While surrounded by her many friends, and doing that which was dearest to her heart, God, in His Infinite Wisdom, called Home, Bessie Harley Eagle, Nat. No. 159,673, a charter member of Shenandoah Valley Chapter,

Daughters of the American Revolution.

The many offices which Mrs. Eagle so ably filled, and her generous support of all D.A.R. projects, are too numerous to record herewith. Chapter - State - National, - she filled each with dignity and efficiency that brought joy to her heart and honor to her Society. At the time of her sudden passing, she was serving the National Society as Adviser to the Museum, having served as State Chairman of Museum and State Librarian.

We will not dwell on the intensity of sorrow that now overwhelms us, but rather will we speak of her goodly deeds, - declare her greatness, - make known her selflessness, and reaffirm her love for the Master.

Early in life Mrs. Eagle dedicated her life to God, and raised her voice

in the Praise of His Holy Word.

Later as a wife and Mother she built a most beautiful home life and then necessity caused her to become a most considerate grandmother and Mother combined.

Many were the organizations that sought her time, coveted her expert knowledge, used her wide experience, depended upon her executive ability, relied on her judgment, and enjoyed her prestige and gracious charm.

The spark of her genius kindled a flame that will survive throughout this Society and will be a lasting monument to her unique creative ability; just as the warmth of her personality, her unfailing patience and generosity, her unlimited capacity for friendship created for her a revered niche in the hearts of all with whom she came in contact.

We shall long for the "touch of her vanished hand," for the friendliness of her cordial greeting, - for the helpfulness of her kindly words of wisdom, cheer and guidance. We shall miss her leadership. The remem-

brance of her is Dear and Blessed.

TRIBUTE TO MRS. ROBERT BYERS FELTON, STATE LIBRARIAN

On Sunday, June 6, God called the spirit of Janet Byers McCulloch

Felton from her earthly, to a Heavenly home.

Janet was born March 8, 1921, in Point Pleasant - the daughter of

Alexander Byers McCulloch and Julia Ryan McCulloch.

She graduated from Point Pleasant High School in 1939; in 1943 from Ohio University, Athens, Ohio. During World War II she was employed by Military Intelligence.

In 1945, December 31, Janet married Robert A. Felton and came to Parsons to reside. Two charming children joined them, named Jeffery Ryan

and Julia Marie.

Coming from a family having a deep interest in the Daughters of the American Revolution, Janet followed in the footsteps of her revered grand-mother, Delia McCulloch, former State Historian, and her aunt, Mrs. William Steenbergen, who is perhaps the eldest past regent (chapter) in the state, serving as regent of the Pcint Pleasant Chapter in 1907.

Knowing that the work of the Daughters was very near Janet's heart, her husband encouraged her in every way to work with the Daughters, and was very proud of her accomplishments. Janet served them faithfully until

her call came.

She was a devout member of the Presbyterian Church, active in Women's Club, and was past regent of Blackwater Chapter and State Librarian. Janet also had time to be a devoted Mother and evince much interest in her home, and her husband's work.

It has been said, "The clock of Life is wound but once, and no man has the power to tell just when the hands will stop — At early or late hour". God's clear call loosened the silver cord, and suddenly we lost a Dear Friend

and loyal Daughter.

THE FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE OF WEST VIRGINIA N. S. D. A. R. MINUTES OF

OPENING SESSION

Thursday, October 28, 1954

The meeting was declared recessed until Friday 9 A. M.

FRIDAY MORNING

The Friday Morning Session was called to order by the State Regent. Mrs. William McClaugherty, at 9 A. M. in the Ball Room of the Stonewall Jackson Hotel in Clarksburg.

The Colors were advanced by the pages, and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag and the American's Creed, led by Mrs. Ross P. Daniel, State Chairman of Correct Use of the Flag, recited by the assembly.

The National Anthem was sung.

Devotionals were conducted by Mrs. G. H. Neale, State Chaplain. Mrs. Myra Johnson Posson, Chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave her preliminary report. Total registration 223.

The Chair announced that the registration would close at 5 P. M.

Friday, October 30.

Miss Hallie Martin, Program Chairman, presented the program and moved that it be adopted as printed, with a few corrections. The motion was seconded by Miss Marjorie Templeton and carried.

Mrs. D. W. Snyder read the Standing Rules of Order and moved that they be adopted as read. Motion was seconded and carried.

1. All sessions will begin promptly at the hour announced.

2. Delegates are expected to be in their seats before the opening of each session.

3. Doors will be closed during speeches, musical numbers and reports.
4. No delegate shall be entitled to the floor until she rises, gives her

name and Chapter and is recognized by the chair.

5. No member shall speak more than once during the day to the same question, nor longer than three minutes at one time without leave of the assembly.

6. The reports of Chapter Regents and chairmen of State Committees shall be limited to two minutes each. Reports of absent members shall be

filed.

7. A typewritten copy of each report must be handed to the Recording Secretary, after it is read.

8. All main motions must be presented in writing and signed by the

maker.

9. All resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee. 10. Robert's Rules of Order, (revised) shall be the accepted authority on Parliamentary Law.

Mrs. W. H. Daniel, State Chairman of Resolutions presented the fol-

lowing Resolutions which were adopted:

RESOLUTIONS PRESENTED TO THE 49TH ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE OF THE WEST VIRGINIA ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Resolved, That the 49th Annual State Conference of the West Virginia Organization of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm allegiance to the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution of which we are primarily a part and assure the national officers of our loyalty and willingness to cooperate with them at all times.

Whereas, Certain of the resolutions adopted by the 63rd Continental Congress of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution are of vital national interest and should be given wide publicity among our membership, be it therefore Resolved, That the 49th State Conference reaffirm the following Resolutions adopted by the 63rd Continental Congress:

THE SPIRIT OF AMERICA

Whereas, In these crucial times citizens need constructive programs in Americanism in order to understand and value the advantages and benefits of the Constitutional Government, economic systems and way of life which have made this Nation so strong and influential;

Resolved, That Daughters of the American Revolution emphasize at chapter meetings, school exercises and public gatherings the privileges and responsibilities under the American heritage, to the end that the Spirit

of America he perpetuated.

UNITED NATIONS AND WORLD GOVERNMENT

Whereas, Revision of the Charter of the United Nations organization is scheduled for consideration in 1955 and many groups are already endeavering to convert the United Nations into a world government or partial world government, despite its basic concept as a federation of sovereign nations:

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, reaffirm its opposition to any change in the United Nations Charter which might cause the surrender of the traditional sovereignty of the United States of America and consequent loss to our elected representatives of their Constitutional rights to make domestic laws and declare war;

Resolved, That we believe it to be essential that the veto power be retained in the Security Council.

OPPOSITION TO RED CHINA

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution go on record as strongly opposing the admission of Red China as a member of the United Nations.

WIRE TAPPING

Whereas. It has been impossible to convict suspected subversives because the Statute of Limitations remains in force for only three years and

wire tapping evidence is not admissible in Federal Courts;

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, approve the passage of laws extending the Statute of Limitations and permitting the introduction of evidence obtained by wire tapping in cases involving national security and defense, upon written permission to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by the Attorney General,

STRATEGIC MATERIALS

Whereas, In this age of atomic warfare the safety and security of the United States demand vast supplies of readily accessible minerals, metals and other materials to sustain an adequate defense in case of national emergency; and

Whereas, Recent Senate hearings have disclosed that approximately 77 per cent of this Nation's stockpile of critical and strategic materials has been acquired from distant foreign areas which would be difficult or im-

possible to reach under war conditions;

Resolved, That encouragement be given to the conservation and development of natural resources within the United States and the Western Hemisphere to make this country self-sufficient in the production of critical materials essential for national defense and for expanding economy during times of peace.

PRAISE FOR FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, reiterate its confidence in the Federal Bureau of Investigation and its Director, J. Edgar Hoover, with commendation for its past record and request Congress for appropriations adequate to continue and expand its effective services.

TEACHING OF HISTORY AND CIVICS

Whereas, One of the primary objectives of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, is to stress the teaching of American hishistory in our schools, colleges and universities so as to enable all young people to have a better knowledge of our country; and

Whereas, Knowledge of our governmental system and procedure is

essential for good citizenship;

Resolved, That our members make earnest effort to see that American history and civics are taught in all schools of their respective States as required courses.

SUBVERSIVE INFLUENCE IN EDUCATION

Resolved, That the Daughters of the American Revolution continue to seek in their local communities effective measures to secure the suspension and dismissal of teachers who have demonstrated their unsuitability to teach because of their collaboration with the Communist conspiracy, as well as those who, having invoked the Fifth Amendment rather than admit membership in the Communist organization before a duly constituted authority, have violated their trust and forfeited their right to shape the character of our youth; continue to seek the appointment of instructors of diligent and loyal citizenship as well as of professional competence; and continue to exert every effort to restore to the curriculum simple, undenominational religious instruction and studies in United States history and civies presented in a manner designed to inculcate love of God and country. and faith in our Constitution and ideals.

RESIDENT ALIENS

Whereas, According to statistics, there are more than 2,600,000 aliens over 21 years of age living in the United States of America who have not taken out citizenship papers, and 250,000 new aliens enter the country each year and all are potential citizens; and

Whereas, Under the law, most persons must live in the United States

for a period of five years before they may become citizens;

Resolved, That the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, within its states and chapters obtain the names of aliens coming into our country in various communities where they locate, in order to seek out these potential citizens, giving them manuals for citizenship and friendly guidance to help them to understand our ideals and to learn what this country stands for.

ANTARCTICA

Whereas, The United States of America has discovered, explored and claimed more territory in the South Polar region than all other nations combined; and

Whereas, This region not only is an untapped reservoir of natural resources, but is of extreme strategic value in the interest of our national de-

fense; and

Whereas, The United States of America has done nothing to advance the claims so acquired, although seven other countries each claims a portion of Antarctica, and one nation lays claim to all of it;
Resolved, That the Congress be urged to pass H. J. Res. 353 and to take

all steps necessary to protect and preserve our claims to Antarctica.

YOUTH GUIDANCE

Whereas, Reports from reliable authorities on the subject have informed the public that juvenile delinquency has greatly increased, especially in the lower age brackets, which situation now constitutes a serious and tragic menace, both to the lives of the persons involved and to the future of the Republic;

Resolved, That the Daughters of the American Revolution determine to develop in themselves and in their respective communities an increased and active awareness of the necessity of providing a healthy and well-ordered environment and training in the home, in the school and for the leisuretime activities of the youth of our Nation, that there may be steadily developed in them a sense of the dignity of life and an understanding of the importance of moral, civic and spiritual responsibility.

SPIRITUAL CRUSADE

Whereas, America is one of the greatest strongholds of faith, freedom and enterprise, and

There is widespread alarm throughout the free world he-Whereas, cause of the Communistic effort to engulf all peoples, and

Whereas, Efforts to promote the overthrow of our Government by

force are being advocated by certain subversives among us;

Resolved, That this organization call upon its members and the Nation to enter immediately upon a national program of spiritual revitalization to strengthen our fight for Christianity vs. Communism, make God an active partner in our citizenship and conduct, and His law our path to faith. victory and peace.

PROPOSED PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION OF WEST VIRGINIA. PRESENTED TO THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE BY BARBOURSVILLE CHAPTER

Whereas, Our Founding Fathers came to America to establish a government that would be a stronghold of faith, freedom and enterprise, and Whereas, On arrival they gave fervent thanks to the God of their

fathers, acknowledging their allegiance to Him, and

Whereas, The Constitution of the State of West Virginia has no preamble acknowledging the allegiance of the citizens of our State to our

Almighty God; Resolved, That the West Virginia Organization of the N.S.D.A.R. respectfully memorialize the State Legislature of West Virginia that that ody take the necessary steps to correct this omission in our Constitution.

Resolved, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the President of e Senate and to the Speaker of the House of Delegates.

PROPOSED BUILDING FOR THE STATE MUSEUM

Resolution of the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Society at Parkersburg, West Virginia, unanimously adopted January 14, 1954.

Presented to the Northern District by Mrs. Nancy Stout Beckwith, of the Adopted by the Northern District and ordered Blennerhassett Chapter. presented to State Conference for consideration.

Whereas, On November 12, 1953, there appeared before the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Society as a guest speaker Mr. Herman Everett Gieske, editor of The Parkersburg News, and

Whereas, during the course of his remarks, Mr. Gieske urged the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Society to take the iniative in supporting a new and more adequate building to be devoted entirely to the purpose of a West Virginia State Museum, and

Whereas, such an ultra-modern Museum, fully adequate to the present and future needs of the people of West Virginia long had been approved and discussed by the membership of the West Augusta Historical Society, and

Whereas, It was proposed that the West Virginia Legislature ought to approve an enabling act for study of such a Museum not later than the 1955 session of the Legislature, and

Whereas, it was proposed a comprehensive finance plan after due

consideration be presented to the people, and Whereas, it was suggested that the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Society give to this project its fullest and most enthusiastic support, and

Whereas, It was advocated such a Museum of Archives and Historical

Exhibits should be a building of beautiful architectural impressiveness and dignity, and should be built to last for centuries, containing memorials of the people's own activities on the battlefields, in the laboratories, on the farms, in the mines, and in the factories, in their schools, their churches, and their homes, and

Whereas, Such a project, properly supported by our Legislature, would be of great value to present and future children of West Virginia, Therefore,

be it

Resolved, That the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Society give their unstinted support to such a project, and to so advise fellow societies and organizations throughout the State, and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to the Governor of West Virginia, to the members of the West Virginia Legislature, and to the press and other public organizations for suitable action thereon.

Resolved, That the West Virginia Organization of the N.S.D.A.R. ap-

prove the foregoing resolution as adopted by the West Augusta Historical and Genealogical Socitey.

RESOLUTION RE-AFFIRMING STATE SUPPORT FOR C. A. R.

Resolved, That the West Virginia Organization of the National Society. Daughters of the American Revolution continue to aid and encourge the West Virginia Society Children of American Revolution in their activities.

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STATE REGISTRAR'S REPORT

Your State Registrar is happy to report a growth in the membership West Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution, with the formation of the Nathan Davis Chapter at West Union, General Andrew Lewis Chapter. Lewisburg, and many new members in the present chapters over the State.

The principal duty of the State Registrar is to keep up to date, by chapters, the card file containing the name, address, National number, date admitted, transferred, re-instated, resigned, dates of marriage, and death of members, copies of which the Chapter Registrar mail her, when the Registrar General notifies her of the action of the National Board of Management. She is also in charge of the Ancestor File card system. This file contains the date of birth, marriage, and death, the Revolutionary service of the Ancestor, the statistics concerning his wife and children. On the back of each ancestor card is a list of the descendants who have joined NSDAR, their National numbers, and the names of the chapters of which they are members. Copies of the Ancestor cards are part of the permanent records in the State History and Archives at Charleston. West Virginia is one of the few states having an Ancestor file. Fifteen cards were added Bee Line joins the list of chapters completing their ancestor this year. records to date.

The Carnegie Library at Parkersburg has added "A Census of Pensioners for Revolutionary or Military Services With Their Names, Ages, and Places of Residence As Returned by the Marshalls of the Seven Judicial Districts Under the Act for Taking the Sixth Census." The book was published by "Authority of an Act of Congress Under Direction of the Secretary of the State." The publication date was 1841. This valuable research

book may be the means of establishing several new lines which will result in many new members throughout West Virginia.

Mrs. Leonard D. Wallace, Registrar General, NSDAR, announced that by vote of the National Board of Management, Supplemental papers will be accepted for consideration after March 7, 1955. The fee will be \$10 for each supplemental line. Mrs. Wallace asks your continued support of the plan to replace the worn bindings on the volumes of National Application appears by the contribution of \$4.00 each chapter. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE STATE HISTORIAN

Outline of the work to be accomplished during the current year sent to each chapter Historian or Regent. The following chapters responded, as follows:

BARBOURSVILLE: Two medals in sixth grade, two papers received

for the Musuem which is started at Toll House, also other items of histori-

cal interest.

BUFORD: Fourteen good citizenship to giris in junior and senior high school, also one in Marshall College Laboratory School; eligibility for medals included knowing and appreciating history of country, both local and national. Text books in American History examined, arrangement for the third verse of our National Anthem to be memorized and sung frequently, fifth grade students in local and parochial schools in Cabell County. Special celebration of Washington's Birthday held in sixth grade, including patriotic songs, poems and booklets made, also an historical pageant or playlet given. which was original.

CAPTAIN JAMES ALLEN: Four history awards, five dollars each, given to junior and senior high schools; text books in grades through the seventh for subversive ideas. This was done by a committee of which Mrs. Dickerson, Principal was chairman. All books were found to be very good. A patriotic program was given by the junior high school teachers, which in-

cluded a pageant of the Washington era.

COLONEL ANDREW DONNALLY: Ten history medals awarded to junior high school students, one program on "Famous Homes of America",

one historical "quiz" program.

COLONEL MORGAN MORGAN: Professor G. E. Moore, Fairmont State College, history department addressed the chapter, and upon suggestion, the historical work being done in the county schools was investigated. Many interested students were found, and as a result a gold medal was awarded to the student having the highest average in American History. in the six schools contacted. Medals were also awarded in the elementary schools, six in the eighth grade, two in seventh grades, two in fifth grades. Our awards were made on Flag Day and those who received medals were the chapter's guests, as were the parents who responded one hundred percent. Also a high school student won the award, oratorical, on "The U.S. Constitution - Ours to Defend". An historical playlet was presented in February, in keeping with this patriotic month.

DANIEL DAVISSON: Seven historical and one anniversary program

observed; ten pins for good citizenship.

ELIZABETH CUMMINS JACKSON: One historical tour sponsored; four historical meetings; one historic spot marked; all historical birthdays observed.

ELIZABETH ZANE: Four prizes in money for students with highest average in history. School texts inspected; four historical programs given; one soldier's grave marked; one scrap book kept; two patriotic anniversaries observed; marking and listing of graves of soldiers in county; donated to public library one book each month for young readers of America.

Four medals awarded, one college medal, two JOHN CHAPMAN:

junior medals, one grade school medal, three historical programs given.

JOHN HART: Ten history prizes, value five dollars each; one good citizenship medal.

JAMES WOOD: Historical program for collecting money for St. Mary's

School for Indian Girls.

JOHN YOUNG: Junior Committee raised money, made arrangements and unveiled, Dec. 19. on the 159th anniversary of the passage of the law by the Virginia Assembly, of the organization of the town of Charleston, a bronze plaque. Also the Juniors placed the February display in the children's musuem of the Kanawha County Library. This featured George Washington and Lincoln authentically dressed dolls; Thomas A. Edison and his many inventions also. A "quiz" program was given by the chapter concerning many famous sons and daughters in the February month whose lives were an inspiration to American youths.

students in history.

Eight good citizenship medals awarded; one Ameri-KING'S WOOD:

can History award, one merit of honor, stressed eighth grade history, ohserved Constitution Day and Flag Days with appropriate programs.

MAJOR WILLIAM HAYMOND: Ten historical programs; grades chosen for special work, eighth, ninth and twelfth; study of the Constitution by twelfth grades, study of American history in eighth and ninth grades.

MATTHEW FRENCH: Four medals awarded, three in college, one in grade school, forty-seven history awards given in American history, five programs given, as, "The Constitution", "The Five Point Star", Early American Music, "Historical Homes", "The Jury System". The "Five Point Star" was given by the McKenzie Chapter C.A.R. as a play in costume. Six hundred flags were presented to the four city and three rural schools; work in the intermediate grades was chosen - practice of patriotic ideals, study of American history, organization of patriotic clubs. Four radio broadcasts, copies of "Remember These Things" by Paul Harvey, donated to city and school libraries. Stressed all special historical dates pertaining to our country.

MONDONGACHATE: One good citizenship medal, one home maker's medal, four medals in history; visited grade school and gave each beginner

an American flag, gave six historical programs.

POTOMAC VALLEY: One historical program given; one NSDAR silver spoon to young lady for good citizenship; one pair of cuff links to boy in eighth grade for highest average in American history; presented Elk Garden High School a picture of Thomas Jefferson, a Rembrandt Teale copy framed and marked with brass plate.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY: Ten good citizenship medals to senior high school students, fifty-four awards for excellence in American history, to 8th grade students, one award for outstanding service in Americanism to an eighth grade student; four historical programs, tracing records for pro-

spective members; two broadcasts.

WILLIAM HENSHAW: Placed marker at Cooling Springs Presby-terian Church, gave a program on "Little Known Facts of Berkley County." WILLIAM MORRIS: Three good citizenship medals to senior high

students, two to junior students; contribution of ten dollars to Junior Committee for marking the site of Charleston with bronze plaque. Historical programs - "Our Constitution", National Defense Review, American Indian Display, with colonial costume, talk on china and glass, carly American of Continental Congress; books reviewed; use of Flag. One scholarship given to college student.

REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN

AMERICAN INDIANS

The policy of the State Society in keeping with the National Society is to stand firmly behind a strong educational program for the Indian American.

Chapter Chairmen reporting have shown an active and enthusiastic interest in this program. Excellent programs on the American Indian varying in content have been given throughout the state. These programs have included music, exhibits, guest speakers, radio programs, moving pictures for P.Y.A. groups, and special programs given through the schools, honoring our first Americans.

The chapters having American Indian Committees report generous contributions of money, supplies, gifts and clothing to various approved schools such as St. Mary's High School at Springfield, South Dakota, and

Bacone College, Bacone, Oklahoma.

Several articles by the State Chairman on the American Indian telling about his way of life, and many contributions to our culture have appeared

in local and state newspapers.

An exhibit of Indian articles is now on display in the Science Hall at Marshall College, Huntington, under the direction of the State Chairman and Dr. J. T. Richardson, Social Science teacher at the college, and is attracting wide interest.

WORK WITH OUR YOUTH

600 flags given to school children, first grades, I project for underprivileged, 7 Americanism contests sponsored in schools, 108 History contests spensored, 1 Highway Safety contest, 90 Historical films shown to school children (William Haymond Chapter showed them each school month in 10 schools), 2 chapters assist Boy Scout Troops, 2 Chapters assist Girl Scout Troops, 2 chapters assist 4-H clubs, 7 chapters assist Girl Home-Makers Clubs, I chapter gave an award of merit to a senior, I chapter maintains a juvenile delinquent's room, 5 sponsored trips of a patriotic nature for school children, 5 children were sent to the Salvation Army camp, 1 chapter sent a girl to Girl's State, I gave a scholarship award in high school, a \$5.00 award was given for Home Economics contest, \$37,50 given to underprivileged children's camp, \$50.00 given for Human Conservation Scholarship, 2 actively supported Eleanor H. Smith Scholarship Fund, I chapter gave an award for a Public Speaking contest, Major William Haymond Chapter prepared the history test for the History Award in their local schools. Shenandoah Valley made a survey of high school activities pertaining to Americanism. Wheeling Chapter entertained the Good Citizens from the local high schools at lunch.

WORK IN OUR COMMUNITIES

Three radio broadcasts on Americanism were reported. Buford Chapter takes an active interest in the Huntington Art Gallery. They presented an American Flag to the Art Gallery, held a meeting there, in conjunction with two civic groups.

Six chapters gave awards for civic work in the communities. 1 Safety Contest was sponsored, 2 chapters report assistance with Red Cross work, 1 Award of Merit was given to civic minded citizen. We assisted with 21 programs in other organizations.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

Each of the 33 chapters reporting on Red Cross activities states that members participated individually in the annual roll call, in addition to contributions by ten chapters.

Reports show that 77 members gave blood. 70 served as gray ladies. 87 did other volunteer work. 3,240 hours were donated by the 157 members listed above.

Chapter contributions totaled \$105.00.

The greatest number of work hours donated were listed by the Matthew French Chapter who reported five members giving 90 hours while assisting with the bloodmobile; 312 hours by one member assisting in the Red Cross office; and 156 hours by one member of the motor corps.

Elizabeth Ludington Hagans reported that for eleven months last year

two members served as co-chairmen of the blood bank.

South Branch Valley reported one member serving two months as Volunteer Home Service Secretary.

Princess Aracoma reported one member serving as Executive Secretary of the chapter in her county. Members of other chapters are active on the county executive boards.

Shenandoah Valley reported that at least fifteen members do some

type of Red Cross work and four donate blood every six weeks.

APPROVED SCHOOLS

45 Chapters in the state. 2 chapters did not report; three chapters reported "nothing done"; 40 chapters reported work done. 41 Chapter Chairmen of Approved Schools; 28 chapters had an Approved Schools program; 30 D.A.R. Ladies at Tamassee. Exhibit and Sale were held at the State D.A.R. Conference, in Charleston, October, 1953, with all thirteen schools and colleges represented. School literature was distributed at the State Conference. Articles regarding the work for Approved Schools were published in the W. Va. State D.A.R. News. The State Chairman assisted numerous chapters in arranging Approved Schools programs.

40 Chapters contributed a total of \$6,101.09 assistance to six schools and colleges: Cash, \$1,781.87 — of this amount \$92.10 was to the Helen Pouch Memorial Scholarship Fund; \$288.87, proceeds from the Junior Membership Bazaar; the \$1,400.90 remainder was sent to the schools by the

chapters.

Books, \$18.00; gifts from D.A.R. Ladies, \$165.56. 34 chapters sent a total of 118 boxes of new clothing, blankets, used clothing, christmas gifts, and other articles, valued at \$3,967.15, and the cost of sending the boxes

The largest assistance was given to Kate Duncan Smith D.A.R. School. Tamassee D.A.R. School, and to Crossnove, an Approved School, in the

order named.

The giving to the schools is gradually increasing each year. due to the work of a number of fine women in various parts of the state,

who feel a keen interest in this phase of our D.A.R. work.

By this time next year, we hope that we shall be able to report that enough money has been raised in West Virginia to establish the Hereford Beef Herd at Tamassee D.A.R. School. This is our State D.A.R. Project.

I am very thankful for the splendid co-operation we have had from the

chapters in the Approved Schools work.

As Chairman of the Motion Pictures Committee, I submit the following

In October 1953 a letter was sent to the Chairman of Motion Pictures in each Chapter, outlining the D.A.R. Motion Picture Projects as set up by our National Chairman, Mrs. F. Allen Burt. With the letter was encolsed a questionnaire for a report on Chapter activities in this field. Although less than half of the Chapters responded, the number of requests I have had for film information in recent months, and the increased use of films, would indicate a growing interest.

Many Chapters included historical and patriotic pictures in their program planning last year, and reports were given at meetings on lists of recommended pictures. Four Chapters had outstanding reports for the year. Wheeling Chapter and Major William Haymond Chapter of Fairmont used a great many films in Chapter programs, after which they made these pica great many times in Chapter programs, after which they made these pictures available to many schools, both in city and district. Some of the film strips shown were: "The Flag Speaks". "Give Me Liberty", "Declaration of Independence", "Old Hickory", "Jefferson", "Winning Our Independence", and Travel Films. John Hart Chapter, Elkins, showed "The Flag Speaks" to High School and Junior High School.

James Wood Chapter Chairman, Parkersburg, gave a special report to her Chapter on the testimony of Anne Melson Stommel, given before the Jenner Committee in regard to Subversive Influence in the Educational processes. (Part 8, pp. 841-854.) Her voluntary testimony was on an inservice course on Films, for teachers' credit, the chairman of the course

was given by the music department of Davis-Elkins College. It represented the different periods and phases of American Music, and songs were used of the various periods in our history, including our modern composers.

JOHN YOUNG: An entire American Music program was presented by a young man student at Cincinnati Conservatory, who has won several awards. The Star Spangled Banner is sung at each chapter meeting. At an American Indian program, recordings demonstrated the Indian War Dance Music. The Christmas program included vocal numbers and a harpist. Another program is planned around Stephen Foster music.

KANAWHA VALLEY: Sing National Anthem at each meeting, and

two musical programs are planned for the year.

KING'S WOOD: Chapter chairman expects to spend some time away. PRINCESS ARACOMA: Our Chapter meetings open with the singing of Star Spangled Banner and are urging members to memorize the other verses. The History of our National Anthem is to be reviewed. Christmas music and Stephen Fester music are planned.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY: One program was devoted to American Folklore and Song and some music was used along with other programs throughout the year. The Star Spangled Banner was sung when a piano

was available.

WEST AUGUSTA: Have music at each meeting if a piano is available. RADIO AND TELEVISION

The Radio and Television Committee, the great media for communi-

cation has made progress in West Virginia, its first year.

In 1953 five committees reported twenty-four broadcasts with coverage of six hours and twenty-seven minutes. Two of the committees gave \$334.50 value to their broadcasts. One television program was given. Last year the National Committee reported 5.157 broadcasts, 99 telecasts, 3,240 announcements with approximately air value of \$93.489.76.

A copy of a letter from Mrs. Edwin H. Lotz, National Chairman of the Radio and Television Committee, a 1954 list of available radio scripts and an annual blank have been sent to the fourteen chairmen appointed.

Since the first of February six chairmen have sent reports. The James Wood Chapter had seven broadcasts plus "spot" announcements covering two hours, valued at \$300 and a tape recording on "Washington Homes in Jefferson County."

The Wheeling Chapter in February reported two broadcasts covering

twenty-three minutes.

Borderland Chapter in Mt. Hope has had two radio programs.

In Elkins, Miss Sadavoie Goddin gave over the radio a clever talk, "Debunking Lincoln Myths."

Buford Chapter, Huntington, has had "spot" programs every month

before the regular meetings.

The Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter's project, moving the remains of Indian Chief Counstalk from the Court House Grounds to the State Park "Tu-Endi-Wei", Pt. Pleasant, was presented five times on television, seven times on "spot" radio programs and once as an hour radio program.

Mrs. Lotz is very anxious to build a tape recording library at our office at National Headquarters in Washington. She stated that many radio sta-

tions will make a tape recording of your program and give it to you gratis or for a nominal fee. Flag Day, Decoration Day and Constitution Day are all excellent apportunities for use of tape recordings. The National Society has purchased a tape recording machine. Tapes made by the National Defense Chairman and other chairmen may be available to Daughters, to be

rented as scripts have been in the past.

Also, Mrs. Lotz announced that at the close of the three year period in 1956, three awards will be made by her, namely; First award of \$10 for the most excellent tape recording on one of our three National objectives — Patriotic, Educational or Historical. Second award of \$5 for greatest number of tape recordings submitted and accepted by National Society. Third award of \$5 for most outstanding program on Radio and Television. The winners of these awards will be chosen by the Reviewing Board of National Society.

We plan a national story in the near future along these lines, for it is unusual for a State to number amoung its memberships two such ladies. newspapers.

Hinkle, Historian; and Mrs. D. W. Snyder, Parliamentarian,

Mrs. Neale conducted impressive memorial services for Mrs. A. Bruce Eagle, Mrs. Robert Felton and Mrs. Merton B. Gibbons, who died during the

year; the service concluded with a silent prayer by members,

Mrs. Williams introduced officers of the State Officers Club: Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor, first vice president; Mrs. Plummer E. Hill, second vice president; Miss Mary Katherine Barnes, Secretary; and Miss Marion E. Tapp, Corresponding Secretary. Minutes of the 1953 annual meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Holcombe presented a drawing of a proposed pin for the State Officers Club, as might be prepared by the J. E. Caldwell Company. She made a motion that the club adopt the design of the pin exhibitied;

Mrs. W. H. Daniel seconded the motion which was approved by vote.

BY-LAWS

THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this body shall be the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II

Objects

The object of this Organization shall be to bring into closer relationship the Chapters of West Virginia and to promote the three objects of the

National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of it results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the premotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of

the American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. All Chapters in the State in good and regular standing in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, shall be eligible to

membership in this Organization.

Section 2. Any Chapter after confirmation by the National Society may become a member by sending to the State Registrar and the State Recording Secretary the name of the Chapter, the names of its members and by sending the State assessments to the State Treasurer.

Section 3. A member-at-large of the State, shall not be eligible as a delegate or an alternate to the meetings of the National Society or State Organization, or hold a National or State Office or serve on a National or

State Committee.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

The Officers of this Organization shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian and a State Librarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary.

ARTICLE V

Election of Officers

Section 1. The Officers of this Organization shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the State Conference, every third year. A majority

vote shall constitute an election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. All State Officers shall assume office when the Continental Congress confirms the election of the

State Regent and State Vice Regent.

Section 4. No member shall be eligible to any State Office until she has been a member of the West Virginia Organization at least two years. No member shall be eligible to the same State Office for two consecutive terms and no member who has served one term in any State Office shall be eligible to any other State Office, except that of State Vice Regent or State Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

Section 5. No member shall hold at the same time two offices carrying

a vote at the State Conference.

Section 6. No member shall be eligible to the State Regency who has not served previously as a State Officer. No Chapter shall be eligible to representation on the Board for more than three consecutive terms, ex-

clusive of Chapter Regents.

Section 7. Should the office of the State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall accede to that office for the remainder of that term. Other vacancies occuring in office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next annual meeting of the State Conference. Any member having served in a vacancy for more than one-half term in any office, except the office of State Regent and State Vice Regent, shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 8. In recognition of valuable service to the State Organization, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a majority vote at any State Conference upon a member who has held the office of

State Regent.

Section 9. Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General from West Virginia shall be made by the Nominating Committee at the annual meeting of the State Conference. There may be nominations from the floor. The vote shall be by ballot; a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive Committee, appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be exofficio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Regent shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Section 2. The State Vice Regent, in the absence of the State Regent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all State Meetings with the reading of scripture and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as

occasion may require. She shall conduct the Memorial Service at each State

Conference and prepare the necrology for the State.

The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all Section 4. meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers, Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings affecting or pertaining to them.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of her office and such other correspondence as the State Regent, State Organization, the State Board of Management and the State Executive Committee may direct. She shall send out the notices of all

meetings and shall distribute all literature.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills duly authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. All bills shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee prior to their payment. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The books shall close on the fifteenth day of September each year. An Audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management. She shall within thirty days of her retirement, turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and books of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for anyment of hills duly authorized. payment of bills duly authorized.

Seciton 7. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligi-

bility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Registrar General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keen a card file containing the name, address, name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, re-instatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband.

The State Historian shall direct and encourage the Histori-Section 8. cal work in West Virgina through Chapter Historians and shall incorporate in her annual report, such outstanding report from Chapter Historians as may be of future value to the State. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Historian General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. She shall prepare for the Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution the State reports of grave locations, dates and service records of Revolutionary soldiers, sailors and patriots. She shall have custody of all historical or biographical manuscripts of which the State Organization may become possessed, and shall arrange and preserve the same.

Section 9. The State Librarian shall have charge of all books and magazines of which the State Organization may become possessed, with the exception of those provided for elsewhere. She shall have charge of soliciting gifts, negotiating exchanges and purchasing new volumes for the Library of the National Society. She shall perform such other duties as may be

designated by the Librarian General and the State Organization.

Section 10. All Officers shall submit, in duplicate, a brief narrative report of their work to the Annual Conference.

ARTICLE VII

Meeting of the State Organization

Section 1. The Annual Conference of the West Virginia State Organization shall be held in October during the week including the day of October the tenth, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board or Mangaement; the exact date shall be left to the discretion of the State Regent. The place of meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Mangaement unless previously named by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the receiving of reports of officers, State Board of Management, the chairmen of committees, the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.
Section 2. The report of the Program Committee when adopted shall

become the order of Business for the annual Conference. A vote of a majority of all registered delegates is necessary to make a change in the program.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates and alternates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall be the

Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.

Section 4. The voting members of the State Conference or at any special meeting of the State Organization shall be its Officers, the Officers and Honorary Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents of West Virginia, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents, or alternates, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society.

Section 5. One credential blank must be sent to the Chairman of Credentials Committee and the other to the State Regent not later than ten days

before the annual meeting of the State Conference.

Section 6. Twenty (20) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII

Fees and Dues

Section 1. The fiscal year of the State Organization shall be September

15th, to September 15th.

Section 2. To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January, thirty-five cents (35c) per capita for each member on the Chapter roll the first day of January, and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chapters as of January 1. presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference. Said dues and assessments shall be remitted in one payment.

Section 3. The Chapters shall send to the State Treasurer, the State dues and assessments for the current year for all members accepted to membership by the National Society between January 1, and June 30, of each year. Such members shall pay the required dues and assessments again

the following year.

Section 4. The dues and assessments of all members accepted by the National Society after June 30, of each year shall be applied to the next

succeeding calendar year.

Section 5. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent to defray her expenses to the National and State Meetings and for expenses pertaining to her office to the amount of the above sum.

Section 6. The remaining State dues may be used for printing, station-

ery for State Officers and State Chairmen and necessary expenses incurred by other State Officers and State Chairmen. All bills which the State is liable shall be itemized and presented to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not later than September 1, of each year in which the debt is in-

curred.

Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all the expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State and Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

ARTICLE IX

State Board of Management

The Officers of the State Organization and the Chapter

Regents shall constitute the Board of Management.

The State Board of Mangement shall meet at the call of Section 2. the State Regent. One meeting shall precede the State Conference and one meeting shall follow the State Conference. Special Meetings may be called by the State Regent upon written request of five members of the Board. At least five days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given all members of the Board.

The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Organization during the interim between its meetings, except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board of Management shall make an annual report to the

State Conference.

Section 4. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Mangement.

ARTICLE X

Executive Committee

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization shall compose the Executive Committee. The State Board of Management may authorize this Committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent or upon the written request of five members of the Committee. This Committee shall act as adviser to the State Regent and it shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 2. A recommendation for a project to be considered by the State Conference must be submitted to the Executive Committee on or before September 1. If the proposal meets with the approval of the Executiv Committee and the State Board of Management it shall be submitted to the Finance Committee for consideration and if recommended by the Finance Committee presented to the State Conference for adoption.

Section 3. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI

Committees

Section 1. At the close of the State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following committes: Finance, Resolutions, and Credentials.

Section 2. The Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and four members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds, plan a budget, and recommend to the State Conference such expenditures as the committee deems expedient.

Section 3. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent. All resolutions to be presented at the State Conference must be sent to the chairman at least two weeks before the meeting. The name and address of the chairman shall be included in the call for the State Conference. The committee shall consider all resolutions sent to the chairman and shall recommend suitable action thereon when presenting the resolutions to the meeting.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall consist of four members, the chairman, to be appointed by the State Regent, the State Treasurer and

two members to be appointed from the Hostess Chapters.

ARTICLE XII

Chapters

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Organization shall elect Officers

at the time of, or previous to, the May Meeting of said Conference. Section 2. The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary and the State Treasurer of the election of Officers.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter in the State Organization shall send to the State Regent annually on or before March 1, a typewritten re-

port of the work of her Chapter for the year.

The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the Section 4. work of her Chapter from October 1, to October 1. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words, one copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference, one copy to the State Regent and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

ARTICLE XIII

Districts

Section 1. The State Organization may be divided into the following istricts: Northern, Central, Eastern, Southern and Western, each district

laving a Director and a Secretary and other necessary officers.

Section 2. Each district shall elect its own Director and Secretary and other necessary officers, the election taking place at the District Meeting. The term of office shall be one year. No member who holds a State Office or the office of Chapter Regent shall be eligible for the office of District Director.

ARTICLE XIV

Parliamentary Authority

THE RULES CONTAINED IN Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this State Organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE XV

Amendments

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual State Conference by a two-thirds vote, provided that a copy of the amendments has been sent with the call to the annual meeting. Amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the meeting at which they are adopted.

Section 2. Amendments may be proposed by the State Conference, by the State Board of Management, or by a committee authorized by the State

Conference, or by a Chapter.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the State Organization shall become a law of the Organization without notice of the amendment.

RESOLUTION No. 4 ADOPTED AT THE 48th ANNUAL STATE CON-FERENCE IN CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA

Whereas, The State Regents of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution are finding it difficult each year to secure a place in which to hold the Annual State Conference due to the lack of hotel accommodations in certain sections of the State, and

Whereas, The traditional custom of holding the Annual State Conference in the Sections of the State which can accomodate the delegation

is becoming a financial burden on many of the Chapters, be it

Resolved, That the State Regent and her Executive Committee shall have the authority to select the place in which to hold the Annual Meeting, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference, and that the State Regent, aided by the General Chairman and Chapter Regents in the respective cities shall plan the program without elaborateness for the Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Annual Conference Dues be increased to two dollors (\$2.00) per delegate, to be used in defraying all of the expenses in con-

nection with the rolding of our State Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Conference expenses shall not exceed the Conference Dues, that no additional fees be added to the cost of the meals as served by the hotel and that all bills for conference expenses be approved and countersigned by the Finance Committee.
