OPENING SESSION

Thursday, October 29 - 8:30 P. M.

The opening session of the Forty-Eighth Annual State Conference, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia was held Thursday. October 29, 1953 at 8:30 P. M. in the Ball Room at the Daniel Boone Hotel.

The processional of National and State Officers and Honor Guests. escorted by Pages was preceded by the color bearers carrying the United States Flag, the West Virginia Banner, and the Daughters of the American Mrs. Charles A. Hariland, played the "Triumphal Revolution Banner. March" by Verdi.

The Conference was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. William McClaugherty, who declared the Forty-Eighth State Conference in session.

The invocation was given by Dr. John W. Hollister, District Superintendant of the Charleston District of the Methodist Church; the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by Mrs. Harry J. A telegram was read from Governor William C. Marland expressing regret in not being able to personally greet the members of the West Virginia Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, and extending good wishes for a pleasant and profitable conference.

The colors were retired and the meeting recessed until 9:30 A. M. Friday, October 30, 1953.

Following the meeting, the Kanawha Valley Chapter, Mrs. E. Forest Jones, Regent, entertained the Conference with a delightful reception. National Officers, State Officers, National and State Chairmen of National Committees and the Hostess Regents formed a receiving line to greet the guests.

The first business session of the Forty-Eighth Annual State Conference, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution was called to order by the State Regent, Mrs. William McClaugherty at 9:30 A. M. in Parlors A and B, Daniel Boone Hotel following the advancement of the Colors by the Pages.

The devotionals were conducted by the State Chaplain, Mrs. G. H. Neale, the Pledge to the Flag led by Mrs. Ross P. Daniel, Sr., State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag.

Mrs. J. Marion Bailey, General Chairman gave the report from the Program Committee.

It was moved by Mrs. Bailey and seconded "That the Program be accepted as printed." Motion carried.

Mrs. Millard T. Sisler read the Standing Rules of Order for the Con-ference and moved "That they be adopted as read." The motion was The motion was seconded and carried.

Standing Rules for the Procedure of the Forty-Eighth Annual State Conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia:

1. All sessions will begin promptly at the hour announced.

2. Delegates are expected to be in their seats before the opening of each session.

3. Doors will be closed during speeches, musical numbers and reports.

4. No delegate shall be entitled to the floor until she rises, gives her name and Chapter and is recognized by the chair.

5. No member shall speak more than once during the day to the same question, nor longer than three minutes at one time without leave of the assembly.

6. The reports of Chapter Regents and chairmen of State Committees shall be limited to two minutes each. Reports of absent members shall be filed.

7. A typewritten copy of each report must be handed to the Recording Secretary, after it is read.

8. All main motions must be presented in writing and signed by the maker.

9. All resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee.

10. Robert's Rules of Order, (revised) shall be the accepted authority on Parliamentary Law.

Mrs. Myra Johnson Posson, Chairman of the Credentials gave a preliminary report. Total registration so far, 241.

The State Regent asked the Vice Regent, Mrs. Edward Phillips to take the chair at which time she gave her report. Mrs. Phillips expressed the thanks and appreciation of the Conference for her excellent report.

The State Vice Regent gave her report.

The Chaplain reported 57 members lost by death this past year.

The Corresponding Secretary gave an oral report.

The Treasurer had pages pass copies of her report to the members.

It was moved by Mrs. Harry J. Smith and seconded "That the auditor's report be accepted." Motion carried.

The Registrar gave her report.

The Historian read her report and requested Chapter Historians to contact her before the close of the meeting.

The Librarian gave her report which completed the officers' reports. It was moved by Miss Hallie Martin and seconded by Mrs. W. H. Daniel "That the reports of the State Officers be accepted as read and placed on file." Motion carried.

The State Regent asked Miss Carraway, President General, to explain the points for the Honor Roll requirements and some of the projects of the National Society. She said that the former Caroline E. Holt Scholarship Fund was renamed the Caroline E. Holt Educational Fund, the income to be appropriated for educational purposes. It is now being used to educate negro girls to become nurses.

Miss Carraway stressed the importance of work by every member. D.A.R. is judged by each one of us. We must practice and preach our objectives.

Mrs. J. Marion Bailey, General Chairman, announced that tickets were still available for the banquet.

The National President, Children of the American Revolution, Mrs. Charles Carroll Haig was introduced to the Conference by the Regent. She gave a challenging talk, urging the members to form more C.A.R. Chapters and to think seriously of the slogan "What of Tomorrow.'

At this time the sad news was brought to the Conference of the passing of Mrs. A. Bruce Eagle. A beautiful tribute was paid Mrs. Eagle by the State Regent. She asked the Conference to bow in silent prayer and concluded with a prayer that the family and loved ones would find comfort from the Heavenly Father.

The colors were retired and the meeting recessed.

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded "That the resolution be adopted." Adopted.

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded "That certain of the resolutions from National Congress be combined and adopted as one." Motion carried.

2. Whereas certain of the resolutions adopted by the 62nd Continental Congress of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution are of vital national interest and should be given wide publicity among our membership, it is therefore resolved. That the 48th State Conference reaffirm the following Resolutions adopted by the 62nd Continental Congress:

(1) Law Making by Treaties; (2) United Nations; (3) Prisoners of War; (4) Investigation of Subversive Movements; (5) Children and Television Programs; (6) Narcotics; (7) Air Power; (8) Civil Defense; (9) Constitution Day; (10) National Holidays; (11) Preservation of Early Ship Records.

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded "That these resolutions he adopted." Adopted.

3. Resolved, That the West Virginia organization of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution continue to aid and encourage the West Virginia Society Children of the American Revolution in their activities.

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded "That this resolution be adopted." Adopted.

Before continuing with the resolutions an amendment to the By-Laws was acted upon, proposed by John Hart Chapter.

Amendment: Substitute for Article 8 Section 7, "Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference — this amount to be used in defraying all the expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference.. No Chapter whose State and Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

It was moved by Mrs. H. J. Smith, seconded by Mrs. G. H. Neale "That the amendment be adopted." Adopted.

4. Whereas, The State Regents of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution are finding it more difficult each year to secure a place in which to hold the Annual State Conference due to the lack of hotel accomodations in certain sections of the State, and

Whereas, The traditional custom of holding the Annual State Conference in the Sections of the State which can accommodate the delegation is becoming a financial burden on many of the Chapters, be it

Resolved, That the State Regent and her Executive Committee shall have the authority to select the place in which to hold the Annual Meeting, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference, and that the State Regent, aided by the General Chairman and Chapter Regents in the respective cities shall plan the program without elaborateness for the Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Annual Conference Dues be increased to two dollars (\$2.00) per delegate, to be used in defraying all of the expenses in connection with the holding of our State Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Conference expenses shall not exceed the Conference Dues, that no additional fees be added to the cost of the meals as served by the hotel and that all bills for conference expenses be approved and countersigned by the Finance Committee.

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded "That the resolution be adopted." Adopted.

5. Proposed by Colonel John Evans Chapter:

Resolved, That the Forty-eighth Annual State Conference of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia recommend to the National Board of Management further consideration of the possibility of inclusion of a subscription to the D.A.R. Magazine in the annual dues of each member by the addition of a magazine fee not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$.75).

It was moved by Mrs. Gibson and seconded by Mrs. James L. Tritchler "That the resolution be adopted."

MINUTES BOARD OF MANAGEMENT Thursday, October 29, 1953

The opening prayer was given by the State Chaplain, Mrs. G. H. Neale.

The State Regent reported that she had attended two National Board meetings. She stated that the National Society had renamed the Caroline E. Holt Scholarship Fund to be the Caroline E. Holt Educational Fund and that a part of the accuded interest would be used as scholarships for the training of negro nurses.

The State Regent spoke of the valuable material at National Headquarters for Chapter Regents, State and Chapter Chairmen and for programs. It was moved by Mrs. Edward S. Phillips "That the By-Laws be printed

in booklet form, in sufficient numbers to meet the needs of the Chapters" seconded and carried.

The State Regent asked that members be more careful with their papers — to have them checked before sending them to Washington. Mrs. McClaugherty also urged that we stress more History to our

children.

The National Society is requesting one dollar (\$1.00) from each Chapter

to restore the old and valuable paintings. The deadline for dues in Washington is February 1st. March 1st is the deadline for changes in names of delegates and alternates.

When speaking of the high school girls winning awards — call them "Good Citizens". It was suggested that the girls might be sent to the State Capital and be entertained at Morris Harvey College.

The State Regent expressed a hope that every Chapter would sponsor at least one Junior American Citizen Club, and work toward a Junior Committee.

A discussion was entered into to elect District Directors at the same time the State Officers are elected - and to serve for the same term. No action was taken.

The Amendment to the By-Laws Article VIII Section 7 was discussed.

The State Regent said that the fiftieth anniversary of the West Virginia State Conference would be in 1955. She expressed a hope that that meeting

might be held at the Greenbrier Hotel at White Sulphur Springs. Mrs. G. H. Neale moved "That the State Conference be held at the Greenbrier Hotel in 1955". Motion was seconded and carried.

The State Regent urged every member to encourage the display of Flags on National Holidays.

The Resolution on "Favoring State support for the State D.A.R. News" was discussed. Mrs. F. C. Hodges moved "That the West Virginia D. A. R. News he accepted as a State Project". Motion was seconded by Mrs. C. C. Hinkle and carried.

A Resolution concerning the publishing of a State History was with-drawn by Mrs. C. C. Hinkle, State Historian, since the book on Chapter Regents is being compiled by Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe. A motion was made, seconded and carried "That the State accept as a project the establishing of a beef herd at Tamassee."

Discussion "That a fund be created to take care of the needs of the State Chairmen." No action taken.

REPORT OF THE STATE REGISTRAR 1952 - 1953

Through the cooperation of the 45 Chapter Registrars, I should like to present a report of the State Membership and Ancestor files from Sept. 10, 1952 to Sept. 10, 1953.

While the State organization had a gain of 127 new, those resigned, transferred, dropped, and deceased, brought the chapter membership to 3204, a loss of 30 active members.

To continue as a successful organization, we must grow. Many women throughout the state are eligible for D. A. R. membership and each of us has the responsibility of contacting them and assisting them in establishing their ancestral lines. In doing so, we are ambassadors of the "American Way of Life", and loyal and patriotic citizenship. Let us kindle pride in our beautiful America, and awaken her women to this hour of Communistic peril, and the need to associate herself with this worthy organization.

Let us also be good ancestors ourselves and keep minute accounts of our families in scrap books, clippings, and photostatic copies of births. marriages, and deaths. Our population moves so freely about our nation, and fires, floods, and carelessness of man, causes posterity to lose many records.

I wish to thank the Chapter Registrars for conscientiously reporting the changes in membership promptly and for continuing to add information to the Ancestor file. This file contains the date of birth, marriage, and death, the Revolutionary service of the ancestor, his wife's maiden name, date of birth and death, the names of their children, the dates of their date of birth and death, the hames of their children, the dates of their births, marriages, and deaths. On the back of each card is a list of the names of the women who have joined the NSDAR as descendants, their National number, and the name of the chapter to which each is a member. The cards are being copied by the History and Archives department of our State and are available in the Library at Charleston as part of its permanent records. Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Registrar General, NSDAR announced that by vote of the National Board of Management on April 12, 1952, no more Supelemental papers will be accented for consideration until the ones now

Supplemental papers will be accepted for consideration until the ones now in the files have been processed.

While Mrs. Kenneth Troy Trewhella was Registrar General, she in-stituted a plan to replace the worn bindings on the volumes of National Application papers for the sum of \$4.00 each by the chapters. Attached to the inside cover of the volume is a bookplate giving the name of the con-tributor assuming the cost of rebinding. Mrs. Wallace asks your continued support of the project.

Your state historian has outlined the work to be accomplished this year. in our West Virginia D.A.R. News, September issue. A copy was mailed to each chapter historian, and to the regent where no historian is listed.

Armistice Day with proper observance. An address, "United Tribute to Famous Americans", February. Memorial and Flag Days fittingly observed. Colonel Morgan Morgan:—Six prizes given in city schools for best work Colonel Morgan Morgan:—Six prizes given in city schools for best work

in American history, value, \$24.00. Program by chapter historian, February; patriotic days with proper programs. Three members read American history text books. One member aided in placing historic shelf in public library in order.

Potomac Valley :--- Presentation of bill fold to eighth grade student making the highest average in American history.

Shenandoa' Valley :- Thirty eight certificates presented to Eighth Grade pupils in city and county schools for excellence in American history. Chapter members participated in the one hundred and seventy fifth birthday celebration, commemorating the founding of Martinsburg, by serving on the steering committee, doing research work, assisting with the music, costumes and pageant. An article, "Springfield Farm on the Conococheague" written by a chapter member, Mrs. F. W. Mich, Jr. was published in the Maryland Historical Magazine. Article, "Harper's Ferry as a National Monument" appearing in our October D.A.R. Magazine.

A reminder-that we do special work in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades of our schools as requested by our Historian General, and continue to mark the graves and historic spots in our state, sending information to the state historian.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

OCT. 1952-1953

In my article to Chapter Librarians in the West Virginia D.A.R. "News" I included the questionnaire so that, time being short, I would not have to write to each Chapter Regent to get the name of her Librarian. However, the list of "Wanted Books" was inadvertently omitted so I sent a letter to each Chapter Regent with the Questionnaire and List to be passed on to her Chapter Librarian. I had 27 replies, a few being from the Regents. I do hope I can obtain the rest of the names so that we can keep West Virginia on the Honor Roll of the Librarian General.

With the exception of one chapter all the chapters paid their assessment of two cents per member for the Library Fund. A following is a resume of the work of the reporting Chapters:

ANN ROYAL CHAPTER has been instrumental along with other organizations in keeping a Bookmobile service in operation. Their Chapter Library consisting of "out of print" works of Virginia and West Virginia is maintained in the home of a member.

BARBOURSVILLE CHAPTER has placed the D.A.R. magazine in the local library.

BEE LINE CHAPTER maintains a D.A.R. bookshelf in the local library, BLACKWATER CHAPTER secured a "wanted book", "The Genealogy of the Ham Family", through their State Librarian for the National Library in Washington. A phamplet, "Marriages Performed by The Reverend William Welch (1816-1867) Mineral County," was copied by myself and presented by Mrs. Harold Phelps to the National Library and to the State Library.

BLENNERHASSETT CHAPTER reports that they are saving "birthday money" to purchase a book this year.

BUFORD CHAPTER spent \$11.50 for books and phamplets on National Defense material for their Local Library and placed D.A.R. magazines and National Defense material in local Junior and Senior High Schools and in the local library.

CAPTAIN JAMES ALLEN, ELIZABETH CUMMINS JACKSON, JAMES BAREOUR, WEST AUGUSTA, and MOUND CHAPTERS reported the name of their Librarian and payment of two cent assessment.

COL. CHARLES LEWIS CHAPTER reports the D.A.R. magazine placed in each of the high schools in Mason County, and contributed magazines to the colored schools and schools not having subscriptions. A D.A.R. Memorial Shelf is maintained in the Public Library.

ELIZABETH ZANE CHAPTER piaced a D.A.R. magazine in Gibson Memorial Library and members contributed 12 copies to a rural teacher. SOUTH BRANCH VALLEY CHAPTER gave a yearly subscription of the D.A.R. magazines to each of the four graded and high schools.

WHEELING CHAPTER spent \$11.50 for the local library. They placed D.A.R. magazines and index and the Census of Virginia for 1790 in the local library. They maintain a D.A.R. Bookshelf and three bookcases of genealogical and record books in the local library.

The chapters have been very generous with contributions of money, supplies, gifts and clothing to the various N.S.D.A.R. approved American Indian Schools such as St. Mary's High School at Springfield, South Dakota and Bacone College, Bacone, Oklahoma.

The money needed for providing scholarship support for Bacone and St. Mary's and other schools must come from the chapters and members desiring to give our Indian population an opportunity for intelligent citizen-ship. We are growing more aware of this crying need each day.

The policy of the National Society is to stand firmly behind a strong educational program for our original Americans. Though our beautiful state of West Virginia may have few, if any Indians, our members feel this pressing need and will further the national policy in every way we can. Each chapter is asked to report by March 1 to the state chairman all blood donors from the membership and also any who give volunteer service at Veterans' or Military Hospitals as gray ladies, staff aides, motor service or other services given to those in the armed forces of our country.

AMERICANISM

A letter was sent to each chapter in West Virginia in October, 1952. The letter gave suggestions for programs on Americanism, including some names of films pertinent to our work and addresses of where they might be obtained. It also gave suggestions for work with schools, an Americanism Historical Quiz to be used at chapter meetings, club meetings, in schools or in any way the chapter chairman desired in her community.

Eleven chapters have sent the names of their Americanism chairmen to me. To date I have received reports from only seven chapters. They are: Captain James Allen, Beckley, Mrs. A. D. Cooke, chairman; Pack Horse Ford, Shepherdstown, Mrs. Ernest Stutzman, chairman; Blennerhassett, Parkersburg, Mrs. George Poling, chairman; Bee Line, Charlestown, Mrs. Marvin I. Edwards, chairman; Colonel Andrew Donnally, Welch, Mrs. Samuel Solins, chairman; James Wood, Parkersburg, Mrs. L. D. Dunsmoor, chairman; Matthew French, Princeton, Mrs. D. J. Bailey, chairman, Shenandoah Valley, Martinsburg, Miss Hilda Lingamfelter, chairman.

The most outstanding reports are from Bee Line, who prepared a Christmas Box for an alien family, and a gift for the new baby. They visited the homes of six alien families, distributed three Manuals, and gave prizes for good grades in American History in their High School.

James Wood—gave prizes for good grades in American History, and assisted with the public library in the community.

Colonel Andrew Donnally gave ten American History medals, conducted Americanism quiz at each meeting, the questions being printed with the program in the Year Book. They had two programs devoted to Americanism, one a film on Immigration, the other a talk on Americanism. They assisted with the Naturalization Day ccremony at the court house at which time eleven aliens were admitted as citizens. The chairman arranged the program in which the circuit judge, a federal representative, the American Legion. Boy Scouts (Cut), Girl Scouts all participated. Our state regent, Mrs. W. W. McClaugherty made the principal address of the day. The Welch Daily News carried the story and four pictures. The story was sent to our National D.A.R. Magazine and it appears in the September issue, along with two pictures. The chairman made talks on Americanism to several organizations in the county, including the Woman's Club. the Rotary Club of Church Women at Northfork. One member took forty Junior High school children to Charleston to visit the Capitol, State House and to see the Legislature in session.

Matthew French Chapter gave History Awards to thirty-five students who made straight A and they gave a \$50.00 scholarship to an outstanding high school student.

Shenandoah Valley chapter sponsored a German woman for naturalization, gave a Manual to her, and assisted her in learning American customs. Each member has called on her. They gave certificates of Award in 8th grade history to students who made A. Their theme for the year was THIS IS AMERICA. They had a speaker who spoke on American literature, and insisted on having American music. They urge the people in their community to display our American Flag on patriotic days. They subscribed for the D.A.R. Magazine to be sent to the high school. Several of their members took part in the Historical Pageant for the 175th Anniversary program and in the parade.

For 1953-54, we have again sent letters to each chapter, telling them that the committees of Americanism and D.A.R. Manual have been combined. Also, that the Americanism committee has assumed the work of the Girl Home-Makers and Human Conservation.

We shall hope for increased interest and reports from all of our fortyfive chapters on work done in 1953-54.

APPROVED SCHOOLS

Report for period March 1, 1952 to March 1, 1953. Forty-five D.A.R.

Report for period March 1, 1952 to March 1, 1953. Forty-five D.A.R. Chapters in West Virginia. Forty-one chapters have a chairman of Approved Schools. Twenty chapters had Approved Schools program. Thirty-eight D.A.R. Ladies at Tamassee, in five chapters. Thirty-nine chapters rendered the following assistance to the schools: Total amount of CASH sent to the schools, \$1,294.60; 108 boxes of new clothing; Christmas gifts; household articles, such as curtains, draperies, sheets, pillow cases, towels and wash rags; weaving materials; good used clothing, hats and shoes, estimated to be worth \$4,125.62. Total assistance, \$5,420.22. An Approved Schools Exhibit and Sale were held during the State Con-ference at Wheeling, and literature from all thirteen schools and colleges was distributed. An Approved Schools program was had at the State Con-ference, at which the State Chairman presided, and the speakers were Dr. Lewis H. Brumbaugh, President of Northland College, and Mr. Ralph H. Cain, Superintendent of Tamassee D.A.R. School. The Rev. D. C. Loving, Headmaster of Blueridge School, also, spoke in the State, and the National Chairman of Approved Schools, Mrs. Lowell E. Burnelle, was in the state two times during the year and spoke at meetings.

two times during the year and spoke at meetings. During the past three years' administration, forty-one chapters sent to the schools: CASH, \$3,675.25, and 352 boxes of new gifts, and used clothing, worth \$9,832.47, making a total of \$13,507.72 assistance to the schools from West Virginia.

It has been a pleasure to work with the outgoing State Regent, Mrs. A. Keith McClung, and her staff, and with the chapter regents and the chapter chairmen of approved schools. Interest is increasing in the work for our approved schools, and especially in our two D.A.R. owned schools, Kate Duncan Smith and Tamassee.

Many women over the state feel a keen interest in the welfare of the schools and colleges, and it is to these women that we are indebted for what has been done for the schools.

PRESS RELATIONS

1953

The State Press Relations Committee has increased in service during 1952. Along with the customary duties of advising chapter chairmen, furnishing news releases, etc., has been the opportunity of editing and publishing the West Virginia D.A.R. News with all its editorial and financial problems. Chapter chairmen have responded nobly to the challenge of reporting news to local papers, providing news for the State paper, and then acting as salesmen for the State paper. We are very proud of them.

A roll of 44 chapters shows: 1 chapter takes 6 papers; 3 chapters take 7 copies; 6 chapters take 5 copies; 2 take 8 copies; 15 take 10 copies; 9 take 15 copies; 4 take 20 copies; 1 takes 25 copies; and 3 take 30 copies. This is the usual order and does not include extra copies requested.

Mrs. Fred Pelter, John Chapman chapter, Mrs. R. W. Knotts, John Hart chapter, and Miss Elizabeth Stone, Major William Haymond chapter are chairmen in chapters taking 30 papers per issue. Mrs. Holly Simmons, Col. Charles Lewis chapter deserves special commendation for being one of the most faithful reporters to the State paper.

For outstanding achievement in obtaining news in local papers, we must mention Miss Louise Bullock, James Wood chapter. Miss Elizabeth Stone, and Miss Mary K. Barnes who have consistently taken publicity out of the society page and put it on the front page. This is particularly good, because it shows the public that our society works as well as plays.

PROGRAM

The Program Committee was created by vote of the National Board of Management. February 3, 1949, for the purpose of assisting chapters to plan programs relative to the educational, historical, and patriotic objectives of the National Society.

The Committee prepares a Theme with an Outline for Chapter Programs which is sent to each chapter chairman. The Program Committee office at National Headquarters has over 5,000 papers in its files ranging in a wide variety of subjects suitable for D.A.R. programs, which are available to members for a rental fee of twenty-five cents each for thirty days. A catalogue with an up to-date mimeographed supplement, twenty-five cents each, lists the titles of papers according to special headings; other mineographed supplements lists names of plays, pageants, kodachrome slides and radio scripts.

Due to the demand for program material on the subject of world affairs, chapters are urged to send copies of their best papers for our files. The National Reviewing Committee accepts only subjects that are of national scope; all other subjects are kept in the state files.

A set of kodachrome slides, with a descriptive text, showing the exterior and interior views at National Headquarters, State Rooms in Memorial Continental Hall, and the 61st Continental Congress may be purchased for \$12.00 per set. It is suggested that each State Society buy a set of each group of slides to show at state, district, and chapter meetings. Use 35 MM slide projector, and portable screen.

ADVANCEMENT AMERICAN MUSIC

As State Chairman of the Advancement of American Music Committee. I submit the following, as reported from the Chapters: ANN ROYAL—at most meetings had musical numbers in connection

with the programs.

BARBOURSVILLE—had one entire program on the history and de-velopment of American Music, stressing folk Music. BEE LINE—had one entire program on American Music.

BEE LINE—nad one entire program on American Music. BLENNERHASSET—during the year have had at different times talks from the members on early American Music. The April meeting was a pro-gram on early American Music beginning with the music of the Indian— then followed the Slave Music—the first Colonial settlers—and the diffi-culties encountered in the development of music over the long period

beginning in 1607 and ending with the accomplishments of the present day. At this meeting two very old songs: "Sweet Musidora of Granada" (a Spanish ballad) and "Drawing Nearer My Home" a sacred burial hymn of the early 1800s, were sung by one of the older members. COL. ANDREW DONNALLY-one musical program.

COL. JOHN EVANS-open meetings with Star Spangled Banner. The Christmas meeting was carols and musical numbers, and one Chapter meeting devoted to American Music.

COL. MORGAN MORGAN-the Star Spangled Banner is used at chapter meetings. Music has been a feature at almost every month's meeting in coordination with the program or speaker for that particular month including Patriotic Music, Indian Music, Choral music, Folk songs, Solos, instrumental music, and group singing. ELIZABETH ZANE-did not have a chairman of American Music last

year.

JENNIE WILEY—Chapter Chairman is making a collection of American folk songs especially Tug and Big Sandy Valley region. The members know all verses of Star Bangled Banner. They have an album of Indian music and Stephen Foster.

JOHN CHAPMAN-one musical program during the year and one musical radio program each year.

MATTHEW FRENCH-a program on "American Heritage in Music" with the speaker concentrating on the Revolutionary period. The vocalist used folk songs accompanied with the auto harp.

MOUND—One verse of the National Anthem is sung at every meeting. Two meetings this past year were devoted especially to music - at one, the speaker used for his topic,"Organ Music - Enriching the Life of Man". With this there was special music using both organ and piano. The December meeting was entirely a musical program including a group of High School girls. Other musical numbers are used frequently on other programs during the year.

PACK HORSE FORD-one musical program during the year. This was a program of stories and the singing of election songs of other years.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY—Each year the chapter has one program on American Music. The December meeting always includes music, and many other meetings during the year have musical numbers included in the program. Some are vocal and some instrumental, sometimes rendered by our own chapter members and sometimes by invited guests.

WEST AUGUSTA-Programs during the year included music of MacDowell, Carrie Jacobs Bond, Gershwin, Peabody, and Stephen Foster. Piano, voice and trombone were the instruments that were used on many of these programs.

The Chapter House has not been neglected. New stone steps were built, the mantel adjusted for better heating, a fine new screen made to fit fireplace, and complete renovation of the kitchen and dinette ceilings. A handsome five piece silver service was purchased by donations and money made by magazine ads. A nice large tray, and a small tray were gifts. Another gift was a beautiful silver antique cake basket, and crystal candelabra. A two hundred year old silver ladle, an heirloom of the Lee family, was presented by Mrs. Geiger.

Buford sold \$712.00 in magazine advertisements-making us second in the state.

BY-LAWS

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this body shall be the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The object of this Organization shall be to bring into closer relationship the Chapters of West Virginia and to promote the three objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an en-

chtened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of

American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American edom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. All Chapters in the State in good and regular standing in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, shall be eligible to membership in this Organization.

Section 2. Any Chapter after confirmation by the National Society may become a member by sending to the State Registrar and the State Recording Secretary the name of the Chapter, the names of its officers, the names of its members and by sending the State assessments to the State Treasurer.

Section 3. A member-at-large of the State, shall not be eligible as a delegate or an alternate to the meetings of the National Society or State Organization, or hold a National or State Office or serve on a National or State Committee.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

The Officers of this Organization shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian and a State Librarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary.

ARTICLE V

Election of Officers

Section 1. The Officers of this Organization shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the State Conference, every third year. A majority vote shall constitute an election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained. Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for

Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. All State Officers shall assume office when the Continental Congress confirms the election of the State Regent and State Vice Regent.

Section 4. No member shall be eligible to any State Office until she has been a member of the West Virginia Organization at least two years. No member shall be eligible to the same State Office for two consecutive terms and no member who has served one term in any State Office shall be eligible to any other State Office, except that of State Vice Regent or State Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

Section 5. No member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying a vote at the State Conference.

Section 6. No member shall be eligible to the State Regency who has not served previously as a State Officer. No Chapter shall be eligible to representation on the Board for more than three consecutive terms, exclusive of Chapter Regents.

Section 7. Should the office of the State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall accede to that office for the remainder of that term. Other vacancies occuring in office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next annual meeting of the State Conference. Any member having served in a vacancy for more than one-half term in any office, except the office of State Regent and State Vice Regent, shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 8. In recognition of valuable service to the State Organization, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a majority vote at any State Conference upon a member who has held the office of State Regent.

Section 9. Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General from West Virginia shall be made by the Nominating Committee at the annual meeting of the State Conference. There may be nominations from the floor. The vote shall be by ballot; a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee, appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be exofficio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Regent shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Section 2. The State Vice Regent, in the absence of the State Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all State Meetings with the reading of scripture and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as

occasion may require. She shall conduct the Memorial Service at each State Conference and prepare the necrology for the State.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers, Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings alfecting or pertaining to them.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of her office and such other correspondence as the State Regent. State Organization, the State Board of Management and the State Executive Committee may direct. She shall send out the notices of all meetings and shall distribute all literature.

The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and Section 6. securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills duly authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. All bills shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee prior to their payment. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. On or before the first day of April each year she shall send to the Chairman of the National Committee on Credentials, the names of the Chapters in West Virginia that are delinquent in the payment of dues to the State Organization. The books shall close on the fifteenth day of September each year. An Audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by in Auditor approved by the Board of Management. She shall within thirty lays of her retirement, turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and coks of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for payment of bills duly authorized.

Seciton 7. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligibility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Registrar General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keep a card file containing the name, address, name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, re-instatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband.

Section 8. The State Historian shall direct and encourage the Historical work in West Virgina through Chapter Historians and shall incorporate in her annual report, such outstanding report from Chapter Historians as may be of future value to the State. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Historian General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. She shall prepare for the Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution the State reports of grave locations, dates and service records of Revolutionary soldiers, sailors and patriots. She shall have custody of all historical or biographical manuscripts of which the State Organization may become possessed, and shall arrange and preserve the same.

Section 9. The State Librarian shall have charge of all books and magazines of which the State Organization may become possessed, with the exception of these provided for elsewhere. She shall have charge of soliciting gifts, negotiating exchanges and purchasing new volumes for the Library of the National Society. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Librarian General and the State Organization.

Section 10. All Officers shall submit, in duplicate, a brief narrative report of their work to the Annual Conference.

ARTICLE VII

Meeting of the State Organization Section 1. The Annual Conference of the West Virginia State Organi-zation shall be held in October during the week including the day of October the tenth, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board or Mangaement; the exact date shall be determined by the State Board State Regent. The place of meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Mangement unless previously named by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the receiving of reports of officers, State Board of Management, the chairmen of committees, the election of officers and for any other business that may arise. Section 2. The report of the Program Committee when adopted shall

become the order of Business for the annual Conference. A vote of a majority of all registered delegates is necessary to make a change in the program.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates and alternates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall be the Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.

Section 4. The voting members of the State Conference or at any special meeting of the State Organization shall be its Officers, the Officers and Honorary Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents of West Virginia, the Chapter Re-gents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents, or alternates, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society.

Section 5. One credential blank must be sent to the Chairman of Credentials Committee and the other to the State Regent not later than ten days before the annual meeting of the State Conference.

Section 6. Twenty (20) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII

Fees and Dues

The fiscal year of the State Organization shall be September Section 1. 15th, to September 15th.

To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter Section 2. belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January, thirty-five cents (35c) per capita for each member on the Chapter roll the first day of January, and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chapters as of January 1. presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference. Said

dues and assessments shall be remitted in one payment. Section 3. The Chapters shall send to the State Treasurer, the State dues and assessments for the current year for all members accepted to membership by the National Society between January 1, and June 30, of each year. Such members shall pay the required dues and assessments again the following year.

The dues and assessments of all members accepted by the Section 4. National Society after June 30, of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 5. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent to defray her expenses to the National and State Meetings and for expenses pertaining to her office to the amount of the above sum.

Section 6. The remaining State dues may be used for printing, stationery for State Officers and State Chairmen and necessary expenses incurred by other State Officers and State Chairmen. All bills which the State is liable shall be itemized and presented to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not later than September 1, of each year in which the debt is incurred.

Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all the expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State and Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

ARTICLE IX

State Board of Management

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization and the Chapter Regents shall constitute the Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Mangement shall meet at the call of the State Regent. One meeting shall precede the State Conference and one meeting shall follow the State Conference. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent upon written request of five members of the Board. At least five days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given all members of the Board.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Organization during the interim between its meetings, except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board of Management shall make an annual report to the State Conference.

Section 4. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Mangement.

ARTICLE X

Executive Committee

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization shall compose the Executive Committee. The State Board of Management may authorize this Committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent or upon the written request of five members of the Committee. This Committee shall act as adviser to the State Regent and it shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 2. A recommendation for a project to be considered by the State Conference must be submitted to the Executive Committee on or before September 1. If the proposal meets with the approval of the Executiv Committee and the State Board of Management it shall be submitted to the Finance Committee for consideration and if recommended by the Finance Committee presented to the State Conference for adoption.

Section 3. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI

Committees

Section 1. At the close of the State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following committes: Finance, Resolutions, and Credentials.

Section 2. The Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and four members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds, plan a budget, and recommend to the State Conference such expenditures as the committee deems expedient.

Section 3. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent. All resolutions to be presented at the State Conference must be sent to the chairman at least two weeks before the meeting. The name and address of the chairman shall be included in the call for the State Conference. The committee shall consider all resolutions sent to the chairman and shall recommend suitable action thereon when presenting the resolutions to the meeting.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall consist of four members, the chairman, to be appointed by the State Regent, the State Treasurer and two members to be appointed from the Hostess Chapters.

ARTICLE XII

Chapters

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Organization shall elect Officers at the time of, or previous to, the May Meeting of said Conference.

Section 2. The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary and the State Treasurer of the election of Officers.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter in the State Organization shall send to the State Regent annually on or before March 1, a typewritten report of the work of her Chapter for the year. Section 4. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the

Section 4. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the work of her Chapter from October 1, to October 1. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words, one copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference, one copy to the State Regent and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

ARTICLE XIII

Districts

Section 1. The State Organization may be divided into the following districts: Northern, Central, Eastern, Southern and Western, each district having a Director and a Secretary and other necessary officers.

Section 2. Each district shall elect its own Director and Secretary and other necessary officers, the election taking place at the District Meeting. The term of office shall be one year. No member who holds a State Office or the office of Chapter Regent shall be eligible for the office of District Director.

ARTICLE XIV

Parliamentary Authority

THE RULES CONTAINED IN Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this State Organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE XV

Amendments

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual State Conference by a two-thirds vote, provided that a copy of the amendments has been sent with the call to the annual meeting. Amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the meeting at which they are adopted.* Section 2. Amendments may be proposed by the State Conference, by the State Board of Management, or by a committee authorized by the State Conference, or by a Chapter.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society effecting the work of the State Organization shall become a law of the Organization without notice of the amendment.
