The Regent expressed her appreciation for the presence of 100% attendance of her Officers at her last executive meeting of the Board of Management.

Mrs. Smith asked if anyone knew of any old business to be taken up at this time. Adding that she knew of none.

The Regent then asked for new business. The Organ Project proposed by Mrs. H. K. Owens, Jackson's Mill Chairman was informally discussed. Mrs. Holcombe stated that each of the five Districts holding meetings during the spring and summer endorsed the proposal. Mrs. Smith said she felt sure that all West Virginia Daughters would cooperate with the Jackson's Mill Committee in procuring funds to buy the organ in the not too distant future.

Mrs. Smith then called for the informal reports from each of her State Officers.

Mrs. Hugh S. Byrer. Chaplain. made appropriate remarks concerning our work together during the past three years. She expressed her personal gratitude for having had the privilege of service in the State Society, saying that the many lovely experiences had enriched her life. Miss Louise Bullock, Corresponding Secretary said that Mrs. Byrer had expressed the feeling shared by every member of Mrs. Smith's Board, and Mrs. Holcombe said she would like to add a thank you for the delicious luncheon hat we had just enjoyed and for the beautiful favors Mrs. Smith so thoughtfully out at our places.

Mrs. Smith, the Regent replied that she appreciated the warm friendship and cooperation that her Board had given her for the past three years.

Mrs. M. L. O'Neale. Registrar, spoke of the Ancestor's file which she had set up for the work in West Virginia saying that the Project required many hours of hard work and that the cooperation of the Chapter Registrars and Chapter Regents would be necessary to make the Project a success.

Mrs. Daniel W. Snyder. Librarian, told of the gift for the West Virginia Room which she had sponsored and told how pleased she was that Mrs. Francis. Mrs. Wiswell and Mrs. Biggs were to share the joy of giving the beautiful radiator.

Mrs. Frank S. Harkleroad. Historian, gave us each a copy of a pamphlet which she had compiled saying that this was her contribution for Research. Mrs. Harkleroad further gave a short report on the sale of cook books and Christmas Cards for Valley Forge.

Mrs. Harkleroad also spoke of the Patriots Stones for Valley Forge, and said that she was so happy that West Virginia would be able to place one at Valley Forge.

Mrs. A. Keith McClung. Vice Regent. spoke on different phases of the various D. A. R. Committees. She said that she thought the newly added Committee of Transportation was a fine one. Mrs. McClung said that she had enjoyed being the Chairman of this Committee in West Virginia. At 3:00, the afternoon session convened, and the following State Chairmen gave their reports:

Miss Hallie Martin. Chairman of the State Building Promotion Committee, was complimentary in her remarks on the progress of the Fund raising campaign in West Virginia. She thanked Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, National Chairman for her assistance and cooperation. Miss Martin told the Conference of the song dedicated to Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne, President General. Mrs. Rex Hayes Rhoades, Chairman

of the Building Finance Committee and Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe. Chairman of the Building Promotion Committee. She asked that Mrs. Martin lead the assembly in this song entitled "Keep Those Dollars Rolling Along." to the tune of "Keep Those Caissons Rolling Along." All entered into the spirit. Many gave cash contributions and several Chapters pledged their share of \$6.00 a Daughter. Miss Martin then announced a song dedicated to two West Virginia Daughters—"To Helen and Hallie" to the tune of "Yankee Doodle." Miss Martin concluded her report by thanking those who had participated in the pledging and cash donations, and reminded them that she would call for pledges on Saturday. RESOLUTIONS OF THE 44th ANNUAL CONFERENCE WEST VIRGINIA SOCIETY

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

I. LOYALTY TO THE NATIONAL SOCIETY. DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia State Society. Daughters of the American Revolution in 44th Conference assembled in Parkersburg. West Virginia reaffirm its allegiance to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. of which it is primarily a part, and assure the national officers of its loyalty and willingness to cooperate in all measures proposed by the National Society.

II. FUNDAMENTAL LAW.

WHEREAS, respect for law and law observance constitutes the cardinal principles essential to the perpetuity of the nation:

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, urge all patriotic citizens to familiarize themselves with the Constitution of the United States and to oppose all concerted action or proposed legislation that might violate its principles.

III. AFFIRMATION OF THE N. S. D. A. R. RESOLUTIONS OPPOSING IN-TERNATIONAL TRADE ORGANIZATION AND OPPOSING RATIFICATION OF THE INTERNATIONAL LABOR ORGANI-ZATION "FREEDOM TO ORGANIZE CONVENTION."

WHEREAS, the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, in the 58th Congress assembled passed resolutions opposing the International Trade Organization and the ratification of the International Labor Organization Freedom to Organize Convention." it is imperative that the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, affirm the stand of the National Society on the following resolutions:

Section A-Opposing International Trade Organization.

WHEREAS, our mass production industry which has been established and built to its present great efficiency is a keynote of our national defense and that of all nations opposed to dictatorship and slavery; and

WHEREAS, this mass production industry has been able to reach its present efficiency through freedom of labor to choose its jobs, freedom of management to produce needed products and to see free markets, freedom of inventive genius to create new products and new industries; and

WHEREAS. the provisions of the International Trade Organization would place complete control of investment, markets, prices, production and the creation of new industries in the hands of an International Central Council in which the United States would have but one vote of the combined votes of at least thirty-nine other nations; and

WHEREAS, the placing of such power over the lives, work, investment and genius of free Americans not only is contrary to the principles of our Constitutional Republic, but also would wreck our mass production industry and eventually our national defense:

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution. opposes participation of the United States of America in the International Trade Organization.

Section B—Opposing Ratification of the International Labor Organization "Freedom to Organize Convention."

WHEREAS, individual liberty is guaranteed every American worker under

the Bill of Rights of the Constitution and these guarantees assure every American worker the right to choose his own employment and working conditions; and

WHEREAS, such individual liberties are seriously threatened by the so-called "Freedom of Association and Protection of the Right to Organize Convention, 1948" adopted at the General Conference of the International Labor Organization, a subsidiary of the United Nations, held in San Francisco in June-July, 1948, which proposal would turn complete control of wages, hours and working conditions in all countries over to a central world committee in which the United States would have but one vote; and

WHEREAS, adoption of this proposal by the Congress of the United States would also give such a world committee, complete control over our national defense industries, through its control over workers in such industries;

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, in 44th Conference assembled, unalterably oppose ratification of this International Labor Organization proposal as detrimental to the freedom of American workers and to our national defense, and urges members to inform themselves of the dangers involved and to protest the ratification of this misleading proposal.

IV. LEGISLATIVE AMENDMENT.

WHEREAS, the International Trade Organization and International Labor Organization are detrimental to free enterprise in the United States and would limit the powers of individuals as granted by the Constitution:

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, in 44th Conference assembled wire Senators Harley M. Kilgore and Matthew M. Neely to vote to amend House Rule 1211 to include the restrictions enacted by the 80th Congress for the protection of the individual American citizen.

V. OPPOSITION TO WORLD GOVERNMENT.

WHEREAS, the acceptance of a World Government comprising all nations would mean the abolition of the sovereignty of our own country; be it therefore

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, go on record as opposing World Government and urge each member to inform herself and others of the great danger of any World Government movement.

VI. EXPOSING COMMUNISM AND UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES.

WHEREAS, the ideologies of Communism threaten to destroy our form of government by subtle infiltration into schools and colleges in the name of youth movements, and into other groups in the name of peace;

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution. as a means of national defense, call upon its entire membership to inform themselves of these grave menaces.

VII. FEDERAL CONTROL VERSUS STATE CONTROL.

RESOLVED. That the 44th West Virginia State Conference assembled, declare its opposition to any federal legislation which would tend toward further regimentation and centralization of the National Government, and reduction of States Rights.

VIII. NATURALIZATION.

WHEREAS, the standards set by our present naturalization laws are too low, especially in regard to requirements for reading and writing: RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, urge the enactment of more stringent laws for naturalization of those seeking American citizenship.

IX. AMERICAN HISTORY.

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, urge that TRUE American History be taught in the public schools of West Virginia.

X. PATRIOTIC MUSIC

WHEREAS, there is no West Virginia law requiring the teaching of patriotic songs in the public schools, and since it is the objective of the Chapter to create a wider interest in American music; be it

RESOLVED. That the 44th West Virginia State Conference, Daughters of the American Revolution, request that the State Legislature pass a law requiring that three stanzas of the Star Spangled Banner and four stanzas of America be included in the music program of the public schools in West Virginia.

XI. SOCIALIZED MEDICINE.

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, go on record as opposing any legislation in regard to Socialized Medicine or so-called compulsory health insurance.

XII. WEST VIRGINIA STATE PROJECT.

RESOLVED. That the Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia adopt annually as a state project, the awarding of two prizes of \$250.00 each to two West Virginia girls, this scholarship to be known as the "Eleanor Hamith Scholarship." Said money to be raised, administered and awarded as follows:

The money for these scholarships shall be raised by assessing each member of the West Virginia Society twenty cents annually. Each Chapter is to be responsible for collecting its quota and forwarding the amount to the State Treasurer.

Administration: A committee of five members, appointed by the State Regent, shall select the winners and award the scholarships. The chairman of this committee shall be the State Chairman of the Girl Homemakers, and the other four members shall be persons familiar with school records and college entrance requirements. This committee shall notify the principals of all schools eligible for receiving these awards, and request that interested girls of the senior class be requested to file application for consideration through him, or some designated teacher on the faculty.

Time: The award shall be made on or before June first of each year, and the money shall be deposited with the treasurer of the college, or colleges, which the recipients elect to attend in the coming fall.

Qualifications:

- 1. Each student must be a graduet of a first-class West Virginia high school and have attended at least two years in the State of West Virginia.
- 2. The girls must be outstanding students in Home Economics, and above average in scholarship.
- 3. The scholarships will be awarded only to students entering West Virginia State Colleges to become Home Economic teachers or Home Demostration Agents.
- 4. Other requirements may be set up by the committee awarding these scholarships.

XIII. COURTESY RESOLUTIONS.

WHEREAS, the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revo-

lution, desires to express thanks to all who contributed in any way to make the 44th Annual State Conference in Parkersburg. West Virginia. a successful one, be it

RESOLVED. That the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution. expresses its thanks to the management of the Chancellor Hotel for its hospitality and its many courtesies: to Miss Mary Lawson, and all hotel employees who served untiringly during the Conference; to Mrs. Chalmers B. Gibbens. Regent. and member of James Wood Chapter, who worked so faithfully to carry out the plans of the 44th State Conference; to our beloved State Regent, Mrs. Harry J. Smith, for her graciousness and fairness, as a presiding officer: for the inspiration given us by the presence of our national officers to the officers and member of other patriotic societies: to distinguished guests attending the State Conference: to the speakers and musicians: to the pages who gave untiringly of their time; to all members of every committee and others who worked to make the 44th annual State Conference at Parkersburg. We are happy to announce the organization of two new Chapters—and the formal acceptance by the National Board on Wednesday. The Jennie Wiley Chapter, at Kermit, with Miss Jessie Baker, organizing Regent, and first elected Regent. The Blennerhassett Chapter at Fort Neal, with Mrs. Herbert Snodgrass organizing Regent and first elected Regent. New growth is necessary to the welfare of any organization. We hope for one more new Chapter before the April Congress.

My deepest appreciation for your generous support for the past three years. I am very proud of the Historical work of our West Virginia Chapters.

To our splendid National Officers, our good West Virginia Regent, our Valley Forge Chairman, Mrs. Langston, our helpers,—I say, "Thank you sincerely" from my heart.

Letters and helps from our National Historian, beloved Mrs. Carwithen, Mrs. Langston, Our Valley Forge Chairman. Mrs. Harry Smith our State Regent, Mrs. Eagle, our Honorary State Historian and many others were my greatest inspiration. My work, though strenuous, is cheerfully submitted for my loved and honored N. S. D. A. R. I submit my report and only wish I had more time to give. Letters of instructions, a list of West Virginia's "Required Books" and a list of rare book shops were sent to all Chapter Librarians direct or through the Regent of each chapter. A questionnaire was also sent to all Chapter Librarians as a guide for each chapter.

Even though many letters have been written to book dealers specializing in old and out of print books and searches made through the press in a number of cities. we were able to locate and secure for our D. A. R. Library only four of the books on the "Required List."

Forty dollars of our State Library Fund was sent to the Librarian General to purchase books for the Library. From our Library Fund we also purchased the "Manoe-Denigs—A Family Chronicle."

Only twenty-three chapters have reported and we have many more than that.

It may be that some of the smaller chapters feel that the work they have done would avail nothing in competition-please do not get that feeling. Report what you have done, whether it be much or little. "Many a little makes a mickle" and everything that is done helps to swell the total. It may seem but a trifle to you but trifles make perfection and perfection is no trifle.

If the Chapter Librarians will fill out the questionnaire blanks sent to them by the State Librarian and return same to her on time, it will greatly simplify the work for us all and will curtail the length of the National and State reports, thus saving valuable time.

As time will not permit your Librarian to read each chapter's report, I am submitting a concise account of the work of all the chapters in the state but a full detailed report of the work of each chapter will be published in the State Proceedings.

43 chapters have elected Librarians. 23 chapters filed reports. 14 chapters reported meeting their State Library Assessment. 12 chapters maintain a D. A. R. Bookshelf in local libraries. Four of West Virginia's "Required Books" were sent to the D. A. R. Library. Four other books were sent to the National Library. 112 periodicals were placed in local libraries. Marriage Bonds of Bedford County, Virginia 1755-1850 were placed in the Parkersburg Public Library. Many D. A. R. magazines have been placed in High Schools and local libraries.

So. Daughters, another year's work has ended. You have done well and your State Librarian deeply appreciates your whole hearted cooperation and support. We have traveled together along the D. A. R. Library Trail for the past three years and the contacts made have ever been an inspiration for me. May I hope that the interest and the Library work will increase tenfold?

GENERAL REPORT

ADVANCEMENT OF AMERICAN MUSIC

It is with no little pride that I submit my third and final report. Your state chairman has striven to agitate the study of American Music, not only among the forty-two chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, but also throughout the public schools of West Virginia.

It has been my great pleasure to see a steady growth in the study and performance of American Music, especially in our urban centers. This is due, in part, to the facilities at their command—namely: orchestras, performers, and in many instances, men and women available to guide in the study and performance of American Music from its beginning to the present day.

Since Busord chapter has given the most extensive report for the year 1948-1949, it seems fitting to give special mention for this effort. Busord chapter has had one American composer on each program and one all American program. The chairman. Mrs. H. A. Lawrence has stressed constantly the study and performance of American music not only in Busord chapter, but in the Women's Club, of which she is chairman of music. The services of outstanding vocalists, string players, pianists, readers etc. have been wisely chosen.

Other chapters reporting satisfactory work are: Pack Horse Ford, Potomac Valley, Colonel Andrew Donally, Mound, Daniel Davisson, Elizabeth Ludington Hagan John Menear, and John Hart. Reports are missing from a few chapters in our large cities. It is believed that these chapters have maintained their high musical standard of previous years. A majority of our remaining chapters reports the singing of the Star Spangled Banner at each meeting and one American Music program through the year. One chapter reports that due to lack of time, the National Anthem is not sung.

It would be impossible for our members and the youth of America to cover the scope of American Music except in a cursory manner. Only one deeply interested in American Music can make such an exhaustive treatment. To me, the question is ever present—"What are we driving at in our program for the Advancement of American Music"? In most instances, our progress is negligible. Can we, as an organization, outline a wise and efficient program that at some later time may become a part of our state-wide music requirements? Will it be necessary to call in a group of experts to outline a minimum of American Music, always remembering that it must be accompanied by world music? Your state chairman believes that these questions are worthy of your serious consideration.

D. A. R. APPROVED SCHOOLS WEST VIRGINIA STATE REPORT

1948 - 1949

In submitting this, my final report as state chairman of the D. A. R. Approved Schools. I wish to take this opportunity of thanking West Virginia Daughters for their cooperation and interest in the schools program. It has been a privilege as well as a pleasure to serve under the competent leadership of our beloved state regent. Mrs. Harry J. Smith, and the new friendships formed during the administration will long be treasured.

West Virginia chapters did not contribute as much financial support during the past year as had been donated previously but the reduction in money gifts to the schools is doubtless due to the national building project. It is evident that the schools were not forgotten since the number of boxes containing clothing and supplies was considerably larger than formerly. The plan of chapters "adopting" schools for special consideration in addition to sending aid to Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee D. A. R. Schools met with the approval of twenty chapters and others have expressed intention of following the plan this year.

During the year money contributions to the schools total \$531.86, including a \$100.00 gift made by Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, national vice chairman of D. A. R. Approved Schools, to the Kate Duncan Smith D. A. R. School in memory of her father, the late Mr. Clanton Davis. Valuation of clothing, books and other supplies sent to the schools is listed at a high of \$3.526.00.

It may interest you to know that since beginning as state chairman of Approved

Schools. I have mailed more than 963 letters. 138 postcards in addition to miscellaneous communications about the work—postage has amounted to more than \$30.00, to say nothing of stationery, express charges and time involved. That will give you some idea of the effort being put forth to get aid from West Virginia chapters for the fourteen D. A. R. Approved Schools. Letters will be sent monthly this year to each chapter as they have been during the past two years—cooperation of the chapters is earnestly solicited.

I regret that it was impossible for me to accept all invitations to visit chapters during the past year but enjoyed being a guest of the Elizabeth Zane Chapter. Buckbannon, when an Approved Schools program was presented. I gave an informative talk to the John Minear Chapter, of which I am a member in regard to the Approved Schools work and also had the pleasure of speaking in behalf of the schools at the Central District meeting, held in May at Buckhannon, and at a meeting of the James Wood Chapter in Parkersburg.

CONSERVATION—W. VA N. S. D. A. R.

Report from March, 1949 to September, 1949

Reports from Chapters show an increase in the number of Chapter Chairmen for Conservation but the 100% which is the goal for this year has not been reached.

The plan for the Conservation program for 1949 and '50 has been sent to each Chapter in the State.

Seventeen Chapters reported to me before the National Congress the outline of their work is as follows:

Ann Royal Chapter—The preservation of an historic covered bridge and a contribution to National Tribute Grove \$5.00.

Barboursville—Cash for seed sent overseas \$2.00.

Borderland-Tribute Grove \$5.00. Red Cross \$5.00.

Buford—Tribute Grove \$80.00. Human Conservation \$75.00, total \$155.00. Personal services from chapter members were protection and feeding of wild life, planting shrubs and trees: Red Cross and Family Welfare service assistance at health clinics and teaching the Conservation pledge to youth organizations.

Captain James Allen—Tribute Grove \$10.00. Red Cross \$5.00. Cancer Fund \$5.00. Veteran patients at Pinecrest \$28.00. \$30.00 for expenses of a Girl Scout at a Conservation Camp. One chapter program was devoted to Conservation. Chapter members assisted "The Friends of the Land" in planning and selling tickets for a

Louis Bromfield lecture: the proceeds from lecture are to be used next year to send Boy Scouts to a Conservation Camp.

Col. John Evans Chapter—No cash contributions reported, but the chapter broadcast programs on fire prevention: a chapter member attended a Conference on Conservation at Jackson's Mill: programs were devoted to the work.

James Wood—Reported activities in clinics, day nurseries, Juvenile Delinquency: they were active in the Freedom Train program in Parkersburg and planted a Blue Spruce in commemoration of the event. They advocated the passage of the Means test and other legislation pertaining to sanitation in public eating places. This chapter did not report any cash expenditures for their work.

D. A. R. GOOD CITIZENSHIP PILGRIMAGE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1948-49

On September 25, 1948, letters were sent to the chapter chairmen of the Good
Citizenship Pilgrimage Committees stating the requirements of the contest. Nationally, all chairmen followed the same rules as to having the senior classes hold an election to elect the three girls they considered the best citizens of the senior class. They were selected on the qualities of

Dependability, which includes truthfulness, loyalty and punctuality,

Service, which includes cooperation, courtesy, consideration of others.

Leadership, which includes personality, self control, ability to assume responsibility.

Patriotism, which includes unselfish interest in family, school, community and nation.

From the three girls elected in each school, the high school faculty selected the number one good citizen from that school.

In West Virginia we asked the number one Good Citizen from each school to write a letter to a contemporary in Russia, or some country dominated by communistic influence, giving the reasons why she was glad to be an American Citizen.

The first paragraph of the letter was sent. It was as follows: Dear Ivan:

We, in the United States of America set aside a special day for giving thanks to God for His help to us through the past year. Our President designates a special day, which is usually the last Thursday in the month of November.

When Thanksgiving Day comes this year. I shall offer an especial prayer of thanksgiving for the privilege of being an American Citizen. The paragraphs which follow will tell you some of the reasons why.

(Finish the letter using not more than 4000 words.)

Dr. Carl M. Frazure. Dean of Political Science Department at West Virgini University judged the essays. His selections were Helen Kovacs, Gary High School first. She received a pin from the National Society, and a government bond with a maturity value of \$100.00. This was presented to her by the State Regent. Mrs. Harry J. Smith at the Southern District meeting in Welch during the month of May. The contest was sponsored in the Gary High School by the Colonel Andrew Donally chapter.

The girl whose essay ranked second was Kathryn Mollohan, of Charleston, sponsored by the John Young Chapter, Mrs. John E. Amos, chairman.

The third place went to Claudette Hefner, Burnsville High School, sponsored by the Trans-Allegheny chapter, Miss Ella Louise Maxwell, chairman.

The following chapters sponsored the contest in one or more schools, and awarded Good Citizenship Pilgrimage pins:

That is not quite half, and can hardly be called good results, but at least the results are better than in any previous years it has been my privilege to observe.

D. A. R. MANUAL FOR CITIZENSHIP

Your State Chairman attended the National Committee Meeting in Washington. D. C. this Spring, with Mrs. Roy Heywood. National Chairman of Manual for Citizenship presiding. The C street walk was selected as a New Building project for this Committee and a pledge made of \$500.00. To date West Virginia Chapter Chairmen have contributed \$15.00 toward this gift.

The National Society allows \$48,000.00 a year for our Committee and there were 270.145 Manuals distributed this past year—2.000 were sent to Polish Misplaced Persons in Germany. 550 Manuals were distributed in West Virginia.

The Colonel John Evans Chapter organized an Overseas Wives Club and aided several of its members in becoming citizens. Mrs. J. L. Tritchler and Mrs. W. P. Breakiron conducted a program for new citizens at a Naturalization Court ceremony and a number of teachers worked with the children of foreign parents on becoming a citizen. Mrs. F. J. Weiland is chairman for this Chapter.

Mrs. Charles B. Bourland. Chairman of Borderland Chapter, reported Manuals placed with persons studying to become citizens, with war brides, and the County Court. Each member of the Chapter was given a copy.

Kanawha Valley Chapter. Mrs. R. C. Boothe. Chairman, gave Manuals to an Adult Study Class of foreign born, to the Fruth School. Public Library. Federal Judge's office. Red Cross. Y. W. C. A., Y. M. C. A., Colored Veterans of War. Garnet High School. Tyler Mountain School. Catholic High School, Mercer School. Veterans of Foreign War office and the American Legion Department in the State House. A total of one-hundred four Manuals were distributed.

Mrs. K. C. Moore, James Wood Chapter, placed Manuals in the city schools, and gave them to persons interested in becoming citizens.

Mrs. Eloise Heintzelman, Major William Haymond Chapter, placed Manuals in sixteen languages, with the American Legion and in the Public Library. Manuals were placed in Public Schools and given to people wishing to become citizens. A speaker was obtained from the American Legion for a Chapter program, and arrangements were made to sponsor Naturalization Classes to be held in the Legion Home. Manuals were given to the Junior Department of the Fairmont Woman's Club to use in their study—Becoming Better Citizens. They were distributed to each member of the Chapter—Mrs. Heintzelman attended Naturalization Courts and the National Committee Meeting in Washington.

The Elizabeth Ludington Hagens Chapter. Mrs. D. W. Parsons. Chairman. supplied the office of the Clerk of the Court with Manuals in several languages, and placed them in each school in the county. They werd given to a young minister to aid in his work among the foreign born of various countries.

West Virginia was 100% in payment of four cents per capita per member.

D. A. R. MUSEUM

(Mrs. R. J.) Christine Bergen

October, 1949.

This, my final report, is a resume of my efforts during the past three years to improve the appearance of our West Virginia room, and the establishment of a permanent "W. Va. Museum Fund." Two cents per capita created the Museum Fund and following work has been accomplished.

Due to the construction of our new building, and the installation of a firealarm system in Memorial Continental Hall, the repairs to our room were delayed. However, the shell-back closet has been installed and the room is now in the process of being redecorated.

Upon the advice of Miss Hendricks. Period Interior Decorator, the remodeling of the closet on the South wall into book-shelves will not be undertaken at this time.

The hinges have been rebrassed and the brass door-knobs cleaned.

The hammered brass andirons have been sold to Mrs, James B. Vaughn. Castlewood. South Dakota, for the sum of \$50.00 f. o. b. Washington. An effort will be made to purchase other andirons that will be in keeping with the fire-place and rail. \$50.00 is being set aside for this purpose.

After consulting with three antique dealers, none of whom were interested in the purchase of the mahogany frame mirror, size 40 x 46 inches (not antique), it was sold to Mr. Luke Terry, Pikeside, W. Va. for the sum of \$20.00.

The policy of the National Museum Committee requires any state room wishing to display it's State Banner, must have a standard and pole of hardwood that conforms to certain specifications. In order to conform with this policy, a contract has been entered into with the Washington Woodworking Co. to make a mahogany standard and pole with mounted brass eagle, at a cost of \$57.50.

Wheeling Chapter presented "Flight to Erin" a book by Mr. Tom Sweeney, and the Ravenswood Chapter had a special program on "Our Museum."

The following contributions have been received:

GIRL HOME MAKERS

As State Chairman of Girl Home Makers, I submit the following report:

Twenty-eight chapters in the State now have Chairmen. Two chapters reported they had no Chairman and the Regents of the other chapters have not reported. This is such an important work that I urge the Regent of each chapter to appoint a chairman without delay.

Thirteen cotton dresses and four menus were submitted to me this spring. One dress in the Senior Group and one in the Junior Group were forwarded to Washington for display at the National Congress. The dresses did not receive prizes but awards of merit were sent to the Charleston girls who participated in the Menu Making Contest.

During the year the activities have been raising scholarship funds; contacting Home Economics teachers in the schools, urging their cooperation in the work of this committee. Also presenting cash prizes to the winners in local contests and entertaining with teas and luncheons.

In May I met in Huntington, with Mrs. Charles Walker of Charleston and Mrs. D. B. Kraybill of Huntington, to study the records of the girls for the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship, as submitted by the principals of the various High Schools. It was unanimously agreed to award the scholarship to Rhoda Mae Somerville of Clarksburg and Alice Pauline Woodrum of Charleston. Both girls are entering West Virginia University this fall to major in Home Economics. Two checks, each in the amount of \$250.00, have been sent to the University for their use.

The members of the State Scholarship Fund committee are Mrs. Fred Mole, Princeton: Mrs. Charles Walker. Charleston. Mrs. M. T. Sisler. Morgantown. Mrs. D. B. Kraybill. Huntington. and myself. I have received the full cooperation of each member and I wish to express my gratifude at this time.

JACKSON'S MILL

MADAM REGENT, HONORED GUESTS AND LOYAL MEMBERS OF D. A. R.:

Just a short report on Luncheon at Jackson's Mill in July, Kanawha Valley, of Charleston, served as Hostess—proving that far-away Chapters could do so. It

was, as usual, a lovely affair—about 200 guests from several states. Col. John Evans Chapter, of Morgantown, will serve in 1950.

This is not an official occasion. Each Hostess Chapter is in full charge.

Time is very precious there, so no speeches are given, time being spent inspecting buildings: meeting old, and making new friends.

Our Eleanor Smith Scholarship girl was there as a 4-H'er and we were vrey proud of her. She is now in West Virginia University.

Mrs. Robert Brown plans to have State C. A. R.'s at Jackson's Mill in 1951.

Miss Tapp. Secretary, has compiled, in her minutes of Luncheons over the years a complete history of our activities at Jackson's Mill.

I will place my full report on file. It will be printed in Conference Report.

State Chairman Jackson's Mill Report:

First meeting was held at Jackson's Mill in 1931 and continued through to present, excepting war years, each July. Purpose, to create and maintain an interest in West Virginia youth, and affairs at Jackson's Mill.

After much thought, the movement was started for West Virginia D. A. R.'s to sponsor a Memorial Outdoor Theater. This was presented to State Conference in Parkersburg. 1937. Mrs. French Regent. The motion was unanimously passed, and more than Nine Hundred Dollars subscribed in a few minutes.

Mrs. French appointed Mrs. H. K. Owens, as State Chairman, Jackson's Mill Outdoor Theater, and Committee composed of Mrs. Waitman Conaway, Mrs. George DeBolt, Mrs. Earl Jackson, Mrs. Mary B. Newcomb, Mrs. Robt, J. Reed, who all gave splendid service. Funds at first raised by voluntary contributions from time to time. Later a per capita of five cents per member from State funds, until this was no longer necessary.

At conference in Fairmont, Mrs. Robert J. Reed created our slogan "A Doll. A Daughter." All Chapters in State gave to this fund. Sixteen paid their fu amounts; others as they were able. Wheeling Chapter was first to pay in full Some overpaid, which helped the smaller chapters.

This Theater was started in 1937, and in 1940 was duly dedicated to the "Memory of Our Ancestors, and for use of West Virginia Youth", at a ceremony following the State Conference at Morgantown, Mrs. French presiding. Mrs Becker. President General. National Society, making the principal address. There were many notables present, including Governor Holt and Ex-Governor Kump.

Later Mrs. French reported this work to the National Society as West Virginia D. A. R.'s gift to the Golden Jubilee.

In three years it had been made ready for use, and paid for to that date. When the war stopped our meetings, we kept our Committee together and added to our funds gradually. Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars was given, to be used for lighting, in honor of Mrs. French. The lights have been delayed on account of lack of material and workmen. They are now installed and paid for. Entire cost of same to 1943: D. A. R.'s \$3.524—W. P. A. \$3.890—Total to that date \$7.414. Cost of lights installation \$560.76, which will cover it. Total to date \$7,974.76.

The following is a letter, relative to the above, from Mr. C. H. Hartley:

"State 4-H Camp. Weston, W. Va., October 10, 1949.

Mrs. H. K. Owens. Elkins. W. Va. Dear Mrs. Owens:

We have the general lighting of the Outdoor Theater completed. I think we

have spent a little too much money, but we will arrange to take care of the excess. I believe you told us some time ago you had \$560.00 in the lighting fund. The total cost of the lighting is going to be slightly over \$700.00. If you will send the money you have available we will then pay the bills and work out plans to take care of the excess. From time to time we will add stage lighting as the occasion demands.

One of the outstanding meetings of recent years was held here the last week in September, the Thirtieth Anniversary of the West Virginia All Stars. The pageant was presented in the Outdoor Theater on Saturday night. October 1.

We certainly appreciate the fine cooperation on the part of your organization.

Total membership in clubs. 2942, showing an increase since last September of 846.

Your Chairman has distributed Handbooks, pins and Study Guides to these clubs and various interested persons.

After an interview last November with the State Superintendent of Schools, Mr. W. W. Trent, he sent a hand-book to each County Superintendent and asked him to pass it on to his teachers and encourage them to organize J. A. C. Clubs.

As Chairman I have made three radio talks: Visited 10 schools and spoken before six Chapters on J. A. C. work.

John Chapman Chapter of Bluefield, under the capable leadership of Mrs. William Crouch. Chapter Chairman, has accomplished much this year in J. A. C. work. She reports fifty clubs organized, 1500 members, in both colored and white schools. Seven Thatcher Award pins were presented last spring. Forty Eight flags were bought by the Chapter to be used on teacher's desks.

Mrs. Harley Griffith. Chairman of J. A. C. in William Henshaw Chapter sends a comprehensive, detailed report of the fine work they have done. Three clubs reported in Berkeley County with 94 members.

Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter, Point Pleasant, Mrs. Oblinger Chairman, has done splendid work and reported eleven clubs with 349 members.

Matthew French Chapter in Princeton reported 6 clubs with a total of 204 members. Knob Street school has had many interesting projects through the J. A. C. Clubs.

Princess Aracoma Chapter, Logan, which has done such outstanding work in Junior American Citizens Clubs in the past, has not sent a report but I am sure they are not dropping this wonderful work, as I am sure there is much J. MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

MOTION PICTURE COMMITTEE

I feel there has been increased interest in the Motion Picture Committee in the past year. More chapters have named Chairmen, and more questions and requests for information have been received by your Chairman. We have also increased the number of subscriptions to the Motion Picture Guide, which is one of the projects that our National Chairman stresses. At present we have about fifteen Guides being sent to our schools and libraries. Many more of these Guides should be available for the use of our youth and their elders as well.

Parents and Parent Teacher Associations are generally much interested in the type of pictures our children see, and in many instances try to cooperate with theater managers in having them secure good family pictures. Some theater managers have Saturday morning matinees for the children at least once each month.

Most of our schools use audio-visual education which is the modern way of teaching, and in several of our schools the better pictures shown in local theaters are brought up for discussion in the classroom.

We still have many undesirable pictures being shown to our children, so we must put forth our efforts; to eliminate as many of these as possible.

Elizabeth Ludington Hagan Chapter reports giving manual printed in 16 languages to the foreign folk of their community.

In August, letters to 42 chapter chairmen were written by the State Chairman and mimeographed through the kindness of Mrs. Gladys Zinn and one of her secretaries. Jane Kanick. Accompanying these letters was literature to be used on Constitution Day. These letters outlined the plans of the National Committee with a detailed program to January 1st. 1949, when another letter was sent. Resolutions passed by the 57th Continental Congress were stressed, especially the one known as the Anti-Red Resolution, which is as follows:

"The safety of the United States is now gravely threatened by the aggressive presence of an ideology completely contrary to the principles of freedom under law, private enterprise, and social justice upon which this nation was founded", the Anti-Red resolution presented to the fifty-seventh Continental Congress of the D. A. R. asserted.

"Resolved, that the National Society. Daughters of the American Revolution, call upon its entire membership to adopt the policy of informing themselves intelligently on the theory and manner of this threatening intrusion, and dedicate themselves, not casually but earnestly, to the business of recognizing and exposing Communism wherever it is steking to entrench itself or has already done so."

During the State Convention in Fairmont. October 14-15-16, at the National Defense Luncheon. Miss Nielson enthralled her listeners with the most inspiringly patriotic address. Her audience numbered hundreds. Many guests at the hotel—business men—listening at doorway to foyer.

The State Chairman was active in securing literature which was found on the table in the hall. Most of these were informative facts broadcast by Henry J. Taylor over Mutual—added to display sent by National Defense Committee.

To every chapter chairman the Committee for Constitutional Government sent a pamphlet by Ralph D. Grain, member of Congress, on "The Implications of Federal Aid to and Control of Education." It needs to be studied.

The trend of the times is toward Socialism—which is kin to Communism—and it behooves us to watch and fight to keep our way of living the American Way.

The State Chairman was in touch with the powers that were trying to prevent the issuing of a visa to the "Red Dean" of Canterbury, who wanted to tour our country with subversive speeches.

Replying to my letter. David Lawrence. Editor of WORLD REPORT and U. S. NEWS. says:

"Rather than deny the 'Red Dean' his right to be heard, let us make our own argument for democracy and against Communism more convincing than his."

Special mention should be made of the work done in the schools preparatory to the coming of the Freedom Train to our State.

James Barbour Chairman reports, viz.:

- (1) Exhibit of "Keep Alive the Spirit of America."
- (2) Talks on our American Heritage in grade and high schools, Kiwanis Club, and our County Hisorical Society.
- (3) Held forum with Woman's Club on Communism and Federal Aid to Schools.
- (4) Forum with doctors on Socialized Medicine.

Col. John Evans Chairman reports purchasing from National Defense Committee literature and later displayed reproductions of famous documents to be seen on the Freedom Train in Whiteside's Store in Morgantown.

The chairman of Maj. Wm. Haymond Chapter joined with the chairman of Col. Morgan Morgan Chapter in promoting an extensive campaign of interest in the Junior and Senior High Schools of Fairmont. The literature was purchased by the D. A. R. Chapters—and also a display which was placed in the City Library. News stories were given to the papers regarding the Freedom Train's arrival.

In Wheeling—where the Freedom Train arrived September 14—a window was decorated by the Wheeling Chapter. D. A. R. It depicted by small banners the outgrowth of the Nation's Flag from colonial times to the present date.

Buford Chapter reported 10.300 visited Freedom Train in Huntington—attracted by D. A. R. literature, displayed and published. Films, "Sea Power for Peace" and "Atom Bomb Experiments," shown by U. S. Navy Reserve.

John Chapman reports the greatest number visiting Freedom Train while in its city. Bluefield.

Col. Chas. Lewis Chapter reported all addresses given at every meeting being for National Defense—Mrs. Payne being their speaker on two occasions. One of their High School girls represented West Virginia in Washington as a Pilgrim. Round Table discussion by Regent at Woman's Club—7 High School girls participated, 100 present.

West Augusta Chapter sponsored two girls to Girl's State Camp. Jackson's Mill.

Shenandoah Valley Chapter is studying the Taft-Hartley Bill and discussing it in meetings.

Trans-Allegheny Chapter Chairman writts, "We answer roll call with current events and excerpts from National Defense news." Also, "We held an open forum on Communism versus Americanism." She writes they are a small chapter, but from this report I glean they are active in enlightening the public on condition of affairs in our United States.

The chairman of Col. John Evans Chapter is active in aiding new citizens working on their citizenship papers. Two have become citizens that were overseas wives of American "G. I's".

Chairman of South Branch Valley Chapter reports working with Youth Organizations in giving a definite program of Americanization.

Mound Chapter reports three elementary schools took part in a very spirited and competitive study of the Constitution of America. Reward of winner—D. A. R. medal.

James Wood Chapter stressed especially Resolutions passed at last Congress. Aided in successful visit of Freedom Train. Worked with International Relations Study Groups—conducting six programs on World Problems.

Elizabeth Zane reports "During Educational Week. November 14, the Chapter showed the film "Learning Democracy through School and Community Projects' to a joint meeting of the two P. T. A. town organizations. Later two rural schools also used the picture. One community organized a citizenship club as a result. One high school teacher used the picture in her Civic Class of Seniors. About 800 persons saw the various presentations."

On January 8th the State Chairman had the honor of addressing James Woo Chapter in joint meeting with the Marietta Chapter in the Chancellor Hotel. Park creburg. W. V.a. Her topic was. "Events in a Whirling World." using the literatur sent by National Committee in detail, George Sokolsky's "The Crux." Economic Council Letters 200 and 202-204.

At the January meeting of Wheeling Chapter, D. A. R., she again spoke on the L, L. O. and its pending treaty.

Interest at both these meetings were aroused against the Socialized Medicine Bill and that of Federal Aid for Schools.

An interview with the Executive Secretary. National Defense Committee in Washington at Continental Congress, brought forth the stressing this year of the fight against World Government being advanced by American Intelligensia. Already 23 State Legislatures have approved it. When 36 states have done so. Congress will bring it before people to vote upon. Our D. A. R. needs to propogandize for World Organization, else we will be "sold down the river" as Mrs. Brosseau writes. Write your State Senator and Representative to vote NO to World Government Resolution.

In May and June your State Defense Chairman attended divisional meeting in Buckhannon and Moundsville, and spoke for National Defense.

One Chapter Chairman writes. "It is now time that every member of the Daughters of the American Revolution be Nationally Defense minded," and I heartily agree with her.

After Washington had surveyed the land, he named it Round Bottom, a name it still bears. In Miss Shaw's bit of history of this section, she said that the Indians had inhabited this section for over one thousand years. Mrs. J. H. Essington, Mound Chapter, followed Miss Shaw with a brief history of the Mound below this historical property. Mrs. Essington gave the high-lights of the scientific opening of the Mound at Natrium which was supervised by an archaeologist from the Smithsonian Institution.

Mrs. Edward S. Phillips. Vice-Regent of Wheeling Chapter gave quite a complete report of the Continental Congress of the Daughters of the American Revolution held in Washington last April.

Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe. National Chairman of the Building Promotion Committee, in her talk asked that attention and good will be given to the organ project at Jackson's Mill. She stated that only one half of the money for the building fund has been raised and that money given to the Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution is a real contribution to our American Government. Mrs. Carpenter asked to hear a motion for the support of the Organ at Jackson's Mill. Mrs. Paul O. Reymann. Wheeling Chapter, made a motion to endorse the movement, and it was seconded by Mrs. Grace Stone Hetzell. Wheeling Chapter.

The meeting recessed at 12:30 P. M. for luncheon which was held on the Sun Deck of the Club House.

At two P. M. the meeting was called to order, and Mrs. Daniel Snyder, State Librarian, read a brief history of the National D. A. R. Library in which we heard that the library is one of the most extensive on the subjects of History and Genealogy in the United States.

Mrs. Carpenter. at this time appointed Miss Gladys Zinn, Wheeling Chapter. Mrs. F. W. Dickerson, Mound Chapter: Mrs. H. H. Stoops, Ann Royal Chapter for the Nominating Committee.

A short talk was given by Mrs. M. L. O'Neale, State Registrar. Mrs. O'Neale urged the Chapters to keep their Registrars as long as they would serve.

Mrs. Frank Harkleroad. State Historian, asked for old deeds and historical records. She also made an appeal for Valley Forge Bell Tower, and at this time Mrs. Holcombe presented a check for Mrs. Harkleroad in memory of the late Mrs. Robert Reed of Wheeling.

Miss Nellie Wood, of the Phoebe Bayard Chapter, Greensburg, Pennsylvania was introduced before Mrs. Carpenter read greetings from Mrs. Sister, Mrs. Edgar Williams, Miss Mary Katherine Barnes, Mrs. H. K. Owens and the First Vice President General, Mrs. James B. Patton.

The report of the Nominating Committee was heard, and the following officers for the 1950 meetings of West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution were duly elected:

Madam Regent:

Much of the report which follows was done under the direction of our immediate past regent. Mrs. Audra Gall Lambert, and the credit for which we, as a chapter, consider a most interesting and successful organization year, is due to her leadership. At our September, 1948, meeting we decided to try to have more interesting programs centered around DAR projects, and to increase our efforts to bring our organization ideals to our community. Mrs. Lambert appointed a program committee, the members of which made a sincere effort to carry out the proposals of the chapter. Meetings were divided into program and business meetings in order to allow more time for better programs and we have found this most satisfactory. Only emergency business is conducted at a program meeting. At the same time a budget committee was named which, in session, considered our dues, contributions, and chapter expenses and, our annual assessment was based on their proposal. This has been another innovation which has been successful, especially in the share that out-of-town members now bear in all chapter expense. We have also instituted the use of an advance notice of dues due on our own printed form. As a result all dues were received well in advance of the dead-line. We have met all national and state assessments.

International Relations: Our November meeting was a dinner with four members as hostesses and our guest speaker was Dr. Cora Lenox. of Philippi, a member of the staff of the Myers Clinic Hospital, and who, with her husband, Dr. John Lenox, were for twelve years medical missionaries in China. Her talk on "Women of China" brought a real insight into one phase of our foreign relations.

Approved Schools: A long established custom in our chapter has been a turkey dinner at our December meeting. This year, instead of the usual gift exchange among members, we had a gift shower for Crossnore, which we had adopted as our approved

school project. At the same time members brought used clothing which was also sent to the school. A gift of \$10 was made by the chapter, the shower gifts were valued at \$22.35, the Christmas clothing at \$105, and a box of clothing sent later by two members, at \$30, making a total for our "adopted" school of \$167.35. Our March meeting was in the charge of our approved schools chairman and the work and needs of the different schools was presented to the chapter. We will retain Crossnore as our "adoption" for another year.

National Defense: In March our chapter sponsored an open county-wide forum for the discussion of socialized medicine. The meeting was conducted in our City Hall and Bretsel Harris, county superintendent of schools, served as moderator. The panel was led by Dr. Hu C. Myers, chief of the staff of the Myers Clinic hospital at Philippi, and serving on the panel were Mrs. Dilworth, our national defense chairman: Dr. Frank Murphy, of Philippi, and Dr. Thomas L. Woodford and Dr. E. M. Hamilton, general practitioners: Neil W. Davis, commander of the local American Legion Post: and Dr. Dale B. Casto, of Belington, dentist. We were unable to secure a panel member who favored the subject. However, the problem dissolved itself when several adherents of the program attended the meeting and, supported the proposed legislation.

Also a part of our national defense work was the presentation of medals for proficiency in history to a student in Belington high school, and to one in Kasson high school.

A local project, which we have assigned to the National Defense, is our annual service of marking graves at the Belington Fraternal cemetery on May 30. Our service this year was the 20th to be held. Memorials, in the form of baskets of garden flowers, are placed on the graves of chapter members and of veterans of the Civil War, World War I, and World War II. The Rev. Norman A. Seese, pastor of the Church of the Brethren of Junior, was the speaker, and the chapter ritual was read by the regent and chaplain. Assisting in the service were members of the Belington high school band: American Legion Post, No. 96, with their firing squad and color guard; Laurel Mountain Post No. 410, Veterans of Foreign Wars: the auxiliaries of the Legion and VFW; the local Boy Scout troop; and the Belington Volunteer firemen, who handled traffic.

Advancement of American Music: Mrs Jessie Ferrell Thompson, a past state chairman and a member of our chapter, was in charge of the program for the April meeting and she gave an interesting account of the stories of many of our early American songs and of the authors and composers.

Good Citizenship: An agreement has been made by our chapter and the John Minear Chapter of Philippi whereby each chapter presents good citizenship medals for the three county high schools on alternate years. This year the presentation was made by the John Minear Chapter while the 1950 awards will be made by our chapter.

Marine Library: At our March meeting a book shower was held for this project and we sent more than fifty books to the center.

Building Fund: A contribution of \$25 was made from chapter funds and at September meeting the chapter pledged to raise \$6 for each member.

Marine Hospital: A chapter contribution of \$5

Ellis Island: A chapter contribution of \$3.

Membership: Two new members have been added during the year; one application will be presented at the National board meeting this month: and work is being done on three applications which we hope can be reported as members in the March report. We have lost one member by death.

Press Relations: Full accounts of our meetings and other chapter activities have appeared in the Clarksburg Telegram, the Clarksburg Exponent, the Barbour Democrat, the Philippi Republican, and occasionally in the Elkins Inter-Mountain.

Children of the American Revolution: Some work has been done toward the

organization of a group in this county and about a dozen children are ready to join as soon as the papers can be made up. All will go in on established DAR lines. A pre-organization meeting was held last year at which Tommy Carnes was elected temporary chairman and Miss Barbara Carlin named, secretary. The name "Barker's Settlement Chapter" was selected. Members would be sponsored by the two county chapters, later to be divided into two chapters when membership justifies the division. The writer was organizing officer but some serious eye trouble which has limited her activities prevented further development. We have a new chairman who will be recommended for organizing officer, and as she is a teacher and has been active in young peoples' work in the church and in 4-H Club work it is hoped that the project can be continued and become an active chapter.

Other chapter activities during the year included contributions of \$2.50 each to the American Red Cross and the Tuberculosis and Health association drives, and \$5 to the Cancer Control Fund. At the January meeting Miss Virginia Brandon, high school history teacher, and the present regent, gave a joint review of Hollister Noble's novel. "Woman With A Sword." Several members attended the district meeting at Buckhannon and the state luncheon at Jackson's Mill. In August the chapter served as hostesses for a joint picnic with the John Hart Chapter, of Elkins, and the John Minear Chapter at the Belington City Park.

May I add that, in view of the increased interest in our organization during the past year, on both the part of the members and of the public, that we believe that the careful planning of program pays large dividends. Our members have a renewed interest, chapter attendance is better, and the public has learned that we are not just a social organization.

We have had ten regular meetings of the chapter and twelve meetings of the Executive Board.

In May, eight of our members attended the Southern District Regional meeting held in Welch. We have met all of our national and local financial obligations. We have contributed to the Bell Tower and other special funds through the sale of cards, cook books and plates.

Locally, we have contributed to the Community Christmas Tree fund, the Red Cross, and the Community Chest. We furnished and decorated a living room in the Union Mission's new home. We maintain this room, also. Funds were raised for this project from a concession for selling sandwiches and drinks to the crowds visiting the Freedom Train. Contributions are used for maintenance. We maintain, by contributions, the juvenile detention room in the local jail. This room was furnished by John Chapman Chapter.

Three Good Citizenship Medals were awarded in our Junior High Schools, and one high school girl was honoted by our Good Citizenship Pilgrimage award. In the high school as well as in Bluefield College, the best student in American History received a medal from our Chapter.

Through election new officers have replaced those of last year, and it is with a feeling of gratitude that we assume the full responsibility of our respective jobs. We are grateful for the fine work already done and for the opportunity to carry on the many projects of our National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

BY-LAWS

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE CONFERENCE OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised at Charleston, November, 1920

Amended at Clarksburg, 1922

Amended at Martinsburg, October 15, 1931

Amended at Charleston, October 9, 1942

ARICLE I - Name

The name of this organization shall be the West Virginia State Conference of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II - Object

The purpose of the State Conference shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE III - Membership

All Chapters in the State of West Virginia that fulfill the requirements of the National Society are members of the State Conference.

ARTICLE IV - Officers

- Section 1. The officers of the State Conference shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Historian, a State Registrar, and a State Librarian. These officers, with the exception of the State Corresponding Secretary, shall be elected by ballot at the regular meeting of the State Conference every third year. The corresponding secretary shall be appointed by the State Regent elect for a like term. The officers of this Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected and shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office for two successive years.
- Section 2. A nominating committee of five members to be elected by the State Conference one year in advance of the election of officers, shall present a ticket bearing the names of candidates who have consented to serve if elected. Following the report of the committee, nominations may be made from the floor.
- Section 3. No two elected officers shall be members of the same Chapter and no member shall be eligible to the same office for more than one term. The term of office of the officers shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent, and the State Vice Regent is confirmed. A member having served a half term or more in an office of the State Conference shall be deemed to have served a term.
- Section 4. In case of a vacancy occurring in the office of State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall fill the office of State Regent until confirmed by the National Board of Management. A vacancy occurring in any other office shall be filled by the State Executive Committee until the next annual meeting of the Society.
- Section 5. Honorary Officers may be elected for life at the Annual Meeting by a three-fourths vote, which vote shall be taken by ballot unless by) unanimous consent the ballot is dispensed with. No member shall be eligible to an honorary office who has not filled the State office of corresponding name.

ARTICLE V - Duties of Officers.

- Section 1. It shall be the duty of the State Regent to preside at all State Meetings; the State Board of Management, and to perform all other duties appertaining to the office. She shall appoint such standing and special committee as are authorized by the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee. She shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.
- Section 2. It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference and of the Board of Management.
- Section 3. It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to keep a correct record of all meetings of the State Conference and of the Board of Management.
- Section 4. It shall be the duty of the State Corresponding Secretary to send out the notices of meetings of the State Conference and the State Board of Management, and to conduct such correspondence as the State Conference or the State Board of Management may direct.
- Section 5. It shall be the duty of the State Treasurer to collect and receive all money due the State Conference and deposit same in a bank approved by the State Board of Management and all orders upon the Treasurer for the disbursement of funds shall be signed by the State Regent. The State Treasurer's accounts shall be audited previous to each Annual Meeting, and at the conclusion of her term' of office by a certified public accountant. The State Treasurer shall submit for distribution at the annual meeting a printed report of receipts and disbursements for the year just concluded.
- Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep a typewritten record book of all historical and commemorative meetings of the Society and of its work in the State. She shall keep a reference history of all State Officers, who serve during her term. These records shall be turned over to her successor upon election.

- Section 7. It shall be the duty of the State Chaplain to open all meetings of the State Conference with reading of the Scripture and prayer and to conduct such further religious service as occasion may require.
- Section 8. It shall be the duty of the State Registrar to assist applicants for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, to prove eligibility claims in towns where there are no Chapters, and to give desired assistance to Chapter Registrars in vertifying lineage papers. She shall keep up-to-date the card index as furnished to her by the Chapter Registrars.
- Section 9. It shall be the duty of the State Librarian to endeavor to collect such books and papers as would be of historical value to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.
- Section 10. Each officer shall make an annual typewritten report to the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI - Meetings.

- Section I. An Annual meeting of the State Conference shall be held in October during the week including the day of October tenth,* unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board of Management. The exact date for this meeting shall be left to the discretion of the State Regent. The place of the meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Management unless previously named by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of officers, of the State Board of Management, and of committees: for the election of officers and for any other business that may occur.
- Section 2. The West Virginia State Conference shall hold a business and social meeting during the week when the Continental Congress of the National Society is in session, the time and place for the meeting to be determined by the State Regent and the State Vice Regent.
- Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the State Board of Management, or upon the written request of five chapters.
- Section 4. Each Chapter in the State Conference shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall be the Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.
- Section 5. The voting members of the State Conference shall be its Officers, the Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the Vice Regent or the Regent's representative, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at Coninental Congress.
- *This week is chosen in remembrance of the battle of Point Pleasant, which occurred on October tenth. 1774.
- Section 6. Twenty-one (21) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII - Dues

- Section 1. The annual dues of each Chapter in the State Conference shall be twenty-five cents a member, based upon the number of members reported to the Treasurer General by the Chapter Treasurer as being in good standing. The dues are payable on or before January first.
- Section 2. Each Chapter in the State Conference shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 30.1 the sum of one dollar for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference. This amount is to be used toward defraying the expense incurred at the State Conference. No Chapter whose State and Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

Section 3. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent for her use in the interests of the State work.

Section 4. The annual contingent fund of ten cents per member shall be used by the State Regent as necessity or advisability demands.

ARTICLE VIII - State Board of Management

Section 1. The officers of the State Conference shall constitute the State Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall meet at the call of the State Regent. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent upon the written request of five members of the Board. At least five days' notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given all members of the Board.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Conference during the interim between its meetings except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board is authorized to appoint from its own body two members who together with the State Regent shall constitute the Executive Committee. The Board may authorize this committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem expedient. The Board of Management shall make an annual report to the State Conference.

ARTICLE IX — Committees

Before the close of each State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following Standing Committees, each to consist of not less than three members:

Committee on Budget Committee on Printing Proceedings Committee on Resolutions

She shall appoint such other committees as are authorized by the State Conference the State Board of Management, or the Executive Committee. The chairmen of all committees shall report to the State Conference.

PROPOSED ADDITIONS TO STATE BY-LAWE

ARTICLE X - Chapters

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Conference shall elect officers at the time of, or previous to, the May meeting of said Chapters.

Section 2. The Regent of each Chapter shall make a report of the work of her Chapter for the year ending March first.

This report must be typewritten in triplicate: one copy sent to the State Regent no later than March tenth: one copy to the Recording Secretary, and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the work of her Chapter from October first to October first to be printed in the State Proceedings. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words. One copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference: one copy to the State Regent, and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

ARTICLE XI -Districts

Section 1. The arrangements of Districts shall be left to the State Executive Board, and are subject to change by the Executive Board.

- Section 2. Districts shall elect a Director and such other officers as may be necessary, at the time of their annual meeting, and shall have Standing Rules governing other activities.
- Section 3. District meetings shall be held for the purpose of presentation of the work of the National Society and of the State Society by the State Officers and State Chairmen and for the discussion of the projects and problems of the Chapter Regents. Also to encourage the organization of Chapters in every County and to create greater interest in the work of the organization.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of District Directors to hold at least one meeting annually.

District Directors shall send the minutes to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary immediately following their District meeting. These minutes shall be printed in the State Proceedings.

ARTICLE XII - Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this organization in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with these By-Laws.

ARTICLE XIII - Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual Meeting of the State Conference provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all Chapters in the State Conference at least thirty days, and no more than sixty days, before the meeting; and provided further the amendment has been proposed by the State Board of Management or by a Chapter of the State Conference, or by a committee authorized by the State Conference.
