STANDING RULES

1. All sessions of the Conference shall begin promptly at the place and hour announced.

2. The report of the Program Committee, when adopted, shall become the order of business for the Conference.

3. The doors shall be closed during addresses, reports and musical numbers.

4. Roll Call shall be answered by the Chapter Regents, or their representatives, who shall announce the number present from their chapters.

5. Delegates shall rise, address the chair, give name and chapter and

be recognized before being entitled to the floor.

6. Reports shall be typed and a copy filed with the State Recording Secretary after being read.

7. Reports of absentee members shall be filed unread unless the conference rules otherwise.

8. Reports of State Officers shall be limited to four minutes, of State Chairmen and District Directors to four minutes, and of Chapter Regents to two minutes.

9. Main motions shall be in writing, signed by the mover and seconder, and sent to the Recording Secretary.

10. No delegate may speak more than twice in one day on any question, nor longer than three minutes.

- 11. Recommendations and resolutions shall be referred in writing to the Resolutions Committee to be presented to the Conference for action.
- 12. Reports of special meetings, including the State Officers Club, the Chapter Founders, the Chapter Regents Club, and other breakfast or luncheon meetings, shall be given by the chairmen or the secretary to the State Recording Secretary for inclusion in the State Proceedings.

13 All reports shall be in the hands of the State Recording Secretary

at the close of the Conference.

14. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be the authority on Parliamentary Law.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

The members of the Finance Committee were in session several hours following the meeting last night discussing and trying to plan a budget for carrying out the work of this organization for the ensuing year.

I am sure each and every one present realizes that it is taking more money each month to run our homes as prices continue to rise.

Today we are faced with the same situation in our State Organization. Our printing has more than doubled in price, our stationery has

increased and postal cards have gone up.

The Proceedings in 1939 cost \$223.27 for 138 pages-today we pay a little less than \$500.00 for 108 pages. The cost of printing the State Treasurer's report used to cost about \$30.00. Today it costs \$100.00 plus \$2.00 tax. The stationery previously cost about \$25.00 for State Officers and State Chairmen and today it costs approximately \$150.00. Postcards are two cents today. I might add that each report which has to be sent to the Treasurer General takes from six to nine cents postage.

It is going to be necessary to increase the State Assessment of the

Evans ,pastor of the Edgewood Methodist Church, sang with great feeling "There Is No Death," O'Hara. A tribute to Mrs. George DeBolt, Honorary State Regent, was offered by Mrs. Waitman T. Conaway, Honorary State Regent. As each one of the 51 names on the Memory Roll Call was read by Mrs. Hill, a page placed a white carnation in a basket of foliage. Lighted candles on each side of the basket completed a beautiful setting for this service of memory. The Reverend Evans sang "The Lord's Prayer," Malotte, and the assemblage pronounced the benediction in unison. Taps were sounded by Graham Ward, bugler, and the service was brought to an end with a postlude by Mrs. Chauncey Hinerman.

WHEREAS, The minutes and the Treasurer's report are the legal records of the Conference and should be printed accurately and exactly

as submitted to the Conference; and

WHEREAS, With the increased price we are having to pay to have the Proceedings printed, we should demand of the publisher that the

records of the State Conference must be printed accurately; and

WHEREAS, The Proceedings of the 1950 State Conference contain three mistakes that reflect on the accuracy of the Treasurer's and Auditor's reports, and the Proceedings of the 1951 Conference omitted the Chapter Receipts as required by the State By-Laws, therefore

REPORT OF STATE REGENT

As the last reports of this administration are given at this, the 'orty-seventh Annual State Conference, much will be reviewed of which your State Regent is justly proud as well as accomplishments which have far exceeded her fondest hopes. Throughout these three years all national projects, including indebtedness, have taken precedence over state and chapter undertakings but this has not interfered with our

D. A. R. program.

Each of the past three years has dawned with shadows of war clouds threatening the very security of our country, but with them came a challenge for every Daughter to defend her country through a vigorous National Defense program sponsored by the National Society. Realizing that our nation is confronted with forces of disunity striving to tear the world apart, people are looking with respect to the 172,000 patriotic women who speak with conviction for plans to preserve our American Freedoms. Even though we have seen fruition of our efforts, it is necessary for the chapters to strive diligently to promote our program of Patriotic Education in schools, churches, and organizations if we are to conquer our foes.

Realizing that our children will inherit today's problems, greater emphasis must be placed upon our Youth Training Program. "Young Lives Like Cement assume the shape of their surroundings," therefore it is our responsibility to direct a program which will teach them greater love for country through the study of American History and Christian Education. Such a program can be accomplished if the chapters will promote Junior American Citizen Clubs in the public schools throughout our state. Little time, if any, is allotted in the school curriculum for teaching of patriotic education, thus it must be supplemented during an activity period at school. Chapters please write your State Chairman for information about this work that we may have more J. A. C. Clubs in our state this year.

Seventy-five accredited High Schools participated in the Good

Citizen Contest this past year, where the outstanding Senior giri was chosen for Dependability, Service, Leadership, and Patriotism. If we train our youth for these qualifications, can there be any doubt of the attimate results of our efforts to direct community, state, and national leaders for the future? Let us set our goal for a Good Citizen in every high School.

Girl Homemakers program encourages a well-rounded course in Home Economics. The Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship, an outright gift of \$250 to a college girl majoring in Home Economics, should be publicated by each chapter.

The Society, Children of the American Revolution, is truly a source of pride and inspiration to your State Regent as sne attends the national and state conventions each year. Eighteen boys and girls from the state have reached the age of D. A. R. and S. A. R. membership this year, and it is hoped that they will be replaced by many more new C. A. R. members. The mothers and grandmothers are responsible for the growth of the C. A. R. membership.

During the past three years, D. A. R. membership has shown a steady increase, but with the large number of eligible women in the state, I suggest that you interest these women in our D. A. R. Program, especially for Junior Committee organization. New members in a society are comparable to a blood transfusion for an ill person.. Does your chapter need one?

Linked closely with our endeavors for increasing membership in our state has been our program for stressing a better informed membership through the use of D. A. R. Tools, such as the D. A. R. Handbook, the Constitution and By-Laws of the National and State Society, the Resolutions of the last Continental Congress, National Defense Material, the D. A. R. Magazine, the Press Digest, the West Virginia D. A. R. News, and the State Regent's Bulletin. The D. A. R. News has served as a medium of valuable information to our members this first year. The success of the paper is due to the able service of Mrs. Romeo T. McDonald, State Press Chairman and Editor, and the members who cooperated with her.

The Year Books have been a source of interest to me as I note the type of program the chapters are following, National Defense, Americanism, Correct Use of the Flag, and Approved Schools are the subjects that take precedence over other topics, but National Defense is stressed at practically every meeting during the year.

Many Historical landmarks and Revolutionary Soldiers' graves have been located and marked in our state, Genealogical Records of value have been recorded and placed in the National D. A. R. Library, and several valuable books have been secured for the Wanted Book List. Through the preservation of all this valuable information, membership in D. A. R. will be made easier for future members.

There has been a marked increase in D. A. R. Magazine subscriptions throughout the past year, and much interest was shown in the Ad-venture for our State Society which reached the amount of \$6,002 worth of ads for the November issue of D. A. R. Magazine. Mrs. Jack Adams, State D. A. R. Magazine Chairman, through this project has brought honor and favorable publicity to both the State Society and the State of West Virginia.

I want to express my deep appreciation to the state officers, who have shared the responsibility of the State Society with me, and who have worked diligently to carry out the requests of the National Officers, to the state chairmen, chapter regents and members who have helped through their cooperation to make the work of the Society a success, and to the

REPORT OF STATE LIBRARIAN

I sent out questionnaires and list of "Wanted Books" to 42 Chapter Librarians and the regents of King's Wood and William Morris Chapters, as I was unable to get the names of the Librarian of these two chapters. I am still hoping to get these two names; if not, West Virginia will not be on the Honor Roll of the Librarian General, which honor West Virginia has had for a good many years. It is important that a Librarian is appointed in each chapter for even if much work cannot be done, we have the credit of all the chapters having a Librarian.

I have received reports from only 24 chapters, just a little more than half, which is not too encouraging, as follows: Elizabeth Cummins Jackson reports only name of Librarian. James Barbour, Ye Towne of Bath, Daniel Taylor and Bee Line, name of Librarian and having paid quota

of two cents per member for Library fund.

Chapters reporting paying quota and maintaining book shelf in local Library: Ann Royall, Barboursville, Borderland, John Chapman, Col. Morgan Morgan and Princess Aracoma. Buford paid quota, maintains book shelf in local Library, placed five Magazines in Library this year, D. A. R. Magazine being one of them.

Daniel Davisson paid quota, maintains book shelf in local Library, with Genealogical Guide, D. A. R. Magazine and History of Jefferson County, by Dr. Millard Bushong, placed on shelf this year. Librarian will present American Fathers and Sons and East of Eden to National

Library.

Col. Charles Lewis paid quota, maintains book shelf in local Library, having given a sectional bookcase this year in memory of Mrs. William H. Vaught, books and pamphlets given to D. A. R. Library, article sub-

mitted to D. A. R. Magazine by a member.

National Library.

South Branch Valley Chapter placed D. A. R. Magazine in four schools this year and it is believed one of the "Wanted Books" can be obtained through a member. West Augusta Chapter placed D. A. R. Magazine in local Library. Wheeling Chapter paid quota, gave subscription to D. A. R. Magazine to Wheeling Library.

In addition, I have secured two "Wanted Books" and sent them to National Library: "Treadway and Burket Families," by William Treadway, and "Genealogy of Park Benjamin," by Merle M. AMERICANISM

Letters were sent to each chapter in the state during the month of October, 1951. The letters stated that the usual work with aliens was urged by our National Chairman. An historical quiz was enclosed to be used at club meetings or for historical contests in the schools, emphasizing our interest in American History.

In February, 1952, a letter went to each chairman, urging cooperation with the contest sponsored by the Charleston Gazette in West Virginia, called the Message to Moscow Contest. This contest was for students

from the ninth grade through high school to submit messages of not more than 150 words for use over the Voice of America radio. The prize was an all-expense trip to New York City for the person who submitted the "message" considered best. The student was then to read the message over the Voice of America program.

Written reports from West Virginia chapter chairmen are as follows: Buford Chapter, Mrs. Porter William Smith, chairman, reported that they used the C. A. R. Chapter for a program in Americanism. 12 C. A. R. members took part in the respective uniforms of Girl Scout, Boy Scout, (Cub), Camp Fire Girls and Y-Teen.

They used the Americanism quiz in rhyme on Famous Men of the Revolutionary period, which was sent by the state chairmen. The Americanism Committee of Buford Chapter attended and assisted with a Naturalization Ceremony at which time 10 aliens were made citizens. They presented flags and D. A. R. Manuals to the new citizens, assisted by the Boy Scouts.

The Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter mailed the Chronological Historical Quiz to all teachers of American History in McDowell County High Schools. The chairman made a talk over the radio on Americanism, sponsored by the McDowell Woman's Club, also made a talk to the Iaeger Woman's Club. The Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter sponsored the Message to Moscow Contest in the McDowell County High Schools. The Regent, Mrs. Edward D. Gibson, offered a cash prize of \$25.00 to the high school student in McDowell County who submitted the best "message." A senior in Welch High School, George Gates, won the \$25.00 and also won an additional \$25.00 from the Charleston Gazette for the best letter of the week. He was runner-up for Grand Prize, or trip to New York.

The Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter Americanism Committee assisted with the Naturalization Ceremony at which time 18 aliens became citizens. Our American Music Chairman sang "God Bless America." We gave flags and Manuals to the new citizens. We then went to lunch with the new citizens and the members of the court as guests of the American Legion Post No. 8.

The James Wood Chapter, Mrs. John Utterbach, chairman, reported that they always opened meetings with the American's Creed, and that the committee had two programs during the year, with excellent addresses on Americanism.

The John Chapman Chapter, Mrs. Walter Pollock, chairman, reported that they sponsored the Message to Moscow Contest in the Beaver High School.

The Colonel John Evans Chapter, Mrs. Lydia McBee, Chairman, reported that work with the foreign born is their chief interest. For four years they have had an Oversease Club of 25 foreign born women. 15 of the members are already citizens, the other 10 to become citizens very soon. They report that they give D. A. R. Manuals to be used as handbooks in some schools.

Matthew French Chapter, with Miss Emma Peck as chairman, made a most interesting report. They are really emphasizing Americanism through American History. Matthew French Chapter took all students from Prinecton High Schols who made straight "A's" in American History, on a bus trip to Charleston. They visited our beautiful Capitol, the County Airport, the Charleston Gazette offices and many other places of interest. In the three graded schools, the Matthew French Chapter awarded white satin ribbons, imprinted with the D. A. R. insignia, and "D. A. R. History Award 1952," to all who made straight "A's" in American History.

Shenandoah Valley Chapter reported that the Flag Quiz, sent to them by the State Chairman, was distributed in the Grades Schools. They reported also that the New Flag Code of Public Law 829 was distributed to Chapter members. Miss Hilda Linganfelter is the Americanism Chairman for the Shenandoah Valley Chapter.

Mrs. Joe Steinbeck, Trans-Allegheny Chairman of Americanism for her chapter, reported that they had very few foreigners to become citizens, but she requested literature and suggestions for Americanism

work.

I am advised that there are three excellent films available for Americanism programs. One of them, called "The Twentieth Century Pilgrim," concerns the naturalization proceedings and ceremony. I trust that all Americanism Chairmen will be given at least one program during the year for placing especial interest on Americanism. Any one of these films will make an interesting and instructive program. However, Americanism Chairmen can claim almost every program as an Americanism program, as the aim of all D. A. R. work is to promote and foster patriotic American Citizenship.

D. A. R. APPROVED SCHOOLS

This report covers the period March 1, 1951, to March 1, 1952. year turned out better than we expected. Of the forty-four chapters, forty reported work done; three made no report; and one reported nothing done. Thirty-nine chapters reported having an Approved Schools Chairman. Twenty-six programs held. Three chapters had members on Approved Schools tour. Three chapters have a total of thirty-one D. A. R. Ladies at Tamassee. Two chapters had an exhibit and sale.

Mrs. Paul P. Specht, chapter chairman of Shenandoah Valley, and Mrs. James Williamson, chapter chairman of William Henshaw, did a splendid job with the Exhibit and Sale during the State Conference at Martinsburg, in October, 1952. They distributed literature from all Martinsburg, in October, 1952. They distributed literature from all schools, and sold handicraft from Northland College, Crossnore, Pine

Mountain, Hindman, and the Berry Schools.

Thirty-nine chapters shipped a total of 136 boxes of new clothing, used clothing, and gifts to schools, valued at \$3,249.25. The total amount of cash sent to all schools was \$1,245.15; of this amount, \$89.42 was from The total amount of gifts sent schools was \$4,494.40, or \$901.30

more than was given the previous year.

The schools assisted were Kate Duncan Smith, Tamassee, Northland College, Crossnore, Berry Schools, Maryville College, Hindman, Pine Mountain, and Blue Ridge, or nine out of the 13 schools and colleges on the Approved List. The first four named received the substantial assistance, and the others received very little.

This present year, we are asking the chapters to continue sending cash gifts to the Revolving Fund at Tamassee, and cash gifts to the Crafts and Arts Building Fund at Northland College. And to send cash

contributions to Kate Duncan Smith for a Campus Light.

Please give Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee first consideration in the sending of boxes. Remember that we are paying the Executive Secretary's salary from the proceeds of the rummage sales at Kate Duncan Smith.

I want to take this means to thank every woman who has worked to help make our Approved Schools work a success. You have been wonderful and it has been a joy to work with you.

the forefathers had given them to us.

To faithfully enumerate the many details in connection with the work of the National Defense Chairman is too time consuming and the space allotted in the Proceedings would prohibit this. But be assured that the National Defense Program of the N. S. D. A. R. is truly American and challenges the Daughters to fight subversiveness in all its phases, Socialism, Communism, and all the isms.

Press Chairmen throughout the state, besides selling the state paper, worked together to increase the publicity by 2,000 inches over the 1951 report. A notable difference was the increase of stories prominent enough in news value to be placed on the front page. Special mention must go to Miss Elizabeth Stone, Major William Haymond Chapter, who achieved this goal not once but several times. Special mention goes also to Miss Ruth B. Willey, Shenandoah Valley Chapter, for her splendid coverage of State Conference in Martinsburg. She worked well and diligently to roll up the press inches for the state. As of August 25 the architect made a visit of inspection of the Bell The carved Eagles are in place and construction has reached beyond the Carillonneur's room to the openings in the belfry-the steel columns of the belfry frame were set-electricians were erecting the conduits, outlet boxes and other items pertaining to the electrical mechanism necessary for the Carillon—the walls of the Carillonneur's room had been satisfactorily completed—the aluminum handrail on the spiral staircase erected—inscriptions being carved in stone—bronze plate erected.

The amount needed to complete the Bell Tower is approximately \$38,000. Last April 19, 1952, the balance needed for construction was

\$53,840.85.
