RIGHT ON, LADIES

Two recent books are strongly recommended by your editor as being of interest and importance to all women. Both are fairly short and completely fascinating, as well as extremely thought-provoking.

The first is <u>Education of a WASP</u>, by Lois Mark Stalvey. Mrs. Stalvey was active in "The Panel of American Women" program in Kansas City and then in Philadelphia. Her story is sometimes distressing, sometimes encouraging, but always moving, and every woman will identify with at least parts of it. This book is an experience you really must not miss.

The second book is <u>Unbounitand Unbossed</u>, by Shirley Chisholm, the first black woman ever elected to the Congress of the United States. This one should inspire every woman to work a little harder for the kind of government we meant it to be. While Mrs. Chisholm's book is frankly political in parts, her experiences apply to any political party anywhere and you'll come away from it with a better understanding of how its done and how it <u>should</u> be done, and a better understanding of the part women, black and white, must play in the affairs of our country.
