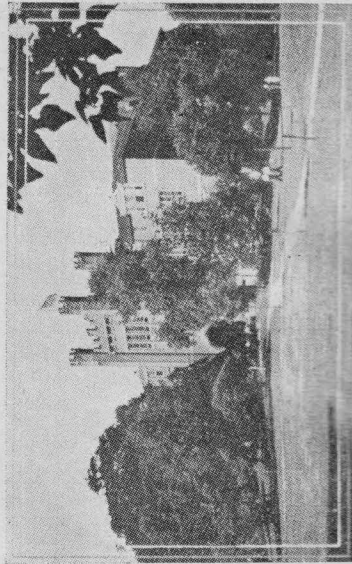

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

"Marshall Academy" was established in 1837, shortly after the death of Chief Justice Marshall, of the Supreme Court of the United States, in whose honor the school was named. It was organized as a private institution. In 1856 the work of the Academy was enlarged and reorganized, and the name changed to Marshall College.

But little information concerning the early days of the institution is now at hand. None of the records of the school during the time it was an academy are preserved. From the year 1867 to the present time, however, we have a fairly satisfactory record.

At the close of the Civil War a number of the leading citizens in the southwestern part of the new State of West Virginia succeeded in having the legislature take it over as a "State Normal School." Though academic in

its work, and such it remained, with varying fortunes, save a little teaching of pedagogy, school management, and the like until 1897, when a practice school of one grade was organized. This the state refused to support; and, accordingly, it was abandoned after two years of unappreciated effort, and the school went on again wholly as an academic institution.

In January, 1902, the Department of Education was organized, and a practice school for teachers was opened. In February, 1920, by action of the State Board of Education, the institution became a State Teachers College, conferring its first degrees in June, 1921.

Under authority of the State Board of Education, a further expansion of the institution was effected in June, 1924. At that time the College of Arts and Sciences was formally organized. With the College of Arts and Sciences are affiliated the two-year course in engineering, and the pre-medical and the pre-law courses.

### THE FACULTY

The Faculty of Marshall College now numbers over one hundred, and the average academic training for the individual members is much higher than formerly. At the present time an M. A. degree is the minimum for any regular position. The men and women in the college teaching body have taken their degrees from universities in all parts of the nation and some of the better known European institutions. This group includes scholars of exceptional ability and has a fixed scholastic atmosphere that greatly impresses itself upon the student.

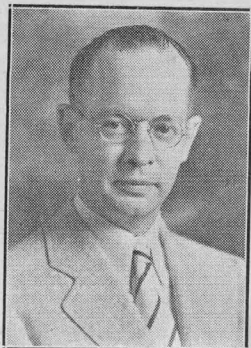

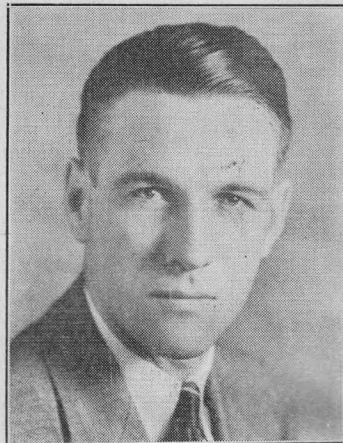

## STUDENT GOVERNMENT

In a large measure the students of Marshall College govern themselves. To maintain traditions and provide the machinery necessary for handling the business and social affairs of the student body, a system of student government was set up a few years ago. From year to year the organization has been perfected in its functions until it now exercises a large degree of control over student affairs.

All executive and legislative duties of the student body are vested in the president of the student body and the several members of the student council, which is an elective organization.

Student government at Marshall enjoyed a happy year of success and accomplishment for the year of 1934-35. Many things were done—some of which had failed to materialize in past years. The students expressed greater interest, were more loyal to the cause and the college, and at the same time stood firmly for their rights and privileges.

With the cooperation of the athletic department, the annual Dad's Day was sponsored by the council. Again this year the council carried out its share of the homecoming activities on Thanksgiving. The fraternity and sorority having the best decorated houses and floats were awarded beautiful loving cups. The regular student council mixes were numerous and exceptionally successful as was the Beauty Ball. Several thuses for football were conducted by the council. Special keys for all members of the council were designed and presented.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE  
STUDENT BODY

PREAMBLE

We, the regularly enrolled students of Marshall College, comprising the Student Body of Marshall College, in order to encourage active cooperation in the work of student government, to uphold the highest standard of honor and integrity in all matters of personal conduct, to strengthen cordial relations between faculty and students, to enact and enforce laws according to the grant of powers, to provide for the information of an official body known as the Student Council, to give adequate and effective expression to the opinion of the Student Body in matters of general college interest, do hereby ordain and establish this constitution for student government of Marshall College.

ARTICLE I—LEGISLATIVE

Section 1. All executive and legislative powers herein granted shall be under the direction of the President of the Student Body and the several members of the Student Council, elected as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The several members of the Student Council shall be:

(a) Two representatives from the Freshman class, elected for a term of one year by and from the class.

(b) Three representatives, one to serve for a term of two years and two for a term of one year, elected by the Sophomore class from its membership.

(c) Two representatives (each to serve for a term of two years) from the Junior

class, elected by the class, thus making a total of three with the hold-over members.

(d) Two representatives, each to serve for a term of one year, elected by and from the Senior class, thus making a total of four with the two hold-over members.

(e) The President of the Student House Government Association.

(f) The editor-in-chief of the official college year book, The Mirabilia, and the Council editor of the official college newspaper, The Parthenon, as ex-officio, non-voting members.

Section 3. Representatives to the Student Council shall be elected as follows:

(a) Candidates shall be nominated by a petition of ten per cent of the membership of the class. These petitions shall be presented to the Election Board by 9:00 A. M. on the third Wednesday after the first Monday of the fall term of school. No student may sign more petitions than there are representatives to be elected from his class.

(b) The Election Board shall consist of the President of the Student Body, the hold-over members of the Student Council, and one of the regularly appointed faculty class advisers who shall be designated by the President of the College for each of the four classes.

(c) The Election Board shall announce all nominees at once, and shall appoint five persons for each class to supervise the election.

(d) The election shall be held by secret ballot from 10:00 A. M. to 12:00 M., one week after the final date for presentation of petitions, each class having a separate voting place. Nominees shall be listed in the order in which their petitions are presented. Each candidate shall be entitled to a challenger within the voting room. In elections to choose representatives for terms of varying lengths, candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall receive the longer terms.

(e) The Election Board shall count the votes immediately after election. All protests shall be filed with the President of the Student Body within one week after the election and shall be considered by the Student Council.

(f) When vacancies occur in the representation, such vacancies shall be filled by the body represented as heretofore provided.

(g) Any member of the Student Council or officers of the Student Body with the exception of the Student President may be removed from office upon a three-fourths vote of the Student Council. Charges shall be preferred by any member of the Student Body. The charges shall have been brought two weeks prior to the date of the vote, and each member of the Council shall be notified of the nature of the meeting at least one week prior to the date of the meeting.

Section 4. The first regular meeting of the Student Council shall be held the day following the election of Council members. At this meeting the Council shall designate the time of its meetings. The Student Council shall meet regularly every two weeks following the initial meeting, except during vacations. Nine regular members present at any meeting shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5. The Student Council shall have the following powers and duties:

(a) To conduct during the college year four assemblies, which may or may not include such assemblies as may be necessary for the election of the President of the Student Body.

(b) To elect the editor-in chief and business manager of The Mirabilia upon recommendation of the retiring editor and business manager.

(c) To arrange for the publication and circulation of a yearly handbook containing the constitution of student government, tra-

ditions and laws of Marshall College, and such other material as may seem advisable. The publication of this handbook may be delegated from year to year to college organizations at the discretion of the Council.

(d) To present awards in the name of the Student Body.

(e) To make and control freshman rules provided that enforcing authority may be delegated to an organization composed of students who indicate their desire to participate in enforcement by presenting their names to the President of the Student Body. Only students whose scholastic average the previous year at Marshall College has been C or better shall be eligible for membership in this enforcement organization.

(f) At its discretion, the Council may draft a point system for student offices.

(g) To approve the appointment of a Council editor of The Parthenon, who shall be an ex-officio non-voting member of the Council and a regular member of The Parthenon staff.

(h) The Council may at any time ask an explanation of policies of college publications if the said policies seem contrary to college interests, and may recommend the removal of staff members.

(i) The Student Council, as representative of the Student Body, shall have the power, subject to the approval of the Administration and the State Board of Education, to enact rules and regulations in all matters of student activity not strictly academic, and shall have the further power to enact rules as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this constitution.

#### ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE

Section 1. Nomination for the office of President of the Student Body of Marshall College shall be made at the first regular

meeting of the Student Body in May of each year. There shall be at least two nominees for the office of President, all nominees being academic Juniors. The President of the Student Body, upon the assumption of his office, shall be an academic Senior. A secret ballot shall be taken one week from the date of nominations and in case no candidate receives a majority, another ballot shall be taken one week later on the two candidates having the highest number of votes. A majority shall be necessary for election. The election for Student President shall be conducted by an Election Board appointed by the President of the Student Body, provided that each candidate shall be entitled to a representative on the Board. Each candidate shall also be entitled to two challengers within the voting place. If the President be ineligible at the time of the assumption of office, the vacancy shall be filled by a regular election as provided for above, to be held the third week of the fall term of school.

Section 2. To remove the President of the Student Body, a petition signed by twenty-five per cent of the Student Body shall be submitted to the Student Court. At the discretion of said Student Court, a new election may be called at which the President may stand for re-election. If the Student Court does not consider that there are grounds for calling a new election, any further action to remove the President shall require a petition signed by fifty per cent of the Student Body. This petition will automatically call a new election.

Section 3. The President of the Student Body shall have the following powers and duties:

(a) Preside over all Student Council meetings, and call special meetings when he deems it necessary. He shall vote in the Council only in case of a tie.

(b) Appoint all special committees.

(c) Appoint two members of the Student Body on the college Athletic Board, two on the college Social Activities Committee, and three on the college Assembly Committee. Each of these appointments shall be confirmed by the Student Council.

(d) The Student President shall act for and represent the Student Body on all official occasions.

Section 4. The Student Council at its first meeting shall choose from its membership a vice president who shall have the same qualifications as the President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and any other officers deemed necessary.

Section 5. The powers of these Council officers shall be as follows:

(a) The Vice President of the Student Body shall assume the powers and duties of the President in the absence of, or at the request of the President of the Student Body.

(b) The Secretary of the Student Body shall write and preserve records of all Student Council meetings. At the end of the Secretary's tenure of office, he shall deliver to the President-elect his records, which shall in turn be entrusted to the new duly elected Secretary.

(c) The Treasurer of the Student Body shall be in general charge of all collections and disbursements of the finances of the Student Body; said collections and disbursements to be authorized by the Student Council. Two weeks before the end of his tenure of office, the Treasurer shall present his records to the College Auditing Committee.

Section 6. Elections for all class officers shall be held by secret ballot at the same time and under the same supervision that Student Council representatives are elected. Presidents of classes shall be nominated by petitions of ten per cent of the membership of their respective classes. Each class shall also elect a vice president, a secretary, and a

treasurer, candidates for which shall be nominated by filing an announcement of candidacy with the Election Board. All class officers must be academic members of that class, and petitions for president and announcements for other officers shall be presented to the Election Board not later than the final date for Student Council petitions as set forth in Article I, Section 3-a.

#### ARTICLE III—STUDENT COURT

Section 1. There shall be a Student Court composed of three faculty members appointed by the President of the College and four students appointed by the President of the Student Council. Of these student members, all of whom shall be academic Juniors or Seniors, one shall be a fraternity man, one a sorority woman, one a non-fraternity man, and one a non-sorority woman. The Court shall meet within a week after the organization of the Student Council and shall elect its own officers. At this first meeting the Court shall designate the time of its meetings.

(a) To consider cases of dishonesty, breaches of social etiquette, infringements of college traditions, and all matters contrary to the best interests of the college.

(b) The Court shall have final judgment as to the constitutionality of acts of the Student Council and as to the interpretation of this constitution.

(c) To render decisions and pass sentences concerning all matters before it.

Section 3. All college organizations shall submit a report of any social function, through the highest ranking official of the organization present, to the Chairman of the Student Court within four days after the function. Regulation forms shall be provided for this purpose, and any organization failing to make a report shall be held responsible as well as such individuals as may have been delinquent.

Section 4. All students and faculty members shall be privileged to prefer charges or



submit reports to the Student Court concerning any matter within its jurisdiction.

Section 5. The Court shall, as individuals, take the juror's oath of secrecy. No records except final decisions of the Student Court shall be recorded and preserved. Final appeal in all matters may be taken to the President of the College.

#### ARTICLE IV—AMENDMENTS AND BY-LAWS

Section 1. Amendments to this constitution may be proposed either by the Student Council or by a petition signed by ten per cent of the members of the Student Body.

Section 2. Amendments to this constitution shall become valid and integral parts of the constitution through ratification by a two-thirds majority of the members of the Student Body at a meeting called for that purpose, or by a two-thirds vote of the ballot upon the proposed amendment. The method of voting shall be decided upon by the Student Council.

Section 3. An amendment must be proposed at least two weeks before action can be taken upon it. The proposed amendment shall be given public notice on the college bulletin board or advertised in the college newspaper at least ten days before a vote can be taken.

Section 4. By-laws and rules of the Council may be adopted or amended by a majority vote of the Council, provided that the matter shall have been submitted in writing at a previous meeting. By-laws or rules may be passed by unanimous consent without having been previously submitted.

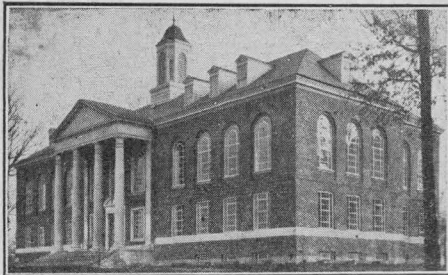

### LIBRARY RULES

1. Quiet must be observed in the library.

2. Two-week books may be taken out at any time during library hours except Sunday from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.

3. Reserve books may be taken out for two hours during the day. They may be taken for overnight between 4:00 and 6:00 p. m. every day except Saturday. They may be taken for the week-end on Saturday between 11:00 and 1:00.

Reserve books that are taken for overnight are due at 9:00 a. m. the following morning. Reserve books taken for the week-end are due at 9:00 a. m. Monday morning.

Fines on overdue reserve books are twenty-five cents for the first hour or any part of an hour which the book is overdue, and ten cents for each additional hour or fraction of an hour.

Fines on two weeks books are two cents per day from date due to date returned.

Students who neglect or refuse to pay fines: (a) Do not receive credit for courses until fine is paid; (b) do not receive honorable dismissal from the college; (3) forfeit the privilege of using the library until fine is paid.

4. To secure books: (a) Main desk—It is necessary to have the call numbers for the books desired. These may be found by consulting the card catalogue located to the right of the main desk. Card catalogue is arranged like a dictionary. Each book may be found under its author, title and subject. The number is found in the upper left hand corner of each card. Copy this completely and accurately on a small piece of paper, and give to librarian in attendance at desk. (b) Call numbers for reserve books may be found by consulting the author file near reserve window.

5. Magazines, both bound and unbound, must be used in the reading room. Bound magazines may be secured at the MAIN desk. Current

periodicals in reading room should be returned to their proper places on the racks.

6. Every book should be returned to the desk from which it was taken. Borrowers remain responsible for books as long as they are charged to them.

7. Borrowers who mark, mutilate or lose books belonging to the library will be required to pay full replacement value of book in addition to any fines which may have been incurred.

8. No one is permitted to draw books to be loaned to other people.

9. Students who cannot be relied upon to return books promptly will be deprived of the privilege of drawing books.

10. Failure to comply with these rules governing the use of the library will mean the withdrawal of all library privileges.

Library Hours, Main—Monday-Friday, 7:45 a. m. to 9:00 p. m.; Saturday, 7:45 a. m. to 1:00 p. m.; Sunday, 2:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m.

Reserve Library Hours—Monday-Friday, 7:45 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.; Saturday, 7:45 a. m. to 1:00 p. m.; Sunday, closed. Reserve hours are subject to change.

Junior High School Library Hours—To be announced later.

#### HELPS AND SUGGESTIONS

1. Lost and found articles should be reported to the Secretary's office.

2. Suggestions or announcements for assembly should be given to the assembly committee, Mr. Ranson and Mr. Pitt.

3. If you want a job, see Miss Prichard.

4. Lockers may be rented in the main building for one dollar, which is refunded on surrender of key.

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8. Athletic books should be obtained from the Treasurer's office upon payment of registration fee, as it is included in the tuition.

9. The Psychology Clinic is in room 12.

10. The Green Room (College Theatre) is across the hall from the Psychology clinic.

11. To reach the center of town by street car take either the Ritter Park (No. 7) or the Vernon Street (No. 11). To reach the stadium take the Ritter Park car. To go to West Huntington, take the Vernon Street car. To go to Guyandotte (East Huntington) take the Third Avenue car (No. 3).

12. Library open from 7:45 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. from Monday to Thursday; 7:45 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. on Friday; 7:45 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. on Saturday; 2:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. on Sunday. No books are loaned out on Sunday and are to be used in the library only. Reserve Hours (during the daytime books from the reserve section may be kept for two hours. This section is on the first floor of the Library) 7:45 a. m. to 6 p. m. from Monday to Friday; 7:45 to 1:00 p. m. on Saturday. Fines for overdue reserve books are: 25c for the first hour overdue; 10c for each additional hour up to 75c.

13. Explanation of Grades: A—Honor grade, 3 points; B—Excellent, 2 points; C—Good, 1 point; D—Lowest passing grade, 0 points; F—Failure, 0 points. As many points are required for graduation as there are hours of work on the record books. In other words every student who graduates from Marshall College must make at least an average of C.

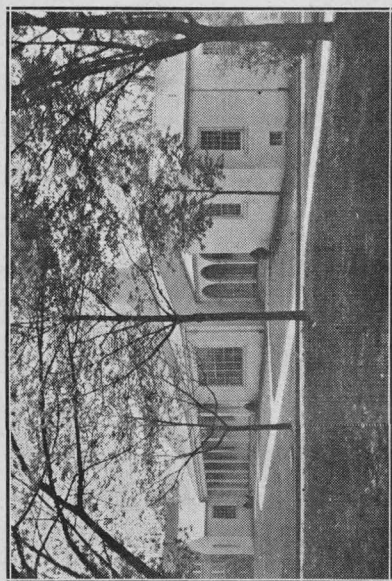

We hope to carry out fully our three-fold purpose of giving authentic training in dramatics, developing the skill and personality of each individual student, and providing high-class entertainment for the college and the city. Admission to each performance is 35c, or a season ticket to all four shows may be purchased for \$1.00.

## FORENSIC ACTIVITIES

Rather extensive plans are being made for extra-curricular work in forensics at Marshall for the school year of 1935-36. Under the direction of A. O. Ranson, of the Department of Speech, several new features are to be introduced.

1. **Intercollegiate Debate.** The varsity debate teams will meet the teams composing the Buckeye Conference and the West Virginia Conference as in past years, meeting the Buckeye schools in dual debates and the West Virginia institutions in the State Intercollegiate Debate Tournament. A few other debates will be scheduled with schools from the following list: University of Pittsburgh, University of Pennsylvania, Ohio State, West Virginia University, University of Kentucky, Waynesburg College, and Denison University. Several places are to be filled on the varsity squad from the Freshman class this year. All Freshmen interested in college debating should confer with Mr. Ranson in the Speech office, Room 24, Main Building, as early in the year as possible.

2. **Intercollegiate Oratory.** Marshall will be represented in two oratorical contests this season. All students, both men and women, are eligible for competition. Tryouts will be announced early in the year. See Mr. Ranson for rules governing the orations.

3. **Intramurals.** Kappa Gamma, National Honorary Forensic Fraternity with the Gamma Chapter at Marshall, will sponsor intramural contests in debate, oratory, extemporaneous speaking and interpretation during the school year. All Marshall students not having represented Marshall in intercollegiate competition in the particular event are eligible. Suitable awards will be made to the winners. Further announcements will be made from time to time concerning the various events here mentioned. If further information is desired, please get in touch with Mr. Ranson in the Speech office.



### THE BAND

**I.**

**Name**

Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be the Panhellenic Association of Marshall College.

**II.**

**Object**

Sec. 1. The object of this panhellenic association shall be (a) to fix the date of bid day; (b) to pass and enforce rush rules; (c) to regulate other matters pertaining to local panhellenic life; and (d) to encourage all chapters to take an active interest in all school and college activities for the common good.

**III.**

**Membership**

Sec. 1. This association shall be composed of three representatives from every sorority. The dean of women shall act as adviser for the organization.

**IV.**

**Violations**

Sec. 1. Any sorority found guilty by the local panhellenic association of

violating any of the articles of this constitution or its by-laws shall be reported at once in writing to the president of the Local Panhellenic, and a meeting called to consider the offense. The opposition shall be allowed to make its report, after which the president shall take action according to the panhellenic constitution. If the opposing side does not make a report it loses the case by default.

**V.**

**Officers**

Sec. 1. The officers of the local panhellenic association shall be a president, president pro tem, a recording secretary, and a treasurer. Each office shall be held in rotation by the time of their establishment in the college. The term of office shall begin and end with the school year.

**VI.**

Sec. 1. Panhellenic Court, composed of sorority presidents, shall have the power to try and convict cases of infraction of rules, and to decide penalties.

**VII.**

**Meetings**

Sec. 1. Regular meetings shall be held once each month during the school year, the time to be arranged at the beginning of each school year.

Sec. 2. In addition to the regular monthly meetings, special meetings

may be called at any time by the president of the association, and must be called whenever two members of the panhellenic association request that one be called.

**VIII.  
Quorum**

Sec. 1. A three-fourths majority of the members of the local panhellenic association shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Sec. 2. Each sorority shall have one vote.

**BY-LAWS**

**I.**

**Duties of Officers**

Sec. 1. The president shall be the presiding officer of the local panhellenic association; she shall conduct all regular and special meetings; she shall appoint all standing and special committees, with the approval of the panhellenic association; she shall be responsible for the general work of the local panhellenic association. In case of withdrawal of the president from school, the panhellenic council will elect the new president from the two remaining representatives of the sorority to which the original president belongs.

Sec. 2. The president protem shall take charge of meetings in the absence of the president.

Sec. 3. The recording secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings

of the local panhellenic association; she shall have the custody of the records and of all papers and take care of the correspondence.

Sec. 4. The treasurer shall receive all moneys of the local panhellenic association; she shall collect all dues; she shall pay out all funds; she shall render a written report at each meeting.

**II.**

**Membership**

Sec. 1. Invitation to membership in any panhellenic sorority shall be extended in writing and the answer thereto shall be required to be in writing.

Sec. 2. No sorority shall bid a girl unless she is the holder of a high school diploma in a full four-year course, or has had equivalent education; the term "equivalent" shall be determined by the Registrar.

Sec. 3. No girl may be asked to join a sorority or be initiated until she herself has matriculated. Matriculation is defined as enrollment in the college for resident work.

Sec. 4. No sorority may rush, bid, pledge, or initiate during the summer session.

Sec. 5. No pledge may be initiated if her scholastic average for the term, quarter, or semester, immediately preceding initiation, has fallen below twelve hours of C or equivalent rating.

Sec. 6. Summer grades of a student who has carried full work during the summer session, may be used when considering scholastic eligibility for initiation.

Sec. 7. A failure to maintain a C average in twelve hours shall cause a member to lose her privilege of voting and holding office in her chapter, and in local panhellenic. If at the end of the next term, quarter, or semester, she has brought her average up to the required standard she is automatically reinstated in her chapter but not in local panhellenic.

Sec. 8. Faculty members shall take no part in rushing.

Sec. 9. Members of the A. E. S. sororities shall become members of other sororities provided the others are not members of the Association of Education Sororities, or those operating in the regular teachers' college fields. Membership in an A. E. S. sorority does not exclude a member from membership in any honorary sorority.

### III.

#### Repledging

A pledge is binding for one calendar year during which interval a girl may not be invited to join any other sorority. The word "pledge" is defined as meaning a promise to join a sorority in the form of a written acceptance, or the wearing of the sorority colors.

If a girl fails to make her grades, or to fulfill other initiation requirements, or if the sorority, for any reason, does not initiate within one calendar year from the date of her pledging, her pledge automatically expires and she is then eligible to pledge any sorority.

If at any time a girl who has been pledged and dropped by a sorority because of failure to make her grades, meets the grade requirements, she may be re-pledged and immediately initiated into the sorority to which she was formerly pledged, provided the sorority votes her in.

If, however, her pledge is released by the sorority, or if she herself "breaks" her pledge prior to the end of the calendar year from date of her pledging, she is then not eligible to pledge any sorority until one calendar year from the date on which her pledge was released or broken.

This regulation shall cover any campus, the one on which the girl was originally pledged or one to which she may transfer.

The releasing or breaking of a pledge shall be reported to the local panhellenic and a record of such action kept for one calendar year.

If unusual campus rulings, illness, or finances prevent initiation within stated period the situation may be presented to the president of local panhellenic.

**IV.  
Rush Rules**

Sec. 1. Rules on rushing shall be printed and may be as widely distributed as local needs and conditions may demand, and may be posted in a conspicuous place.

**V.  
Open Bids**

Open bids may be given any girl who has been on Marshall campus through one rush week. Freshmen may be given an open bid three weeks after rush week is over.

**VI.  
Dues and Fines**

Sec. 1. The annual dues of each sorority in the local panhellenic association shall be \$5.00 payable within one month after the opening of school. Fines not to exceed \$25.00.

**VII.**  
Sec. 1. Local panhellenic association may make local by-laws to meet local conditions provided they do not conflict with the rulings found in the constitution and by-laws for local panhellenic associations.

**VIII.**  
A scholarship chairman shall be elected to check scholastic standing of panhellenic representatives and report all dropped members to panhellenic.

**IX.**  
Panhellenic will not require any officer other than the President to be a former member of panhellenic.

**INTER-FRATERNITY RUSH  
RULES**

The Inter-Fraternity Council is composed of the following social fraternities: Alpha Kappa Pi, Alpha Theta Chi, Kappa Alpha, Phi Kappa Nu, and Phi Tau Alpha. These fraternities through the council have adopted the following rules which govern the pledging of prospective members:



To be initiated:

1. "12 College Hours" shall be interpreted to mean "12 college hours passed at Marshall." (Transfer—at mid-semesters by a person having 26 hours.)

2. Transferred students shall be classified under the rules governing Freshmen on rushing.

3. Freshmen shall be rushed the three weeks of each semester. (First week starting Monday after registration.)

Silent period shall last from 12, midnight, of the Saturday of the third week of the semester, until 7 p. m. the following Monday.

Open bids after that period.

4. Pledge Lists.

An official list of pledges shall be filed by 9 a. m. Tuesday of the fourth week of the semester. (You may have space in the dean of women's files if you wish.)

5. Broken and dropped pledges.

There shall be an interim of one full semester between the time a member has his pledge "dropped" or "broken" before he may pledge any other fraternity.

6. Breaking Rules.

Any fraternity breaking rushing or pledging rules may be brought before the Inter-fraternity Council. If found guilty of said infringement the Inter-

fraternity Council may impose a fine of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for each offense.

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### BOYS' FRESHMAN RULES 1935-1936

1. Freshmen must speak to all upperclassmen at all times and must conduct themselves with utmost respect for upper classmen.
2. Freshmen must attend all athletic contests and pep meetings, occupying the Freshman section. They must attend all assemblies and any other school meeting at which their presence is desired. When in the auditorium, the Freshmen will always occupy the balcony.
3. By the last Wednesday before the first football game, each member of the Freshman class must be able to recite upon demand the college yells and songs.

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4. Freshmen are not allowed to cut the campus. They are not allowed to use the walk up to the main entrance.

5. All Freshmen will use the side entrance of all college buildings except the Science Hall, where they shall use only the Sixteenth Street entrance, and the Student Union Building, where the door on the west porch is to be used.

6. Freshmen, while enrolled at Marshall College, will not be allowed to wear the athletic letter or any other insignia of any other school.

7. Freshmen are not permitted to sit on the rail at the south entrance of the Main building.

8. All Freshmen must purchase the following: 1 North Dakota Green four-in-hand tie; 1 green and white cap; 1 pair white socks; and 1 handbook.

9. All male Freshmen must wear the official Freshman cap, tie, and socks while in the city limits and on all trips sponsored by the college. They must at all times carry their handbooks.

10. Freshman rules will take effect the first Monday following enrollment and will continue throughout the semester.

11. The walk from the Victory Gong steps to the Music Hall will be known as "HELLO LANE." Freshmen must speak to everyone while en route between these two designated points.

9. The walk from the Victory Gong steps to the Music Hall will be known as "HELLO LANE." Freshman women must speak to everyone while en route between these two designated points.

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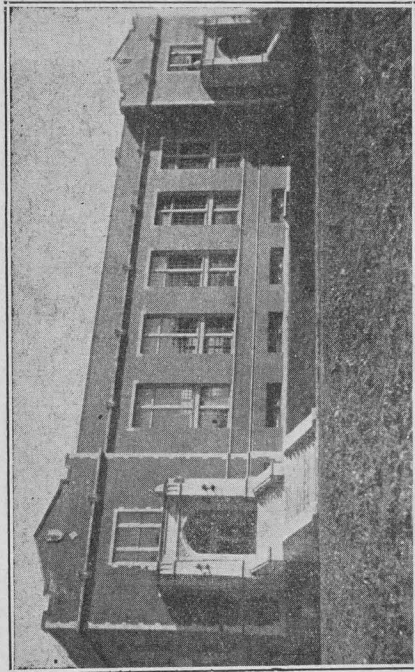

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**Rules of the Buckeye Conference**

Marshall College believes in clean athletics and will not tolerate either dishonesty or professionalism in her sports program.

Marshall College athletics will be operated under the rules and regulations of the Buckeye Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, of which the College is a member.

The following rules are quoted from the Buckeye Conference by-laws:

"1. No student shall participate in any intercollegiate sport unless he be a bona fide student, doing full work in a regular or special course as an undergraduate as defined in the curriculum of his college.

"2. No student shall so participate until he shall have been in attendance in his college for one full collegiate

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year, subsequent to attaining the equivalent of freshman rank in any

"B. Summer session work shall not be counted in determining length of residence.

"3. No student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics upon the teams of any college or colleges for more than three years in the aggregate, and any member of a college team who plays in any part of any intercollegiate athletic contest does hereby participate in athletics for the year.

"4. No student shall be permitted to participate in any intercollegiate contest who has not passed the preceding semester at least twelve hours and made twelve credit points.

"A student who participated in intercollegiate athletics and does not complete the work of that term or semester shall not be permitted to compete in the same sport in his next year of residence until after the completion of a subsequent semester's work.

"Any student who has an incomplete which makes him ineligible, shall be ineligible until that incomplete is made up. (Time limit to make up incomplete shall be six weeks.)

"5. The names and scholastic records of all transfer students from without the Conference shall be submitted to the Conference for approval before such students can be declared eligible. This means scholastic record in the institution from which student transfers.

"A student transferring into any Buckeye school to be eligible for participation in athletics, must be in good standing at the institution from which he is transferring. In case an athlete is dropped from an institution he must return to that institution and clear his record before being eligible for participating in athletics at a Buckeye institution.

"6. No student shall play in any game under an assumed name.

"7. A person participating in any athletic contest as a member of a collegiate team while not a student in the institution represented, is debarred from participating in intercollegiate contest conducted under these rules.

"8. No person shall be eligible to participate in any intercollegiate contest who has received any gift, remuneration or pay for his service on a college team. No student shall participate in any intercollegiate contest who has ever used or is using his

knowledge of athletics or athletic skill for gain.

"Participation of college students in athletic sports as members of professional or semi-professional teams shall render such students ineligible to membership in college teams; a semi-professional team being one which contains one or more members who are engaged for a whole or a part of the season for pecuniary compensation. Any athlete who is proven to have accepted loans or gifts from any person or organized group, because of athletic ability, shall be declared ineligible for competition in the Buckeye Conference.

"9. Any student who is a member of a representative college team and who plays on any outside team during the time that he is a member of the varsity team or squad, shall be thereby rendered ineligible for participation in that sport for the current college year.

"12. College football teams shall play only with teams representing educational institutions.

"13. Teams other than the regular college or "varsity" teams in all branches of athletics shall play only with teams of their own institutions.

"15. All athletic funds and accounts shall be controlled and audited by faculty members, or by committees containing faculty members.

"16. The average aid in scholarships and loans given by any college to her athletes shall be no more than in the same proportion as to other male students, both in amount and in numbers receiving aid.

"No scholarship grants or loans are to be promised by any representative of any college to prospective athletes.

"No athlete entering any college may receive scholarship aid or loans until the second semester of the first year in college. Scholarships are not to be used to influence high school athletes to enter college."
