoring scout troops, sending representatives to Girls' State, and cooperating with the schools in numerous projects. Through 86 citizenship, history and essay awards, competitive tests, display of patriotic material, distribution of literature, organization of 30 J. A. C. Clubs, presentation of 406 flags, and sponsorship of patriotic movies, assemblies and speakers, the Daughters of the American Revolution were able to create patriotic consciousness in the youth of participating schools. Students in these schools memorized portions of the Constitution, while others participated in radio and television intervews, skits, talks and forums. Five chapters influenced school authorities to make patriotic music, and flag ceremony and display a part of the student participation in local games. One chapter spot lighted the American flag for games.

Proclamations from Governor Underwood and mayors of twenty towns urged citizens to observe Constitution Week from Sept. 17-23. Numerous newspaper editorials, articles and advertising, patriotic window displays, radio and television programs and spot announcements stimulated patriotic thinking throughout West Virginia. Patriotic movies were shown in many theaters and some churches. Some ministers included pleas for preservation of the Constitution in their sermons and prayers. John Young Chapter of Charleston launched their Constitution Week observation with a program at the State Capitol Building, with the Governor reading his proclamation and Mrs. Wm. McClaugherty, Vice

President General, as the National Defense speaker.

Your State chairman appreciates your cooperation and is ready to assist you in greater efforts to Americanize our youth, create an enlightened public opinion, and to fight against Communism, World Government and unrestricted immigration to our shores.

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### PRESS RELATIONS

The State Scrap Book sent to the Congress won honorable mention. We have forty seven Chapters in the State and of this number only 32 reported their number of inches of publicity and pictures. We hope to have all forty seven Chapters report and send clippings and pictures for the 1958 N. S. D. A. R. Congress Press or Scrap book.

A number of those reporting had marked with ink on their clippings and had failed to send date line and name of publication in which the same was published, consequently those all had to be discarded, also a number that had been put to-gether with scotch tape which is forbidden in the judging of the scrap books.

The most outstanding newspaper stories were the Signing of the Proclamation to observe Constitution Week, Flag Day reports, meetings

of the Chapters and the Awards of Merit. The State Conference at Martinsburg had excellent coverage. The five Chapters in the State with the largest number of inches were Blennerhasset, James Wood, Buford, Borderland, and William Henshaw.

Press rules and regulations were sent to each Chapter Regent at the beginning of the year by the National Press Chairman. There were also articles in the *Press Digest*, and in a recent copy of the *D. A. R. Magazine*.

The total number of inches of publicity in the State newspapers

and other D. A. R. publications was 9,132.

It is earnestly hoped that every Chapter will send their news clippings and pictures to the Chairman before Mar. 1st. 1958, and that each Chapter will count their own inches of publicity and enclose that with its clippings.

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#### RADIO AND TELEVISION

Our committee is proud to report that since last October we have used a total of 628 minutes of air time at an approximate value of \$2,905. Television and radio stations all over West Virginia (and one at Gallipolis, Ohio!) have been very cooperative and charitable with their time.

We can break those totals down as follows: American History Month, 222 minutes worth \$605; miscellaneous programs such as Flag Day, Independence Day, 110 minutes costing \$454; reported for Constitution Week are 145 minutes of television time worth \$955; 150 minutes of radio time at a cost of \$890.

Reports have come from these chapters: Ann Bailey, Barboursville; Borderland, Buford, John Chapman, Matthew French, John Hart, Kanawha Valley, Colonel Charles Lewis, Wheeling and John Young. Buford Chapter has set up a "Listening Post" with 45 women taking part.

According to the list received from the National Library, West Vir-

ginia sent more tape recordings of its broadcasts than any other state.

It was mainly the work of John Young Chapter's committee.

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# THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

John Young, Kanawha Valley, Maj. William Haymond, Matthew French. Pack Horse Ford, Princess Arocoma, Shenandoah Valley, Wheeling, William Henshaw, and Ye Town of Bath.

It is gratifying to note that Chapter members are becoming "Flag Conscious." Neighbors, friends, and merchants were encouraged to own and display the Flag of the United States of America on Flag Day and all Special Holidays. John Chapman Chapter used a "chain telephone" to urge members to display the Flag on June 14th. This was very successful. Bee Line Chapter took action regarding the improper use of the

Flag in a parade in Charles Town.

Four persons became citizens of the United States at the Court of Naturalization held in Bluefield, W. Va. Following the Naturalization proceedings the new citizens were entertained by the John Chapman Chapter at a tea and each was presented with an American Flag. Col. Andrew Donnally Chapter gave small Flags to twenty-three (23) persons who became citizens of the United States.

Flag Day was observed in approximately every Chapter. There were addresses by guest speakers, talks by Chapter Chairmen, patriotic programs, radio broadcasts, a television program, a film "The Flag Speaks" and a patriotic skit by school children. Many Chapters conducted a "Flag Quiz." Copies of the Flag Code and The American's Creed Cards were distributed to Chapter members, civic groups and clubs and schools.

Kanawha Valley Chapter with local Chapter of the S. A. R. provided 185 Flags and had them distributed by Boy Scouts at Flag Day Ceremony. Also gave 135 Flag Codes to Grade and Junior High Schools of

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## **BY-LAWS**

# THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### ARTICLE I

#### NAME

The name of this body shall be the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II

#### OBJECTS

The object of this Organization shall be to bring into closer relationship the Chapters of West Virginia and to promote the three objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution;

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object, of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of the American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### ARTICLE III

#### MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All Chapters in the State in good and regular standing in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, shall be eligible to membership in this Organization.

Section 2. Any Chapter after confirmation by the National Society may become a member by sending to the State Registrar and the State Recording Secretary the name of the Chapter, the names of its officers, the names of its members and by sending the State assessments to the State Treasurer.

Section 3. A member-at-large of the State shall not be eligible as a delegate or an alternate to the meetings of the National Society or State Organization, or hold a National or State Office or serve on a National or State Committee.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### **OFFICERS**

The Officers of this Organization shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State

Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian and a State Librarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary.

# ARTICLE V

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of this Organization shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the State Conference, every third year.

A majority vote shall constitute an election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. All State Officers shall assume office when the Continental Congress confirms the election of

the State Regent and State Vice Regent.

Section 4. To be eligible to the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent a member shall have held membership in the West Virginia State Organization at least five years prior to her election. To be eligible for any other state office a member shall have held membership in the West Virginia State Organization two years prior to her election. No member shall be eligible to the same State Office for two consecutive terms and no member who has served one term in any State Office shall be eligible to any other State Office, except that of State Vice Regent or State Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

Section 5. No member shall hold at the same time two offices

carrying a vote at the State Conference.

Section 6. No member shall be eligible to the State Regency who has not served previously as a State Officer. No Chapter shall be eligible to representation on the Board for more than three consecutive terms,

exclusive of Chapter Regents.

Section 7. Should the office of the State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall accede to that office for the remainder of that therm. Other vacancies occurring in office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next annual meeting of the State Conference. Any member having served in a vacancy for more than one-half term in any office, except the office of State Regent and State Vice Regent, shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 8. In recognition of valuable service to the State Organization, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a majority vote at any State Conference upon a member who has held the

office of State Regent.

Section 9. Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General from West Virginia shall be made by the Nominating Committee at the annual meeting of the State Conference. There may be nominations from the floor. The vote shall be by ballot; a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive

Committee, appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Regent shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Section 2. The State Vice Regent, in the absence of the State Re-

gent shall perform the duties of the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all State Meetings with the reading of Scripture and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall conduct the Memorial Service at each State Conference and perpare the necrology for the State.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers, Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings affecting or pertaining to them.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of her office and such other correspondence as the State Regent, State Organization, the State Board of Management and the State Executive Committee may direct. She shall send out the notices

of all meetings and shall distributed all literature.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills duly authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. All bills shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee prior to their payment. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The books shall close on the fifteenth day of September each year. An Audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management. She shall within thirty days of her retirement turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and books of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for payments of bills duly authorized.

Section 7. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligibility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Registrar Genreal, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keep a card file containing the name, address, name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, re-instatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband.

Section 8. The State Historian shall direct and encourage the Historical work in West Virginia through Chapter Historians and shall incorporate in her annual report such outstanding report from Chapter Historians as may be of future value to the State. She shall perform

such other duties as may be designated by the Historian General by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. She shall prepare for the Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution the State Reports of grave locations, dates and service records of Revolutionary soldiers, sailors and patriots. She shall have custody of all historical or biographical manuscripts of which the State Organization may become possessed, and shall arrange and preserve the same.

Section 9. The State Librarian shall have charge of all books and magazines of which the State Organization may become possessed, with the exception of those provided for elsewhere. She shall have charge of soliciting gifts, negotiating exchanges and purchasing new volumes for the Library of the National Society. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Librarian General and the State Or-

ganization.

Section 10. All Officers shall submit, in duplicate, a brief narrative report of their work to the Annual Conference.

#### ARTICLE VII

# MEETING OF THE STATE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Annual Conference of the West Virginia State Organization shall be held in October during the week including the day of October the tenth, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board of Management; the exact date shall be left to the discretion of the State Regent. The place of meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Management unless previously named by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the receiving of reports of officers, State Board of Management, the chairmen of committees, the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The report of the Program Committee when adopted shall become the order of Business for the annual Conference. A vote of a majority of all registered delegates is necessary to make a change

in the program.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates and alternates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall

be the Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.

Section 4. The voting members of the State Conference or at any special meeting of the State Organization shall be its Officers, the Officers and Honorary Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents of West Virginia, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents, or alternates, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society.

Section 5. One credential blank must be sent to the Chairman of Credentials Committee and the other to the State Regent not later than

ten days before the annual meeting of the State Conference.

Section 6. Twenty (20) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

# ARTICLE VIII

# FEES AND DUES

Section 1. The fiscal year of the State Organization shall be Sep-

tember 15th to September 15th.

Section 2. To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January, thirty-five cents (35c) per capita for each member on the Chapter roll the first day of January. and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chapters as of January 1 presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference, said dues and assessments shall be remitted in one payment.

Section 3. The Chapters shall send to the State Treasurer, the State dues and assessments for the current year for all members accepted to membership by the National Society between January 1, and June 30 of each year. Such members shall pay the required dues and

assessments again the following year.

Section 4. The dues and assessments of all members accepted by the National Society after June 30 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 5. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent to defray her expenses to the National and State Meetings and for expenses pertaining to her office to the amount of the above sum.

Section 6. The remaining State dues may be used for printing, stationery for State Officers and State Chairmen and necessary expenses incurred by other State Officers and State Chairmen. All bills which the State is liable shall be itemized and presented to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not later than September 1 of each year

in which the debt is incurred.

\*Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State or Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

#### ARTICLE IX

#### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization and the Chapter

Regents shall contitute the Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall meet at the call of the State Regent. One meeting shall precede the State Conference and one meeting shall follow the State Conference. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent upon written request of five members of the Board. At least five days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given all members of the Board.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Organization during the interim between its meetings, except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board of Management shall make an

annual report to the State Conference.

Section 4. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE X

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization shall compose the Executive Committee. The State Board of Management may authorize this Committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem exepdient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent or upon the written request of five members of the Committee. This Committee shall

act as adviser to the State Regent and it shall make a complete report

at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 2. A recommendation for a project to be considered by the State Conference must be submitted to the Executive Committee on or before September 1. If the proposal meets with the approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management it shall be submitted to the Finance Committee presented to the State Conference for adoption.

Section 3. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Ex-

ecutive Committee.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### COMMITTEES

Section 1. At the close of the State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following committees: Finance, Resolutions and Credentials.

Section 2. The Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and four members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds, plan a budget and recommend to the State Conference such

expenditures as the committee deems expedient.

Section 3. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent. All resolutions to be presented at the State Conference must be sent to the chairman at least two weeks before the meeting. The name and address of the chairman shall be included in the call for the State Conference. The committee shall consider all resolutions sent to the chairman and shall recommend suitable action thereon when presenting the resolutions to the meeting.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall consist of four members, the chairman, to be appointed by the State Regent, the State Treasurer and two members to be appointed from the Hostess Chapters.

#### ARTICLE XII

#### CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Organization shall elect Officers at the time of, or previous to, the May Meeting of said Chapters.

Section 2. The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary and the State Treasurer of the election of Officers.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter in the State Organization shall send to the State Regent annually on or before March 1 a type-

written report of the work of her Chapter for the year.

Section 4. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the work of her Chapter from October 1 to October 1. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words, one copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference, one copy to the State Regent and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

#### ARTICLE XIII

#### DISTRICTS

Section 1. The State organization may be divided into the following districts: Northern, Central, Eastern, Southern and Western, each district having a Director and a Secretary and other necessary officers.

Section 2. Each district shall elect its own Director and Secretary and other necessary officers, the election taking place at the District Meeting. The term of office shall be one year. No member who holds a State Office or the office of Chapter Regent shall be eligible for the office of District Director.

#### ARTICLE XIV

#### PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this State Organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

# ARTICLE XV AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual State Conference by a two-thirds vote, provided that a copy of the amendments has been sent with the call to the annual meeting. Amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the meeting at which they are adopted.

Section 2. Amendents may be proposed by the State Conference, by the State Board of Management, or by a committee authorized by

the State Conference, or by a Chapter.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the State Organization shall become a law of the Organization without notice of the amendment.

\* RESOLUTION No. 4 ADOPTED AT THE 48th ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE IN CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA

Whereas, The State Regents of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution are finding it difficult each year to secure a place in which to hold the Annual State Conference due to the lack of hotel accommodations in certain sections of the State, and

Whereas, The traditional custom of holding the Annual State Conerence in the Sections of the State which can accommodate the delegaion is becoming a financial burden on many of the Chapters, be it

Resolved, That the State Regent and her Executive Committee shall have the authority to select the place in which to hold the Annual Meeting, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference, and that the Regent, aided by the General Chairman and Chapter Regents in the respective cities shall plan the program without elaborateness for the Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Annual Conference Dues be increased to two dollars (2.00) per delegate, to be used in defraying all of the expenses

in connection with the holding of our State Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Conference expenses shall not exceed the Conference Dues, that no additional fees be added to the cost of the meals as served by the hotel and that all bills for Conference expenses be approved and countersigned by the Finance Committee.
