a public accountant for the
big tobacco companies there
He came here once when
I was about 6-7 yrs. old

He was b. in Frederick Co. Va.
(that part later known as
Bolleourt) He was b. in 1756.
He was in the Battle of Point
Pleasant, on Oct. 12, 1774.
He was a sailor of the
U.S. American Revolution,
enlisting from Greenbrier Co.
June 14, 1776, under General
Elliott, from which he
marched to Alexandria,
served 12 mos. in a Row
galley, in the Virginia fleet
was discharged near Williams-
burg, in the York River,
rec'd his discharge from
Capt. Elliott, re-entering, return-
ing back to Greenbrier Co. he
was again called to service
in the month of August, 1781,
under the command of Capt.
John Lewis, and Lieut. Thomas
Coodson. they marched to

19

Bolclourt Co., to Williamsburg,
the county company of riflemen,
under command of Col. Samuel
Lewis, and from there to York-
town and was in the ~~company~~
~~ment~~ company at the time
of the siege and surrender
of Lord Cornwallis, and was
shortly afterwards discharged,
it being signed by Capt. John
Lewis. In the year, 1834, he
made application for a
government pension but died
before it was granted.

Thomas Harman b. 1756,
He m. Elizabeth Henry, who
was from Ohio. She was born
Dec. 25, 1767, d. Nov. 7, 1832,
at the age of 65 years.

Walter Smith in the
Herald Dispatch, under date
of March 3, 1849, says he
settled in Cabell Co., in 1796,
opposite the no. of Swan Cr.,
(which is just a short
distance above the mouth of

the Little Guyandotte Creek, in Cabell County. He blazed a trail from the mouth of Coal River to Challecothe, O. This was the established route of travel until the Wauhatchee was built, down the Kanawha Valley, a good many years later. Hamman's Trace, as it was known, fell into disuse when the main route of travel changed, but I am told there are in Ohio, some sections of it remaining, and these continue to be known as Hamman's Trace, according to Hardesty's history of Lawrence and Gallia Counties, Ohio. He was the first settler between Point Pleasant and Greensburg, Ky, as Greenup was then known. He made the trace in 1800, and opened a ferry in 1802, from the Va. shore and the mouth of Swan Creek, in Ohio.

Thos. Haman had the ferry until 1832, but turned it over to his son, Henry Haman. Henry Haman was the father of a Mr. Pollock, and they were the parents of Geo. Campbell Pollock, father of Bruce Pollock, who told me of finding in an old Hardesty volume, an account of his ancestor's activity. I have been told and always believed that Thomas Haman was the first settler here.

Thos. Haman is buried about 100 yards, east of the bridge across Little Guyandotte Cr., in Mason County. The wife of one of his son's ~~wif~~ ^{wives} — Esam Haman — ^{Miriam} Morris, who died quite young, at about 25. She was a sister to Edmund Morris, and dau. of John Morris Sr. Esam Haman m. 2. — Campbell of Gallia Co., Ohio.

In the name of God, amen. I, Thomas Hannon, of the County of Mason & State of Virginia, being weak in body from advanced age, but of sound mind and disposing memory, Knowing the uncertainty of life & the certainty of death, in order to dispose of the worldly goods that I have been blessed with, do make and publish this, my last Will and Testament. First, I commit my soul to God, who gave it, and my body to the earth in hopes of a blessed immortality in the resurrection, and desire that after my death my body may be decently interred by my Executors, & the funeral expenses and all my just debts be fully paid & satisfied.

I give and bequeath to my sons, John Hannon, Esor Hannon, & Henry Hannon, or the survivors of them, the home tract of land situated on the Ohio River at, and above the mouth of Little Guyan-dotte Creek containing five hundred acres, with all and singular appurtenances, but upon this trust and use nevertheless, that they, or the survivor of them shall annually account and pay over the rents and profits of said land unto my son, Charles Hannon, or in their discretion, to permit him to use, occupy, and enjoy the same during his life, and at the death of said Charles, I then give the said land to his children if he should have any. If not to be disposed of in the manner herein provided for the distribution of my property, generally.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Whitten, a negro girl named Silah.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Susannah Shelton, the wife of James Shelton, one negro girl slave Jane.

I give and bequeath unto my Grand daughter Mahala Maxwell one negro girl slave Melissa.

I desire that the three negro children, one girl, the child of Daphney, two boys, sons of Agnes which I have sent over the river for their liberty, I desire shall remain free forever.

My son Henry owes me seventy-five dollars; and Jesse, thirty dollars, which is to be taken as part of my estate.

I then desire that all my estate not hereby specially bequeathed, whether real, or personal, shall be equally divided among my children, or the heirs of them that may not be living.

Lastly, I appoint my two sons, John Hannon and Esor Hannon or the survivors of them, the Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other wills heretofore made.

At a Court held for Mason County May 4th, 1835. A writing purporting to be the last will and testament of Thomas Hannon, dec'd was this day presented in open Court and was proved in part by the oath of Thomas M. Shelton, one of the subscribing witnesses thereto and continued for further proof.

The last will and testament of Thomas Hannon, dec'd, which was in part proved by the oath of Thomas M. Shelton, a subscribing witness thereto, last part, was this day further proved by the oath of George W. Shelton, also a subscribing witness thereto, and the same is ordered to be recorded.

And on the motion of John Hannon & Esor Hannon, Executors named in the said Will, who made oath thereto; and, together with Charles Clendennen, William A. McMullin, and Robert A. Hereford, their securities, entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of \$8,000.00, conditioned as the law directs. Certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate of the said will in due form of law.

Thomas Hamman is said to have been born in Frederick Co. Va., and to have been the first settler in Cabell County. He was a Revolutionary soldier, born about 1757, died April 18, 1835. He is buried in Mason County, just across the Little Guyandotte Creek, and a hundred feet or so to the right of the road up and down the Ohio River. In his application for a pension, in 1834, he stated that he moved to Mason County, in ~~1834~~, 1791,
