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

GFWC Convention Well Aware Of W. Va. Representation

Clubwomen across the nation were well aware that the West Virginia Federation was represented at the GFWC convention June 5-9 at Miami, Florida

Mrs. James A. Scarbro, immediate past state Junior Director and currently Junior chairman of the GFWC Home Life Department and state Community Improvement chairman, was elected by the Juniors as their choice of candidate for the important office of Director of Junior Clubs for the General Federation; the election will be held during the convention June 18-22, 1962, at Washington, D.C. Miss Mary Katharine Barnes and Mrs. H. B. Sullivan are her campaign chairmen. Mrs. Scarbro reported before the Junior meeting at the Eden Roc hotel and also the general convention held at the Fontainbleau.

Mrs. Sullivan reported as State Jun-

ior Director during the Junior portion of the convention and also accepted the ten first-place awards to the West Virginia Juniors: Education, news communication and continuing education; Fine Arts, overall outstanding work as well as in the music division and for submitting the first report received from any state; Home Life, American Home Week and best overall report; Conservation, best overall report and first report received; International Affairs, best overall report: International Clubs, first report received.

Mrs. John F. McCuskey reported as state president and also accepted the citation presented to the West Virginia Federation for first place in the Public Affairs Department program "Get Out the Vote;" the state's official entry was from the Woman's Club of Charleston.

Miss Barnes, GFWC Safety Division chairman, presided at the Safety Luncheon given by the Automotive Safety Foundation for GFWC Board members, state safety chairmen and special guests. Seat Belts, compliments of the American Equipment Company, were given state presidents, state safety chairmen, GFWC officers and those at the speaker's table, and for door prizes.

During the Safety Luncheon, Mrs. E. Lee Ozbirn, GFWC president, presented a \$1,000 bond to the Woman's Club of Logan, first place national winner in the GFWC-Shell Youth Traffic Awards program for communities of less than 25,000; Mrs. R. H. Colvin, state safety chairman and also safety chairman for the Logan Club, accepted the bond. As safety chairman for the winning club, she received an all-expense paid trip to Miami for the week as a guest of the Shell Oil Company. The Woman's Club of Beckley received one of the five \$100 honorable mention awards in the contest. Winners in the GFWC-Reader's Digest Street Lighting Awards Program were announced

1961-62 Goals Are Set for Clubwomen

YOU, the West Virginia Clubwomen, brought great honor to your State during the General Federation Convention in Miami. First, in our total accomplishments in safety, and in unification of our program and efforts in public affairs.

As these awards were called out from the great convention hall of the beautiful Fontainbleau. I thought of each of you in every nook and corner of our State working as effective individuals to organize a Town Hall where all the citizenry could assemble and meet their candidates — then the follow through after the election by the thousands of letters you directed to your legislators.

More than the Award was the additional funds your efforts brought to raise West Virginia's health standards and the 61/2 million dollars to improve the educational standards of our State. These are realities and came so close to us in the communities where we live. Working cooperatively (as we outlined in our program) with your local P.T.A., A.A.U.W., Medical Auxiliary, Garden Council, B.P.W., League of Women Voters, Quota, and the many other organizations in your community, we were a great force of some 100,000 women building better communities all over West Virginia. The honor was yours, and the great award was in the improved standards of health and education as it reaches the citizenry and our children.

The General Federation gave us this program, and by effectively implementing our own state projects in the structure of "responsive, responsible citizenship for survival," we have arrived at the half-way mark — and before we embark on the last lap please examine our program for 1961-62.

Our first move into the new and final stage must include realistic steps to translate all our statements and programs into action. Time is running short for our extensive programs in conservation, youth, health, internationa affairs and education. There is ample proof that the West Virginia clubwoman has concerned herself first with outer space and near places — also we have concerned ourselves with outer space and far places, with your contribution to CARE, the Pan-

American and Latin-American Scholarships. We have taken our responsibility to help our neighbors in the western hemisphere and thrown our support in preventing destruction of our civilization.

Our international club as well as our international affairs programs have been emphasized and effectively administered by our Chairman. The West Virginia clubwoman has shown a great human heart to her neighbors all over the world and a great conscience and concern for her fellow man. This is no age, certainly, for a calloused conscience. To do so is to be false to ourselves and our responsibility as clubwomen and our own history. We are our brother's keeper. "Labor to keep alive in your breast that little spark of celestial fire called conscience," wrote George Washington in 1748

Nominees For State Offices Due Nov. 1

Clubs planning to submit nominees for state office consideration of the state nominating committee must have their endorsements in the hands of the committee chairman by November 1.

Complete information about the member endorsed as a candidate for state office, together with her picture, should be mailed to the chairman, Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, 1519 Lewis Street, Charleston 1. The committee will meet early in November so nominees selected may be notified and articles prepared in time for publication in the January issue of the Clubwoman.

Article VII, Nominations and Elections, Section 1 a of the state by-laws provides that "The other eight members and alternates shall be elected one from each District at the district meeting following the election of the Committee Chairman."

The chairman was elected at the state convention in March so each district will this fall elect a committee member and alternate. Section 1 a of the same article reads: "That Committee may bring in one or more names for each office, except that of President."

West Virginia clubwomen, with dignity and compas areas of club activities; we arrive in '62 to giv accounting we must not unthose depending on us to not only share, but to step up our program and meet all expectations in not just sharing in West Virginia's future but improving it. We must design and propose programs that will strengthen our efforts in our own communities, state and nation. Nor can we afford to lack vision to present a comprehensive program for the development of a world community.

Our next emphasis must be placed upon our program of responsibility to the hemisphere community. I hope each Club will call into its meetings sometime this year any international guests or a new American citizen and talk frankly and freely of the many mutual problems we have, pertinent to us all, whatever language or wherever our home.

Our concern with hemisphere solidarity was made explicit by the program of International Affairs, International Clubs, CARE and the Latin-American scholarship. Through these programs we can to some degree unite our efforts to build a better world, to bring a full economic, social, political and spiritual life to the peoples of this hemisphere.

We can contribute realistically and idealistically by helping make our way of life understood by our Latin-American neighbors. Please study the Divisions under the International Affairs and Club and participate in all phases of this vital program. We have much to learn from each other. From the stirring address of the President of the United States, I quote, "Let us once again transform the American continent into vast crucible and revolutionary ideas and efforts - a tribute to the power of the creative energies of free men and women, an example of all the world that liberty and progress walk hand in hand. Let us once again awaken our American revolution until it guides the struggles of people everywhere, not with an imperialism of force or fear - but the rule of courage and freedom and hope for the future of men."

To widen our scope of understanding of our Federation and its great work, I urge every member to subscribe to our most valuable educational tool — the GFWC Clubwoman, with its wealth of educational material in every field of Federation work.

Safety Awards For 1961 - 1962

Our plans for the Safety Division is a continuation of last year's program. Many clubs wrote that they received information too late last year to do much, but planned to work toward safety this year. I will send out bulletins to help you. The new chairman of Public Affairs or Safety can get the information from last year's chairman.

We are looking forward to bringing home a \$1,000.00 bond for West Virginia next year. We can go well over half of the clubs in this state with safety programs.

There are also awards for youth safety in communities under 25,000 population and over 25,000. These first places are \$1,000.00 bonds, second place \$500.00 and third place \$250.00.

Each club has received information for the street lighting contest. This year there will be prizes offered in each state for work done toward better lighting. If a state doesn't have an entry, the money which would have gone to a club in that state will be divided among the other states. Last year there was not a single entry from West Virginia, so we all stand an equal chance again this year.


The "work kits" have been promised for September, but they may be late. However, the contest opens October 1, and includes "The Ideal Costume" for each group.

Press Book Rules, Judging Set For State Meeting

clubs bership of 201 and above.

Only published news stories (not club sheets or publications), with the exception of the General Federation Clubwoman and West Virginia Clubwoman, can be used.

The name of the paper and the date must be shown with each article, and the name of the club underlined.

Press Book size: not smaller than 10×12 inches; not larger than 14×18 inches. Binding: neat, durable, not expensive. Loose leaf is recommended so that scrapbook material may be inserted after the judging and the club have a complete coverage of the club year. Art work will not be judged.

Cover: must identify club and town.

First page: Club yearbook must be mounted on the first inside page.

News stories must be arranged chronologically, showing advance stories, news coverage, follow-ups.

Number of inches must be marked on each page of book.

Total number of inches and number of news pictures (not photographs or glossy prints, just pictures published in newspapers) must be listed on last page of book.

Articles about the Federation which use the name of a club member may be used as press book material with the name of the member underscored.

Press book may not include articles about other organizations or activities

just because they are held at a clubhouse and the club names mentioned for that reason.

Where more than one club is referred to, as Huntington Women's Clubs or Federated Clubs of Huntington, each club may use the publicity.

Publicity items may include news from March 16, 1961, up to and including publicity dated the day prior to the first day of the 1962 convention.

Federation. Through our work and prayers, multiplied by all of the clubs in our General Federation, the ties of friendship with our foreign neighbors will be closer and each of us will be more

aware of our responsibility to strive for our goal — Universal Peace.

This club year emphasis will be on Latin American countries again, and the following suggestions may be of help, to be included in your club programs:

- Encourage members to correspond with pen-pals in foreign lands.
- Welcome foreign visitors in homes, churches, schools. Encourage attendance of foreign visitors at club meetings.
- Honor new citizens by attending naturalization ceremonies. Present them with gifts on the anniversary of their citizenship.
- 4. Include during the club year an evening devoted to a program with international flavor. A "smorgasbord of all nations" is an idea, using foods, decorations and music suggestive of various countries, and is most enjoyable.
- Install United Nations Bookshelves in your school and public libraries. Ask members and organizations to donate books.
- Co-operate with ministers and churches in "World Day of Prayer."
- Become better informed about our International friends by participating in United Nations Week.
- Include in your devotions at club meetings prayer for lasting world peace.
- Plan a study program on Latin American countries for at least one club meeting.
- Have members bring a foreign recipe to club meetings to be exchanged, and display recipe books on foreign dishes.
- Encourage members to correspond with people in our sister state, Hawaii.
- 12. Have your club contribute books to the Inter-American Library in the University at Ponce, Puerto Rico. Books of university standard are needed and they need not be

- new. Books in good condition, in either Spanish or English, will be gratefully received.
- 13. Have showing of Anti-Communism film, with discussion period following; have evening program, with husbands of members as guests.
- Each president is asked to appoint an International Hostess.

CONTEST RULES

General:

Contestants should prepare their entries with the thought in mind that plans for the Centennial celebration are underway and the winning play, short story and poem of this year's contest should be valuable additions to the compilation of resource materials to be made available for use by schools, clubs, radio, newspapers, etc. for the 1963 celebration.

Format:

All material should be typed on one side of the paper only. The name and address of the author should be in the upper left hand corner of each page. A stamped, self-addressed envelope should be enclosed for return of entry. All entries must be original, unpublished and never before entered in a State Federation contest.

Theme:

West Virginia, the State Beautiful.

Entries may be based on state legend, folklore, natural scenic wonders, early exploration, settlement, border warfare, heroes, heroines, Indian heritage, development of a natural resource, etc.

DRAMA

Area I. One Act Play

- A. Playing time should be not less than twenty minutes nor more than thirty.
- B. It would be highly desirable (but not required) that the play be produced, directed and presented by club members at a regular or extra club meeting.

Area II. Outstanding Program of Dramatic Activity

- A. All drama activity of the club must be reported by drama or fine arts chairman and approved for entry by the Club President.
- B. Wide participation of club in suggested Division STUDY and ACTION program.
- C. Additional Suggested Activities
 - 1. Sponsor youth class in drama or creative writing.

it is the correct approach that will decide whether or not you will be successful. Keep a kit of how you have proceeded and all valuable material for your successor, so she will have the advantage of your study and experiences. This will strengthen the entire Federation more than any one single thing we can do. This will be brought by all chairmen, officers and executive board to pre-convention meeting of Council. It will serve as Honor Point No. 1 and Club Presidents will send their kits to District Presidents, officers and executive board and chairmen of departments to me at pre-convention board. At least write an outline of how a new chairman or officer will go about framing a program and what her duties are. With the kit bring or send the pink administrative book you received the first year from GFWC headquarters.

Contact your nearest University Extension and ask program of courses to be offered, then urge all members to sign up for one or more courses. Your Education Department Chairman will have set up this program with colleges and universities. The courses will be on "World Affairs." Each club must give ten minutes of each club meeting to report by a member of what is happening in world affairs. Conduct one open meeting with speaker or a seminar, opening it to all organizations. A world affairs conference is suggested.

Invite senior citizens and all families in your community from foreign countries and do something special for these families and their children. This is our first cornerstone laid to build peace and understanding.

Each club member is asked to secure a family's name or the name of a clubwoman in South America and write her during the year, cementing friendly relations between West Virginia clubwomen and women all over the world. Your Chairman of International Clubs will give you a list for your club members. Mrs. Ruth Henderson, Sistersville, is your Chairman.

Pan-American Scholarship, Latin-American Scholarship, CARE, and our own State Scholarship must have your individual support. Don't take it out of the treasury. Motivate your W. Va. Clubwomen to give because it is vital in our program of international relations. If each clubwoman could give one dollar for all four scholarship programs it would do the job and put W. Va. Federation first in the hearts of those who need our help — by helping these four projects you are building a tremendous barrier and handicap to communism and ideologies that are working to tear down our free world and erase our way of life.

use of seat belts. The slogan 'A MIL-LION AND ONE IN 61' plus information has been sent to your club by the General Federation.

Awards will be made at the convention in Washington to those clubs with 100% participation and to the club with the best publicity campaign for seat belts.

The most important thing to remember in any program is a great deal of publicity is necessary. Please keep all publicity and send it in with your annual report. In working toward national or state awards, you must have proof in the form of newspaper articles and letters from the official groups of your community.

The Women's Clubs have been asked by the Governors Committee for Traffic Safety to work with the Kiwanis Clubs and the P.T.A. in organizing Safety groups in your communities to carry on programs of a county wide nature. The major job that has been given to us to do is the location of traffic hazards and reporting them to the state or county commission that can fix them.

An award also will be made to the club that secures the largest number for first aid kits in the home and cars.

This might seem as though we are asking you to do a lot, but what good are our other efforts if we and our loved ones aren't around to enjoy the fruits of our efforts.

(The presidents of all clubs will be sent a questionnaire for a final report.)
