We think this was a clerical error when the MPA Program made some changes and it was accidentally reflected in our program description.
- **Clerical Changes –** Tammy Johnson recommended a few other changes to align our admissions description to better align with actual admission policies that are currently in place.
- **Changing Admission Requirement:** The only substantive change we are pursuing at this time is to eliminate GRE scores from our admission requirement.

(NOTE: Because of all of these problems, we received permission from Dean Pittenger to begin using the new program description immediately in Spring 2019.)

Rationale:

The BS/PhD program at Marshall University will be a collaborative endeavor between the College of Science (COS) and the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine Biomedical Research Graduate Program (BMR). It is a competitive accelerated eight-year program with the goal of providing high quality undergraduate and PhD graduate education to develop a skilled basic science workforce to meet the research needs of West Virginia and Central Appalachia. There are four primary rationales for the program.

1. West Virginia has a talented pool of high school students, many of whom are recruited to schools outside of West Virginia because of a perceived lack of options within the West Virginia higher education system. The current success of the BS/MD program (another collaboration between the COS and the Medical School) has shown that with the appropriate marketing and incentives we can recruit these students to Marshall to enrich both our undergraduate and medical student population. Using this experience with the BS/MD program we believe that a similar approach will help increase the number of talented high school students that opt for an undergraduate and graduate career at Marshall.
2. Marshall is now developing strategies to increase its recruitment from other regions of the country. Developing a BS/PhD program could be an effective part of this recruitment policy and should help attract students that have an interest in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) fields.
3. The COS currently has an outstanding pool of students that would be ideal candidates for PhD programs. Many of these students however are focused on a career in medicine. Many of these students pick medicine because they believe it is their only option. Starting the BS/PhD program will enable us to interact with these students earlier and help provide valuable biomedical research experience. For those students that decide that research is the appropriate path we will then be in prime position to recruit them into the BMR program, rather than lose them to other academic institutions.
4. The BMR program in conjunction with COS has recently been funded by the HEPC to provide innovative education opportunities in the STEM fields for students at Marshall. This BS/PhD is a

truly innovative approach that will enable us to provide an outstanding educational opportunity for these students. It will also strengthen the interaction between the BMR Program and the COS, and position us for future grant applications to fund graduate education.

The request for an increase in the anesthesia practice content hours is in response to a recent analysis of program success and effectiveness by the faculty within the nurse anesthesia program and as required by the accrediting agency (COA) for additional anesthesia content hours. The program plans to use these additional hours to offer more direct anesthesia practice content without the need to increase the total hours of the program. Fifteen hours will be taken from the research content of the program leaving it with six remaining hours in research methods and statistics. The fifteen hours will be added to existing principles courses (advanced and basic) applied nursing and simulation lab. This will allow students to have a more immersive experience with both real and practice-based clinical management. This offers the students a more practitioner based learning experience.
