

MUID REMOTE ID PHOTO SUBMISSION

As a public University, we are required by federal law (34 CFR §602.17(g) and the HEOA of 2008) to ensure online students are who they say they are. All distance education students at Marshall University are required to provide proof of identity by uploading a photograph and an image of a government issued photo ID such as a driver's license, passport, or military ID.

Please submit a photo using the following guidelines:

- Should be cropped to a head shot only.
- Should be taken against a plain, light background.
- Must be a color photo.
- Photo must not use any filters or artificial modifications.
- Must not include sunglasses or hats.
- Must be positioned directly facing the camera.
- Eyes should be open and looking at the camera

After your photo has been submitted and approved by our staff you will receive a confirmation email. As an online student you are welcome to a Marshall student ID. All student IDs are now mobile within smartphone digital wallets.

STUDENT SUCCESS TIP: READ YOUR SYLLABUS!

A syllabus can be lengthy and repeat the same information for every class, but it's important to read every word because it is easy to miss dates and specific information.

Tip for success: A little prep time at the beginning of the semester can keep you on track and prevent missed due dates.

What you need: Colored highlighters and a planner, paper calendar or digital calendar.

- Assign a color for each course.
- Go through the syllabus and put every due date on the calendar. Include reading assignments and discussion posts. Record EVERY date.
- Highlight with that course's color.
- If you need a reminder a few days ahead use a separate color for reminders.
- Look at the calendar often (at least once a week) to make sure you know what deadlines are coming up.

Review the syllabus periodically to be of specific requirements for each class such as file format, citation styles, and posting instructions.

Did you know...


The President of Marshall University originally lived in a house on Fifth Avenue. However, in 1971, the current stately home in Ritter Park was purchased for \$95,000.
