Diligent, dynamic and dedicated, Margaret Long Arnold, exemplifies the ideals of the Federation and proves herself an outstanding leader. Always interested in people, Mrs. Arnold is vivacious, well informed, alert to present needs and glowing with enthusiasm.

A graduate of Syracuse University, Mrs. Arnold served as Director of Speech and Dramatics in the schools of Syracuse and interviewer and producer of a radio network. Author of a textbook on speech, she has taught Parliamentary Procedure and lectured in every state. Her work as a former national officer of Delta Gamma Sorority has kept her in touch with young women in campuses throughout the nation.

Mrs. Arnold is a world traveler and in the spring of 1962 she visited Germany as a guest of the German government.

She is a member of the Millville Woman's Club, membership 34, and the Concord Woman's Club, membership 500, which gives her an opportunity to know the problems of a small club as well as a large one. She began her club work as an usher and

was elected Secretary, Vice-President and President of the Concord club.

In the New Hampshire Federation of Women's Clubs she was named Chairman of Art, and later as advisor of State Juniors. Successively she served as District Vice-Chairman, Second Vice-President, First Vice-President and President of the New Hampshire Federation.

Prior to her election as President, Mrs. Arnold served the General Federation as Recording Secretary, Third Vice-President, Second Vice-President and First Vice-President.

Mrs. Arnold was the founder of the New Hampshire Authors Luncheon which is sponsored by the Concord

College Club and provides scholarships for Concord girls. In 1952 the University of New Hampshire named Mrs. Arnold "New Hampshire's Most Distinguished Citizen."

A hobby that has taken on tremendous proportions is Mrs. Arnold's interest in problems of the aging. She served as Chairman of the New Hampshire Council of Problems of the Aging; Coordinator and Chairman of the first Governor's Conference to prepare for the White House Conference on Aging and was an active member of the White House Conference on Aging Advisory Committee.

New England College bestowed the honorary degree, doctor of human letters upon Mrs. Arnold in 1951. She is the second woman to receive the Pettee Medal from the University of New Hampshire. The medal goes to natives or residents of New Hampshire who have distinguished themselves nationally or internationally. She holds the Arents Medal from the University of Syracuse, the highest alumni award given.

Mrs. Arnold has been active in the local and state League of Women Voters and the American Association of University Women. A champion of volunteer services, she has served as President of the Concord Hospital

On Program At Convention



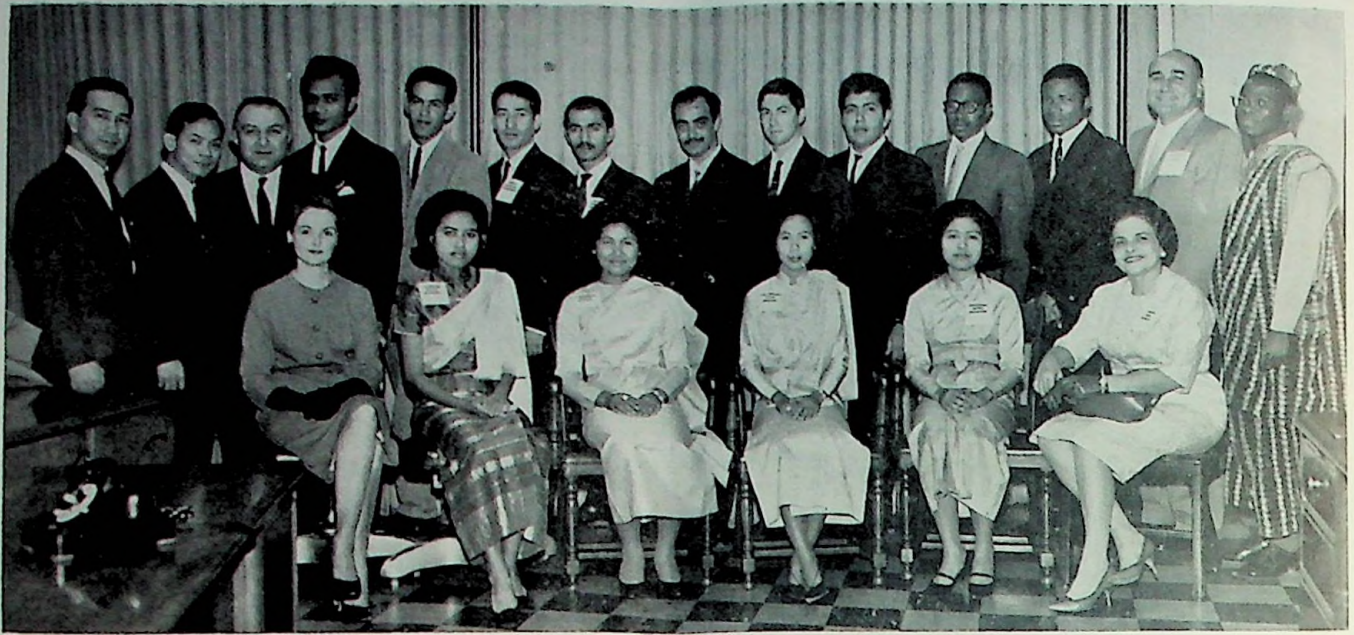
Dwayne Orton

Since 1942, Dwayne Orton has been engaged with International Business Machines Corporation in its many and unique educational enterprises. Before joining IBM, he was Dean of the General College at College of the Pacific, and then President of Stockton College in Stockton, California.

As Editor of THINK, he directs a monthly magazine devoted to the public service and distributed to leaders in business, industry, government, and the professions throughout the world. Although established by the late Thomas J. Watson 28 years ago and published by IBM, THINK makes no reference to the company or its products. Freedoms Foundation three times awarded Orton its George Washington Honor Medal for his editorship and "outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American way of life."

In addition to editing THINK, Orton serves as Educational Consultant to the IBM Corporation, whose Department of Education he headed for eleven years and built into a great educational institute serving over 120,000 persons a year in courses ranging from simple occupational training to advanced seminars in business management and engineering sciences. 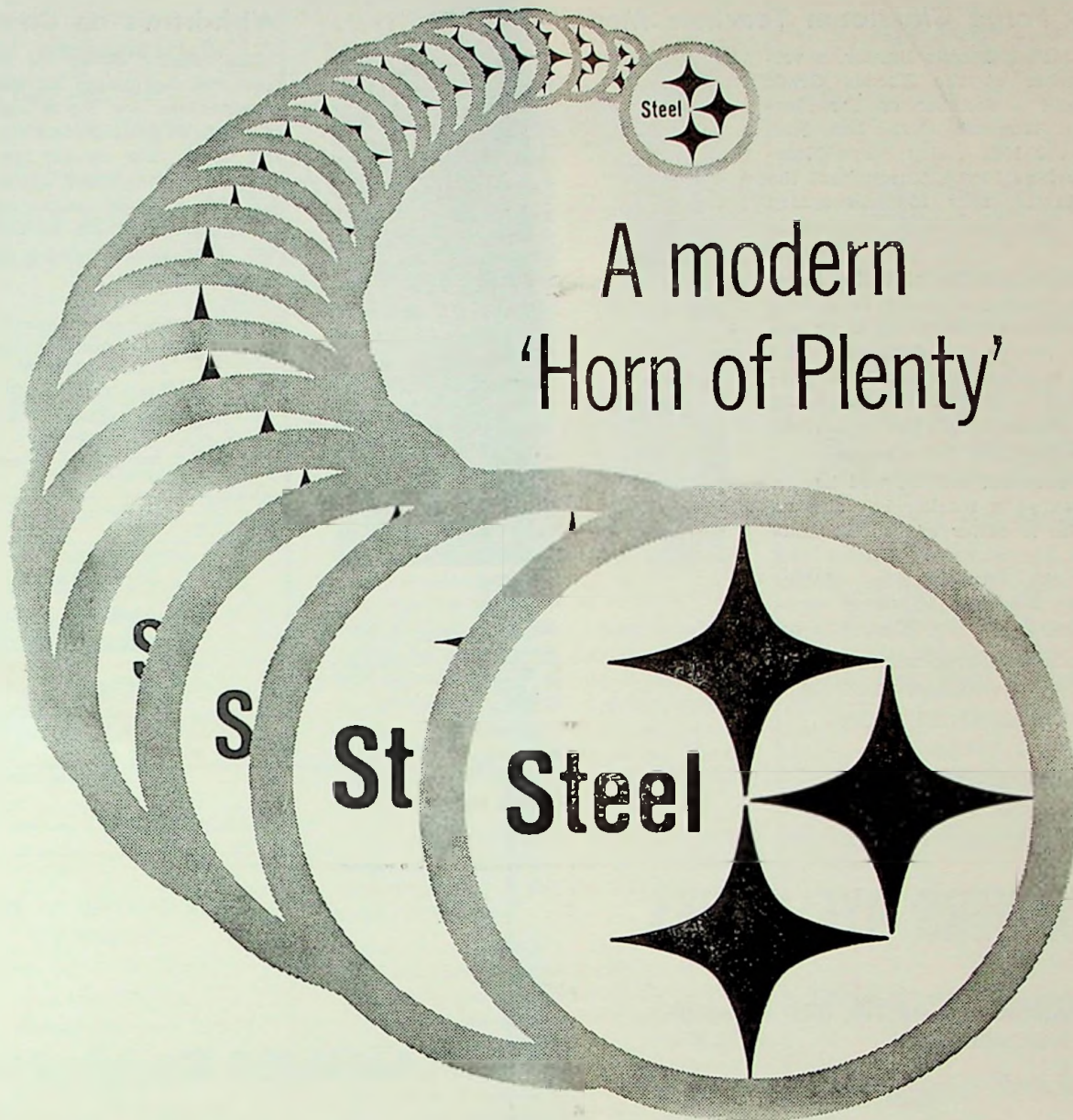

Any Child Can Order a Gun

"A small, easily concealed pistol or revolver may be purchased today almost as easily as a tube of toothpaste, so lax, ineffective, and all too often lacking are laws governing the sale and purchase of these weapons.

"The traffic in mail-order guns, in particular — guns ordered by mail and delivered by express — is virtually uncontrolled since it circumvents postal laws which prohibit such merchandise in the mails. Any child who has \$5 in his piggy bank and can scrawl his name and falsify his age on a mail-order form can obtain a gun," writes Josephine Ripley in **The Christian Science Monitor**.

With crime increasing all over the country the time has come for us to do something about this racket. Police records show that many juvenile delinquents carrying guns have bought them through mail advertisements.

Senator Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut has introduced a bill, S-1975 which amends the federal firearms act to make it more difficult for juveniles, mental defectives, and other "irresponsibles" to come into possession of firearms and which would provide traceable records on those who purchase them.

The Senator made it clear that there is no intention or desire to deprive mature and responsible citizens of their right to purchase or possess firearms. The National Rifle Association and American manufacturers of arms have been of great assistance to Senator Dodd in his investigation of mail-order gun crime. It is the "quacks," who will sell anything for money, who are at fault.

J. Edgar Hoover has said that there is no doubt but that the easy method of obtaining guns has contributed to the increase in crime in the United States. He thinks that local control is the answer.
