# History of Marshall

From Col. George S. Wallace's  
"Cabell County Annals and Families".

Marshall Academy was established in 1837 and named after Chief Justice John Marshall of the Supreme Court. John Laidley, after whom Laidley Hall has been named, was one of the leading spirits who brought about the founding.

Marshall Academy was started in a four room building erected on the original one and one-fourth acres of land which were purchased for forty dollars. The first teacher was Mr. John H. Peck.

In 1850, the Academy passed under the control of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and was later changed to Marshall College. Marshall was never a denominational school, and the act of making it a college prohibited the establishment of a theological school.

In the midst of some financial difficulties in 1867, a bill was passed for the establishment of a "State Normal School at Marshall". Thirty thousand dollars was provided for this purpose and local subscriptions brought ten thousand more.

Since the cornerstone was laid in 1869 by West Virginia Masons, the College has had thirteen presidents. Later years have brought a number of attractive buildings to the campus. The college passed thru the stages of elementary, secondary and normal school work, later being granted the power to give the A.B. degree.

In 1937 Marshall celebrated her centennial year.

In 1938 Marshall was given permission to offer B.S., M.A., and M.S. degrees.

From fewer than 100 students in the nineties, more than 1800 now register in Marshall each semester.

## Student Government

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In a large measure the students of Marshall College govern themselves. To maintain traditions and to provide the machinery necessary for handling the business and social affairs of the student body, a system of student government was set up a few years ago. That organization has been perfected in its functions until it now exercises a large degree of control over student affairs.

All executive and legislative duties of the student body are vested in the president of the student body and the several members of the student council, which is an elective organization.

The Student Council is very active in the promotion of weekly dances, maintaining school spirit by pep meetings, etc., holding of elections, and conducting school affairs of all kinds.

THE STUDENT COUNCIL ACTS AS THE VOICE OF THE STUDENTS AND AT ALL TIMES AS A SCOURING BOARD FOR STUDENT OPINION. ITS MEMBERS WILL GIVE ALL SUGGESTIONS THOUGHT AND CONSIDERATION.

Each class has several representatives on the council. Seats are held by girls as well as boys. Each student is on an equal basis and each has an opportunity to represent his or her class. Annual elections are held near the close of the second semester in which officers for the coming year are selected. ## *Intramurals*

## *Madrigal Club and Band*

Under the leadership of Professor Harry Mueller, the Madrigal Club is a popular organization on the campus and is frequently invited to sing on programs, both in Huntington and out of the city. Tryouts will be announced shortly.

The Band is another popular organization performing on many public occasions, particularly at football and basketball games. Several trips are taken each season to out-of-town games etc. Any boy with musical ability is eligible and welcome to enter. Professor Mueller also has charge of this organization.

## College Theatre

College Theatre is one of the oldest and most popular student organizations on the campus. Under the sponsorship of the speech department, College Theatre has for years produced the best of modern and classic plays. Many who received their theatrical start in College Theatre have gone on to fill positions of importance on the professional stage.

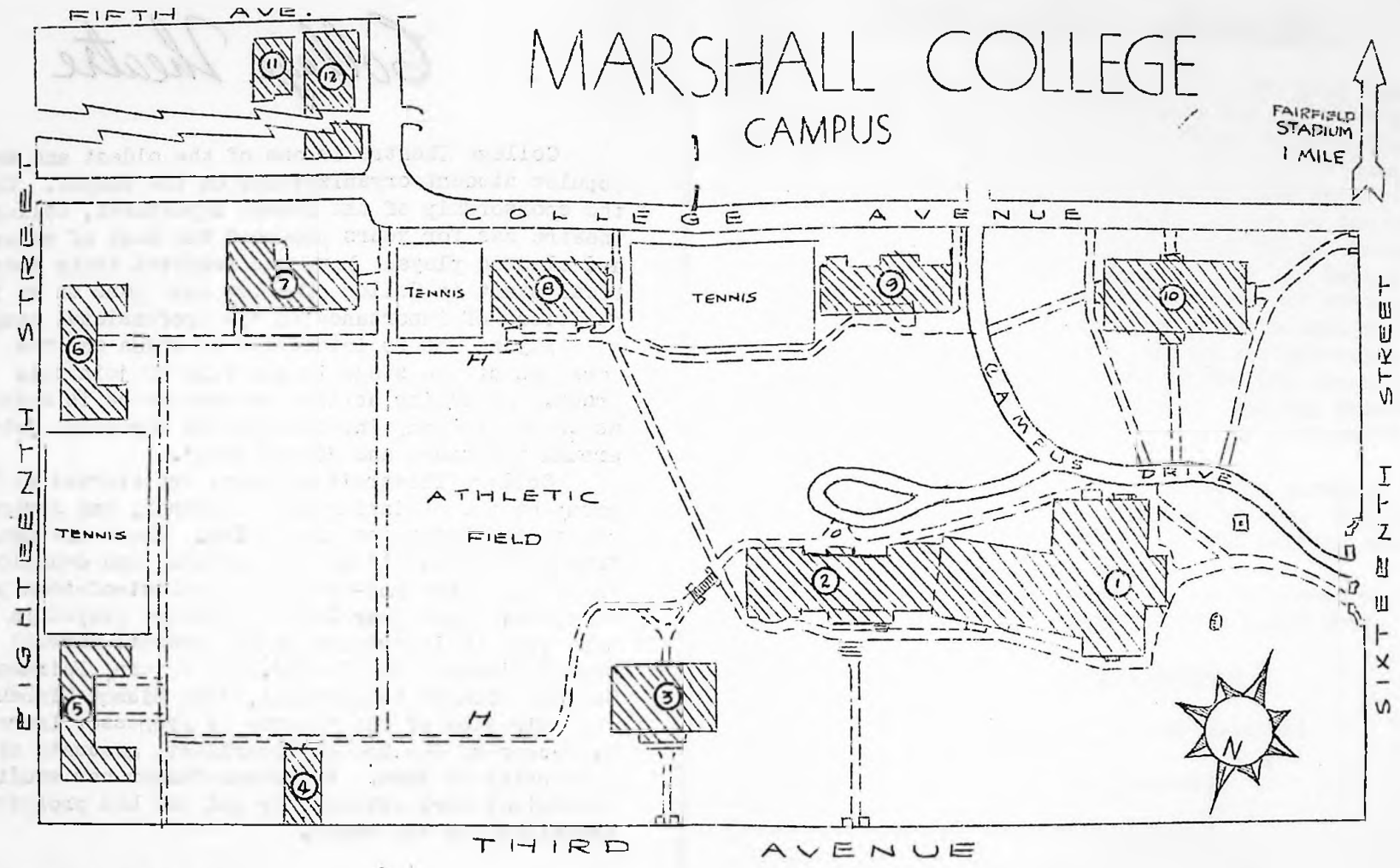
Anyone who is interested in drama and the workings of the stage is eligible to join this group. No acting ability or experience is necessary, as there are many interesting and important jobs around the stage and "Green Room".

College Theatre's officers are elected by the group at the beginning of the season, and several plays are chosen for production. There are usually four major productions each season, and occasionally there are extra one-act plays and out-of-town productions. Last year College Theatre played in Fairmont with their triumph of the season, Maxwell Anderson's "Elizabeth the Queen". In return, Fairmont College brought to Marshall, "The Bishop Misbehaves".

Director of the theatre is Professor Lawrence E. Tucker of the Speech Department, graduate of State University of Iowa. Professor Tucker has studied theatrical work extensively and has had professional experience on the stage.

Professor Tucker, as popular in class as with College Theatre, teaches several classes in drama and stage technique.

There are no dues in College Theatre, and new names are always welcomed. Anyone can tryout for parts in College Theatre Plays.

## Fraternities - Sororities

Fraternities and Sororities have long played an important part in the social life of Marshall College. With few exceptions each organization maintains a chapter house in which out of town members reside. These organizations take an active part in the social and student events on the campus.

High standards are maintained by the Greeks due to the excellent supervision of the Social Deans. An Intra-Fraternity Council composed of Fraternity members and a Pan Hellenic Association made up of Sorority representatives, act as the governing body of the Greek organizations. These two organizations are socially active themselves. The Pan Hellenic and Intra-Fraternity dances are two high-spots of the social season.

The rushing season for freshmen pledging will open shortly after the semester begins. Rushing announcements will be found in the college newspaper, The Parthenon.

## *Health Service*

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A student clinic is maintained in which are located the offices of the resident physician and nurse. The physician is available only for such services as may be rendered at the clinic, except in emergency cases. Students who wish to have health service are expected to call at the clinic. The nurse is available at the infirmary in Laidley Hall. Medical examinations are given every student entering Marshall College. We strongly advise all freshmen students to get this examination as soon as possible. The address of the clinic is 1712-5th Avenue.

## *Religious Life*

The religious life of the students is largely entrusted to the many well organized churches in Huntington. Devotional exercises are held in conjunction with the regular assembly period. Other ample opportunities for students are provided in association with the young peoples' organizations in the Huntington churches. In addition, the Christian Alliance of Men and Women, a campus organization, meeting weekly, has been very helpful in the spiritual life of the College. Churches of most all denominations may be found within half a mile of the Campus.

## *Student Employment*

In normal times, a large percentage of the needy and deserving students at Marshall can be employed. In any case, it is advisable for them to be prepared to meet their expenses during the first few months while efforts are being made to place them.

Marshall enjoys substantial assistance from NYA, by which system it is possible for students to earn a maximum of \$15.00 per month. Consult your Dean.

## Student Union

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Devoted wholly to social life, the Union is the common meeting ground of all the students. The building was erected in 1932. It is not state owned, but belongs to the citizens of Huntington who raised the money through a bond issue. These bonds are now more than half paid off. The building was for Dr. Morris P. Shawkey, Marshall's president for twelve years.

The Union is the nucleus of campus social life. Outstanding on the social calendar at Marshall are the Student "Mixes"--dances sponsored by the Student Council on Friday nights. Many fraternity and sorority parties and dances are held in the Union. The most recent of Union successes are the "10¢ Dances" held each Monday night after the various campus organization meetings.

The Union boasts a Ping-Pong room, a Club Room, a large Soda Fountain, and a large ball room which serves as a lounge when not in use.

The Union is capably managed by Cecil Ferguson, a former student. He is assisted by Mrs. Frank N. Mann who acts as hostess. She is a second Mother to all students.

## The "Parthenon"

The Parthenon is the student newspaper of Marshall College. It was organized as a literary publication in the late 1800's and has been an inseparable part of the college with which it grew. It is recognized as one of the foremost college semi-weeklies in the United States. Read your Parthenon, comment on it and criticize it, because only through your help, can the Parthenon continue the growth which has made it a success.

The Parthenon is distributed to students each Tuesday and Friday. Jack Murphy, a Senior, is this year's Editor in Chief.

The Marshall Artist's Series Committee has been very successful in bringing to the College Students, and to the people of Huntington as well, the very best talent on the American platform.

### Library

The James E. Morrow Library, built in 1930, contains five class rooms, an art display room, offices, stack rooms, and a reading room that will accommodate three hundred students. The Library contains over 36,000 books and 300 periodicals, besides a large number of reports and documents which are of great value for research purposes. An ideal spot to spend the vacant periods. Miss Rosa Oliver is Librarian and stands ready to help any student at any time.

Football prospects at Marshall College loom brighter this year than ever before in the history of the college. Cam Henderson, head coach and director of athletics, will have a large group of gridiron veterans returning this year, and these will be supplemented by men who formed a formidable freshman squad last year.

This will be Coach Henderson's fifth season at the helm of the Big Green. Kerr Whitfield, former assistant coach, has been elevated to the position of business manager, following the resignation of Frances Farley who has joined the staff of the up and coming Morris Harvey Athletic Dept. Farley Bell, one of Crafty Cam's own pupils, and who has made such a fine reputation at Victory High School in Clarksburg, has accepted the position of Assistant Coach. He will direct the Freshman squad, who for the first time in several years have scheduled a number of games. The Athletic Department is supplemented by a list of able line and back field coaches.
