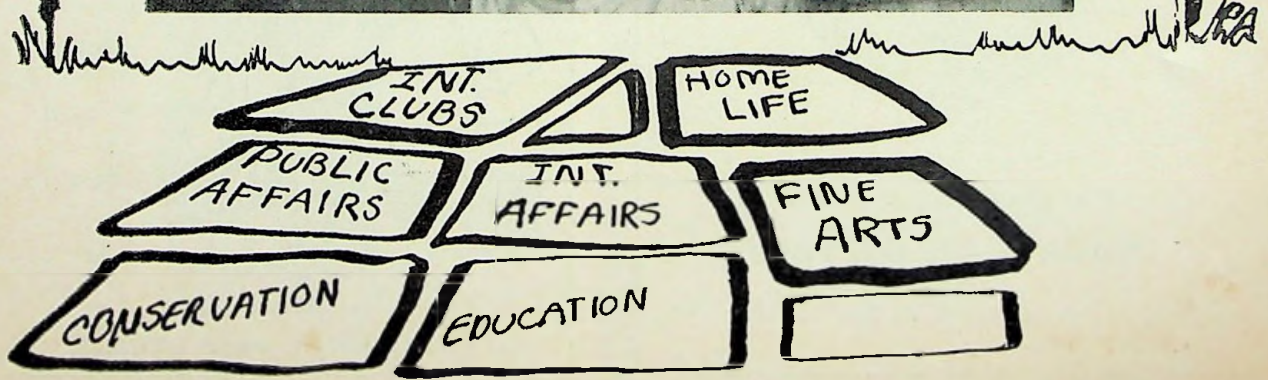
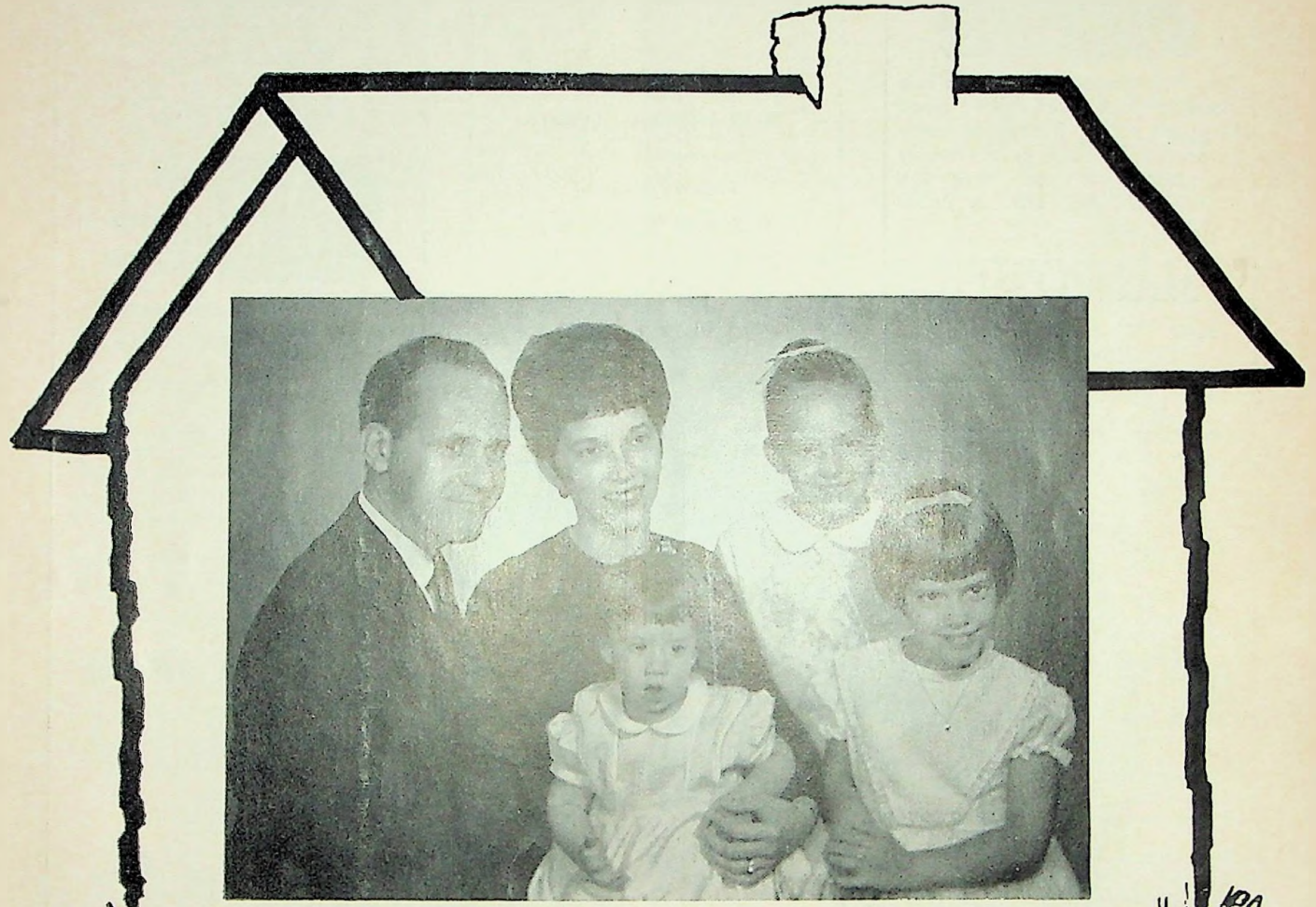

A New Year!

When the bells rang out at midnight proclaiming the end of 1966 and the beginning of 1967 we may have had a feeling of sadness that time had taken another year; a year in which we had not done all the things we wanted to do; a year of some heart aches and problems; yet a year of joys and memories we shall always cherish. "Time waits for no man" so 1967 is with us.

A new year is always good. We have been given another chance, a clean slate, a legacy. Rachel Van Creme has written:

A new year is a magic chest,
Untold wealth is in it:
A golden chain of precious hours —
Every link a minute.
Tears and laughter, sadness, song—
Jeweled gems that lend
Richness to the legacy . . .
Ours to keep or spend.
A new year is a magic chest;
The gift of time is in it.
So guard it well, and do not lose
One precious, golden minute.

According to Roman mythology, Janus was the god of gates and doors, god

of all beginnings, and represented with two faces, one looking forward and the other backward. From him, the month of January was named. It is the time to glance backward over the activities of the past year in Women's Club work as we look forward with hope to beginning again.

It is good to salute the Juniors in this month of beginning again. Their good works will always be an inspiration and joy to us. May this new year bring only happiness and fulfillment to them.

I should like especially, to give each of you the following recipe:

Take twelve fine full months—see that they are thoroughly free from all old memories of bitterness, rancor, hate and jealousy. Cleanse them completely from clinging spite; pick off all specks of pettiness and littleness; in short, see that these months are freed from all the past, and have them as fresh and clean as when they first came from the great storehouse of Time. Divide each of these months into 30 or 31 equal parts—each one except the second, divide that into

Into each day put twelve parts of FAITH, eleven of PATIENCE, ten of COURAGE, nine of WORK (some omit this ingredient and so spoil the flavor of the rest), eight of HOPE, seven of LOYALTY, six of LIBERALITY, five of KINDNESS, four of REST (leaving this out is like leaving the oil out of the salad—don't do it), three of PRAYER, two of MEDITATION, and one well-selected resolution. To this add a dash of fun, a sprinkle of play, and a heaping cupful of good humor. Pour into the whole mixture love ad libitum, and mix with a vim. Cook thoroughly with fervent heat, garnish with smiles and a sprig of joy, then serve with QUIETNESS, UNSELFISHNESS, and CHEERFULNESS, and A HAPPY NEW YEAR is a certainty.

A club is friendliness to the foreign-born resident, and making new friends in the next block.

A club is meetings, minutes, and moments of madness brought on by those reams of reports at the end of the year, and it's the suspense, disappointment—sometimes a whirl of excitement as we listen for our club's name in the list of awards at convention.

A club is telling stories to a group of bright-eyed youngsters on a Saturday morning at the public library, and collecting a ton of good used books for the State Mental Hospital.

A club is knowing that you have given fifty children in Mexico a school so they may have the opportunity of an education.

A club is individual growth, in leadership, civic responsibility, and even more important—fellowship.

It is being such a good member of the group that one's daughter will ask, with envy, "Say, how old do you have to be to join the Jr. Woman's Club?" And the youngest one will add wistfully, "Gee, you have all the fun-getting to go to Convention."

But more than any of these things, it is the awed and proud look on a husband's face when someone stops him on the street and tells him how well you represented the JWC at the Town Meeting last night, or when your picture appears in the local newspaper presenting a large check to the Mayor for a swimming pool.

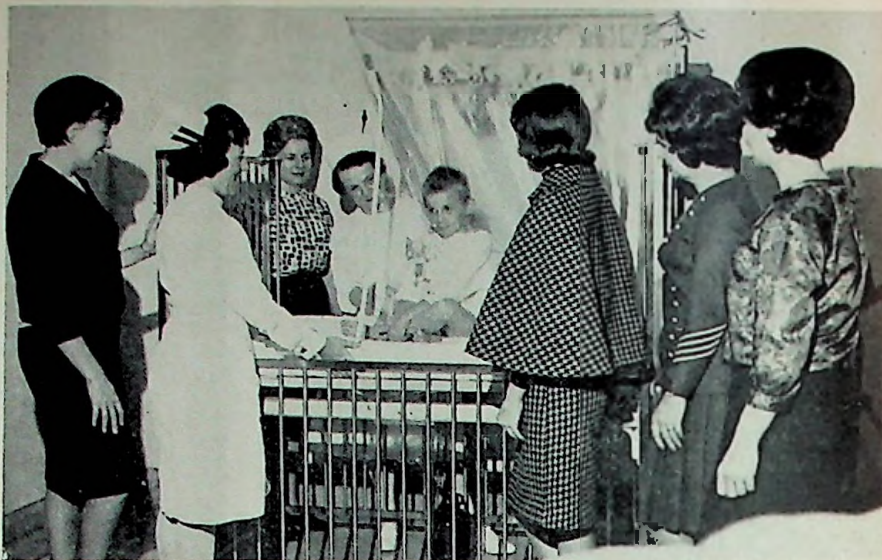
