
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



COURSES OF STUDY.

The Board of Regents has provided for two distinct courses of study for the State Normal School and its branchea, a Normal Training Course, and an Academic Course.

Admission to either of these courses shall be by diploma from the Common Schools but the faculty of any school shall be authorized to receive, as prescribed by the Board of Regents, such students as they may see proper, who are not prepared to enter these regular courses, and shall classify them a- Proparatory Students. The course of study for Preparatory Students shall be that of the Upper Grade of the Course for Common Schools, or so much thereof as the faculty may prescribe.

- 1. The Board of Regents will confer upon those who complete the Senior Year, with an average standing of 80 per cent. and not below 75 on any one branch, a Normal Diploma, with the title of Normal Graduate. *Promded*, No one shall be graduated who has not attended at least two terms.
- 2. State Certificates are issued by the State Board of Examiners to Normal graduates who have taught successively three years under a number one county certificate, two of which years immediately precede the year in which application for State certificate is made. A large number of such certificates have already been issued.
- 3. Tuition in the Normal Department is free to those having Normal appointments. The following apportionment of

the number of students which each county in the State shall be entitled to appoint to the Normal Department in the State Normal Schools, free of charge for tuition, has been made by the Board of Regents:

Below are the rules and regulations prescribed by the Board concerning Normal appointments.

• 4th. Applications for appointment to the Normal Department of the State Normal Schools shall be made to the Superintendent of Free Schools of the county in which the applicant resides; and said Superintendent shall select such number as may be entitled to the privileges of the Normal School in his county in the foregoing apportionment, subject to the approval of the State Superintendent of Free Schools.

5th. As far as practicable males and females shall be selected in equal proportion. Male pupils must not be less than fourteen and females not less than thirteen years of age. 6th. Every certificate of appointment to the Normal Schools of this State shall be directed to the school which the applicant may desire to attend. The County Superintendent making such appointment shall at once notify the Principal of said school of such appointment. The Faculty of said school shall, subject to appeal to the Board of Regents, have power to vacate any appointment or certificate for non-attendance, inaptitude to learn, immorality, or other good cause. In case of a certificate being thus vacated, the Faculty shall notify the Superintendent who issued the certificate of such vacation; whereupon, if no appeal is taken to the State Superintendent within twenty days after the action of the Faculty he may make an appointment to fill the vacancy thus created. Every County Superintendent shall keep a record in his office of the appointments made by him.

7th. No applicant for appointment shall be appointed by a County Superintendent, unless he, or she, be of good moral character, and shall sustain a good examination in reading, spelling, elementary arithmetic, geography, and elementary English grammar. Said examination may be made either by the County Superintendent or the Principal of the School which the applicant desires to attend.

Sth. The County Superintendent shall require of each applicant appointed, to subscribe the following declaration:

This declaration shall be endorsed by the father, guardian, or some responsible person for the applicant, as follows: "I agree, in case of the failure of—, the within named applicant, to comply with the provisions of this declaration, so far as it requires him, or her, to spend one year in teaching in the Free Schools of this State, to cause to be paid to the Treasurer of the Executive Committee of the School which he, or she, may attend, tuition at the regular rate, for such time as said applicant shall have been in attendance at said School.

"Given under my hand this — day —, 189—.

Thereupon he shall give such applicant the following certificate:

9th. The normal students shall be allowed three years within which to comply with his agreement to teach one year in the Free Schools of the State, and if such compliance is not made therewith in three years from the date of graduation, the Executive Committee of the school from which the said student graduated, shall at once proceed to collect from the bondsman or bondsmen, the amount of tuition due the State from said student. That this may be fully complied with, the said graduate shall annually report to the Executive Committee of the school of which said teacher is a graduate, or make such report until the one year's teaching has been done in the Free Schools of the State.

10th. Each appointee shall deliver his, or her, certificate and declaration, to the Principal of the Normal School, that he or she, attends, who shall file the same with the archives and records of normal pupils.

11th. Whenever the accommodations thereof will admit of the same, so many paying students as can be accommodated therein from this State, or any other State, may be admitted to the Normal School, giving preference to citizens of this State, whether they desire to become teachers or not.

12th. A State student in any Normal School, may, upon request, be transferred to another, upon procuring a certificate of good deportment from the Principal of the School which he is attending, or by permission of the Board of Regents, but not otherwise, and the time he has so attended, shall be credited to him in the course, by the Principal of the School to which he is transferred. *Provided*: He brings with him his certificate of appointment with time of attendance endorsed upon it by the Principal of the School whence he comes.

15th. If for any cause, save incapacity, a pupil may not be able to complete the course in the time prescribed, said pupil may be continued longer in the studies of that year, at the discretion of the Faculty.

16th. Post Graduates of the Normal Schools who may desire

to review their studies in the Normal Department of said School, shall, upon recommendation of the Principal, be allowed to do so by appointment of the Board of Regents.

19th. The rates of tuition for pay scholars shall be as follows:

All Departments, per year...... 18.00 Incidental Expenses for all Students, per fracction thereof...... 1.00

All fees must be paid in advance, and no abatement of tuition will be made for a fraction of a month, or for absence, except in cases of illness extending over a month, or for suspension or expulsion.

20th Pay pupils entering after the beginning of any term or session, shall pay only for the remainder of said term or session, pro rata at the above rates

21st. Pupils shall attend all required examinations of the year, and no pupil shall be permitted to advance without said examination, and who does not attain a standing of seventyfive per cent of said examination.

Normal pupils who fail to make an average standing of

seventy-five per cent. shall forfeit their appointments.

These examinations shall be in writing, or partly written and partly oral, and shall be conducted by the instructor in charge, under the supervision of the Principal.

Pupils applying for Normal Diplomas, shall be examined

two weeks before the commencement.

The State Superintendent of Free Schools is authorized to issue to the student completing this course a Diploma, which will be received at the State University as equivalent to its Preparatory Course.

No student falling below a class standing (including examinations) of eighty per cent., shall be entitled to a Diploma.

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC.

Music, as an accomplishment, has become so universal as to render it an almost necessary factor in educational development. Superior facilities for its studies are offered; the department of Instrumental music is in charge of a thoroughly competent teacher. The Modern Gorman Method is taught, particular attention being given to technique.

Musicales are given from to time, where pupils are required to play without notes; and selections from the lives of noted composers or original papers are read, it being considered important that the great masters should be studied, not only in their works but in their lives.

Three pianos are in the building, and ample opportunity is afforded for practice.

The tuition for piano instruction is ten dollars per term of twenty-four lessons, and two dollars per term for use of piano for practice. For vocal instruction, twelve dollars per term.

HEALTHFULNESS.

The question of healthfulness is an important factor in selecting a school to attend. The situation of Marshall College is very important in this respect. Its natural location and its improved sanitary arrangements are all conducive to health. There has not been a case of serious illness at the College for a number of years.

TEXT BOOKS.

All text books and stationery needed by students may be procured in Huntington at the regular retail prices. Students should bring with them any text books which they may possess, but are advised not to purchase any new ones until they arrive at the school.

APPARATUS.

A supply of excellent mathematical and philosophical apparatus has recently been produced. Superior facilities are thus provided for teaching such of the natural sciences as belong to the course of study. In the daily work of their various classes, pupils are permitted to witness and perform interesting and instructive experiments, and from the facts thus set forth are directed to the causes and underlying principles.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.


A respectable beginning has been made towards a library. There are already on the shelves a number of standard works of history, biography, science, pedagogy and general literature. It is proposed to make addition to these from year to year until a library is secured fully commensurate with the wants of the school.

A reading room was opened a few years ago and has proved to be a most useful and enjoyable feature. On its tables are found most of the leading magazines, together with a number of religious and secular newspapers and periodicals.

The privileges of the library and reading room are free to all students.

societies: the Hyperion composed of young ladies and the Erosophian composed of young men. The members of these societies take great interest in their work and find them of great help in a literary way and in the cultivation of the art of speaking in public. The societies are encouraged by the faculty in every proper way, and all students are urged to join them.

REQUISITES FOR ADMISSION.

Students expecting to enter the Junior year of the Normal Course should have previously completed the usual free school course of study.

Pupils desiring to enter the Intermediate or Senior class will be permitted to do so, providing they can pass a satisfactory examination on all the branches belonging to the preceeding year.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS.

An institution supported by public taxation and designed to serve the interests of all classes in the State must of necessity be unsectarian. It does not follow from this however, that those principles of morality and religion upon which all sects may agree are not to receive attention. On the contrary, any system of education in which these principles are neglected and these forces not recognized must be a disastrous failure.

All students boarding in the building, are under direct care of the teachers at all times.

Students in attendance at the school, not boarding at the building, are looked after carefully, and parents and others interested are promptly notified of any improper conduct or inattention to study.

No student of immoral character is allowed to remain in the school.

Punctuality, industry, and the full performance of all work required will be insisted upon. Civil, gentlemanly and lady-like conduct will be expected of every student.

The daily work of the school is begun by religious exercises, upon which every student, unless specially excused, is required to attend. The different religious denominations have their churches, pastors and Sunday Schools in the city, and these are means of good influence on students.

The fear is sometimes expressed that students attending school in a city like Huntington, are in more danger of being led off from the paths of right conduct than in smaller places. No greater mistake can be made. There is certainly no more danger of the formation of bad habits by students if proper care is taken in Huntington, than in small villages. On the other hand, there are many influences for good, morally and spiritually, that from the nature of the case are not found in smaller towns.

BOARDING.

The college dormitory is allotted exclusively for the use of young lady students.

Water supplied from the city water works is on every floor of the building; bath rooms and toilet rooms in dormitory.

The building is lighted by gas throughout and heated by the best hot air system. Students' rooms are furnished with bureau, washstand and set, bed with spring mattress, table, chairs, etc. Students are required to furnish their own bed clothes, pillows, towels, and napkins.

Students boarding at the College are under the direct care of the Principal and teachers, who reside in the building.

The cost of board in the building is as follows:	
Board per week, if paid monthly in advance\$2	75
Board per week if not paid in advance 3	00
Fuel and light fee per week, payable in advance each	
term	25

A deposit of two dollars may be required of each student boarding in the building as a damage fund. This will be refunded on the student's departure if there has been no damage to room or furniture.

Board for young men may be obtained in private families at about the same rates as the above.

It is desirable that the Principal be notified in advance of the arrival of students.

It is recommended that parents send to the Principal money for the expenses of their sons or daughters at school. The Principal will receipt for it in every instance, and render an itemized account each term.

OTHER EXPENSES.

The expenses for board as above, with an incidental fee of \$1.00 per term, is all the necessary expense of Normal pupils, except for washing and books, both of which are small items.

The Normal student having no expense for tuition, can attend school at Marshall College at a cost very much below that charged for the same grade of work in similar schools elsewhere.

It is claimed for Marshall College, in common with the other Normal Schools of the State, that it offers to teachers or to those preparing to teach, superior advantages at a minimum cost.

EXAMINATIONS.

At the close of each term, examinations in all branches of study pursued that term will be held. The grades obtained by students at these examinations, averaged with their class standing, will be recorded as their standing on the several branches, seventy five per cent. on a scale of one hundred being the minimum pass grade. Reports are issued after each examination, showing the standing of pupils, deportment, attendance, etc.

TIME TO ENTER.

If possible, students should enter school promptly at the beginning of the term, but the work is so arranged that students can be accommodated at almost any time. Special arrangements are made to suit teachers who are unable to attend more than one or two terms on account of their schools.






