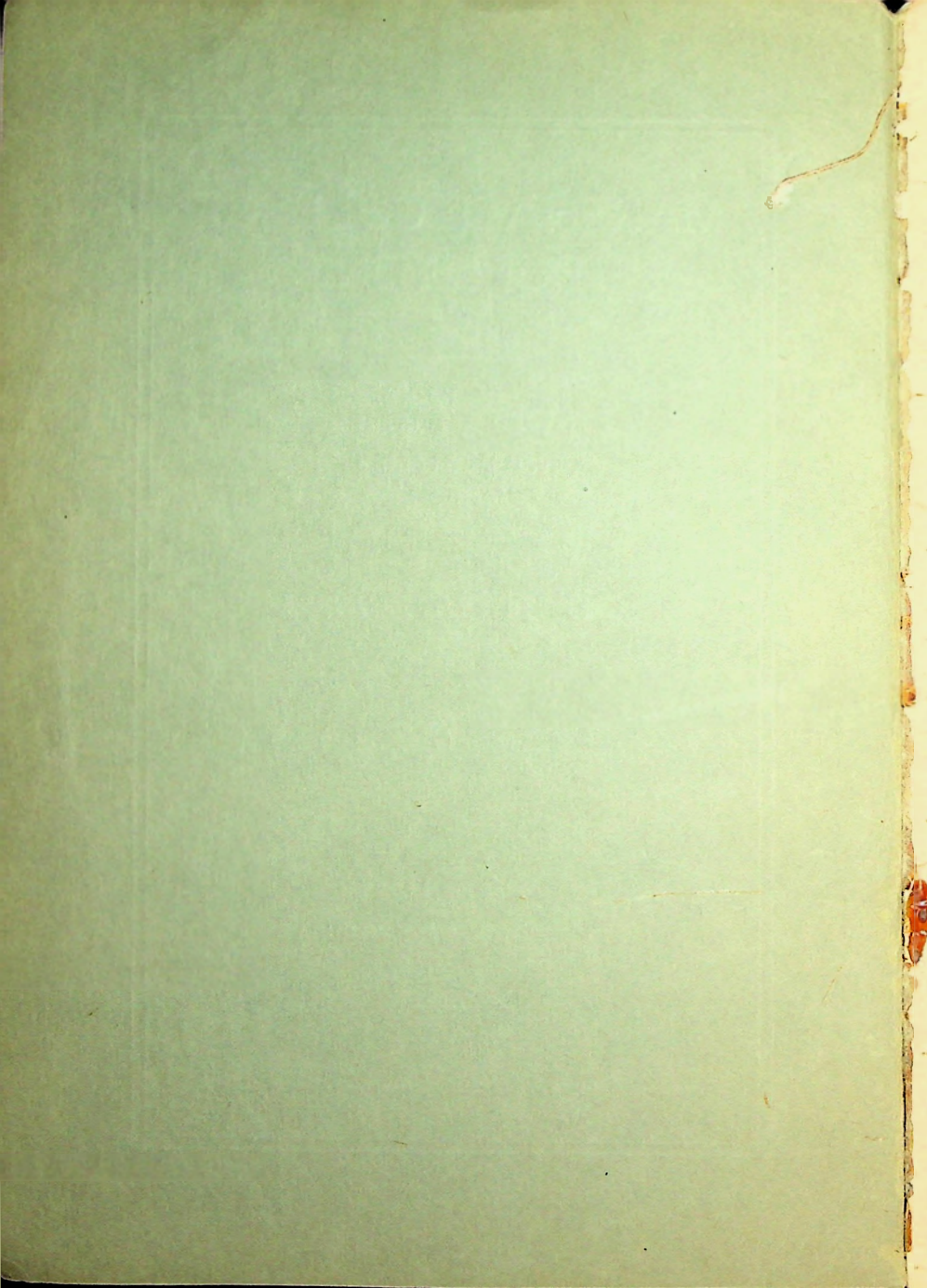

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## HISTORY

"Marshall Academy" was established in 1837, shortly after the death of Chief Justice John Marshall, of the Supreme Court of the United States, in whose honor the school was named. It was organized as a private institution. In 1856 the work of the Academy was enlarged and reorganized, and the name changed to Marshall College.

But little information concerning the early days of the institution is now at hand. None of the records of the school during the time it was an academy are preserved. From the year 1867 to the present time, however, we have a fairly satisfactory record.

At the close of the Civil War a number of the leading citizens in the southwestern part of the new state of West Virginia succeeded in having the legislature take it over and establish a State Normal School. This action did not materially change the nature of its work, which continued to be academic in character, with occasional courses in pedagogy, school management, and the theory and art of teaching. In 1897, a practice school of one grade was organized. Lacking support, this effort at the professional training of teachers was discontinued after two years of experiment. In January, 1902, a department of education was organized under authority of the Board of Regents, and a practice school for teachers was established. In February, 1920, the State Board of Education authorized the organization of a Teachers College. This college conferred its first degrees in June, 1921, when it graduated a class of four students.

Much of the work of the institution continued to be academic. Accordingly, the State Board of Education, in June, 1924, authorized the organization of the Arts and Sciences College with which are affiliated the two years course in engineering and the pre-medical and pre-law courses. The two colleges now operate in cooperation, but each under its own dean, with but slight disparity in enrollment.

## LOCATION

The institution is located in Huntington, a city of eighty thousand population. It is easily accessible by the four trunk line railways of the state, the Ohio Valley Electric lines, the Midland Trail, and other motor roads.

Huntington is an ideal location for a college. It is a city of beautiful and hospitable homes. It is an art and civic center of note, and nowhere can a better community spirit be found. It has a large number of fine churches and fine theatres. Its numerous and varied industries also furnish abundant laboratory facilities for all social and commercial studies.

### THE COLLEGE CAMPUS

Although the College is situated in the heart of a city, it has, nevertheless, a campus of generous proportions. Its twenty-five acres of area is in effect materially increased by the broad avenues and streets with which it is surrounded. These ample thoroughfares not only provide abundant parking facilities, but they afford sky space and range of vision. The site is a level tract of the broad Ohio River valley in the midst of which is a mound shaped terrace of great natural beauty. The grounds are laid off in building sites, walks, drives, groves, and flower gardens. Proper architectural design and appropriate landscaping combine to effect a campus of marked interest and beauty.

In addition to the campus proper, the College is joint owner of a splendid modern stadium only a few blocks distant, where all football games are played, and other open air activities are carried on.

### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

In all there are twenty-one buildings on the campus. Of these, ten are used for definite educational activities, six for sorority houses, one is used for home economics practice house, and four are occupied by faculty members or college employees.

College hall is the oldest and largest building on the campus. One section of this building was erected in 1872. This building includes a dormitory and cafeteria, the college auditorium, recreation and social parlors, class rooms and business offices.

Northcott Science hall is a three-story structure of modern design devoted to the work of the physics, chemistry, biology, botany, geography, and home economics departments.

The Physical Education building was completed in 1921. It is provided with a good gymnasium floor, two swimming pools, class rooms, and offices.

Music hall is an older building which has been remodeled and enlarged to include a small auditorium for recitals, practice rooms for piano and voice students, a band room, and ten class rooms.

Champ Clark cottage is a frame building remodeled for dormitory purposes. It has accommodations for about 25 girls.

A remodeled building on Fifth avenue is used by the classes in journalism.

The junior high school and grade training school buildings are neat frame structures erected for temporary use.

## GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

(For specific requirements see regulations under Teachers College and under College of Arts and Sciences, respectively.)

*Applications for credential blanks, and all communications in regard to admission, should be addressed to the Registrar.*

Admission to Marshall College may be obtained in three ways: (a) by certificate of graduation from an accredited\* secondary school; (b) by a properly certified transcript from a standard university, college, or normal school; and (c) by examination.

*An applicant for admission by certificate must file with the Registrar an official statement of his credits, signed by the proper official of the school or the schools from which he comes, at least fifteen days before the date of registration. The Registrar will notify the applicant as to the acceptance of his credits. All certificates, when filed for credit, become the property of the college.*

*No student may register by proxy.*

Graduates of second-class high schools are allowed not more than 12 units of credit, and cannot be admitted to college until three or four additional units have been earned in a first-class high school or its equivalent.

Entrance examinations are offered at the beginning of each semester, if demanded. No student is permitted to take an entrance examination in any subject for which he has college credit. All candidates for entrance examinations must notify the Registrar at least one week before the examinations are to be given.

No credit, either high school or college, is allowed for teaching experience.

*Students entering from other colleges must meet the entrance requirements of this college, and must have certificates of honorable dismissal from the institution last attended and official statements of credits. A student's statement of credits must show the descriptive title of each course, the year in which the work was done, the number of weeks the course was pursued, and the number of credits allowed thereon. A transcript presented for advanced standing should come direct from the institution issuing it; and, when accepted, it becomes the property of the college. Under no circumstances is credit of collegiate grade allowed for work done in a high school.*

Examinations for advanced standing must be taken within three months after the opening of the semester. Each candidate for examination must secure a permission card at the Registrar's office at least five days before the date of examination.

Every student at Marshall College is entitled to one official transcript of his record free; for each additional copy of his record he will be charged \$1 for an original copy and 25 cents for each carbon copy.

\*Accredited schools are standard four-year high schools or preparatory schools as classified by the Departments of Education of the various states, or any of the regional accrediting agencies, such as the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.



A student who defaults in the payment of any college dues forfeits his right to claim a transcript.

An application for a transcript of credit should furnish the date of last attendance at Marshall College, and a married woman should give both her maiden and married names.

### ASSIGNMENT AND CREDIT

1. A student who enters at the beginning of a semester may be assigned as much as sixteen semester hours, but not more, except by special permission of his Dean.

2. If a student enters late, the maximum assignment of sixteen semester hours is reduced; and to receive credit for eighteen weeks work in any subject assigned, he must pass, satisfactorily, an examination on all the work covered by the class up to the time of his entering. In laboratory subjects all "make up" work must be done hour for hour in the laboratory.

3. *A student who leaves school without giving notice of good cause therefor is allowed no credit for work done that semester. If it is necessary for a student to leave school before the end of the semester, he should see each of his teachers about his work, make a statement of the reason for his going, and satisfy the conditions for getting credit for what has been done.*

4. A regular student at Marshall College who fails to make at least nine hours credit in any semester is not eligible for enrollment the succeeding semester.

5. Eight hours is the maximum credit allowed for work done during any school year by a teacher in service, regardless of whether the work is done by correspondence, in extension class, or in residence.

### GRADING SYSTEM

The series of grades employed for rating students' work is the following:

A—Honor grade; given for ability and performance of exceptionally high order. Among a representative group of college students work of quality A will generally be found in from 3 to 10 cases out of a hundred.

B—Excellent; given for ability and performance distinctly better than average in quality. Among a typical group of college students work of quality B will generally be found in from 15 to 20 cases out of a hundred.

C—Good; given for ability and performance of medium or average quality. Among a typical group of college students work of quality C will generally be found in from 40 to 50 cases out of a hundred.

D—Lowest passing grade; given for ability and performance of quality fair to poor. Among a typical group of college students work of quality D will generally be found in from 15 to 20 cases out of a hundred.

F—Failure. Among a typical group of college students work of quality F will generally be found in from 3 to 10 cases out of a hundred. An F may not be removed from the record except on evident error; to receive credit, the work must be repeated *in class* and successfully passed.



I—Incomplete; signifies that student was unable, on account of illness, or for other equally good reasons, to do some of the last exercises of the class work, and that student may be able to earn a grade higher than D by completing the work of the course. I automatically changes to F if work is not completed within one semester.

W—Withdrawn from course; can be used only in case student has been officially dropped from course on notice from dean to registrar to instructor. To be accompanied by date of last class attendance; thus, W 9-29-32. In case such drop notice is issued later than one calendar month after the date for first class meetings in the semester, the W shall also be accompanied by a grade (in parentheses) to show the quality of the student's work up to the time of last attendance; thus, W (C) 10-13-32. Such grades shall be used as part of the student's record for the semester in determining his eligibility for enrollment the following semester.

For statistical purposes, the numerical equivalents of the several grades are as follows: A, 3 points for each hour of credit; B, 2 points for each hour of credit; C, 1 point for each hour of credit; D, F, I, no points. Candidates for graduation must have at least as many points as hours to their credit.

### CLASS ATTENDANCE

Students are accountable to instructors for absences from class. The instructor will bring to the attention of the dean all cases of excessive or chronic absence. Absence from classes immediately before or immediately after a holiday or vacation for the purpose of extending the holiday is not excusable. Non-attendance at classes at the opening of any session will be recorded as absence.

### CLASSIFICATION OF STUDENTS

Students who have completed not less than ninety hours of college work are classified as Seniors.

Students who have completed not less than fifty-eight hours and not more than eighty-nine hours of college work are classified as Juniors.

Students who have completed not less than twenty-six hours and not more than fifty-seven hours of college work are classified as Sophomores.

Students who have completed the high school or secondary course and not more than twenty-five hours of college work are classified as Freshmen.

### DIVISIONS OF THE SCHOOL YEAR

#### THE SEMESTER

The work of the institution is organized on the semester basis. The first semester opens early in September and continues eighteen weeks; the second semester opens immediately after the close of the first semester and continues eighteen weeks. The regular summer session is a half semester in length.

## THE SUMMER SCHOOL

The principal summer term opens on the Monday following the close of the second semester of the regular year.

The faculty is composed of members of the regular teaching staff and a number of selected men and women secured from other colleges and universities.

Several grades in the training school and one or two rural schools are operated during the summer term in order to give Normal students and teachers the advantage of observation work and practice teaching.

## STUDENT EXPENSES

## BOARD

Young ladies who are not living at home with relatives are required to room and board in one of the college dormitories. Young men secure rooms in places approved by the faculty committee. A dining room and cafeteria are available for the young men. Board and room average from \$7.00 to \$7.50 a week.

The cost of books varies from \$10.00 to \$15.00 per session.

\*Checks for fees should be made payable to "Marshall College."

†An additional fee of \$10 a semester is charged students from other states except during the summer term, when fees for students from all states are the same.

Fees for materials used in certain courses in science and in other subjects requiring special materials, ranging from 50 cents to \$5.00 per semester, will be collected by the instructor in charge and turned in to the Treasurer. Such fees will be collected before the middle of the semester.

No student may be assigned to classes or have his schedule approved by his dean until he has paid his registration fee. The student loan committee of the faculty may be able to help students who need temporary financial assistance.

Any student submitting to his dean a schedule for approval after the appointed registration days must show the treasurer's receipt for a late registration fee of \$2.00 for any tardiness of three days or less, and \$5.00 for any tardiness beyond three days, in addition to the regular registration fee.

Students withdrawing before the end of the first month of the semester may obtain a refund of one-half of fees paid. Those withdrawing before the end of the second week may secure a refund of three-fourths of the fees paid. No part of fees can be refunded in case of withdrawal after the end of the first month of a session. If a student is not able to make satisfactory schedule and asks for a refund before his schedule is approved, he will be entitled to a refund in full on the order of his dean. Application for refunds must be made to the Treasurer of the College at the time of the student's withdrawal.

### COST

It is the aim of the College to hold all living expenses down to the lowest reasonable minimum. Wholesome food is provided in the dining rooms, but fancy food cannot be furnished at the prices charged. The institution buys at wholesale and manages its service carefully. It returns to the student in food and service the entire equivalent of the money paid. The charge for rooms is barely sufficient to pay for heat, light, and upkeep. This policy is pursued in conformity with the State's avowed purpose of providing educational facilities for all its people at the least possible cost to the student.

### THE PURPOSE OF MARSHALL COLLEGE

The institution has had a long career of honorable service. As an academy it took high rank. As a teacher training school its service was extended over a still larger portion of the state. Whether in its academic or professional work, it has always maintained a high standard of social ideals, and those ideals have become crystallized in the best type of a state-wide citizenship.

The fundamental purpose of the institution is to render the best possible service to the people of the state whose creation it is. Rapidly increasing demands upon it have led to substantial expansions in the college. However, no influence of increasing numbers of students, added courses of study, or greater projects will be allowed to obscure the basic idea of the development of strong, clean, efficient men and women, the type of citizens who stand as a sheet anchor of orderly and beneficent government.



## COLLEGE MORALE

In college life morale is of the highest importance. Listlessness and loafing are educational sins. Intense interest and hard work are essential to success. A dominant purpose tends to develop a strong personality which is itself one of the desiderata of a general education. Marshall College will do its utmost to help students find themselves, to assist them in the formation of all helpful habits, and to encourage them in their work. It does not invite the attendance of students who are unwilling to devote themselves to a course of earnest, persistent, hard work.

*Parents are warned against the harmful effects of frequent home visits by students. The home visit is pleasant, but it diverts the student's attention from his work. Cutting class at the end of the session or entering a day late militates against the best results. A full day's work is assigned each student for every day of the session, and no student can miss a single day without definite damage to his work.*

Social activities and diversions of all kinds should be limited during school sessions. The College makes proper provision for agreeable and wholesome social life, but it cannot tolerate the continued presence of any to whom a high life purpose and the advantages of a clean and wholesome social life do not appeal. The great majority of the students enrolling here are young men and women of fine character and habits, and the college is under obligation to protect them from the damaging influences of both moral and mental dissipation.

## RULES OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

## GOVERNING STUDENTS

1. Students are subject to the rules and regulations made by the school for their guidance and government; for any failure to comply with such regulations, a student may be punished, suspended, or expelled as provided by the Board.

2. Students in attendance at any state school may be transferred to any other state school; but no student shall be admitted to a state school unless he presents a recommendation for admission to said school with an official certificate of his credits earned in the school from which he transfers.

3. No student shall be permitted to carry more than sixteen semester hours of work, at any time, except by special permission of his Dean—and not more than eighteen hours without the permission of the College Council. Two laboratory hours shall count as one semester hour.

4. Each regular student shall carry at least twelve semester hours.

5. When a student has received his assignment, he cannot change it except by permission of his Dean.

6. Minimum resident requirements for graduation: For standard normal diploma, at least one year of work, two-thirds of which must be done in actual residence. For the A. B. degree, at least one year's work in residence, one semester of which must be in the senior year. A "year in residence" must represent not less than thirty-six weeks' work in residence, with not less than 24 hours credit.



## REGULATIONS CONCERNING ROOMS AND BOARD

No student is permitted to board or room anywhere except in a place approved by the College authorities; and should any one be found in a place not approved by the committee, he will be notified at once to move, on penalty of being dropped from school.

Young men and young women are not permitted to room in the same house.

All matters pertaining to board and rooms for young women are subject to the approval of the Dean of Women.

Students are not permitted to room at any place in which the proprietors are not willing to conform to rules and regulations prescribed by the College. In case the rules are not observed, students will be required to change their rooming places.

Students who do not reside at home are expected to get permission when leaving the city. This rule is made to protect the student and to make it possible to find him in case any urgent call should come for him. While this rule is not made absolute, it will be considered a breach of good faith and confidence for students not to observe it. The purpose of the rule is reasonable and should appeal to every student and parent. Girls apply to the Dean of Women for the necessary permission.

Students desiring to change their boarding places or their rooms are required to notify the Secretary. This is a very important requirement, and its observation must be strictly adhered to.

## STUDENT HOMES

College Hall stands on the elevated central portion of the spacious campus. It is joined to the main building on the west, a wide central hallway on the first floor extending the full length of the two sections. The residence hall contains seven suites and thirty-four rooms, accommodating one hundred fifteen students. A sewing room and kitchenette are provided for the use of the young women. A good infirmary is maintained where students who are sick are properly cared for.

*All non-resident freshman women, except those who work for room and board in private families, must live in College Hall or Champ Clark Cottage.* Exceptional cases will be considered by the Dean of Women.

Champ Clark Cottage on Third Avenue accommodates twenty-two students.

Everett Hall offers especially attractive accommodations for twenty-three young women. This hall is reserved for non-resident women above freshman ranking.

Besides these halls the Sigma Sigma Sigma, the Delta Xi Delta, the Theta Rho, the Delta Sigma Epsilon, the Pi Kappa Sigma, the Kappa Theta, the Alpha Sigma Alpha, and Kappa Tau Phi sororities maintain chapter houses—under supervision of the College authorities—which accommodate about fifteen students each.

All non-resident women not living in the dormitories, sorority houses, or in homes where they work for their room and board, must live in houses approved by the Dean of Women. The College retains the right

to move girls from addresses not found on the approved list. A list of approved homes may be obtained from the office of the Dean of Women.

Young ladies who wish to engage rooms in any of the college halls should make application several weeks in advance. No rooms are considered engaged until the deposit of two dollars (see Rooms and Room Rent on page 25) has been made.

All correspondence concerning reservations for rooms for women, whether in the dormitories or in private homes, should be addressed to the Dean of Women, Marshall College, Huntington, W. Va.

### GOVERNMENT IN WOMEN'S HALLS

Beyond the expectation that the life of our students shall conform to the requirements of promptness and fidelity to duty, and show that considerate regard for others which characterizes refined womanhood, we have but few fixed rules.

Our residence halls have Student House Government Associations which, with the direction of the Dean of Women and the House Directors, exercise proper oversight over the young women resident in them. The Student Council of this Association enforces such regulations as are considered necessary to good order, good habits, and the best educational results for the group.

By a persistent disregard for regulations the student will forfeit her right to the privileges of the halls.

### TO PARENTS

We call special attention to the following ruling of the State Board of Education:

"It is hereby ordered that as long as there is room in College Hall, all Freshman women students, except those who room and board at home, are required to room and take their meals in College Hall. When there are not rooms available in College Hall, the remaining Freshmen shall room in Champ Clark Cottage. All women students above freshman rank for whom there is accommodation shall room in Everett Hall. Any exceptions to this rule must be approved by the Dean of Women."

Every parent who realizes the importance of protecting young girls away from home, in a city, will appreciate this ruling of the State Board.

*When parents or guardians send their daughters, or wards, here, they must send them subject to our government; for, while they are under our care, we must decide what is best for them.*

*When students desire special permission to attend a social function or to remain away from the hall over night, they must secure permission from the Dean of Women.*

*Girls who do not have rooms in the college halls are under the same general regulations as the girls in the halls. They must conform to general rules in force in the college halls. When they desire to attend social functions of any kind, they must secure permission from the Dean of Women just as if they lived in a college hall.*

## CONVENIENCES

All residence halls are steam heated and electrically lighted.

Hot and cold water are supplied throughout these buildings.

There are direct trolley and bus connections with all parts of the city and with adjoining towns.

All three halls are supplied with telephone and telegraph connections.

## ROOMS AND ROOM RENT

The rooms are furnished with single beds, mattresses, closets, dressers, chairs, tables, light, and heat. Students are required to furnish their own bedding (except the mattress) and towels, and are required to keep their rooms clean and in order. *Each student should provide herself also with her own hot water bottle, soap dish, spoon, two glass tumblers, a small pitcher for drinking water, and a napkin ring.*

All *breakage* of whatever kind, whether to furniture or equipment, is paid for by the occupants of the room in which the *breakage* occurs.

Room rent is \$20.00 a semester. Two dollars of this amount is payable when the room is engaged, and the balance at the time of registration. The deposit of \$2.00 is forfeited if the room is not claimed.

## TABLE BOARD

Charges for table board in College dining rooms are at the rate of \$4.75 a week or \$85.50 per semester.

Should a student prefer to pay her board in installments, she may pay in the following manner: \$21.50 upon entrance and \$21.50 on the first of each month thereafter until the full amount of \$85.50 has been paid.

No *reduction* is made in table board for short absences (a few days) at the opening or close of a "semester" or "term" or for the Thanksgiving or the Easter recess.

The cafeteria serves good food at cost prices. Some pay more, some less, than the dining room charge of \$4.75 a week.

## CORRESPONDENCE WORK

As far as her facilities permit, the College offers each year certain courses by correspondence. The work is of college grade and college credit is given for it. Only those may enroll who are eligible for college work.

Not more than eight hours of credit can be earned during a year, nor can more than two subjects be carried at one time.

The fee is \$7.50 per credit hour, payable to Marshall College. The subjects offered vary from year to year. Information will be sent upon request.

## EXTENSION CLASSES

Marshall College desires to be of service to those communities in which groups wish to organize themselves into extension classes. The number of such non-resident classes that can be conducted by college instructors is limited by the capacity of the teaching staff to carry on the work.



The minimum size of a class is placed at fifteen registrants, but the number required will depend in part upon the distance their instructor has to travel. The fee is \$7.50 per semester hour. For such a course the class is required to meet for sixteen two-hour periods, usually at regular intervals of one week. Students who desire credit for the course are expected to enroll not later than the second class meeting. Outside preparation is required for extension classes just as for residence classes.

### STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Huntington offers many opportunities for students who wish to support themselves in part during their residence in school. There are nearly always openings for those having experience in stores or offices, in caring for children, or assisting in housework. Professor Lucy E. Prichard is chairman of the committee on student employment. Applications for assistance should be addressed to the committee, in care of Miss Prichard.

### PLACEMENT COMMITTEE

To assist superintendents in securing teachers adapted to their needs and to assist others who have need for the services of college trained young men or women, a Placement Committee is maintained. This committee consists of the Deans of the two colleges and faculty members who are especially familiar with the work of students. This committee will cheerfully arrange for personal conferences between candidates for positions and employers, or supply by mail as complete personal data about any candidates as may be required.

### THE JAMES E. MORROW LIBRARY

The new library named for a former president of the institution is the latest important addition to the college plant. It is a handsome building of the early American type and splendidly adapted to its purpose. It contains four class rooms, an art display room, offices, stack rooms, and a general reading room that will accommodate about 300 students.

At this time the library contains 27,000 volumes of well selected books. These books thoroughly cover the fields in which the college offers courses. In addition to this valuable collection of books, the library is provided with about 300 periodicals and newspapers of American and foreign publication. It also contains a large number of reports and public documents which are of great value for research use.

During the year past the two sons of the late Dr. C. E. Haworth presented to the library about 330 volumes selected from his personal library. These valuable volumes constitute the foundation of the "Haworth Alcove" inaugurated by the Student Council which has already raised a sum of money to increase the collection.

A juvenile library is installed in the junior high school building for the use of student teachers and pupils in the practice schools.



## FRESHMAN WEEK

About seven hundred freshmen are now enrolled by the College each year. To afford this large group of first matriculates a better opportunity for personal counsel with teachers and deans before their decisions with reference to their work are made, Monday and Tuesday, September 5th and 6th, are set aside as a partial "Freshman Week." Class work will commence Wednesday morning. All freshmen should attend the special assembly at 9:00 o'clock Monday morning where detailed information about registration will be given.

Upper classmen will enroll on Wednesday, and class work will commence Thursday morning. Students are urged to be prompt and thorough in making the necessary preliminary arrangements for their work.

The women's dormitories, sorority and fraternity houses will be open for students Sunday evening, September 4th.

## SCHOLARSHIP AND STUDENT LOANS

Marshall College deems it a privilege to be permitted to assist worthy young people in obtaining a coveted education. Through its friends the College has acquired loan funds which are available to the extent of two or three thousand dollars each year. In fact, the College stands ready to say to any earnest healthy boy or girl who has completed his high school course and has a small amount of money to start on that it can show him a way to obtain a full college education. Inquiries from this class of students are welcome:

Applications for loans or scholarships should be addressed to the Scholarship Committee, of which Dr. C. E. Hedrick is chairman. Scholarships are awarded primarily to students who have proved their ability in the classroom. The following scholarships are available for 1932-33:

Woman's Club Loan Scholarship, value \$150—to be awarded to a student who could not otherwise attend school.

The Marshall "Class of 1889" is permitting its class fund of \$225 to be used for student loans till it may be increased materially, at which time a more permanent disposition of the fund may be decided upon.

The Junior Department of the Woman's Club of Huntington contributed, in 1925, \$100 as the beginning of a loan fund for students needing temporary aid. Preference will be given to students above freshman standing.

The Osceola Burns Scholarship Loan Fund was established in 1925 as a memorial to Mrs. Burns by her daughters, Mrs. Jed. B. Bebbie, Mrs. Vernon Carter, and Miss Elizabeth Burns, who contributed jointly \$150 as the beginning of a loan fund for worthy students.

The Don Chafin Scholarship Fund was established by Mr. Chafin in 1924 and is loaned to students of promise and ability, preferably from Logan County.

Daughters of the American Revolution Loan Scholarship, value \$400, to be awarded to members of the junior and senior classes in need of financial aid. Preference will be given to applicants majoring in American history and civics.

An unnamed Scholarship Loan Fund, with an income of one hundred dollars a year, is to be distributed in loans, at 2% interest, to students in Teachers College who make and maintain a point average of two plus (a grade average of B plus) on a semester assignment of not less than twelve hours.

#### THE MR. AND MRS. JAMES W. BURGESS LOAN FUND

As a memorial to her parents, Miss Frances C. Burgess established in 1928 a loan fund of one thousand dollars for worthy and promising students of junior and senior standing who need temporary financial aid. The fund is to be loaned without interest.

#### LUCILLE DRUEN MEMORIAL

In honor of their classmate, Lucille Druen, the members of the Home Economics Club of Marshall College of the year 1926 raised a fund of seven hundred twenty-five dollars. This money is to be loaned to worthy students at three per cent interest; and the income is to be used as a gift scholarship to stimulate the interest of high school students of West Virginia in home economics.

#### THE D. B. SMITH MEMORIAL

In honor of her deceased husband, Senator Smith, a loyal and devoted friend of Marshall College, Mrs. D. B. Smith, on July 23, 1925, turned over to the College the sum of one thousand dollars, to be known as the "D. B. Smith Memorial." This money is to be invested in perpetuity and the income used by the College in assisting worthy students.

## THE PAUL MORGAN MEMORIAL

In memory of their son, John Paul, a student in the pre-medical department of the college, who was killed in an airplane accident in the summer of 1927, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Morgan of Mason County, have given the college \$1000 as a scholarship fund, the income from which is to be awarded annually to some worthy student preparing for the medical profession. Paul Morgan was a noble example of young manhood and an ideal student.

## THE MRS. JAMES LEWIS CALDWELL MEMORIAL FUND

As a memorial to her mother, Mrs. Mary O'Bannon Smith Caldwell, Mrs. Charles Wellington Watts established in June, 1928, a fund of \$400 annually for an indefinite time. This fund will be used for student loans till it may have materially increased, at which time a more permanent disposition of a portion of it may be decided upon. In the awarding of the loans, preference will be given to junior and senior students who have established high scholastic records.

## THE MOINA MARTHA PRATOR FUND

Dr. Moina Prator, Professor of Geography, who died in July, 1930, provided a bequest of \$1000 which according to the terms of her will is held in trust and the proceeds are available to worthy girls who require assistance in obtaining a college education. Applications go to the college student loan committee.

## ATHLETICS

Marshall College believes in clean athletics and will not tolerate either dishonesty or professionalism in her sports program. High ideals of sportsmanship shall always be as much of a goal as high score records.

Marshall College athletics will be operated under the rules and regulations of the West Virginia Athletic Conference through the football season of 1932, and thereafter under the rules of the Buckeye Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, of which the College becomes a member.

The following rules are quoted from the Buckeye Conference by-laws:

"1. No student shall participate in any intercollegiate sport unless he be a bona fide student, doing full work in a regular or special course as an undergraduate as defined in the curriculum of his college.

"2. No student shall so participate until he shall have been in attendance in his college for one full collegiate year, subsequent to attaining the equivalent of freshman rank in any four year college.

"A. \* \* \* \* \*

"B. Summer session work shall not be counted in determining length of residence.

"3. No student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics upon the teams of any college or colleges for more than three years in the



aggregate, and any member of a college team who plays in any part of any intercollegiate athletic contest does hereby participate in athletics for the year.

"4. No student shall be permitted to participate in any intercollegiate contest who has not passed the preceding semester at least twelve hours and made twelve credit points.

"A student who participated in intercollegiate athletics and does not complete the work of that term or semester shall not be permitted to compete in the same sport in his next year of residence until after the completion of a subsequent semester's work.

"Any student who has an incomplete which makes him ineligible, shall be ineligible until that incomplete is made up. (Time limit to make up incomplete shall be six weeks.)

"5. The names and scholastic records of all transfer students from without the Conference shall be submitted to the Conference for approval before such students can be declared eligible. This means scholastic record in the institution from which student transfers.

"A student transferring into any Buckeye school to be eligible for participation in athletics, must be in good standing at the institution from which he is transferring. In case an athlete is dropped from an institution he must return to that institution and clear his record before being eligible for participating in athletics at a Buckeye institution.

"6. No student shall play in any game under an assumed name.

"7. A person participating in any athletic contest as a member of a collegiate team, while not a student in the institution represented, is debarred from participating in intercollegiate contest conducted under these rules.

"8. No person shall be eligible to participate in any intercollegiate contest who has received any gift, remuneration, or any for his service on a college team. No student shall participate in any intercollegiate contest who has ever used or is using his knowledge of athletics or athletic skill for gain.

"Participation of college students in athletic sports as members of professional or semi-professional teams, shall render such students ineligible to membership in college teams; a semi-professional team, being one which contains one or more members who are engaged for a whole or a part of the season for pecuniary compensation. Any athlete who is proven to have accepted loans or gifts from any person or organized group, because of athletic ability, shall be declared ineligible for competition in the Buckeye Conference.

"9. Any student who is a member of a representative college team and who plays on any outside team during the time that he is a member of the varsity team or squad, shall be thereby rendered ineligible for participation in that sport for the current college year.

"12. College football teams shall play only with teams representing educational institutions.



"13. Teams other than the regular college or "varsity" teams in all branches of athletics shall play only with teams of their own institutions.

"15. All athletic funds and accounts shall be controlled and audited by faculty members, or by committees containing faculty members.

"16. The average aid in scholarships and loans given by any college to her athletes shall be no more than in the same proportion as to other male students, both in amount and in numbers receiving aid.

"No scholarship grants or loans are to be promised by any representative of any college to prospective athletes.

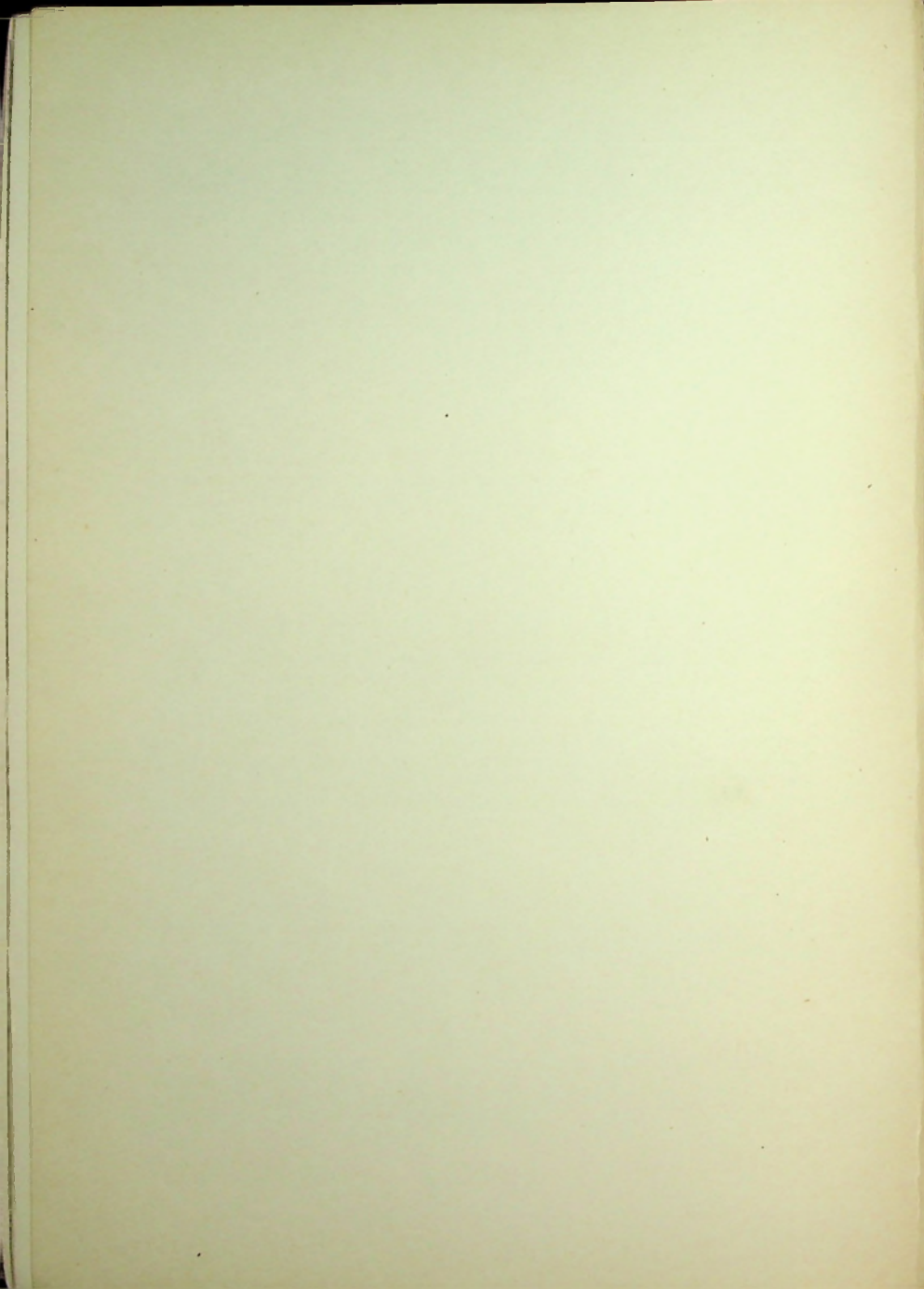
"No athletes entering any college may receive scholarship aid or loans until the second semester of the first year in college. Scholarships are not to be used to influence high school athletes to enter college."

### ASSEMBLY

A general assembly of faculty and students is convened in the college auditorium each Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. A part of the hour is usually devoted to a devotional exercise, and the remainder given over to addresses, musicals, picture programs, and the like. This is the one opportunity for a mass assembly of the entire faculty and student body. All faculty members and all students are expected to attend this meeting.

### STUDENT GOVERNMENT

In a large measure the students of Marshall College govern themselves. It is a tradition on the campus that students are to conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen. This tradition is so well established that it has the effect of a campus law. To maintain this tradition and provide the machinery necessary for handling the business and social affairs of the student body, a system of student government was set up a few years ago. From year to year the organization has been perfected in its functions till it now exercises a large degree of control over student affairs. The system not only works to the advantage of the College, but its operation affords students an excellent opportunity for the study of citizenship and government.

## TEACHERS COLLEGE ORGANIZATION

Ten departments of instruction are maintained in Teachers College, as follows: Art, Biology, Education, English, Geography, History, Home Economics, Library Science, Music, Physical Education.

In addition, certain special courses in other fields are presented as Teachers College courses without creating departments within the College. These courses, and certain special methods courses, are taught by members of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences through the courtesy of the Dean of that College; these instructors are listed as affiliated members of the faculty of Teachers College.

## PURPOSE

Teachers College is Marshall College organized for the purpose of preparing teachers. Its curricula are to be regarded as vocational in purpose. Nevertheless, these curricula, like those of the College of Arts and Sciences, consist for the most part of courses in academic subject matter; they differ from those of the College of Arts and Sciences primarily in the respect that they include professional courses for teachers, and that the selection of subject matter courses is made with a view to meeting the needs of teachers.

## WHAT STUDENTS REGISTER IN TEACHERS COLLEGE

Those students who desire to qualify for a teacher's certificate, issued by the State Department of Education, on the basis of college credits, register as members of Teachers College.

Students registered in Teachers College pursue one of the curricula outlined in this section of the catalogue, under the general guidance of the Dean.

Subject matter courses needed by Teachers College students, and not offered in Teachers College, will be taken from the schedule of the College of Arts and Sciences.

College of Arts and Sciences students will be admitted to courses on the Teachers College schedule, but they will be limited to a maximum of eight hours in education courses, and certain courses are open to Teachers College students only.

## ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

By regulation of the State Board of Education any graduate of a first class high school in West Virginia, with credits as required in any one of the curricula provided for high schools, may enter upon a teacher training curriculum. Any student with 15 units of credit applicable upon one of the high school curricula may be admitted conditionally to teacher training work, but not more than 32 semester hours of college credit may be taken before the requirements for high school graduation have been met in full.

Experienced teachers over twenty-one years of age who lack entrance credits may be admitted to Teachers College for such work as they are

qualified to take; but before receiving a diploma or a degree, they shall meet the full entrance requirement. These are special or unclassified students.

In order to insure adequate preparation of teachers in certain fundamental subjects, students who are admitted to any of the curricula for elementary teachers must attain a definite standard in the following subjects: English composition and spelling, arithmetic, and penmanship. Students who fail to meet the required standards in these subjects will be required to do additional work for which no collegiate credit will be given.

Before a new student in Teachers College may have his schedule approved by the Dean at registration time, he must present to the Dean a certificate from the Registrar, showing the entrance credits that have been accepted, and the number of hours of college credit accepted from other colleges. The Registrar must have at least four weeks, after the receipt of transcripts of credit earned in other schools, in which to prepare the certificate mentioned.

The above requirements may be temporarily suspended provided the student submits to the Dean the Registrar's certificate that entrance credits have been presented, apparently in proper shape, but presented too late for proper examination. In such cases, the certificate required by the preceding paragraph must be submitted to the Dean within four weeks after the opening of the term, or the student's schedule will be subject to cancellation.

### DEGREE AND DIPLOMAS

Teachers College diplomas are of two grades, those awarded at the end of a four-year course of study, and those awarded at the end of a two-year curriculum. The diploma for the four-year course gives to its possessor the A. B. (bachelor of arts) degree. The two-year course leads to the Standard Normal diploma and certificate. These curricula are outlined on pages which follow.

The four-year curricula are sufficiently flexible to permit the student to select some particular kind of educational activity as a future career, and to prepare especially for it. At the same time, its demands are sufficiently broad to guarantee good general preparation. Early selection of a definite professional plan, and adherence to that plan, are urged upon prospective teachers.

### CORRESPONDENCE AND EXTENSION CLASS CREDITS

By regulation of the State Board of Education, not more than 24 hours of correspondence and extension class work can be credited toward a degree, and not more than 12 hours toward a standard normal diploma.

Not more than 8 hours of credit may be allowed for correspondence and extension class work done in any one school year, and not more than 6 hours of this may be by correspondence.

No student may be registered in Marshall College and in another college at the same time without the consent of both institutions.

Observe that present requirements are 68 hours. For short course certificate be sure to take all that is listed for first year, with necessary second year work to meet present requirements.

Students who obtain 3 hours of Education 200 and 250 or 251 by taking them in summer must take another 2 hour course in Education; the dean must approve this selection. Neither more nor less than 20 hours in Education may be counted.

Before graduation the student must have earned as many grade points as hours of credit.

#### FOUR-YEAR CURRICULA IN ELEMENTARY EDUCATION||

Three four-year curricula in elementary education are offered, preparing teachers for elementary schools, principals for elementary schools, and supervisors for rural schools, respectively.

Certain requirements are common to all three of these curricula:

(1) The student must complete 60 semester hours of credit above requirements for the standard normal diploma. (2) Of the 60 hours, at least 48 must be earned in courses in 300 and 400 series; half credit only will be allowed on courses in the 100 series taken in the junior year, and on courses in the 200 series taken in the senior year; courses in the 100 series taken in senior year will give no credit toward graduation. (3) Before graduation the student must have earned as many grade points as hours of credit.

The 60 hours of work required in the last two years of each curriculum in elementary education are listed below. The requirements stated are based on the assumption that the student has met the present requirements for graduation from standard normal curriculum; in case of teachers who met earlier standard normal requirements, the dean will make an adjustment in the requirements for the last two years of the four-year curriculum. These curricula lead to the A. B. degree.

Electives applied on any curriculum must be consistent with the purpose of that curriculum.

## FOUR-YEAR CURRICULA FOR HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS||

### GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

(1) Completion of 128 semester hours of credit above entrance requirements.

(2) One year of science is required. Any one of the pairs of courses marked \* in the list below will satisfy the requirements. Prospective high school teachers who did not present at least two units of mathematics for entrance must earn enough college credit in mathematics to make the equivalent of two units; six hours are equivalent to one unit.

(3) Education courses are not to be taken before the junior year; not less than 20 hours, and not more than 24 hours, may be counted toward degree with high school certificate.

(4) High school teachers must be prepared to teach at least two subject groups. No person can be certificated to teach one subject group or field only, or to teach a single subject, except as indicated in the following list. The subject combinations are listed on the assumption that the subject named first will be regarded as the first teaching field, although that is not obligatory; the subject matter preparation in any field is the same regardless of whether it is the first or the second teaching field of the student; however, the professional work of the student is affected by his choice of first teaching field. Marshall College offers preparation in the following combinations; art; art and social studies; biology and mathematics; biology and social studies; commerce; commerce and social studies; English and French; English and art; English and Latin; home economics; home economics and biology; home economics and chemistry; home economics and art; mathematics and physical sciences; music; music and English; music and French; physical educa-

tion; physical sciences and biology; social studies and English; social studies and French; social studies and Latin; social studies and mathematics; social studies and physical sciences.

(5) Graduation may require more than 128 hours in the case of some combinations of subject groups. The student who enters with deficiency in English or mathematics may find it impossible to meet all requirements within 128 hours.

(6) Graduates of the standard normal curriculum who desire afterward to qualify as high school teachers will find that it is impossible to do so in two years of additional work. The exact amount of additional time required will vary with the combination of high school subjects. No courses in elementary education may be counted toward high school teacher's certificate.

(7) Of the 128 hours presented for graduation at least 48 hours must be in courses in 300 and 400 series; not more than 40 hours may be from the 100 series.

(8) Before graduation the student must have earned as many grade points as hours of credit. No person will be recommended for high school certificate to teach any subject group whose scholarship in that field is below C.

(9) Half credit only will be allowed on courses in the 100 series taken in the junior year, and on courses in the 200 series taken in the senior year; courses in 100 series taken in the senior year will give no credit toward graduation.

(10) A student who has had high school work in a foreign language may not receive college credit for repeated work in that language. One year of high school language work is equivalent to the first semester of a college first year course; two years of high school language work are equivalent to the first year course in college.

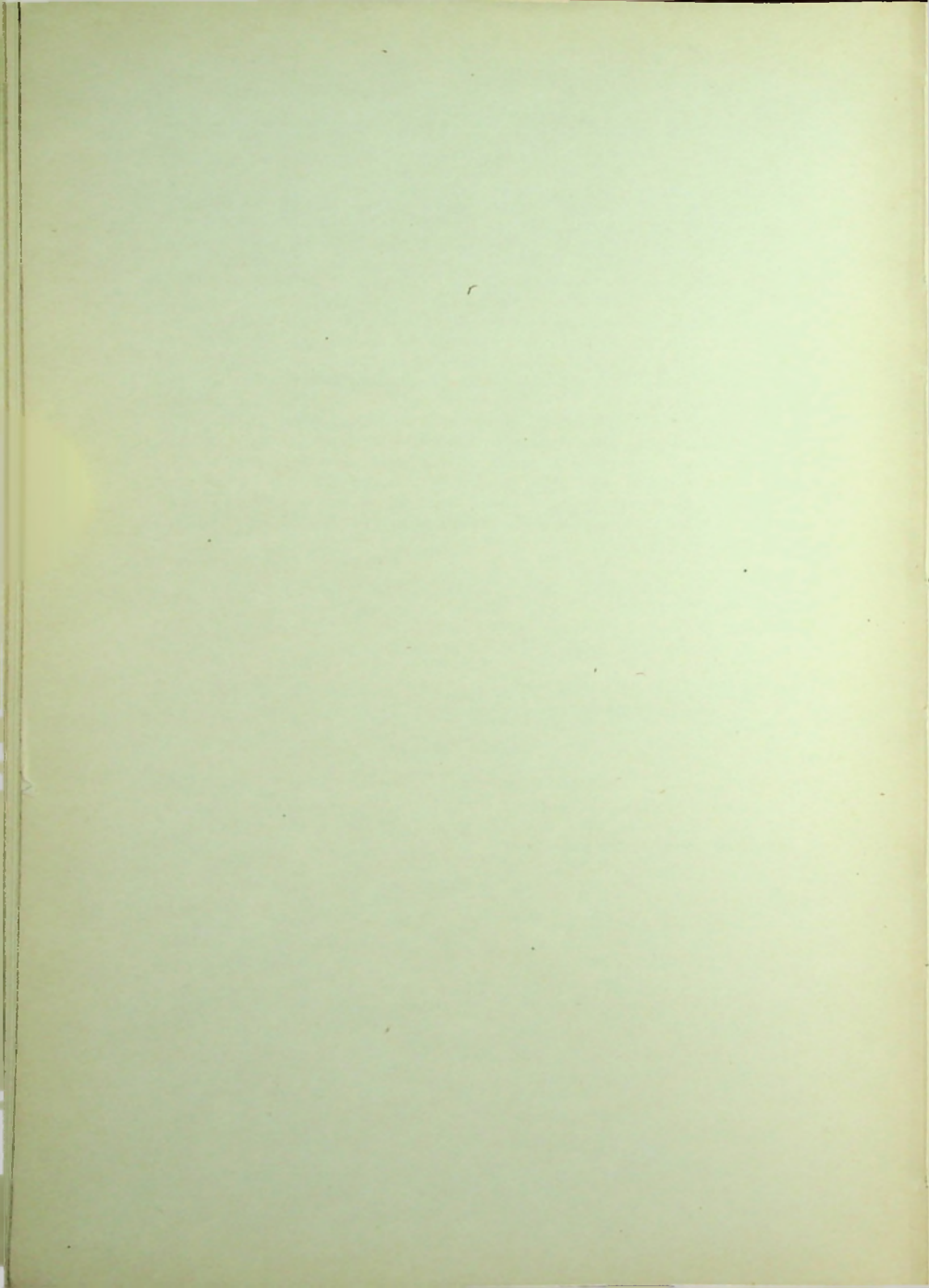

## TRAINING SCHOOLS

Marshall College maintains on the campus the Marshall Junior High School (seventh, eighth and ninth grades) and the Marshall Elementary School (grades one to six). Each grade of the elementary school is in charge of a critic teacher. The junior high school is conducted on the departmental plan.

The training schools serve the purpose of a laboratory for the Department of Education. Observation and practice teaching are done in the training schools under the direction of the supervisors and critic teachers. To supplement these facilities, arrangements have been made for high school observation and practice teaching in the Huntington city schools, and for rural school observation and practice teaching in Guyandotte District schools.





# TEACHERS COLLEGE

Exceptions to the statement that a course is "not open" to certain students may be made by the dean, after authorization by head of the department concerned when, in the dean's judgment, admission to the course is of vital importance to the student's general plan.

NOTE: "I" after a course title indicates that the course is offered in the first semester of the college year; "II," that it is offered in the second semester; "IV," that it is offered in the summer session; and a course without the semester indicated is not regularly offered. Many courses are offered more than once a year.

A study of the principal geographic regions of Europe, with a study of the surface, climate, and other factors of physical environment in relation to human activities and to present economic and political problems.

Prerequisite: Three hours of geography or European history.

**309. Economic Geography of Latin-America. Three hours.**

A regional study of Latin-America as based upon natural conditions with a summary of the economic resources of each region and their utilization. A study of geographic factors in the trade between the various regions and the United States and the rest of the world.

Prerequisite: Three hours of geography.

**312. Geography of Asia. Three hours.**

Mainly a study of the economic and political geography of China, Japan, India, Turkey, and the mandate territories of Western Asia.

Prerequisite: Three hours of geography.

**350. Climatology. Three hours.**

Charting and interpreting original weather data with a view to arriving at a logical division of the earth's surface into climatic realms and provinces. Some time is devoted to the study of climate as a factor in plant, animal and human ecology and to application or comparative climatology to new lands.

Prerequisite: Six hours of geography.



**401. Historical Geography. Three hours.**

A study of geographic conditions which have influenced the discovery, exploration, and colonization of America, the western movement of population, expansion of territory, the Civil War, the distribution of immigrants, cities, and industries. A comparison of geographic with non-geographic factors.

Prerequisite: Three hours of geography or American history.

**405. Political Geography. Three hours.**

An introductory study of the field of political geography. The development of type states as a result of environmental conditions of location, size, land forms, and natural resources.

Prerequisite: Six hours of geography with junior or senior rank.

### HISTORY

**121. Ancient and Medieval Civilization. Three hours. I, II**

General survey of the events, institutions, conditions, and forces that developed early European civilization.

**205. Social and Industrial History of England. Three hours. I**

A careful study will be made of the labor, industrial, and social conditions of England. The growth of the "Factory System," and other economic and social problems, will be considered. Not open to freshmen.

**206. Social and Industrial History of the United States. Three hours. II**

The current social and industrial conditions within the United States will be traced from their beginnings. Some topics are as follows: the natural resources; the influences of cheap land; effect of invention; the development of agriculture and manufacturing; and the contest between capital and labor. Not open to freshmen.

**221. Modern Europe (1492-1815). Three hours. I**

A general survey of the period with emphasis upon the relationship of events and movements. Not open to freshmen.

**222. Modern Europe (1815-1928). Three hours. II**

A continuation of 221.

**231. American History (to 1828). Three hours. I, II, IV**

A survey course, organized to meet the needs of standard normal students. Not open to other students.

**232. American History (since 1828). Three hours. I, II, IV**

Abbreviated content of Political Science 201-202, with study of national and state constitutions. Standard normal sophomores only.

**PSYCHOLOGY**

(Offered in Teachers College by the department of Psychology of the College of Arts and Sciences.)

**303. The Problem Child. Three hours.**

An analysis of the types of children that constitute the problems in the school, the home, and in society in general, including the dull or backward child, the mentally deficient, the psychopath, the nervous child, and the delinquent.

Prerequisite: Six hours of psychology. Social work or teaching experience may be counted as part prerequisite.

**307. Psychology of Adolescence. Three hours.**

A consideration of the characteristics of the boy and girl during the adolescent period, including the educational and social problems peculiar to this period.

Prerequisite: Psychology 101 or 305.

**315. Mental Measurements. Three hours.**

Technique and practice in the use of the Binet-Simon Intelligence Test, with a study of other scales of mental measurement, including individual and group tests, and their application to practical use.

Prerequisite: Psychology 101.

Fifteen units† of high school work are required for entrance. Admission may be obtained by entrance examination, by certificate from an accredited secondary or high school, or by a properly certified transcript from a standard university, college, or normal school.

No credit is allowed for penmanship or spelling as separate subjects.

## ORGANIZATION

The various departments of the College of Arts and Sciences are grouped as follows:

Group A: Language, English, and the Arts.

English, Latin, French, Spanish, German, Greek, Art, Speech, Music, and Physical Education.

Group B: Mathematics and the Natural Sciences.

Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geology, Home Economics, Botany, Zoology.

Group C: History and the Social Sciences.

History, Sociology, Economics, Commerce, Political Science, Journalism, Philosophy, Psychology, Bible, Library Science, Geography, and Education.

Through the requirement of a minimum number of hours from each group it is hoped that over-specialization will be avoided, while through the requirement of a maximum number of hours in a particular group an opportunity is afforded for intensive study in closely related subjects.

## THE BACCALAUREATE DEGREE

The degree of Bachelor of Arts (A. B.) is conferred by Marshall College upon students who have completed a four-year course (128 hours) in the College of Arts and Sciences. The term "hour" is used conventionally to signify one recitation a week throughout the semester of eighteen weeks, or an equivalent of that. A lecture or recitation is regularly fifty-two minutes in length, and the outside work of the student is estimated at an average of two hours for each class recitation. In laboratory work each exercise is approximately two hours in length, with outside study to make it as nearly as possible equivalent in its demands to the conventional "hour" defined above.

## MINIMA GROUP REQUIREMENTS

Group A: Language, English, and the Arts.

1. Six hours must be earned in English 101 and 102 (freshman English composition).
2. Four hours must be earned in English 107 and 108, (formerly listed as Literature 101 and 102).
3. Twelve hours must be earned in a foreign language, which may be the same language or another than the one offered for entrance. Less than a year's work in a foreign language may not be offered for graduation.
4. Two hours must be earned in Physical Education 101 and 102.

**Group B: Mathematics and the Natural Sciences.**

1. Eight hours must be earned in laboratory courses, four hours in botany, and four in zoology.
2. Twelve hours must be earned in the non-biological sciences: namely, chemistry, physics, mathematics, geology, or home economics.

**Group C: History and the Social Sciences.**

Eighteen hours must be earned in three of the following subjects: history, economics, political science, philosophy, psychology, sociology, and geography.

**OTHER REQUIREMENTS**

Candidates for graduation must have at least as many quality points as hours to their credit. Of the 128 hours required for the degree, at least 48 must be offered from some one of the groups given above, which will be designated the student's major group, and at least 24 from a second group, which will constitute the minor group. In no one of the groups may more than 72 hours be credited toward the degree.

At least 48 of the 128 hours required for the degree must be earned in courses numbered from 300 to 499.

Not more than 8 hours of Education may be elected from the Teachers College.

Half credit only will be allowed on required courses in the 100 series taken in the junior year; required courses in the 100 series taken in the senior year will give no credit toward graduation.

The above mentioned courses meet the requirements of the American Medical Association, on whose accredited list we now stand. Candidates for admission to the pre-medical work should include in their high school subjects: Latin two units, mathematics 2 units (algebra 1, geometry 1), physics 1 or chemistry 1. Students are strongly urged to

present also: French 2 units or German 2 units, and botany 1 unit or zoology 1 unit.

A certificate is awarded upon completion of sixty-four hours of work included in the above curriculum in order to meet the requirements of sixty hours as a minimum for admission to most medical colleges. It is highly desirable that freshmen indicate the medical college they intend to enter, since colleges vary somewhat in certain requirements. For example, the medical college of the University of West Virginia now requires twenty hours in chemistry for admission, and the medical college of Duke University requires six hours of mathematics and ten hours of physics.

Special attention is called to the increasing tendency among the best medical colleges to require *three* or even *four years* of pre-medical preparation. In all colleges preference is given those applicants having such preparation. The following electives, strongly urged by the Council on Medical Education, are offered for those who can carry extra credits or for those who would wisely spend three years in preparation to meet the exactions of the best medical colleges: Chemistry 305, 307, 204; Psychology 101, 316; Botany 203, 204; Zoology 300, 301, 306, 307; Physics 300, 301, 302, 303.

We are also able to present courses to meet the requirements according to the recent ruling of the Dental Educational Council of America calling for six semester hours in each of the following: English, biology, physics, inorganic chemistry, and three semester hours of organic chemistry, and electives to make a total of sixty hours as preparatory for *three years* in any leading school of dentistry.

In addition to the above requirements as many credit points as hours must be earned in order to secure a certificate.

Candidates for admission to this department must present a certificate of graduation from an accredited high school, with 15 units of credit. This work must include algebra  $1\frac{1}{2}$  units, plane geometry 1 unit, solid geometry  $\frac{1}{2}$  unit; and it should include 1 unit of physics and 2 units of one foreign language. High school students looking toward this profession are also advised to present credit for trigonometry, mechanical drawing, and shop work. Deficiencies in algebra and solid geometry may be made up in college. Students offering less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  units of algebra must make up the shortage before entering the class in college algebra (Mathematics 127). When credit in solid geometry is not offered, it must be made up before the beginning of the second year. The department endeavors to make such reasonable adjustments as may be necessary to meet individual needs. (See Requirements for admission on page 78.)

A certificate (not a degree) is given on the completion of the two years of engineering work, provided the student has earned as many credit points as hours toward the engineering certificate.

This department is open to all students who have met the regular college entrance requirements. It is strongly recommended that the 15 units prescribed for entrance include 2 units Latin and 2 units in social sciences, in addition to the required American history, civics, and mathematics.

The special curriculum prescribed and advised for the pre-law student has two purposes in view:

The first purpose is to meet the entrance requirements of any of the standard law schools, and with additional courses given in the junior and senior years, to meet the four-year requirements of other law schools.

The second purpose is to give the student the most necessary preliminary knowledge of new words and phrases, of old terms with prescribed and limited meaning, and of such new methods of study as will enable him to undertake the technical study of the law with a greater degree of intelligence and understanding.

The department also aims to give the student a foundation for a broad cultural background for his study and a thorough introduction to the current problems of the law as a social institution. To meet this purpose carefully selected courses in history, sociology, psychology, philosophy, political science, and economics are either prescribed or advised.

## COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

Courses intended primarily for freshmen are numbered from 100 to 199; such courses are open to sophomores unless departmental description of any course expressly excludes sophomores; not open to juniors and seniors. Courses intended primarily for sophomores are numbered from 200 to 299; such courses are open to freshmen and juniors unless departmental description of any course expressly excludes freshmen or juniors; not open to seniors. Courses intended primarily for juniors and seniors are numbered from 300 to 399; such courses are open to sophomores unless departmental description of any course expressly excludes sophomores; not open to freshmen. Courses intended primarily for seniors are numbered from 400 to 499; such courses are not open to freshmen, sophomores or juniors. Exceptions to the statement that a course is "not open" to certain students may be made by the dean, after authorization by head of the department concerned when, in the dean's judgment, admission to the course is of vital importance to the student's general plan.

NOTE: "I" after a course title indicates that the course is given in the first semester of the college year; "II," that it is given in the second semester; and a course without the semester indicated is not regularly given.

### BIBLE

A study of the historic portions of the Old Testament, beginning with Genesis and ending with the Fall of Jerusalem in 586 B. C.

No knowledge of Latin required. This course will not count toward language requirement.

Horace, the man, the satirist and philosopher.
311. **Studies from Augustan Poetry.** Three hours.  
Selections from the Augustan poets other than Horace.
318. **Mythology.** Two hours.  
A study of the most important myths and their influences. No knowledge of Latin required. This course will not count toward the language requirement.



320. **History of Latin Literature.** Two hours.  
Readings in translation from the works of the best known Latin writers. No knowledge of Latin required. This course will not count toward the language requirement.
328. **Advanced Prose Composition.** Two hours.
401. **Juvenal, Martial, and Pliny.** Three hours.  
The social life at Rome at the close of the first century.
402. **Vergil's Aeneid, Books VII-XII.** Three hours.  
A study of the poem as a whole with careful reading of the last six books.  
Prerequisite: Three semesters college Latin or four units high school Latin.
403. **The Roman Stage.** Three hours.  
Selected comedies of Plautus and Terence.

Topics of elementary algebra reviewed in addition to the work of advanced algebra.

Care and use of drawing instruments, lettering, mechanical perspective, and tracing.
111. **Mechanical Drawing.** Two hours. II  
Orthographic projection, practical problems using working drawings.  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 110.
201. **Plane Surveying.** Three hours. II  
Methods of using the tape, level, and transit in making plane surveys.  
Prerequisites: Mathematics 126 and Applied Mathematics 110.
202. **Advanced Surveying.** Two hours. I  
City and topographic surveys. Field and office work.  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 201.
203. **Engineering Problems.** One hour. I  
An elementary course in the analysis of simple engineering problems and the application of mathematics to their solution. To train the student in recording engineering computations.  
Prerequisites: Mathematics 126 and 127 and Applied Mathematics 110.

204. **Engineering Problems.** One hour. II  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 203.
205. **Empirical Design.** Two hours.  
Advanced work in mechanical drawing for mechanical engineers, the study and use of standard parts and the application of the empirical method to the proportioning of common machine parts.  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 111.
207. **Structural Drawing.** Two hours. I  
For civil and mining engineers. Steel details and structures.  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 111.
208. **Descriptive Geometry.** Three hours. I  
A study of the representation of lines, planes, surfaces, and solids, with practical applications.  
Prerequisites: Mathematics 121 and Applied Mathematics 110.
209. **Mechanism.** Four hours.  
Theory of mechanisms. Lectures, recitations, and drawing periods.  
Prerequisite: Applied Mathematics 205.
306. **Analytical Mechanics (Statics).** Three hours. II  
Statics of material point and rigid bodies by graphic and algebraic methods of analysis; chains and cords; centers of gravity and moments of inertia of plane figures.  
Prerequisites: Mathematics 315 and registration in Mathematics 316.

## PHILOSOPHY

201. **Problems of Philosophy.** Three hours.  
An introduction to the methods and chief problems of philosophy through a reading of some of the easier philosophical classics. Recommended as a prerequisite to further study in philosophy. Not open to freshmen.
303. **Ethics.** Three hours. I  
The nature of right and wrong, the conditions of happiness, and the chief moral problems of human conduct.
304. **Logic.** Three hours. II  
A study of the nature of knowledge, the laws of reasoning, and the principles and methods of scientific proof. Recommended for pre-law students.
305. **Studies in the Great Philosophers.** Three hours.  
A study of ten important modern philosophies in their practical aspects as applying to human life, paying particular attention to contemporary American thought.



**306. Esthetics. Two hours. I**

A psychological and philosophical study of the nature of beauty, and a consideration of the elements of beauty in each of the important arts. Given in 1932-33.

**311. Survey of Ancient and Medieval Philosophy. Three hours.**

A study of the origin and development of the fundamental problems of philosophy.

Prerequisite: Three hours in philosophy.

**312. Survey of Modern Philosophy. Three hours.**

Continuation of 311; a study of the chief philosophers of the modern period, from Descartes to Hegel.

**320. Comparative Religion. Three hours. II**

A study of the development of religion, and of the principal non-Christian religions, primitive, national, and advanced.

**330. Chinese Philosophy and Civilization. Two hours. II**

A survey of the philosophy, history, culture, and civilization of one of our most important neighbors, with special attention to her present transformation and situation.

### PHYSICS

**201. General Physics. Two hours. I**

Mechanics and heat. Arranged primarily for pre-medical students, and for those who do not wish a further knowledge of the subject.

Prerequisites: One year each of algebra and geometry.

**202. General Physics Laboratory. Two hours. I**

Required of all students taking Physics 201.

Prerequisites: One year each of algebra and geometry.

**203. General Physics. Two hours. II**

Electricity, sound, and light are studied. A continuation of Physics 201.

Prerequisites: Physics 201 and 202.

**204. General Physics Laboratory. Two hours. II**

Required of all students taking Physics 203. Continuation of Physics 202.

Prerequisites: Physics 201 and 202.

**205. General Physics. Three hours. I**

Mechanics and heat are studied. Arranged primarily for engineering students, and for those who intend to take advanced courses in the subject.

Prerequisite: Plane trigonometry.

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206. **General Physics Laboratory.** Two hours. I  
Required of all students taking Physics 205.  
Prerequisite: Plane trigonometry.
207. **General Physics.** Three hours. II  
Electricity, sound, and light are studied. Continuation of Physics 205.  
Prerequisites: Physics 205 and 206.
208. **General Physics Laboratory.** Two hours. II  
Required of all students taking Physics 207. Continuation of Physics 206.  
Prerequisites: Physics 205 and 206.
300. **Electricity and Magnetism.** Three hours. I  
A study of the mathematical theory and practical applications of electricity and magnetism.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208, Mathematics 315 or 325, and enrollment in Mathematics 316 or 326.
301. **Electrical Measurements.** Two hours. I  
Required of all students taking Physics 300.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208, Mathematics 315 or 325, and enrollment in Mathematics 316 or 326.
302. **Electricity and Magnetism.** Three hours. II  
A continuation of Physics 300.  
Prerequisites: Physics 300 and 301.
303. **Electrical Measurements.** Two hours. II  
Required of all students taking Physics 302. A continuation of Physics 301.  
Prerequisites: Physics 300 and 301.
304. **Light.** Three hours. II  
A study of the theory and applications of light.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208, Mathematics 127 or 223 and 122 or 126.
305. **Light Laboratory.** Two hours. II  
Required of all students taking Physics 304.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208, Mathematics 127 or 223, and 122 or 126.
306. **Elements of Mechanics.** Three hours. I  
The principles of statics and dynamics, with solutions of problems.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208; Mathematics 315 or 325, and enrollment in Mathematics 316 or 326.
307. **Mechanics Laboratory.** Two hours. I  
Required of all students taking Physics 306.  
Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208; Mathematics 315 or 325, and enrollment in Mathematics 316 or 326.

**308. Heat. Three hours. II**

A study of the theory and applications of heat.

Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208; Mathematics 127 or 223, and 122 or 126.

**309. Heat Measurements. Two hours. II**

Required of all students taking Physics 308.

Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208, Mathematics 127 or 223, and 122 or 126.

**310. History of Physics. Three hours. II**

An historical study of pre-Newtonian, classical, and modern physics. The development of the theory involved in its elementary branches is emphasized.

Prerequisites: Physics 207 and 208.

**400. Electrons, Ions and Atoms. Three hours. I**

A study of the conduction of electricity through gases, photo-electricity, x-rays, radioactivity, and the electron theory of matter.

Prerequisites: Physics 302 and 303, Mathematics 316 or 326.

**401. Modern Physical Theories. Three hours. II**

A general review of modern physical theories.

Prerequisites: Physics 302 and 303, 304 and 305; Mathematics 316 or 326.

### POLITICAL SCIENCE

**101. Introductory Course. Two hours. I**

An orientation study of principles, methods and nature of political science.

**102. Introductory Course. Two hours. II**

A continuation of 101, although students are admitted who have not had 101.

**201. American Government and Politics. Three hours. I**

Course deals with history, development, powers, limitations, and practical working of our national government.

Prerequisite to all advanced courses in Political Science.

**202. American Government and Politics. Three hours. II**

A continuation of 201 dealing with state and local government.

Prerequisite to all advanced courses in Political Science.

**204. Comparative European Governments. Three hours.**

A study of the political systems of principal countries of Europe.

**223. Public Administration. Three hours.**

A comparative study of administration in the United States and leading states of Europe.



224. **Political Parties.** Three hours.  
Origin, history, composition, organization, policies, functions, and activities of political parties in the United States.
301. **Municipal Government.** Three hours. I  
History, development, problems, machinery, and forms of city government in the United States and Europe.
302. **Municipal Administration.** Three hours. II  
A continuation of 301 dealing with the functions of the city.
323. **American Constitutional Law.** Three hours. I  
Analysis and discussion of the leading cases interpreting the Federal Constitution.
324. **American Constitutional Law.** Three hours. II  
A continuation of Political Science 323.
325. **Introduction to Jurisprudence.** Three hours.  
A study of the nature, sources, and development of law.
401. **International Law.** Three hours. I  
Deals with the origin, sources, subjects, and objects of international law.
402. **International Relations and World Politics.** Three hours. II  
A study of the nature, principles and problems of relations between states, together with agencies of control.
425. **History of Political Theory.** Three hours I  
Survey of ancient, medieval, and modern political thought.
426. **Recent and Contemporary Political Theory.** Three hours. II  
Deals with contemporary political theories as pluralism, socialism, guild socialism, syndicalism, etc.
427. **American Political Theory.** Three hours.  
Development of political thought in America from colonial times to the present.
450. **Seminar.** Two hours.  
Research study for major students only.

#### PSYCHOLOGY

101. **Elementary Psychology.** Three hours. I, II  
An introductory course, prerequisite to subsequent courses in psychology. Recommended for pre-medical students.
105. **Psychology of Orientation.** Two hours. I, II  
A course in economical methods of learning, study, and adjustment. Open only to students recommended by the dean.

112. **Applied Psychology.** Three hours. I, II  
A consideration of the applications of psychological facts to the professions, industries, business, and the general problems of everyday life.  
Prerequisite: Psychology 101.
207. **Psychology of Emotion.** Two hours. I  
A study of the theories of emotion and its significance in both normal and abnormal behavior.  
Prerequisite: Psychology 101.
208. **Abnormal Psychology.** Three hours. II  
Topics: sleep, dreams, multiple personality, hypnosis, hysteria, and other disorders of the personality. Recommended for pre-medical students.  
Prerequisite: Psychology 101 or 305.
221. **Psychology of Learning.** Three hours.
302. **Social Psychology.** Three hours. I  
A consideration of motives, crowd psychology, customs, and habits in relation to human conduct.  
Prerequisite: Psychology 101 or 305.
303. **The Problem Child.** Three hours.  
See Psychology 303, Teachers College.
305. **General Psychology.** Three hours. II  
For juniors and seniors who have not had Psychology 101.
307. **Psychology of Adolescence.** Three hours.  
See Psychology 307, Teachers College.
315. **Mental Measurements.** Three hours.  
See Psychology 315, Teachers College.
316. **Clinical Psychology.** Two hours. II  
A practical laboratory study of mental testing and its applications.  
Prerequisite: Psychology 315.
406. **Theory of Intelligence.** Three hours. II  
A study of the nature of intelligence, individual differences, mental levels. Also the relation of intelligence to social efficiency.  
Prerequisite: Six hours of psychology.
411. **Genetic Psychology.** Three hours. I  
A comparative study of the origin, growth, and development of mental life. Not given in 1932-33.  
Prerequisite: Six hours of psychology. Experience may count as part prerequisite.

**423. Experimental Psychology. Two hours. I, II**

An application of laboratory practices to psychological problems in the field of sensation, perception, motor activity, learning, and memory. Two two-hour laboratory periods per week.

Prerequisite: Six hours of psychology.

**SOCIOLOGY****100. Introductory Course. Two hours. I, II**

A general introduction to the field of the social science in the nature of a survey of social institutions.

**102. Introductory Course. Two hours. II**

A continuation of course 100 with emphasis upon social processes, the development of human society, human nature and the social order.

Prerequisite: Sociology 100 or equivalent.

**132. Rural Sociology. Two hours. I, II**

A study of the structure and development of rural society; rural psychology; communication and socialization; rural organization; rural leadership; and the various rural social institutions.

**201. Outlines of Sociology. Three hours. I, II**

A course designed to acquaint the student with the general principles underlying human association. It is basic to the further courses in both applied sociology and social theory. Not open to freshmen.

**210. Social Origins and Social Development. Three hours. II**

A consideration of the origin and development of social institutions; the beginnings of race; the development of language, religion, the family, the State; also customs, traditions, and beliefs.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201.

**225. West Virginia Rural Social Life Problems. Three hours. I, II**

A consideration of local and state rural social problems. The development of country life conferences; community scoring and rating plans, and rural social survey work.

Prerequisite: Sociology 132.

**230. Community Organization. Two hours. II**

The fundamental nature of the community and its place in modern social life. Development of social agencies in communities, elements of community planning, analysis of conflict and cooperative groups in the community.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201.

**232. Urban Sociology. Two hours. I**

A general study of the sociology of urban communities. Urban social types, occupational types, the social pathologies of city life, and a general consideration of urban influences to progress.

Prerequisite: Sociology 132 or 201.



**302. Social Psychology. Three hours.**

See Psychology 302.

**308. The Family. Two hours. I**

The structure of the primitive family and its relation to early social organization; the changes occurring in the family structure; the relations of the family to State, and to economic and social institutions.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201.

**311. Problems of Poverty. Three hours. I, II**

General social pathology, a treatment of the social problems arising out of sickness, old age, dependency, unemployment, the homeless, the destitute, and other handicapped members of society.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201.

**315. Problems of Delinquency. Two hours. I**

The causes, social backgrounds, and problems of juvenile delinquency. This course is intended to assist in an understanding of the unadjusted and maladjusted boy and girl commonly called a problem.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201.

**320. Criminology. Three hours, II**

A study of the individual and social factors in crime; the development of theories concerning crime and criminals; modern penal methods. Visits to penal institutions and courts.

Prerequisite: Sociology 201 or 311.

**340. An Introduction to Social Work. Three hours. II**

The aims, methods, and purposes of social work will be treated through text and field work among the social agencies of Huntington.

Prerequisites: Sociology 201, 230, 308, and 311.

**401. Population. Three hours. I**

The major problems of population movements, immigration, and assimilation. Population growth and decline, quality and quantity factors, and concentration and distribution of populations.

Prerequisites: Sociology 132 or 232, and 201.

**421. History of Social Thought. Three hours. II**

The development of social thought from the earliest times to the present. Origins of the science of sociology, and a study of modern systems of sociology.

Prerequisites: Sociology 201, and 311 or 401.

#### ZOOLOGY

110. General Zoology. Four hours.  
An introduction to the zoological sciences, dealing with the structure and functions of representative types of animals, and such general subjects as development, adaptation, and heredity. Intended primarily for students who have not had biology or zoology in secondary schools.
203. Entomology. Three hours. I  
Intended to give the essential facts concerning the taxonomy, life histories, anatomy, economic importance of insects.
205. Invertebrate Zoology. Four hours. I  
A systematic study of the lowest forms of animal life, dealing with morphology, physiology, and ecology.  
Prerequisite: Biology 107 or high school biology.



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206. **Comparative Vertebrate Anatomy.** Four hours. II  
A morphological study of vertebrate animals, with emphasis on the comparison of gross structures of the major groups.  
Prerequisite: Biology 107 or Zoology 110 or Zoology 205.
207. **Ornithology.** Two hours. II  
Study of the structure, nesting habits, migrations, economic importance, and esthetic values of birds.
300. **Histology.** Three hours. I  
A study of the structures of animal tissues, including laboratory technique, in the making of permanently stained slides of these tissues.  
Prerequisite: Biology 107 or Zoology 110 or Zoology 205.
301. **Embryology.** Four hours. II  
A study of the development of the fish, frog, and chick embryos.  
Prerequisite: Biology 107 or Zoology 110 or Zoology 205.
305. **Human Anatomy.** Three hours. I  
A study of the structures of the human body, intended largely as preparatory work for advanced studies in medicine, hygiene, physical education, and other kindred subjects.
306. **Human Physiology.** Three hours. II  
A study of the functions of the human body illustrated by laboratory experiments on vertebrate animals.  
Prerequisite: Zoology 305.
307. **Genetics.** Three hours. II  
A general introductory course in studies in heredity, evolution, and eugenics. Intended for those wishing to pursue teaching, home making, practice of medicine, and other related vocations.

## MUSIC SCHOOL

### *Requirements*

All fees for lessons in applied music are payable in advance for the semester or term. Rates are listed on page 20 of this catalog. Students must secure cards from the Registrar's office before presenting themselves for enrollment in the Music School. Teachers are not permitted to give instruction until receipt for payment of fees is presented.

No deductions are made for absences except in cases of illness lasting more than three weeks, when a rebate of three-fourths the fee for the time lost will be granted. Students enrolling at any time previous to the third week of any semester will be charged the full fee for that semester. Students enrolling thereafter will be charged a proportionate amount of the full fee.

A maximum of six hours of practical music may be credited towards a degree, provided the student has met in full the entrance requirements of the College, provided also that the courses in Harmony (Public School Music 120 and 121) listed on page 70 are also successfully taken. On advice of the department of music, advanced courses in harmony, analysis, or counterpoint may be substituted for courses 120 and 121. Two half-hour lessons a week with their practice shall count as one credit hour. Students registered for credit will be graded in the same way as are college students in general. The classification of a student is based on actual efficiency, not on the amount of time devoted to any grade.

Instruction in instrumental or vocal music may be taken by students not otherwise connected with the College.

## HARMONY

The course in Harmony covers two years. See Music Courses, Teachers College.

## HISTORY OF MUSIC

Work in history of music and appreciation is begun at the opening of the third year and is required throughout the junior and senior years as a part of the course. The class recites twice a week during the junior year and once a week during the senior year.

The first year's work is a general survey of music and musicians from the ancient days up to and including modern times.

The second year's work deals in detail with the most important biographies of composers and the analysis of special forms of composition.

## THEORY OF MUSIC

Theory of music, including such subjects as scale building, time values, meter, phrases, phrasing, form, etc., will be given in class lessons, or, where that is not practicable, in the individual lesson.

## PIANO

In piano three courses of study are offered, one leading to a teacher's certificate at the completion of the work of the junior year, and a second one leading to a diploma at the completion of the senior year. A post-graduate course is offered for those who wish to become especially proficient. Strict adherence to a fixed list of studies is not required. The needs of the individual student are considered and the studies varied accordingly, but in each class studies selected must be worked up to the tempo indicated by the metronome mark. Another course based on the Progressive Series of Piano Lessons will be given to those who desire to take it. This course, which includes theory of music, harmony, history of music, piano playing, and interpretation, is edited by such men as Godowsky, Josef Hofmann, and Edgar Stillman Kelly.

For the sake of convenience the courses are divided into four years, but it should be understood that it does not necessarily follow that a student will complete the work in this length of time. As a matter of fact, it often takes considerably longer.

No student can register for credit who cannot acceptably do the work involved in Piano 201. To ascertain this a practical examination involving major and minor scales played with the accent of four, major arpeggios, and one composition of the degree of difficulty of Grade IV will be given, for example, Grieg's *Dance Caprice*, Schubert's *Allegro Moderato in F*, and Godard's *Au Matin*.

All music students except those in the Preparatory Year are required to take one semester in Elementary Theory.

Elementary work in harmony and in history of music is required as a part of the work of the Sophomore Music year.

Candidates for teachers' certificates in piano must complete the work of the first four years, together with one year's work in harmony and one year's work in history of music. They must be able to read music accurately at sight in reference to fingering, time, notes, phrasing, and expression. They must also be able to play at least one given piece studied without the aid of the instructor. They must also give a recital from memory, with the assistance of one other musician.

Candidates for diplomas must complete the work of the five years, and must take advanced work in Harmony, Theory and History of Music. They are also required to give in public entirely from memory, a recital consisting of only the best standard piano selections as well as one composition studied without the aid of the instructor.

Student recitals, open to the general public, are held at frequent intervals during the college year. All music students are required to attend these recitals.

*Preparatory Years*

Technical exercises. All major and minor scales. All triad arpeggios. Studies by Le Couppey, Burgmuller, Heller, Clementi's Sonatinas. Sonatas by Haydn. Miscellaneous compositions.



*Sophomore Year***201. First Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. All scales in similar and contrary motion. Major scales in tenths, sixths and thirds at tempo of M. M. 112, four notes in one beat. Six major and minor triad arpeggios at tempo of M. M. 112. Bach's Two Part Inventions. Sonatas by Haydn and Mozart. Miscellaneous compositions.

**202. Second Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. All major and minor scales in tenths, sixths and thirds at tempo of M. M. 120. Six more major and minor triad arpeggios at tempo of M. M. 120. Octavo exercises. Bach's Two and Three Part Inventions. The easier sonatas of Beethoven. Miscellaneous compositions.

*Junior Year***301. First Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. Major and minor scales with tenths, sixths and thirds at tempo of M. M. 132. All diminished seventh arpeggios and half of the dominant seventh arpeggios. Tempo of M. M. 132. Kullak's Octave studies. Studies by Cramer. Sonatas by Weber and Beethoven. Composition by Chopin, Schumann, Mendelssohn, etc.

**302. Second Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. All major and minor scales in tenths, sixths and thirds in contrary motion. Major and minor scales in similar motion at tempo of M. M. 136. All dominant seventh arpeggios at tempo of M. M. 136. Kullak's Octave studies. Studies by Jansen and Haberbier. Sonatas by Beethoven. Chopin's Nocturnes, Waltzes and Polonaises. Bach's Well Tempered Clavichord.

*Senior Year***401. First Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. Major and minor scales in tenths, sixths and thirds at tempo of M. M. 144. Major and minor scales double thirds. Arpeggios with passing notes. Octave studies. Studies by Kessler, Henselt, Foote, MacDowell, Concertos by Weber, Mendelssohn, Beethoven, Schytte, etc.

**402. Second Semester. One hour.**

Technical exercises. All major and minor scales in tenths, sixths and thirds at tempo of M. M. 154. All major and minor scales in double thirds. Studies by Chopin and Debussy. Concertos by Beethoven, Schumann, Liszt, etc.

*Graduate Year*

Advanced technical exercises. Scales in double sixths. The greater sonatas of Beethoven. Bach's Chromatic Fantasia and Fugue. Studies by Chopin and Liszt. Chopin's Ballads, Scherzos and Polonaises. Concertos by Schumann, Liszt, Rubinstein, Brahms, etc.

## VOICE

No student can register for credit in Voice who is not able to pass an examination covering the Freshman Year described below, and to sing acceptably songs such as those listed. Students registered for courses 103, 104, 203, and 204, must also carry successfully courses in harmony, piano, and at least one modern language. The study of one modern language must be continued through the junior year's work. Two lessons a week with six hours of practice count for one semester hour of credit.

*Courses***103-104. Freshman Year. No credit.**

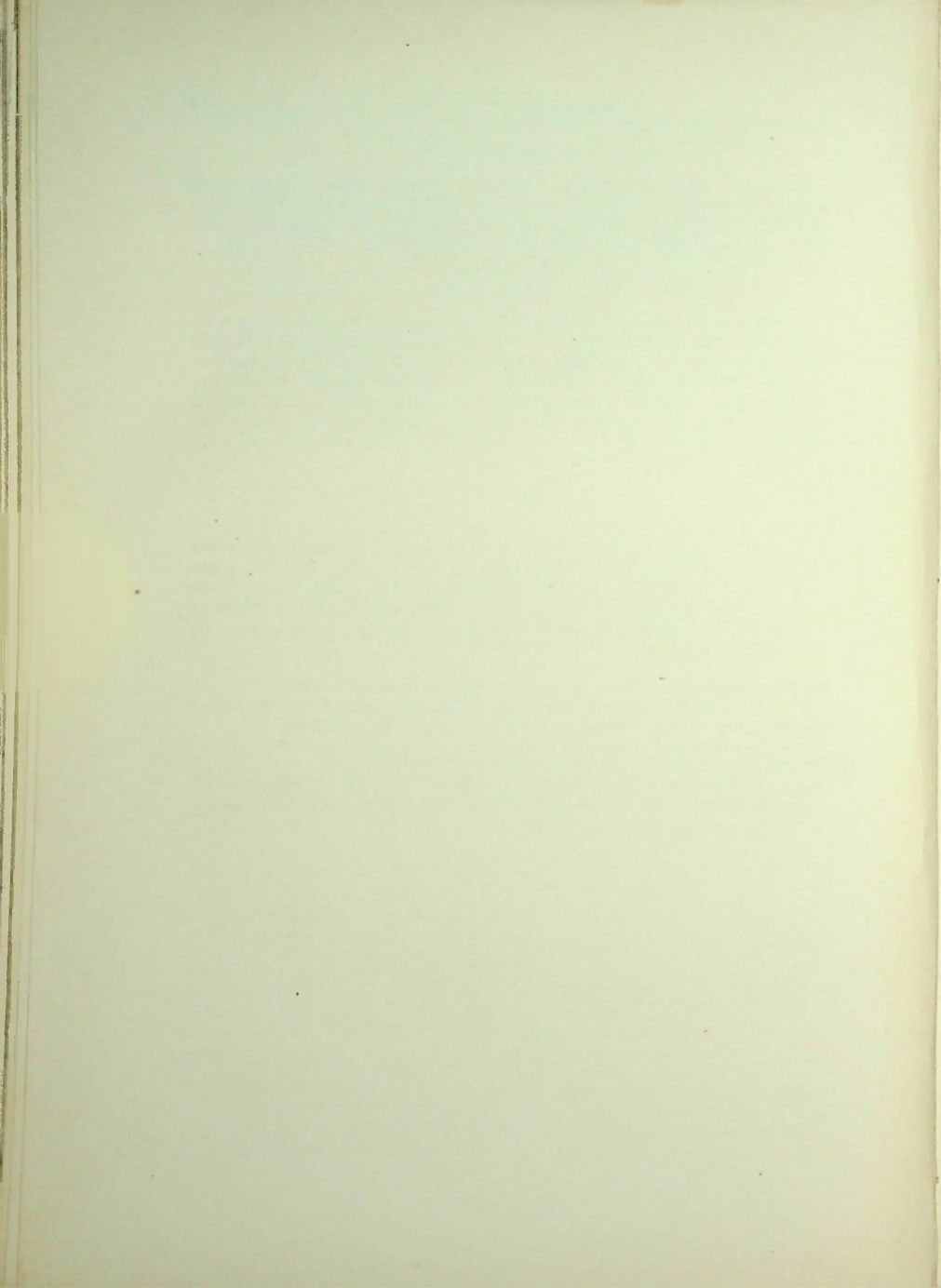
Scales and arpeggios in groups of seconds, thirds, and fourths at a tempo of M. M. 80. Six exercises from Concone, *Opus, 9*; songs of the difficulty of *Ihr Bild*, Schubert; *The First Violet*, Mendelssohn; *Du bist wie eine Blume*, Schumann; *In the Time of Roses*, Reichardt. Schubert, Schumann, and Mendelssohn may be sung in English.

**203-204. Sophomore Year. One hour, two semesters.**

Technical work continued with scales and arpeggios at increased speed. Classical songs in German, French, and Italian.

**303-304. Junior Year. One hour, two semesters.**

Advanced technical and interpretative study. Repertoire of arias and songs of all countries and periods. Oratorio.
