WEST VIRGINIA BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

The first meeting of the Board of Management of the West Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution was held at 3:30 p. m., April 21, 1950, in the West Virginia room of Continental Hall, Washington, D. C., with Mrs. A. Keith McClung, State Regent, presiding. The meeting was called to order and Mrs. Plumer E. Hill, State Chaplain, pronounced the invocation.

The Regent announced the following district meetings scheduled: Western District, April 29, at the Point Pleasant Methodist Church; Southern District, May 20, at Oak Hill; Central District, May 6, at Kingwood; Northern District, June 10, at Pennsboro; and Eastern District, June 3, at Burlington.

Mrs. McClung requested that if possible all board members attend each of the district meetings. Board members voted to hold a meeting July 8, 1950, at Jackson's Mill, the date set for the annual luncheon meeting of the State Society.

The Regent distributed typewritten plans for the State Conference, tentatively scheduled to be held in October at the Greenbrier Hotel in White Sulphur Springs.

Mrs. McClung asked cooperation in getting an invitation before the State Conference in October for the 1951 State Conference.

Mrs. Snyder asked the board for permission to place state funds in the Twentieth Street Bank in Huntington, W. Va. Mrs. Brown made a motion to that effect; the motion was seconded by Miss Baylor and approved by vote.

Mrs. Snyder was authorized by the board to order sufficient yearly treasury forms at her discretion during the three year term. The authorization was approved upon motion presented by Mrs. Layman.

The Regent implored all board members to accept their responsibility as members of the Board of Management by attending meetings over the state and in offering any constructive criticism or suggestions for better organization.

In the absence of Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, State Recording Secretary, the minutes were taken and submitted by the State Vice Regent.

MINUTES STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT MEETING

The Board of Management of the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution met for breakfast at 7:30 A.M., Thursday, October 19, 1950, in the dining room of the West Virginian Hotel, Bluefield, West Virginia, with Mrs. A. Keith McClung, State Regent, presiding Attending were Mrs. William McClaugherty, Vice-Regent; Mrs. Plumer E. Hill, Chaplain; Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Clyde W. Tallman, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Daniel W. Snyder, Treasurer; Mrs. C. H. Layman, Registrar; Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor, Librarian; Miss Hallie M. Martin, State Chairman, Building Completion; Miss Marjorie Templeton, State Chairman, Genealogical Records; and Mrs. George H. Coffman, State Chairman, Student Loan Fund.

Upon motion of Miss Baylor, duly seconded and approved by vote, the State Board of Management made the following recommendations:

- 1. That the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution publish a quarterly News Letter.
- 2. That in the future Section 3, Article 10 of the Constitution and By-Laws be adhered to, limiting reports of chapter regents in the State Proceedings to 500 words, omission of all social activities and report only actual work of the chapters, and that longer reports may be shortened at the discretion of the State Proceedings Committee.
- 3. That pictures of State Officers be included in the State Proceedings with the State Society to defray the expense of the cuts as has been customary in former years.
- 4. That the style of the State Proceedings be changed to conserve space and decrease the cost of publication, the chapter name and location to appear on one line; date of organization, number of members and chapter officers to be listed in paragraph form.
- 5. That the balance from the twenty cents per member assessment for the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship Fund be used to help defray the cost of the State Proceedings.
- 6. That district meetings be scheduled in sequence within a two-week period (not necessarily consecutive) to enable the State Regent and other state officers to attend the meetings more easily and economically.
- 7. That the West Virginia Society hold a luncheon meeting during the Continental Congress in April, 1951, instead of a dinner inasmuch as a National Defense meeting is being planned to replace the usual reception for the President General.
- Mrs. C. H. Layman reported that she had had 500 cards printed for the ancestor file records at a cost of \$8.00. The bill was approved and she is to be reimbursed by the State Society.

Mrs. George H. Coffman spoke relative to the Student Loan Fund and was advised to repeat her explanation during her report as State Chairman of the Student Loan Fund.

Mrs. McClung expressed her gratitude to the Vice-Regent for her work as General Chairman of the Forty-fifth Annual State Conference and Mrs. McClaugherty was given a vote of thanks by the members.

A. R. membership as well as C. A. R. Societies. As Historian General, Mrs. Russell announced that in November, chapters would observe a thank offering for the Memorial Bell Tower.

Mrs. Harry J. Smith, National Chairman, Correct Use of the Flag, quoted the United States Flag Code No. 829 and explained that the United Nations Flag should never be flown except with the United States Flag in the place of honor. Mrs. Lowell E. Burnelle, National Chairman, D. A. R. Approved Schools, made a fundamental talk, giving accurate information and asking that chapters particularly support the two D. A. R.-owned schools, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee. Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams, National Chairman, Building Completion, told of the increased cost of the new building above earlier expectations and advised that the National Society is paying two per cent interest on \$510.00 borrowed to pay for the building. She appealed for continued and increased cooperation in contributing to the building fund.

Mrs. Adams displayed a gavel with a silver band bearing the words: Awarded to the West Virginia Society D. A. R. Building Promotion Committee, Honor Roll, Fifty-ninth Continental Congress, 1950. The gavel was a gift of the C. E. Caldwell Company to the West Virginia Society Daughters of the American Revolution in recognition of its standing on the Silver Honor Roll. Mrs. Adams said since the gavel should have been presented during Mrs. Harry J. Smith's state regency, that she was making the presentation on behalf of Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, past National Chairman, Building Promotion, to Mrs. McClung, on behalf of Mrs. Harry J. Smith, immediate past State Regent. Grateful appreciation was expressed by Mrs. McClung.

The State Regent explained that Mrs. Bruce D. Reynolds, National Chairman, National Defense, would be introduced at the National Defense Luncheon to be held at the Bluefield Country Club and continued the introduction of distinguished guests by presenting Mrs. Thomas Burchett, National Chairman, Press Relations, who explained the detailed workings of the Press Relations Committee which uses the newspapers as a medium for informing the public of D. A. R. activities.

Mrs. B. B. Williams, Vice President General, and National Chairman, Memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge, asked cooperation of the West Virginia Daughters in observance of the Thank Offering in November and also urged members to purchase Valley Forge cookbooks, Christmas cards and note paper. Mrs. A. Bruce Eagle was introduced as Advisor to the National Museum Committee.

The Recording Secretary called the roll of State Chairman who gave their reports; Mrs. E. L. Robertson served as Timekeeper. Mrs. Samuel Solins gave her report as Chairman of Americanism. The report of the Approved Schools Chairman, Mrs. Holly Simmons, was read by the Recording Secretary.

Miss Hallie M. Martin, Building Completion Chairman, made her report and Mrs. Holcombe announced a gift of \$87.50 had been given to the building fund in honor of Mrs. George Mathews. Mrs. Donald Bennett Adams again addressed the Conference to ask that chapters submit to the National Society a list of previous contributions given in memory or honor of some particular person in order that the name might be properly listed in a memory book. Mrs. James E. Greever, member of the Princess Aracoma Chapter, was introduced by Miss Martain and said her Chapter thought it had made the Star-Honor Roll but had been informed there was a \$12.00 shortage which would be paid as soon as the delegates returned home from the State Conference.

Mrs. T. B. Leith gave the report of Conservation work in the state.

Mrs. George Emerick, National Vice Chairman, Correct Use of the Flag, was introduced at the time scheduled for the report of the State Chairman, Mrs. J. B. Thompson. She spoke relative to the United Nations Flag and read a letter from the National Society asking Congressmen to prohibit the use of the United Nations Flag above or on a level with our Stars and Stripes.

Miss Nancy Bowden, State Chairman, D. A. R. Magazine, gave her report and asked for more subscribers.

Mrs. Millard T. Sisler spoke for Mrs. E. A. Livesay, State Chairman, D. A. R. Manuals, who was absent from the Conference due to illness. She asked that each chapter appoint a Manuals Chairman and obtain a supply of the Manuals for distribution.

The D. A. R. Museum report was given by Mrs. A. O. Albin, State Chairman.

Mrs. George H. Coffman, State Chairman, D. A. R. Student Loan Fund, gave her report before presenting the following motion: "I move that the State Student Loan Fund regulations be made to conform to those of the National Society; that the interest rate be changed from five per cent to two per cent; and that the loan be made available to both boys and girls in their junior or senior year." The motion was seconded by Mrs. H. K. Owens and received a favorable vote.

Following the report of Miss Marjorie Templeton, State Chairman, Genealogical Records, the Conference was recessed at 12:15 p.m. for the National Defense Luncheon at the Bluefield Country Club.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON 3:30 P.M.

The State Conference reconvened at 3:30 p.m. at the Bluefield Country Club with the State Regent, Mrs. A. Keith McClung, presiding. The Recording Secretary continued the roll call for State Chairman reports. Mrs. H. K. Owens, Jackson's Mill Chairman, appealed for support of the

project to place an organ at Jackson's Mill, reporting a total of \$588.00 received at the time of the Conference. Mrs. Daniel W. Snyder pledged \$50.00 in honor of the Honorary State Regents; Mrs. Clyde W. Tallman pledged \$10.00 from the Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter in honor of the State Regent, Mrs. A. Keith McClung; Mrs. S. A. McCoy pledged \$10.00 from the South Branch Valley Chapter; Mrs. Alex DeFobio pledged \$10.00 from the Princess Aracoma Chapter; and Mrs. Snyder, State Treasurer, reported \$10.00 had been received from the Elizabeth Zane Chapter after her books were closed. Miss Hallie M. Martin moved that the organ fund be called the Gertrude Owens Organ Fund in honor of the Jackson's Mill Chairman. The motion was seconded by Mrs. G. H. Overholt and carried when voted upon. Mrs. Owens expressed her appreciation to the State Society for the honor given her in this manner.

State Chairman reports were also given by Mrs. J. William Crouch, Junior American Citizens; Miss Virginia Johnson, Junior Membership; and Mrs. Curt Amos, Membership.

Upon completion of the Organ Project report given by Mrs. Hugh S. Byrer, Chairman, Mrs. Frances N. Power made the following motion: "I move that the balance in the Organ Fund, \$300.00, as recommended by the Organ Committee, be made available to sons and daughters of veter-ins for several West Virginia Schools in scholarships of \$100.00 each." The motion was seconded by Mrs. R. P. Daniel and defeated when voted ipon. Mrs. J. Marion Bailey made a motion that the \$300.00 organ fund palance be transferred to the Jackson's Mill Organ Fund. Mrs. James E. Greever seconded the motion and in the discussion members were reminded that the funds were solicited for a veterans' project. Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor and Mrs. Stoyer expressed the opinion that the money should be used for a veterans' project. Mrs. R. P. Daniel said if the motion were worded as a loan instead of a gift that it might have been voted upon differently. Mrs. J. G. Wright said she felt the money should be used as a maintenance fund for the organ at the Veteran's Hospital in Beckley. The motion presented by Mrs. Bailey was withdrawn by her. Mrs. Wright made a motion that the balance of \$300.00 be held by the Organ Committee as a maintenance fund for the upkeep of the organ and the motion was voted upon favorably after being seconded by Mrs. W. W. McClaugherty. Mrs. Claude R. Hill moved that the motion be rescinded after it was reported no upkeep would be necessary while the organ was in the Veterans' Hospital. The motion was duly seconded but defeated when a standing vote was called for by the State Regent.

Mrs. R. P. Daniel extended an invitation to members to attend the tea at her home following the organ dedication Sunday afternoon, October 22, 1950, at the Veterans' Hospital in Beckley.

Miss Pansy Millard read the report of the Program Chairman, Mrs. P. C. Graney. This concluded the State Chairman's reports and the meeting was recessed by the State Regent until the banquet at 6:30 o'clock that evening in the Ballroom of the West Virginian Hotel.

SATURDAY MORNING 9:00 A.M.

The closing session of the Forty-fifth Annual State Conference, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. A. Keith McClung, at 9:30 A.M., Saturday, October 21, 1950, in the ballroom of the West Virginian Hotel in Bluefield, after the flags had been placed in their standards by the pages. The President General, Mrs. James B. Patton, and Mrs. Everett Y. Repass, Vice President General, were escorted to the platform by the pages, to the strains of a march played by Miss Ruth E. Seibert, a page. Mrs. Plumer E. Hill, State Chaplain, conducted the devotional service.

Mrs. McClung again presented Mrs. Patton, our gracious President General, who expressed approval of the chapter regent's reports and the banquet session the preceding evening. She told the Conference that if all chapters in the United States reached the Star Honor Roll, there would not be sufficient funds to complete payment of the new building and urged the Daughters to continue their generosity, not only for the Building Fund, but also for the memorial Bell Tower at Valley Forge. The State Regent appointed the following members of the State Proceedings Committee: Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, Miss Hallie M. Martin and Miss Virginia Lee Barnes. She also appointed Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, State Recording Secretary, and Mrs. Daniel W. Snyder, State Treasurer, to serve with her as members of the Executive Committee.

Mrs. Hugh S. Byer extended an invitation to all Daughters to go to the Veterans Hospital at Beckley at 2 P.M., Sunday, October 22, 1950, to attend the dedication service when the organ and chimes are to be dedicated to the men and women who have served in the armed forces of our Nation. Mrs. George H. Brown, State Historian, offered to transport the Flags to Beckley for the service.

No invitation was extended for the 1951 State Conference.

The State Regent thanked Mrs. David E. French, who served as General Consultant for the Conference, and Mrs. French spoke briefly in acknowledgement of her introduction. Mrs. McClung also expressed her appreciation to other committees serving during the Conference, to Miss Ruth E. Siebert, platform page; Mrs. Clyde W. Tallman, chairman of pages; to the other pages and all who assisted in any manner in the success of the Conference. At this time Mrs. Tallman introduced the pages to the Conference.

Greetings from Mrs. Alfred B. Garges, of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. W. H. S. White, Honorary State Regent, were read by the recording secretary.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE 45th ANNUAL CONFERENCE WEST VIRGINIA SOCIETY

DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

I. AMERICAN IDEALS IN EDUCATION:

WHEREAS, The indoctrination of our children and adults with the "new" social order leading to communism is being conducted in many ways and places, including our schools;

RESOLVED, that the Forty-fifth State Conference of the West Virginia Society of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution declare its opposition to the introduction of subversive ideas in American Education, and earnestly urged the teaching of United States History, Georgaphy, and Civics according to the ideals of American free enterprise, economy and the Constitution of the United States. II. COMPULSORY HEALTH INSURANCE:

WHEREAS, Powerful forces are at work to enforce the passage of a compulsory health insurance or socialized medicine act; and

WHEREAS, Such government invasion in the field of medical care could open an avenue of advance into other professions with a welfare State or Socialism the inevitable result:

RESOLVED, That the Forty-fifth State Conference of the West Virginia Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution vigorously oppose legislation designed to create State Medical care with its vast extension of a parasitic bureaucracy which could result in a Socialistic State in violation of the principles set forth in the Constitution of the United States of America.

III OBSERVANCE OF PATRIOTIC OCCASIONS:

WHEREAS, There is an increasing indifference in the observance of the anniversaries of American Historical events and of great American

Characters; and

WHEREAS, With the influx of aliens through the regular quotas and the displaced persons quotas, there is greater necessity than ever before to arouse in the minds of the American people an awakened understanding of the obligation they owe to those men and women who with faith and sacrifice formed our Government and left us the priceless heritage of a free people;

RESOLVED, That this Society through its Chapters and members earnestly foster the observance of all patriotic and national holidays, and

urge the display of the United States Flag on such occasions.

IV. WORLD GOVERNMENT: WHEREAS. There have sprung up in this country a great many proponents of World Government-including some prominent jurists and Federal Office holders—with the result that there are now well organized movements, under varying titles, to further the program, and

WHEREAS, The broader scheme has been evolved of having State Legislators adopt resolutions memorializing the United States Congress to work in the direction of world Government with the result that twenty-

two states have already ratified the measure, and

WHEREAS, By such universal federation the United States of America would, of necessity, relinquish the major part of its Sovereign rights; and further, on the basis of proportional representation it would have a minority of voting power; Resolved. That the Forty-fifth State Conference of the West Virginia Society of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution re-assert its stand as definitely opposed to any form of world government or partial World Government,

RESOLVED, That Chapters be alerted to investigate the status of this movement in their locality to combat the adoption of legislation

favoring any form of international control.

V PLACE OF HONOR FOR UNITED STATES FLAG IN UNITED TERRITORY:

WHEREAS, The National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution has stressed respect for and correct use of the United States Flag:

WHEREAS, There is today a new flag, the United Nations flag. representing an independent international area lying within the boundar. ies of the United States; and

WHEREAS, The National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution believes that it is the right of every member nation of the United Nations to have its individual position of honor for its national flag within its own boundaries; and

WHEREAS, The Flag Code and Protocol adopted for the United Nations flag disregards the Flag Code of the United States, thus resulting in the placing of the United States Flag in a subordinate position in its own country's territory; and

WHEREAS, The Society believes this position of honor should be maintained for the United States Flag as designated in the United States Flag Code;

RESOLVED. That the Forty-fifth State Conference of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, shall petition Congress to pass legislation conforming to Public Law 829 insuring the United States Flag its own place of honor, exclusive of the international area of Lake Success.

VI. UNITED NATIONS FLAG:

WHEREAS, United Nations Flags are being presented to some schools in the State in preparation for the celebration of United Nations Day, October 24, and Press photographs have pictured children in the schools saluting the United Nations Flag in the presence of and with their backs toward the United States Flag, and

RESOLVED, That the Chapter Regents secure copies of the Flag Code, Public Law No. 829 to distribute to their members, to the press and to their Chapter Chairman of the Radio Committee, asking that every means available be used to instruct the general public as to the place of honor and correct use of the United States Flag in United States territory; and

RESOLVED, That the call, released October 9, from the President General of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, pertaining to Flag protocol be distributed to every Chapter Regent and Chapter Chairman of the Correct use of the Flag for the purpose of having same published immediately in the local press.

VII. EXPOSING COMMUNISM AND UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES: WHEREAS, Communism threatens to destroy our form of government by subtile infiltration into schools and colleges in the name of

youth movements, and into other groups in the name of peace; RESOLVED, That the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution request that the Chapter Chairman of the National Defense Committee be given a stated time at each meeting of the Chapters to present the National Defense program to the members, and urge their cooperation in promoting the work of the committee. VIII. STATE NEWSPAPER:

WHEREAS, We consider that a state newspaper would bind the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, into a more compact unit; and

WHEREAS, It would provide an outlet for state and chapter to each chapter throughout the state; therefore be it RESOLVED, That West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution should sponsor a state newspaper to be issued once every

three months to be financed by private subscription; the first two issues to be guaranteed by the state society; and moneys expended in such a guarantee to be replaced in the state treasury as subscriptions warrant it.

Your committee on resolutions recommend that a committee be appointed to investigate the feasibility of such publication.

appointed to investigate the feasibility of such publicat IX. ELEANOR H. SMITH SCHOLARSHIP FUND:

WHEREAS, There is a surplus in the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship Fund. and

WHEREAS, There is a necessity to have extra funds to carry on some of the important work of the State Society, namely for the printing of the State Proceedings; and

WHEREAS, It is permissable to transfer surplus funds to the general fund;

RESOLVED, That the surplus funds now in the Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship Fund be transferred to the general fund for the use of the State Society.

REPORT OF STATE REGENT

My attention has been centered upon West Virginia's obligation to the National Building Fund which to date is within \$1,233.14 of its goal. Who is responsible for keeping West Virginia off the Star Honor Roll? Also, let us continue our interest in the Valley Forge Project that is desperately in need of assistance.

Due to our National indebtedness, your State Regent deems it advisable not to undertake any state project for this year but asks that you continue your interest in Jackson's Mill and make D. A. R. History through outstanding contributions for increased membership. Genealogical Records, Girl Home Makers, Good Citizens Pilgrimage, Marking Graves of Revolutionary Soldiers and Historic Shrines, J. A. C. Clubs, sponsoring C. A. R. Chapters, preparing C. A. R. papers for children in your family, assisting S. A. R. prospective members. All this can be accomplished without financial outlay.

At the Forty-fifth State Conference we were highly honored by the presence of our beloved Mrs. James B. Patton, President-General; Mrs. Loren Edgar Rex, First Vice-President General; Mrs. Hugh Russell, Historian General; Mrs. Benjamin Ramage Williams, Vice-President General and National Chairman of Valley Forge; Mrs. Everett L. REPORT OF STAE LIBRARIAN

As State Librarian it is my privilege to make this my first report to the State Conference.

I have contacted each of the forty-four Chapters and there is only one Chapter from which I have had no reply, 43 have sent name of their Librarian. I have sent out the Questionaire to 40 Librarians, four were sent to the Regent of the Chapter, but later have received the name cf the Librarian from three of these, leaving only one not heard from. Alonwith the Questionaire was sent the List of Wanted Books and list of Books Dealers from the Librarian General, with the request to try and locate some of these "Wanted Books."

I have only received reports from 20 of the Chapters, though 43 have Librarians. Eight Chapters maintain D. A. R. Bookshelf in Local Library and two others are planning to do so. Many of the Chapters report giving the D. A. R. Magazine to High School and Local Libraries, one chapter reports giving C. A. R. Magazine to four Graded Schools.

The Librarian General reported receiving from Miss Virginia C. Cork, "Data on the Cork, Chevalier, Wilson and Freshour Lines". This wa

not reported through the Chapter.

Miss Marjorie Templeton, State Chairman of Genealogical Records reports nine volumes of Manuscripts, which will appear by Chapters in her report.

The Librarian General asks that I make an appeal for donation: from members of such genealogical books they may possess, these volumes are invaluable in establishing eligibility to membership in the National Society, therefore, if hidden in a private library fail to serve the purpose for which it was published. However, before sending in any such book please write the Librarian General to see if the Library has a copy of the book. She also asks the Librarians to make a diligent search in all second hand book shops in her locality to see if any of the wanted books can be found, often they may be found in the least expected places.

AMERICANISM CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1950 State Conference

Letters were mailed to all chapter chairmen or to regents where the name of the chairman was unknown on September 9, 1950. The letter outlined the general plan for the work throughout the state.

Chairmen were reminded that our efforts toward making good citizens of the foreign born should not lax, but rather to increase in intensity. Suggestions for this work were included, also suggestions for programs to be used on the day set aside for Citizenship Day when aliens are admitted as citizens.

Chairmen were urged to watch pending legislation, and to request her chapter members to write protests when legislation which we consider detrimental to our state or nation is pending.

Important historical dates for each month were included in the letter with the suggestion that each chairman make the announcement of the anniversary to be remembered that month at chapter meetings. A RE-WARD of a Bronze Plaque with the inscription, AMERICANISM AWARD, 1950-1951, will be given to the chapter whose chairman makes the report considered most outstanding.

A historical contest in rhyme is to be mailed to each chapter. The stanzas were written by the state chairman for a chapter meeting and were entertaining as well as educational. The chapter chairmen can use the contest according to the way considered best for her chapter or community. Several history teachers in this area have used it with history classes.

BERTHA BALLARD SOLINS, State Chairman

D. A. R. APPROVED SCHOOLS 1949-1950

This is my first report of D. A. R. Schools and D. A. R. Approved Schools. The work from March 1, 1949, to March 1, 1950, was actually done under the leadership of Miss Mary Katharine Barnes, my predecessor, who has been a most efficient chairman. I only hope that my successor may have as good a report to make of my third year's efforts for Approved Schools.

The Approved Schools are very near and dear to my heart, and I am happy to have the opportunity to be of service to the boys and girls

whom we are aiding to secure a truly American Education. The work for the Approved schools is one of the most fundamental projects carried on by our Society. It is both educational and patriotic. It embodies Americanism and National Defense, because we are educating leaders for the future.

A school to be approved by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, for assistance, must be one which ministers to underprivileged boys and girls, who otherwise would not have the opportunity for education, or it must be a school for the Americanization of foreign born students, or students of foreign parentage. Our Society owns two schools, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, which have a total enrollment of 1,007 boys and girls. These two schools are totally dependent upon us for maintenance. There are 12 additional schools on our approved list, with a combined enrollment of 7,950 students, whom we assist.

The policies for assistance to the schools are made by the National Society, and by a Resolution adopted by the National Board in February 1950, we are asked to give our first consideration to our own two schools Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee, in the distribution of gifts and funds. This Resolution was adopted in order to properly finance these schools Therefore, I hope that the Chapters will continue to follow the program outlined by Miss Barnes; that is, after a substantial contribution has been made to Kate Duncan Smith, or Tamassee, or both, adopt another school on the list as a "special" for which to work.

There are now forty-four D. A. R. Chapters in our state. There were forty-three last year. During the year 38 Approved Schools programs were held, with all schools represented by speakers, with emphasis on Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee. The State Chairman addressed two Chapter meetings; seven films were shown; five exhibits or sales of handinaft from schools were held; fourteen Chapters include Approved schools in their budget; two scholarships were sent to Approved Schools. Total amount of other money sent to schools, \$319.50, making a grand total of \$419.50 cash sent to schools. Total number of boxes of clothing and gift sent to schools, 64, with a value of \$2,602.10. One cash contribution was made, and six boxes sent, without value listed. The complete total of all assistance given, which is listed, is \$3.021.60.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEST VIRGINIA SOCIETIES CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

At the Fifty-Ninth Congress in Washington, I was appointed and installed Senior President of the West Virginia Society, Children of the American Revolution. Upon returning home, the usual procedure of

appointing officers took place.

In an effort to correlate the thinking of the Daughters and the Children of the American Revolution, my first effort was to study the objectives of the two organizations. In our outward administration, the organizations are separate with separate officers, but by a comparison of the objectives of the two organizations, it may be pointed out that the purposes of both organizations convey the same meaning and that both societies are working for the same cause of Patriotism and Love of

Country.

As State Chairman, I attended and presided at the State Conference which took place on October 10, 1950, at Point Pleasant. The members of the Fort Randolph Society were our gracious hostesses. It was with regret that we learned that Mrs. Donald B. Adams, National President of the Children of the American Revolution; Mrs. A. Keith McClung, State Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution; and Judge Frank C. Haymond, State President of the Sons of the American Revolution, were unable to attend. Messages of regret from them were read. We were honored with the presence of our own West Virginia Daughter, Mrs. William Morrill Parker of Parkersburg, who is National C. A. R. Chaplain.

Miss Mary Brown, President in 1949-50, presided as Junior Presi-

dent in a most capable and efficient manner.

Mrs. Holcombe presented Mrs. William Morrill Parker, National Chaplain C. A. R., and Miss Sandra Sue Jones, the incoming Junior

President, who gave the addresses of the conference.

A very excellent program was planned by the senior and junior officers of the Fort Henry Chapter of the C. A. R., of which Mrs. Eldridge Sauer is President and Sandra Sue Jones is Junior President. The members of the Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter and Fort Randolph Society generously provided for us and acted as hostesses for the conference. Mrs. Clyde W. Tallman, present retiring Senior President of the Children of the American Revolution, efficiently planned the conference. Mrs. Tallman was made an Honorary State Regent of the C. A. R.

It is gratifying to report that seventy-seven members of the West Virginia Society, Children of the American Revolution, were present and participated in the business of the society and enjoyed the social program arranged by the local group. The State Conference will meet at Jackson's Mill early in June, 1951, with the Swamp Fox Society of Fairmont and the Randolph Society of Elkins acting as hostesses for the meeting.

As State Senior President, I attended two of the District meetings

of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Western District at Point Pleasant, the Southern District at Oak Hill, and the State Conference of the D. A. R. at Bluefield. Many letters have been written to the Daughters of the American Revolution and to the Sons of the American Revolution urging them to cooperate in the promotion of the work of the Children of the American Revolution in West Virginia.

There are four aims of the C. A. R. in which the D. A. R. and the S. A. R. may aid us; namely,

1. (a) To double the membership of the C. A. R.

(b) Organize a C. A. R. Society in every community where there is a S. A. R. or D. A. R. chapter.

- 2. To interest at least 100 Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution in becoming Promoters of the Children of the American Revolution program. To become a Promoter, one must send \$2.00 to the C. A. R. and in return be placed on the mailing list of the National Society and receive the Children of the American Revolution quarterly magazine.
- 3. That the Regents of the Daughters and Presidents of the Sons of the American Revolution Chapters earnestly cooperate in assisting the senior officers of the C. A. R. in their work.
- 4. Using as a theme song, "These are our children, your children, my children," the responsibility of inculcating into them the aims and objectives of our societies rests entirely at our doorstep, we ask the aid and understanding of all.

MOTION PICTURE COMMITTEE 1949-1950

The information for this report was taken from the questionnaire so kindly sent to me by Mrs. Curt E. Amos, former chairman.

Audio-visual education is being used in most schools of the state especially high schools. Some of the better pictures are brought up for discussion in English and Dramatic classes.

Parent-Teacher Associations were contacted. Parents are interested in the type of pictures their children see, and are generally interested in the showing of family pictures.

Few theatres have Saturday morning matinees for children or show pictures from the Children's Library.

The majority of the Chapter Chairmen reporting feel there has not been a tendency toward better pictures. Picture preference seems to be Historical, Musical, Family type and Disney Cartoons. Single features with good shorts predominate in pictures shown.

The chief criticism of Motion Pictures today are:

Too many crime pictures. Too many murders.

Too much sex, crime, and brutality. Too much fighting and drinking.

Too many young people and unthinking adults are influenced by pictures and especially by the actors and actresses.

There is need for stricter censorship.

ORGAN PROJECT

As many of you already know, this project was initiated in New York City, during Congress there, at our West Virginia luncheon early

in the administration of Mrs. Millard T. Sisler.

lt's now about seven years since your Organ Committee was authorized to undertake and complete this project, much, yes, very much has happened in the intervening years. I shall not dwell upon the past, but in the conference minutes of the previous years you can see why this project has been prolonged and has been classed as unfinished business.

At the Wheeling conference, during Mrs. Sisler's regency, it was voted to place an organ and chimes in the first completed Veterans Hos-

pital in West Virginia,

On January 8, 1950, I wrote the Veterans Administration in Washington, D. C., asking them to keep me advised as to the progress of the two Veterans Hospitals in West Virginia, and also asked if they would be interested in our gifts. In September, 1950, the Veterans Administration advised me that the Beckley Hospital would be ready to receive patients a little earlier than the Clarksburg Hospital, so with that information, I wrote Dr. George F. Swanson, Manager of the Veterans Administration Hospital, Beckley, West Virginia, and asked him if he would be interested in accepting for his hospital our gift of organ and chimes. I had an immediate reply from him, in which he said the Veterans Administration would be happy to receive our generous gift.

Your Organ Committee met on September 16, 1950, for a dutch treat luncheon and decided to place a Hammond Organ with tone cabinet and Maas Chimes in the Beckley Veterans Hospital.

The contract for the organ, tone cabinet and chimes was given to the Galpern Music Co., Beckley, West Virginia, on September 18, 1950. Mr. Burton, their agent, promised to have fully installed and ready for Dedicatory Service by October 18. As you can see, our time was limited, but we were eager to complete this project so that those who have helped make our Society secure might enjoy the tones of our efforts.

After being assured by the Galpern Music Company that the organ and chimes would be ready for dedication by October 18, 1 wrote Mrs Ross P. Daniel, Regent of Captain James Allen Chapter, advising her of our gifts to the Veterans Hospital, and I'd like to quote to you part of her letter. "Please accept the sincere thanks from the Captain James Allen Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and I am sure I can be speak that thanks for the whole community. It is a very generous and wonderful gift, and I am sure it will be the means of cheering many a sickly, sad and broken body in our hospital. Many, many thanks."

As Chairman of your Committee, I have sent letters to each Chapter Regent in the State advising her of the organ purchase and Dedicatory Service. We have also sent invitations to all Regents and members of her Chapter, to all State Chairmen, Honorary State Regents, Officers of Mrs. Sisler's regency, President of the Sons of the American Revolution and several others.

It is good to report that on Sunday afternoon, October 22nd,) at 2:05 o'clock, we will hold a Dedicatory Service at the Veterans Administration Hospital for organ and chimes. A tea will follow in the home of Mrs. Ross Preston Daniels, Regent of Captain James Allen Chapter, for all daughters, guests and those who assist with the program.

The members of this Committee have at all times been keenly interested in this project, but I feel that I would be most remiss if I failed to mention the unselfish support which has been given to me by Mrs Wilson Eutsler.

We have, as your Treasurer's report shows, \$3,256.00 in government bonds, with four years' interest, and a small bank balance of \$6.41.
