



GFWC PRESIDENT TO BE KEYNOTE SPEAKER

One thinks of magnolias, Japonica blossoms and the nostalgia of wisteria when Mrs. E. D. Pearce, GFWC President, speaks with her soft southern accent. Carolyn Lawrence, who at the age of 19 added Pearce to her name, was born in Molena, Ga., where, with her eight brothers and sisters, she played on a cotton plantation.

Lured by the tropics, Mr. and Mrs. Pearce and their young son, Frank Howard, moved to Miami in 1926. After the duties of motherhood and homemaking ceased somewhat, Mrs. Pearce joined the Miami Woman's Club and her club career began. However, her interests have not been entirely confined to club work, for she is a most active member of the Central Baptist Church where she has held numerous offices.

Before long Mrs. Pearce was elected president of the Miami Woman's Club and this was followed by Director of District Eleven, then the two vice presidencies of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs and in 1954 she was elected president of the Florida Federation. During her term as president of the Florida Federation, Head-quarters was established at Lakeland.

Her twelve years' service in the General Federation includes: Chairman, Western Hemisphere Division of the International Relations Department; American Home Department and Garden Division; Recording Secretary of the Southeastern Council: and Recording Secretary of the General Federation. In 1960 Mrs. Pearce was elected to fill a vacancy in the office of Third Vice President. She served as Second Vice President, First Vice President, and is currently serving as President.

If the people of Florida wished to name someone to the top post of

"women who achieve," they would certainly name Carolyn Pearce. You might call her the answer to a governor's prayer, for she seems to be the first person to come to minds of governors of Florida when they need a woman to serve on a state board or committee.

She is a university graduate and teacher by profession. She studied for two years at the University of Georgia and then was married. Always wanting to get a degree she returned to college after her son was grown. She enrolled in the University of Miami taking one or two courses at a time. It took six years, but in 1954 she received the

B.A. degree, majoring in English. Mrs. Pearce has also taken special courses at the Universidad de Bogota, Colombia, South America, and the University of Oaxaco, Oaxaco, Mexico. She speaks Spanish fluently — with a southern accent! She is a member of Zeta Tau Alpha sorority and the American Association of University Women.

Appointed by the Governor of Florida. Mrs. Pearce is currently serving a nine-year term as a member of the Board of Regents, University Systems, State of Florida. She is the only woman member of the Board.

She holds fast to family life and home ties. Having one son, Mrs. Pcarce did not realize what it meant to have a daughter until Frank's marriage to his high school sweetheart, Marilyn Michel. Just as Marilyn is proud of the honors bestowed on her mother-inlaw, so is Carolyn's pride in Marilyn well known. Marilyn's beautiful voice has been heard on many of Florida's finest concert and operatic programs.

Mrs. Pearce says that her husband, officer of the Pearce Produce Company, a family firm of pioneer tomato growers of South Florida, and her son and daughter-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. Frank Pearce, are her biggest "boosters" and cooperate in every way. Federation friends and international students are welcomed and entertained in the Pearce home.

An educator, Mrs. Hamilton has a Bachelor and Master's degrees from Baylor University, Waco, Texas, and the University of Houston. She is a part-time instructor in Education at Nazareth College, Bardstown.

Mrs. Hamilton is a member of the Citizens' Advisory Committee for the study of the Minimum Foundation for Kentucky Education. She has served as President of the Fourth District Education Association of Kentucky and various other educational offices.

For the past 18 years, Mrs. Hamilton has been active in the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs. She is the immediate past president of this organization, leaving the post in April, 1966. During her presidency, she initiated a statewide project for the women — the construction of a treatment center for delinquent girls. The Center, named Jewel Manor honoring Mrs. Hamilton, will be leased to the Department of Child Welfare of Kentucky for operation. The women responded to this proposal by contributing approximately \$60,000 in 23 months. With matching funds, the Center will cost about \$615,000. The contract has been let, and the Center is to be completed by December, 1967.

In June, 1966, Mrs. Hamilton was appointed to the national post of Traffic Safety Chairman for the General Federation of Women's Clubs. She travels over the United States working with club women and other organizations in traffic safety.

Mrs. Hamilton participates in many church, civic, and educational activities. Having traveled extensively in Africa, Europe, and the Middle East, she speaks frequently on subjects concerning the people and the countries she has visited.

HAWAIIAN TOUR FOR W. VA. WOMEN

Plans are practically complete for the West Virginia Federation's tour to Hawaii. The party will leave the Pittsburgh Airport by Pan American jet on July 18, and return on July 27. It will include five days in Honolulu and four days on the outer islands. The two outer islands we will visit will be Hawaii and Lauai. The cost of the tour will be \$763.83, including tax, based on two to a twin bedded room. Optional night club tour will be \$12.15 extra (minimum of ten persons).

The \$763.83 will include round trip air fare from Pittsburgh, hotels (and hotel taxes,) sightseeing via deluxe motorcoach, all transfers of luggage, airports, tips for luggage, etc. It does not include any meals while in Honolulu, except the special ones, which will be listed in the itinerary. All meals, hotels and all expenses are included while on the the outer islands. For those who do not wish to take the outer island tour, the cost will be about \$110.00 less. However, we urge you to take this part of the tour. You have not seen Hawaii until you visit the outer islands.

A deposit of \$50.00 is required when making reservations and final payment on May 18.

MENTAL RETARDATION PROJECT

"Mobilizing the Women's Clubs of West Virginia in a Movement to Help the Mentally Retarded"

The West Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs received a Public Health Service grant for a mental retardation project from the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The grant of \$22,250 is for a period of twelve months and will enable the Federation to present public awareness seminars on mental retardation in each of our eight districts. It provides for an office, director and paid staff of coordinator and secretary. The Director will donate approximately one-fourth of her time and will be responsible to the Executive Board of the Federation for the overall operation of the project. The office was opened in Charleston on September 1st.

The project is primarily a statewide public awareness program to provide an opportunity for effective participation in support of the efforts of the Governor's Commission on Mental Retardation to develop a comprehensive program for the 54,000 mentally retarded in West Virginia. This project will create more public awareness at

the grass roots level.

Seminars were held in Moorefield, Welch, Ronceverte, and Moundsville during November. "The Community Acts to Prevent Mental Retardation and to Help the Retardate" has been the subject for each seminar. The speakers are from the Departments of Government represented on the State

Commission for Mental Retardation—namely: education, health, mental health, rehabilitation, employment security, welfare and public institutions. Also a representative from the West Virginia Association for Retarded Children, Inc., the office of the Commission on Mental Retardation and an out-of-state consultant has had a part on the program. The program participants have reviewed what their particular agency is doing for the mentally retarded, what they need to be doing if West Virginia is to have a statewide and comprehensive program for the mentally retarded and finally, how can the local people at the grass roots level help the mentally retarded and our state to be more comprehensive in its planning for the mentally retarded.

There have been concurrent programs in the schools and at Boy Scout meetings. Also, groups of nurses in training and Girl Scouts have attended the sessions.

The Key words during the programs have been prevention, research and the importance of the role of a local association for retarded children in each county to spearhead and implement programming for the mentally retarded.

The speakers have emphasized early diagnosis, early case findings, public school classes from kindergarten through high school for the retarded, training and hiring of the retarded and seeking foster homes and adoptive parents.

The out-of-state consultants have been pleased West Virginia is thinking of small cottage-type homes and regional residential homes rather than another large institution for the mentally retarded. Mr. Allen R. Cohen, Assistant District Representative, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Region III, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Charlottes-ville, Virginia, challenged the citizens of West Virginia at the seminar in Moorefield when he asked "What will you do with this seminar? Is it just more talk? Or are you going to act so the mentally retarded are really treated as citizens of your great state?"

Plans are underway for seminars in the other districts. The success of these seminars will depend on the action of the clubs in arousing the interest of the citizens in their communities.
