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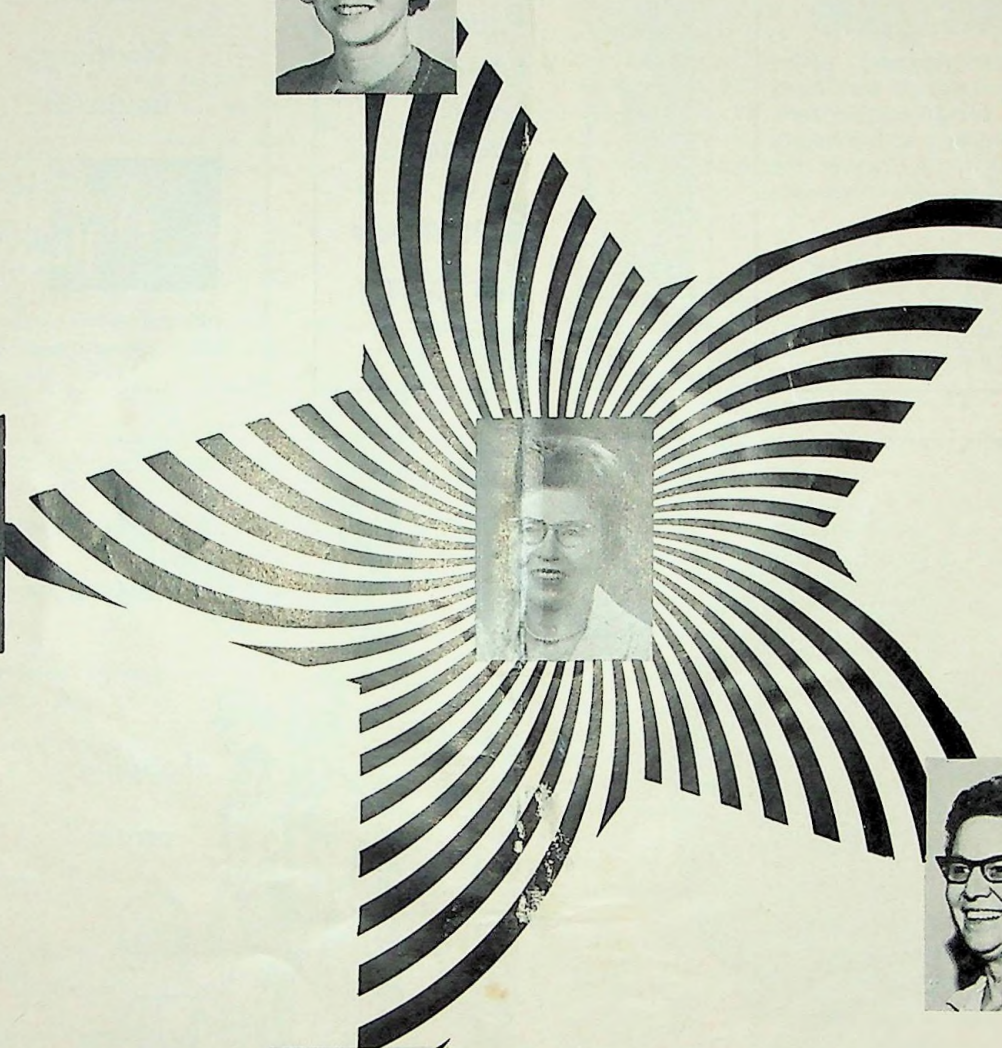

Please call upon me if I can help you at any time in any way. May God bless you and guide you in your years of service.

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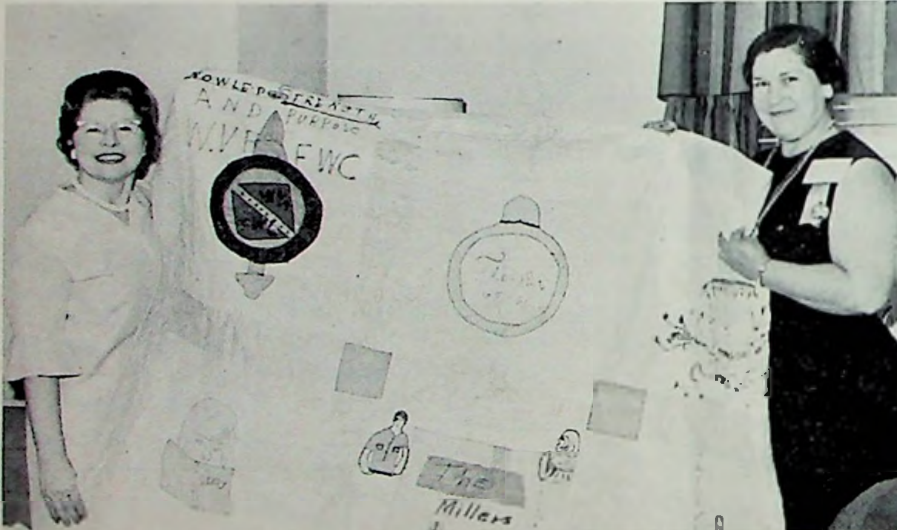
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Coming to us from Corn Island, Zelaya, Nicaragua, is Juliette Morgan, our Pan-American Scholarship Student. She will enter West Virginia University this month. Juliette has written a three page letter to Beckey Conaway, State Pan-American Scholarship Chairman. Beckey has forwarded it to us and we share with you a few quotes from her letter.

"I am the twelfth of a family of thirteen children. A few years before my birth, my father purchased a farm on the San Juan River (that is on the border with Costa Rica). To help the economic situation, at the age of six, I lived with my parents and part of the family on the farm. I partially spent my childhood days there.

"To obtain my education it was necessary that I had to go to and from the Capitol for schooling. After the completion of my elementary educa-

W. Va. Women Receive National Appointments

Mrs. Fred Hurt of Beckley, immediate past president of WVFWC, has been named as GFWC Chairman of the Trade and Aid Division of the International Affairs Department. Mrs. Hurt lists the main objectives of her division as (1) study and act on the fact that trade is the life blood of a country, often determining its foreign policy, and (2) recognize that aid is a program of selfhelp for ourselves as well as the under-developed countries — not give away.

Mrs. James A. Scarbro of Montgomery, immediate past GFWC Community Improvement Chairman, has been named GFWC Chairman of the Recreation Division of the Conservation Department. Mrs. Scarbro lists the main objectives of this division as (1) recognize recreation and use of leisure time as being worthy of thoughtful attention; (2) campaign for recreation areas where needed; and (3) work with other community agencies in improving recreational facilities at the heart of the big cities.

When each club receives correction mailing list sometime around the 1st of October, the list is to be corrected as to members names and zip code numbers inserted after each address, and returned to Bill Snyder ten days after it is received by your club. Check in the amount of 4c per member is to accompany correction list with zip code numbers. Don't forget to comply with this in your club as it makes the difference in whether or not members will receive magazines after the November Issue.

IS MONEY A PROBLEM IN YOUR CLUB? If so, maybe you would like to try this, "Trash and/or Treasure Sale." How it works, announce you will hold sale at your next regular meeting. Have a table arranged near the entrance where each member as she arrives may place some item she no longer has any use for such as earrings, bracelet, necklace, pins, vase, a hat she loved but is afraid to wear, etc. Set a price on items and let members purchase. You will be surprised how many members will find just the pin or earrings she has been searching for to go with a particular dress. It can be fun as well as make money for your club.
