Master's Degree in Library and Information Science

Marshall University Libraries is currently developing a library and information science degree with a focus on special libraries, including archives, historical societies, museums, and medical libraries, addresses a crucial gap in current educational offerings. This specialization ensures that graduates are equipped with the specific knowledge and skills required to excel in these unique and specialized library environments.

The MLIS is one of the last remaining terminal degrees at the master's level and can lead to rewarding faculty employment.

The creation of a master's level terminal degree option at Marshall University provides a valuable opportunity for individuals seeking a nontenured faculty career in academia. This addition not only diversifies the academic offerings at the university but also contributes to the development of a well-rounded and highly qualified workforce in the field of library and information science.

The proposed degree program at Marshall University demonstrates a commitment to addressing the current and future needs of the library and information science field. With a vibrant history of producing school librarians since the early 1950s and a reputation for supporting public library workers through the RBA completion degree, Marshall is the logical choice to go to the next level with an ALA accredited MLIS!





Collection Spotlight: The Rosanna A. Blake Library

The Rosanna A. Blake Library of Confederate History is a unique collection of materials relating to the Confederacy, the southern states, and the Civil War and Reconstruction. The contents were compiled by Rosanna Alexander Blake, a Marshall College graduate, who became a United States trial attorney, a judge in Washington, and an avid collector. Upon her death, the collection, which now includes over 4,000 monographs and 3,000 imprints, was donated to Marshall University. In addition, an endowment provides graduate scholarships to English and History students.



Thank you for your donation

The Rosanna A. Blake Library of Confederate History at Marshall University recently received two unique images of Jefferson Davis and his wife Varina, donated by Dr. and Mrs. John O'Brien. According to Dr. O'Brien's research, the encased tintypes, taken in Washington just prior to the outbreak of the conflict, were most likely taken from the Confederate White House in Richmond in April 1865 by Thomas Welles, the son of Secretary of the Navy Gideon Welles, who was serving in the Union army at the time of General Robert E. Lee's surrender. Welles sent them to his father, and Dr. O'Brien acquired the images from the estate of the family in 1980. An article detailing the provenance of the tintypes written by Dr. O'Brien, who was a close friend of Rosanna Blake and a fellow collector, was published in the Spring 2016 issue of Military Images. The O'Briens, long-time supporters of the Blake Library, donated a number of important materials, including an extremely rare Volck Shield, to the Blake Library. "We are thrilled to add these previously unseen images to the Blake collection," said Special Collections Director Lori Thompson. "They will be utilized by researchers of the Civil War and we are appreciative to the O'Briens for their continued support of Marshall University and this important resource." Dr. John O'Brien died on July 21, 2023. Sylvie O'Brien donated his remaining books and manuscript materials relating to the Civil War to Marshall University.
