Tribute by Mrs. Millard T. Sisler

Our beloved co-worker in the West Virginia D.A.R. was born at Fairview, West Virginia, on August 24, 1881, and died July 13, 1956. She was married on October 28, 1903, to Dr. Claude Lee Holland, Fairmont Pediatrician. Mrs. Holland was above all a devoted wife and mother, a lady who graced any social function, and a participant, intelligent and self-sacrificing, in a number of civic and patriotic organizations. The responsibilities which she accepted she performed with dignity and efficiency. Her thoughtful kindness and consideration for others were outstanding.

She was my beloved friend who served with me on the State Board of the D.A.R. during the war years of 1942 to 1946. She carried the duties of Registrar when they were most difficult due to transportation limitations.

She was a member of the Major William Haymond Chapter, N.S. D.A.R. which she joined on October 6, 1921.

Offices which she held in D.A.R. were: State Chairman of the D.A. R. Magazine for three years and State Chairman of Patriotic Education for a similar period. She served several years on the House Committee for Continental Congress and was an officer of the State Officers' Club.

We have lost a faithful member and friend. Our sorrow finds comfort in the rich heritage of her memory. The organizations which claimed her interest will miss sorely her faithful service and charming personality. Her friends remember these things and mourn her loss.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

The Executive Committee of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia met July 7, 1956, at Jackson's Mill at 10:30 A.M. with Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent, presiding.

Mrs. Russell Bergen, State Chaplain, led the group in prayer.

Mrs. Bergen moved that the Executive Committee ratify the action of the State Regent in setting the State Conference for October 25, 26, 27. Seconded by Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe. Carried.

Mrs. Phillips read a letter from Mr. Thornlee of the C. C. Keys Music Co. in Clarksburg concerning an amplifier to beam the organ music from the chapel to Mt. Vernon Hall at Jackson's Mill. He quoted the cost installed of the amplifier and two outside loud speakers at \$350 to \$400. Mrs. Phillips pointed out that there is \$153.00 in the state treasury in the Jackson's Mill Fund which must be spent at the Mill and said that the additional \$250 could be taken from the contingent fund. Miss Emily Miller, acting State Treasurer, reported \$923.60 in the contingent fund at present and 10c per member still due this year.

Mrs. Molcombe moved that we supply the amplifier at the Mill financing the project as suggested by the State Regent. Mrs. Bergen seconded. Motion defeated.

Mis. Poillips presented material she had requested about the F.F.A. and F.E.A. Youth Camp and Conference Center near Ripley.

It was decided to use the \$153 in the Jackson's Mill Fund at the Mill at the direction of Mrs. E. A. Livesay and Mrs. H. K. Owens, Co-Chairmen for the Mill, in consultation with the Mill Director, Mr. J. O. Knapp.

Mrs. Bergen moved that the finance committee be empowered to go over the old treasurer's records and destroy those that are outdated. Mrs. Leith seconded. Motion carried.

STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The State Board of Management of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia met for lunch at noon, October 25, 1956, in the Lounge Room of the Shenandoah Hotel, Martinsburg, West Virginia, with Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent, presiding. The State Recording Secretary read the prayer prepared by the State Chaplain.

Mrs. Phillips presented the honored guest, Mrs. Frederic A. Groves, President General of the National Society. The members of the Board introduced themselves after which Mrs. Phillips presented again Mrs. Keener W. Eutsler, Conference Chairman, and Miss Amelia McKown, Vice-Chairman, who were hosstesses for the luncheon.

Mrs. Groves brought brief greetings from the National Society and expressed her pleasure at being present. She spoke highly of the Approved Schools Tour.

The report of the Executive Committee was read by the State Recording Secretary. The Executive Committee, meeting at Jackson's Mill July 7, 1956, had voted to spend the \$153 left in the Jackson's Mill Fund at the Mill at the discretion of Mrs. H. K. Owens and Mrs. E. A. Livesay, Co-chairmen, in consultation with the Mill Director.

The Executive Committee had voted to assume a State Project at the Youth Camp and Conference Center near Ripley. Mrs. T. B. Leith was Chairman of the committee to investigate the type of project: an amphitheatre or a museum building. Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe and Mrs. J. Carney Boggess were members of that committee.

Mrs. Leith reported that she and Mrs. Holcombe had spent a day at the camp with Mr. John Lowe and Mr. S. D. McMillan. She stated that the proposed museum would house antiques now owned by Mrs. Statts. She said she was particularly interested in the amphitheatre stating it is a naturally terraced location with splendid natural acoustics. Mrs. Leith read a letter from Mr. S. D. McMillan stating the estimated cost at \$2,000 to \$5,000 depending on the type of stage and seats. He suggested that we set an amount we can give and they will build the stage to that figure. Mrs. Leith read a letter also from Mr. S. D. McMillan recommending the construction of a Daniel Boone Cabin to be filled with the \$2,500 worth of antiques owned by Mrs. Statts.

Mrs. Holcombe stated the estimated cost of the Daniel Boone Cabin is \$10,000.

Mrs. Phillips pointed out that anything given to the camp will be maintained by the state. It is under the Department of Education and for the Future Farmers of America and Future Homemakers of America.

Mrs. Holcombe moved that we undertake the construction of the Daniel Boone Cabin. There was no second.

Mrs. Leith moved that over a period of three years we spend \$2,500 for the erection of the stage of the amphitheatre at the Youth Camp near Ripley. Mrs. Holcombe seconded. Carried.

Mrs. George Ferguson, State Chairman D.A.R. Magazine Advertising, spoke concerning West Virginia sponsorship of the March issue of the Magazine. She asked each Regent to set a goal for her chapter and back up her chapter chairman. The deadline is January 1, 1957. She reminded the Regents of the 10% commission to chapters.

Mrs. Phillips spoke on the 'Tools of Our Trade'. Included in the tools she discussed as necessary were: National By-Laws, State By-Laws found in the State Proceedings, Handbook (a new one available October 26, 1956, at 35c), National Resolutions (5c office of Corresponding Secretary General), What the Daughters Do. Highlights of Program Activity, D.A.R. Magazine (\$2 per year), Proceedings of Continental Congress (\$3.50 from the Business Office). Mrs. Phillips showed the orchid notepaper being sold for the Museum's restoration of the orchid brocade dress of Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, first President General.

Mrs. Phillips stated that Mrs. Roberts, National Parliamentarian, has requested that chapters complete their by-law revisions by the first of the year. They are to be sent to Mrs. D. W. Snyder, State Parliamentarian, for review and not to her. Mrs. Roberts cannot answer personal questions from chapters and members.

Mrs. Phillips announced that Mrs. Harry J. Smith, past Vice President General and Honorary State Regent, would serve as Conference Parliamentarian.

Mrs. M. Eugene Marsh, Jr., State Chairman of the Credentials Committee, read a preliminary report showing total registration 177,

including 100 voters.

Mrs. Paul Hammann, Conference Program Chairman, moved the adoption of the program as printed with one change. Seconded by

Mrs. A. Keith McClung; approved by vote.

Mrs. Harry J. Smith, past Vice President General, Honorary State Regent and Chairman of the Rules Committee, read the Standing Rules of Order and moved their adoption. Seconded by Mrs. Claude R. Hill. Approved by vote.

Standing Rules for the Procedure of the Annual State Conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia:

1. All smalons will begin promptly at the hour announced.

- 2. Delegates are expected to be in their seats before the opening of each session.
- 3. Doors will be closed during speeches, musical numbers and reports.

4. No delegate shall be entitled to the floor until she rises, gives her name and Chapter and is recognized by the chair.

5. No member shall speak more than once during the day to the same question, nor longer than three minutes at one time without leave of the assembly.

6. The reports of Chapter Regents and chairmen of State Committees shall be limited to two minutes each. Reports of absent members

shall be filed.

7. A typewritten copy of each report must be handed to the Record-

ing Secretary, after it is read.

8. All main motions must be presented in writing and signed by the

- maker.

 9. All resolutions must be presented through the Resolutions Committee.
- 10. Robert's Rules of Order, (revised) shall be the accepted authority on Parliamentary Law.

Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor, State Chairman, read twenty resolutions presented by her committee. Resolutions 1 through 19 were drafted in accordance with the Resolutions adopted by Continental Congress in April, 1956, and Resolution 20 was entitled, "State Museum and the Department of Archives and History". Miss Baylor moved the adoption of Resolutions 1-19. Seconded and carried. Miss Baylor moved the adoption of Resolution 20. Seconded by Mrs. Leith. Adopted.

RESOLUTIONS

- Whereas, Certain of the Resolutions adopted by 65th Continental Congress of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution are of such interest as to deserve special recognition by the members of our State Society.
- Resolved, That the 51st State Conference reaffirm the following Resolutions adopted by the 65th Continental Congress.

1. PROTECT AMERICA'S FUTURE THROUGH PATRIOTIC EDUCATION

- Whereas, A primary objective of our National Society for 65 years has been to promote "an enlightened public opinion, affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens";
- Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution continues earnest efforts to spread knowledge of our Constitutional Government and appreciation of the American way of life. so that we may insure the future destiny of the United States of America.

2 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

- Whereas, Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Constitution of the United States has been widely interpreted to mean that treaties and other international agreements can override the Constitution and cut across the Bill of Rights; and
- Whereas. The United States is virtually the only country in the food which permits international agreements other than treating the become internal law without appropriate legislation; and
- Whereas, Several treaties have become the supreme law of the land by yote of only two or three Senators present on the Senate floor;
- Resolved. That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again go on record, for the sixth time at our annual Continnental Congress, in strong endorsement of the principles of an amendment to our Constitution to provide that a provision of a treaty or other international agreement which conflicts with any provision of our Constitution shall not be of any force or effect.

UNITED NATIONS

- Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution continue to support the United Nations Organization in its ORIGINAL purpose as a group of SOVEREIGN NATIONS working together for world peace and understanding, and to oppose its threatened conversion into a world government.
- Whereas, Our National Society has been consistently on record as against the many specialized agencies, which purport to be a part of United Nations, formulating policies such as the Genocide Convention and covenant of Human Rights, which would deprive us of the individual liberties and free enterprise on which our Nation was founded so firmly and which have made it so strong and so great,
- Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again stand firmly and emphatically on its insistence that the United Nations abide by the objectives set forth in its Charter and desist from participation in any plan, project, agency or principle which would intervene in our internal affairs, interfere with our domestic legislation, or spread doctrines contrary to our Amercan philosophies and way of life.

UNESCO 4.

Whereas. Daughters of the American Revolution have repeatedly objected strenuously to propaganda disseminated by UNESCO which tends to indoctrinate and train for world citizenship, and conflicts with the American concepts of national independence and sovereignty:

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution highly commend the American Legion for the resolution passed at their annual convention held in October, 1955, at Miami,

Florida, which reads in part:

"We call upon all American educational institutions and upon Boards of Education throughout the United States to cease and desist from the use of the educational materials of UNESCO propounding world government as a criteria of American citizens.

STATUS OF FORCES AGREEMENT

Whereas, Under the provision of the NATO Status of Forces Treaty and a similar agreement with Japan, several thousands of members of our Armed Forces stationed abroad have been surrendered to foreign jurisdictions to be tried, and in many cases convicted and imprisoned, or otherwise punished for alleged criminal violations of unlamiliar and/or unknown laws, sometimes under procedures conducted in foreign languages before hostile judges, and without the besit of competent counsel, if any; and

Vibreas, total treatment of our soldiers effectively deprives them of substantial rights to which they are entitled under the Constitu-

tion of the United States:

Resolved, "Lat the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution on record as urging strongly the elimination of any provision under any treaty or agreement whereby our military personnel will be surrendered to the criminal jurisdiction of any foreign country.

COMMUNIST TACTICS 6.

Whereas, For more than thirty-five years Daughters of the American Revolution have been warning against the dangers of communism: and

Whereas. There is a current change in the tactics and techniques of Communists but no change in their fundamental policies and longrange goals of world domination;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again warn Americans to be alert and remain firm in their opposition to communism in all its phases.

CONTROL OF COMMUNIST PROPAGANDA

Whereas. The investigation by the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee reveals that vast quantities of Communist, seditious propaganda are regularly being shipped into the United States and being disseminated in this country from abroad, without compliance with the labelling requirements of Foreign Agents Registration Act and of the Internal Security Act; and

Whereas, Such investigations further reveal that much of this poisonous Communist propaganda is being distributed in violation of the above mentioned acts by diplomatic personnel in "iron-curtain"

consulates and embassies in the United States:

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge that the Congress of the United States enact legislation providing for the confiscation of Communist propaganda which is not labelled in accordance with the requirements of the Foreign Agents Registration Act and the Internal Security Act; and providing further that diplomatic personnel in the United States who are engaged in the dissemination of political propaganda be required to register with the Department of Justice and label the political propaganda which they disseminate.

8. RED CHINA

Whereas, To accept Red China would be to condone the very evils we abhor:

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again go on record as adamantly opposed to admission of Red China to the United Nations.

9. ANTARTICA

Whereas, The Anartic Continent was discovered and explored in large measure by American Citizens and has untapped reservoirs of natural resources;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution urge legislators to take such steps as may be necessary to validate claim to areas of important value; and

Resolved. That we recommend the Byrd and other expeditions for their remarkable achievements in exploring and establishing information regarding mineral deposits in the Antartic, which if made available, would supplement our own.

10. PATRIOTIC ADVERTISING

Resolved. That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution commend and applaud the many industrial and business institutions which through their advertising media have rendered outstanding service in the fight against communism and to the preservation of the American system of free enterprise and private initiative.

11. CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY

Whereas, Statistics show that more than one-half of the United States citizens of voting age are women, thus placing a greater responsibility upon the women as voters; and

Whereas. The selection of and election of good candidates to public office is of utmost importance to our welfare;

Resolved. That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution encourage all of its members to assume their civic responsibility to register and vote in all elections.

12. IMMIGRATION AND NATIONALITY ACT (McCarren-Walter Bill)

Whereas, There is pending in the Senate and House Judiciary Committees a series of amendments which would weaken the principal safeguards of the Immigration and Nationality Act of December 24, 1952, and destroy the national origins system;

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution reaffirm its confidence in and support of the McCarren-Walter Act of 1952, and urge all patriotic Americans to protect and resist any crippling amendments and any legislation whatsoever which would tend to destroy the effectiveness of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

FEDERAL AID TO EDUCATION

- Whereas, The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution has continually opposed federal aid to education, believing such aid could lead to gov: nment control of all public schools, thereby removing State and local control;
- Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution continue to oppose vigorously all legislation which could place control of education in the hands of the Federal Government.

14. AMERICAN HISTORY STUDY

13.

- Whereas, One of the primary objectives of our National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is "to promote the study of American History";
- Whereas. The effort made in the past three years to stress the teaching of American History in our schools has met with signal success;
- Resolved. That plans be formulated by the membership to continue an even more aggressive campaign to promote the study of true and factual American History in all our schools from grades through colleges and universities, to the end that it may become a required subject for graduation in high schools and colleges and universities whether State supported or privately endowed.

15 CONSTITUTION WEEK

- Whoreas, There is widespread interest in the celebration of Constitution Week, from September 17th to 23rd;
- Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution position the President of the United States to proclaim this week actually and that the Society ask the Congress of the United States to designate September 17th as Constitution Day.

16. TRADITIONAL OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAYS

- Whereas. There is a growing tendency to depart from the proper and traditional observance of our religious and patriotic holidays and to substitute materialistic observance and extreme commercialism;
- Resolved. That the members of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution shall make it their individual responsibility to counteract any such movements in their community and to work unceasingly to instill in our youth a deeper reverence for the eternal values which ARE America.

17. RELIGION VERSUS ATHEISM

- Whereas. The principle of religious freedom embodied in our Constitution is one of the foundations of our free nation and is now threatened by ideologies of goodless forces at home and abroad;
- Resolved. That we as Daughters of the American Revolution, dedicate ourselves in prayerful service to a renewal of faith in God and trust for strength in the continuing struggle for religion versus atheism.

18. INVESTIGATING COMMITTEES

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again go on record as commending the invaluable service to the Nation rendered by Congressional Committees investigating matters pertaining to internal security and urge that such committees be continued.

19. COMMENDING FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

Resolved, That the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution again commend the Federal Bureau of Investigation and its Director, J. Edgar Hoover, for their unceasing efforts to protect our Nation against crime, corruption, and subversion.

20. STATE MUSEUM AND THE DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Whereas, In 1963 the State of West Virginia will celebrate its centennial anniversary, and there is a suggestion that the people of the State of West Virginia erect a building in the Capitol Group at Charleston, the Capitol of the State.

Whereas, Heretofore, the History and Archives of the state have been

housed in the same building with the museum;

Resolved, That the members of the Daughters of the American Revolution of the State of West Virginia assist in lending their efforts in the construction of a building, which will be a replica of the Independence Hall.

Resolved, That this building will be called "The State Museum and De-

partment of Archives and History".

Resolved, That this building be dedicated June 20, 1963.

REPORTS OF STATE OFFICERS

STATE REGENT

One year has passed since I stood before you, as your State Regent elect, with a heart full of pride and humility, and an awareness of the responsibilities which confronted me. But it was at the Installation Ceremonies in Constitution Hall last April, when Mrs. William W. Mc-Claugherty placed the ribbon on my shoulder, that I realized the magnitude of the task which I had promised to assume. Now, I wish to enumerate what has been done in these last six months.

My first duty was to appoint the State Chairmen for the twenty-four National and seven State Committees. This file also contains the name of their ancestors with their rank. These records can only be properly kept if the chapter registrars send in all changes which affect their chapter.

The Ancestor File is also in my possession. This file contains the war service of the Revolutionary soldier, where, when, and to whom the soldier was married. In most cases it contains the names of their children, their birth dates and whom they married. On the back of the card is the name of the member, the National Number, and the name of the chapter to which they belong.

## STATE HISTORIAN

The very important work of encouraging the study of American History was carried out as directed by the Historian General by all Chapters reporting. Letters were mailed to all chapter Historians. The reports from the twenty-seven chapters reporting were as follows: BARBOURSVILLE—Two history awards to grade school pupils. Two certificates of award to grade school pupils.

BORDERLAND—Presented five History Medals to high school pupils and six certificates of Award in grade schools. Marked one grave of Revolutionary Soldier. Had two historical programs.

BUFORD—Inspected three school books. Took 25 school children to visit historical spots. Held two historical programs and celebrated

three historical anniversaries.

CAPTAIN JAMES ALLEN—Presented nine awards of five dollars each to school children for work done in American History. Three historical programs.

COLONEL CHARLES LEWIS—Presented 11 History Medals. Marked 18 graves. Had community-wide historical programs in school.

Took several hundred children to visit historical spots.

COLONEL JOHN EVANS—Presented 13 History Medals to junior high school pupils. Gave ten programs on historical subjects in schools. Marked two graves. Held five chapter programs on historical subjects and observed three anniversaries.

COLONEL MORGAN MORGAN—Awarded ten medals for American History in schools. Had historical playlet for chapter meeting.

ELIZABETH LUDINGTON HAGANS—Inspected six history books and awarded three history medals. Held three historical programs and observed two anniversaries.

ELIZABETH CUMMINGS JACKSON—Held Constitution Day Cele-

bration and had four historical programs.

GENERAL ANDREW LEWIS—Presented four historical awards and marked three Revolutionary soldiers' graves. Held two historical programs.

JAMAS BARGOUR—Inspected four history books. Historian had article and pictures in local paper on Old Fairmont Pike. Had two his-

torical programs and celebrated two anniversaries.

JAMES WOOD—Copied birth, death and marriage records of Episcopal Church. Took 18 children to visit historical spots. Held display of historical documents and family crests at chapter meeting.

JENNIE WILEY-Inspected ten history books. Presented three

History Medals. Took 60 children to visit historical spots.

JOHN CHAPMAN—Presented one history medal. Had three his-

torical programs

JOHN HART—Presented 27 certificates of award in history. Had three historical programs.

JOHN MINEAR—Presented two certificates of award in history.

Had four historical programs.

JOHN YOUNG—Presented two history medals and gave thirteen framed pictures of the Signing Of The Constitution to the schools.

KANAWHA VALLEY—Presented four history medals and four certificates. Observed four anniversaries and had two historical programs.

MAJOR WILLIAM HAYMOND—Awarded 12 history medals. Held two historical programs in schools and had three chapter programs on history.

MATTHEW FRENCH—Presented ten certificates of award. Gave 600 American flags to first grade pupils. Had seven historical programs.

MONDONGACHATE—Presented five history medals. Held four historical programs and celebrated four anniversaries.

NATHAN DAVIS—Presented two history medals. Held four historical programs and celebrated four anniversaries.

PACK HORSE FORD—Located 42 soldiers' graves and marked 19.

Took 85 children to visit historic spots.

POTOMAC VALLEY—Spent \$27 on upkeep of Fort Ashby and took school children to visit the fort. Presented two History Awards and one silver D.A.R. spoon to high school pupils.

RAVENSWOOD—Gave three awards in history of five dollars each Had three programs on history and celebrated three anniversaries.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY-Gave 55 certificate awards and had four

historical programs.

WHEELING-Gave five history medals. Marked one historical Celebrated four anniversaries and had one historical program. WILLIAM HENSHAW-Restored and paid for the upkeep of Gen-

eral Adam Stephen Monument.

YE TOWNE OF BATH-Bestowed two history medals. Assisted town council in enclosing Old Dutch Graveyard.

## REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMEN

#### AMERICAN MUSIC

A letter with suggestions for the work of the coming year was received from Mrs. Marvin L. Reynolds, National Chairman of the American Music Committee, which was relayed to Chapters with a letter to Chapter Chairmen published in the West Virginia D.A.R. News. Included in the letter your Chairman offered the loan of a record "Folk Songs of the Allegheny Mountains", by Dr. Patrick Gainer, for Chapter use.

Upon request from two Chapter Chairmen, suggestions were made for musical selections for regular meetings and also songs used in Colonial and Revolutionary days. Having found one copy of the hymn tune "Chester", with both religious and patriotic words, which was written by William Billings in 1770 and was called a Revolutionary War "hit", five photostatic copies have been made which are also offered to Chapters for use on programs.

The following reports have been received:

Borderland—The National Anthem was sung at each meeting. The Christmas program consisted of music by American composers and Christmas Carols. Group sang American music at Veterans Hospital in Beckley.

Buford—The "Star Spangled Banner" was sung at each meeting. Music was stressed on six programs which included two patrotic songs by sixth grade chaldren, along with a playlet on Women of the Revolution in April: two colos at both May and June meetings; three authentic South America Folk Songs in November; three Christmas duets in December, a program on West Virginia in February by the Children of the American Resolution at which time they sang West Virginia songs.

Colonal And w Donnally—American Music in some form has been presented at each meeting. Chapter assisted Mrs. Samuel Solins in Naturalization Class programs at the court house. The Christmas program was highlighted by the singing of American numbers. The luncheon program during the Southern District meeting was given by the Coalwood SixTeens and Zanice Virginia Dantzler which consisted entirely of American selections.

Colonel Charles Lewis—The "Star Spangled Banner" was used at each meeting. Two piano solos were played at March luncheon. Four songs by American composers were sung by guest soloist at Western District meeting in May. The National Anthem and America were sung in service when marker was placed at the grave of Revolutionary War patriot.

Elizabeth Zane—Program of American music given by Miss Joan Brown, piano instructor at West Virginia Wesleyan College, was presented in March.

General Andrew Lewis—Music has been incorporated in many of the programs. Members join in singing the National Anthem when there is a piano or organ available and frequently another patriotic song is included. Guest soloist presented a medley of Christmas favorites in December and led the group in singing familiar Carols.

John Hart—Christmas program by Elkins Men of Song. The "Star Spangled Banner" was used at each meeting.

Matthew French—Had talk on "American Music". High School Quartet sang six songs with descriptions for Chapter, all by American composers.

Shenandoah Valley—Opened each Chapter meeting with the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner". Devoted one program a year to

all American music besides musical numbers with some of the other programs.

Wheeling—Had one program on American music by students of West Liberty State College. The "Star Spangled Banner" is sung at

each meeting.

William Henshaw-Had program on "Early American Music" starting with the music of the Pilgrims through to the period after the revolution. It included the folk songs of the people. Members of the Chapter assisted with the musical selections. The father of one of the members displayed his flutes and piccolos and told about the changes in the instruments used today compared to the ones used in Revolutionary times.

Names of Chapter Chairmen have been received from nineteen chapters with reports from the eleven given above. As the new State Chairmen of the Advancement of American Music Committee I hope to receive reports from every chapter in the state for my next report.

#### AMERICAN INDIANS

Borderland Chapter sent \$5.00 to Miscellaneous Fund, 54 lbs. used clothing, 18 lbs. to Bacone College valued \$26.00, and 36 lbs. to St. Mary's High School.

James Barbour Chapter reports making a cash contribution to the Committee on American Indians of \$15.00 last year. The Revent acted as the Instructor for a Study Course on Indian Americans In a local Church Woman's Society. Also made a study of the needs of the Indian.

Wheeling Chapter reports that members were urged to write Congressmen urging legislation for improvement of living conditions and educational facilities for the American Indians.

Wlliam Henshaw Chapter had a paper at a meeting on The Am-

erican Indian".

The General Andrew Lewis Chapter had a program on the "American Indian". Also a box to St. Mary's School in Springfield, S. D., of usuable items in making gifts, etc.—consisting of 20 felt hats, 12 leather hand bags, 3 ties, 10 lbs. jewelry, 12 skeins yarn, 9 balls of beads, a lot of thread and crochet thread.

Matthew French Chapter reports: \$5.00 to Bacone College, box of clothing to St. Marys' School for Indian Girls. Programs on the American Indian, using the script and slides from the National Chairman,

on Bacone College and St. Mary's School.

West Augusta Chapter reports Study Course on Indian Americans. Notebooks were made in the 3rd grade with stories and legends of the Indians, drawings of Indian life and also pictures of Indians and their villages and the work the Indians are doing in their schools. Indian relics and Indian dress were exhibited.

A store window during the Centennial Observance in Mannington displayed the Indian Village. Relics, pottery, and rugs were displayed. The early history of Indians in West Augusta County was in the newspaper. Articles on Indians and their work were read at meetings. A book review on The Sagebrush Surgeon by Florence Crannell Means was most interesting.

#### CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

There are now fourteen C.A.R. Societies in the state with one organizing. There are over three hundred and eighty members, twelve State Promoters, five National Promoters, fourteen Senior Presidents, twenty-five Senior State Chairmen, ten D.A.R. - C.A.R. Committee Chairmen and many assistants.

One of the chief projects in West Virginia for the year was the publishing of the *Jug and Musket* news sheet, by Seneca Trails Society under the direction of Mrs. H. Paul Hite of Parkersburg. The typing and mimeographing were done by C.A.R. and four editions were distributed throughout the state.

Other projects were the sending of boxes of clothing to the Indian and mountain schools, the adoption of several Indian girls by the societies and the collection of funds (over \$106.00) for the mountain

schools, Indian schools, National Project and Gadsby's Tavern.

Three and one-half pages of Magazine advertising valued at \$125.00

were sent to the C.A.R. Magazine.

The State Conference was held in Charleston. The theme was "West Virginia, Our Heritage" and was based on conservation of our natural resources. A most enjoyable after dinner speaker was Mrs. William McClaugherty, of Bluefield, who stressed conservation of life as well as our resources.

From the reports of the regents and D.A.R.-C.A.R. Committee Chairmen the following results were noted: 13 gave financial aid to the societies; 16 invited over-age C.A.R. to become members; 14 reported C. A. R. gave programs at D.A.R. meetings; eight contributed State Promoters and three, National Promoters.

Buford Chapter reported that one C.A.R. in Colonel Andrew Donally Society had received the D.A.R. Citizenship Award. Also a Gold Merit award was given to the Society at the National Convention in Washington.

An Honorable Mention award was given to John Augustine Wash-

ington Society of Martinsburg, at the same time.

This year the C.A.R. National Projects are three. One-third of the funds collected will go to the mountain schools, one-third to the American Indian Schools and one-third to the restoration of the Episcopal Chapel of the Cross in Madison, Mississippi.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICE

The reports have been very gratifying and challenging for the chairman of this newly established National Committee in the state of West Virginia.

Forty-three chapters have acknowledged the request of the Chairman and have appointed Chapter Chairman and in some chapters Committees have been set up to carry on the work of the D.A.R. Community Service Program.

Fifty percent of the chapters have replied to the letter requesting

a report for the current year's work.

The work of the committee has been explained thru letters to the Chapter Chairmen and material in the *D.A.R. News.* The Chairman has called the attention of Chapter Chairmen to items 9 and 10 on the National Honor Roll Questionnaire 1956-1957.

The Chairman has pointed out that all forms of Human Conservation are to be reported under this Committee: Red Cross, Veteran Hospital work, Girl Homemakers, youth work, health projects for both young and old, work with the underprivileged. National has stressed the need for continuing scholarships for physical therapy.

It is impossible to go into the details of a new committee with all its ramifications in the alloted space for a report. The Chairman plans from time to time to assist the chapter by mailing to them material which will help them develop the work. She has conferred personally

with Mrs. Frank O. McMillan, National Chairman, concerning the work.

The Chairman wishes to thank the Daughters for their alert and keen interest in this work and the spirit in which they are taking hold. It is suggested that chapters give two minutes at each chapter meeting to record the hours of personal service given by Daughters in Community Service and to discuss briefly the progress of their local survey of services in which the D.A.R. may participate.

#### D.A.R. MUSEUM

From the beginning of our Society the collection and preservation of Revolutionary Relics of unusual significance, from the standpoint of American History, has been a major project. The D.A.R. Museum actually dates back to the founding of the Society, although relics were housed for many years in the Smithsonian Institution. Later they were on display in the North and South wings of Memorial Continental Hall, and now we point with pride to our modern Museum Gallery which houses our priceless possessions.

As I sat in the Kentucky Conference and heard the Chairman report that an Old Trading Post Book 1771-1773—Greenbrier County, W. Va., and the first county clerk's Day Book, also from Greenbrier County, had been presented to their collection in the Museum I felt a bit jealous. The donor explained that Hugh Knox Miles was present when all of the old records were being burned and he asked permission to take one to keep. The first county clerk's office was built about 1780 by Col. John Stuart, who was the first clerk of Greenbrier County. The county then extended from what is now Augusta County, Va., to the Ohio River and took in about three-quarters of the State of West Virginia near

Lewisburg. A number of the entries in the old Trading Post Book showed that the supplies were obtained at Staunton, Va., and were brought back to the trading post.

While these valuable records are owned by a sister State and placed in the Museum, there must be many just as priceless still in our possession. If so, perhaps we can encourage the owner to place them in our National Museum where they can be enjoyed by all of thousands of Americans who visit our buildings each year.

A cup and saucer presented by the Ravenswood Chapter was painted by Caroline Scott Harrison, wife of Benjamin Harrison, our first President General. The Curator, Mr. Klapthor, was so impressed with it that he asked that it be displayed with the Caroline Scott Harrison collection that is being given great prominence in the Museum. In this collection is a dress belonging to Mrs. Harrison which is brocaded with small orchids forming the design. Since Mrs. Harrison was the first lady to grow orchids in Washington, it is only fitting that some of her paintings of orchids should be reproduced upon lovely note paper which we are selling to help support the work of the Museum.

Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor presented a silver spoon carried by her Revolutionary ancestor which is also with our collection in the Museum.

Our West Virginia Room is one of which we can all be proud. Yet we still need several articles which will add beauty and charm. A lamp is greatly needed as the one we have is not entirely an original.

A small piece of coin glass has been purchased but other small beautiful items are needed for our shall cabinet.

Our Museum is our profe and responsibility. Your chairman wishes to thank all who have have part in this phase of our D.A.R. activity and may our interest increase during a next three years so that each West Virginia Daughter may feel that see has a part in this priceless possession.

# JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

There are 345 reported junior members in West Virginia comprising almost 10% of the total membership. Twenty-nine chapters had Junior Membership Chairmen during the last year. Nine chapters have more or less active organized Junior Committees. The largest of these is Matthew French Chapter with 36 junior age members. John Young Chapter runs a close second with 32 juniors.

Over \$1400 was contributed to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund from October, 1955 to October, 1956. This enabled the state to rank first in the nation at the time of the last Congress with a total contribution of \$1776 given in honor of Mrs. William W. McClaugherty, State Regent, and breaking all previous records.

A bazaar was held at the 1955 State Conference and the Conference was followed by a Junior Luncheon. Although the emphasis has been on the Helen Pouch Fund during the year juniors have also sent boxes of clothing and Christmas gifts to Tamassee, contributed money and effort to the Salvation Army, purchased flags for school rooms and assisted greatly with Constitution Week observances.

A doll, Merrie Annie, was given to the Junior Bazaar in Washington. Also a large box of bazaar things was sent by Matthew French Chapter and another box with items priced to total \$88.00 sent from the state.



#### MEMBERSHIP

June 1, 1956, there were 3519 chapter members of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia and 24 members at large.

#### MOTION PICTURES

A list of 16MM Documentary Films recommended by Mrs. Herbert G. Nash, National Chairman, secured from Mrs. Samuel Solins, National Vice-Chairman of Motion Picture Committee, has been sent to all Chapter Chairmen whose names have been received to this date.

It has been recommended that all Chapter Chairmen subscribe to the *D.A.R. Motion Picture Review* for information on current films.

The William Henshaw Chapter had two travel talks with color slides at two meetings, one a European talk by three members who had been abroad.

The Colonel Andrew Donnally Chapter subscribed to the D.A.R. Motion Picture Review and showed a patriotic film, "The Flag Speaks" and a safety film, "Foot Faults", at two chapter meetings.

The Elizabeth Cummins Jackson Chapter showed the following films at chapter meetings: "The American Revolution", secured from the Audio-Visual Library of West Virginia University; "The Big Vacation", by American Airlines, a free film in technicolor showing scenes taken from a plane flying from Chicago to the West Coast; and "Path of Peace", a picture by the United Nations which was also secured through the Audio-Visual Library at West Virginia University. Current films were also discussed at chapter meetings.

The Kanawha Valley Chapter recommended to its members a list of best films taken from a list in the *D.A.R. Magazine*. The James Wood Chapter secured two excellent films, "The Constitution", and "The Bill of Rights", which were shown to 5,000 students in high schools and junior high schools. The results of a Motion Picture Poll taken for the best patriotic films was a tie between "The Strategic Air Command" and "The Caine Muchy". The best childrens film shown was "The Vanishing Prairie". There were three subscriptions to the *D.A.R. Motion Picture Review*.

The Majo Will in Haymond Chapter continued for the fourth year their project of showing patriotic films in the schools of Marion County. Once a mouth for eight months during the school year films are booked to be shown in county schools. In September a complete schedule is arranged with principals and teachers. Each film is held a week with two to four showings a day. D. A. R. members are assigned the responsibility of delivering the films to each school. The films used this year were "The Bill of Rights", "A Man Without a Country", "Give Me Liberty", "Louisiana Purchase", "Lewis and Clark", "The American Indian", "Giant of the North" and "Washington Shrine of American Patriotism". The film, "Louisiana Purchase", was too advanced for junior high schools.

Five films have been previewed and scheduled for the coming school year.

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#### NATIONAL DEFENSE

It was gratifying to your State Chairman of National Defense to receive replies to my request for names of chapter chairmen from every D.A.R. chapter in West Virginia. Material mailed to them by the Nation Defense office, the D.A.R. Magazine, the Press Digest, the West Virginia D.A.R. News, the Resolutions of the National Congress, the President General's message and the instructions of your State Chairman form a nucleus of tools for chapter program planning. An informed chairman creates an alert membership. Both are imperative if we are to inspire others with our patriotic zeal.

Annual reports indicated that most chapters are devoting at least the minimum of five minutes to National Defense at each meeting. Thirty-three chapters reported complete programs on patriotic subjects, sixteen studied pending legislation and through fifty-three letters and telegrams urged Congressmen to take appropriate action. Six

Awards of Merit were presented in West Virginia last year, one of which went to Mrs. William W. McClaugherty, Honorary State Regent.

Chapters reported increased effort to reach our youth through the schools. Seventy Good Citizenship and patriotic Awards were made to students. Many schools cooperated with chapters during Constitution Week, by studying the Constitution, memorizing parts, writing essays, giving classroom programs, displaying patriotic and historic documents and having plays, patriotic assemblies, broadcasts and concerts. Most of the 16,000 pieces of patriotic literature distributed was done through the schools. Sixteen members, alert to subversive trends in some schools, checked state text books. Wheeling Chapter reported that an education committee in their group does this work.

Many chapters reported taking part in community activities such as Civil Defense, parades, patriotic displays, flag gifts, sending girls to Girls' State and participating in patriotic programs. Some chapters furnished patriotic movies for showing in schools and clubs.

The year closed with observation of "Constitution Week". Proclamations were issued by the West Virginia Governor and the mayors of ten municipalities. Talks on the Constitution were given by our State Regent, Mrs. Edward S. Phillips and others; newspaper editorials and articles were published, displays of patriotic material were placed in windows of business houses and schools, radio and television announcements, forums, plays and programs alerted the listening public. All stimulated patriotic thinking. James Wood chapter sponsored Paul Harvey in a lecture attended by fifteen hundred. The following Sunday evening in his nine minute ABC broadcast, with coest to coast hook-up, he emphasized and praised the Daughters of the American Revolution for their patriotic endeavors.

Your State Chairman of National Defense is ready to support you in greater efforts to stimulate patriotism in our youth, to create an informed public and to fight against Communism and World Government. Urge all your members and acquaintances to show their interest in better government by voting at all elections.

#### RADIO AND TELEVISION

After contacting all chapters I received replies from 22. Of these one-half had reports. They are sumarized as follows:

Blennerhassett Chapter, Parkersburg, gave one ten-minute program on TV and arranged for 84 spots on radio.

Borderland Chapter, Oak Hill, reports 2 TV programs by 8th grade students—one during American History Month and one for Constitution Week. Also Chapter members presented 2 broadcasts.

Buford Chapter. Huntington, reported 3 radio broadcasts and six telecasts with a total of 3 hours. During American History Month there were 3 television presentations and one radio program. Two TV programs were for the Fourth of July and Constitution Week was celebrated by having our TV and 2 radio programs.

Col. Charles Lewis Chapter, Point Pleasant, presented a program Oct. 10th, over radio observing the 182nd Anniversary of the Battle of Point Pleasant.

Daniel Devisse:.. Clarksburg, had a seven minute interview over radio during Constitution Week and spot announcements were made on radio stations in Clarksburg and on TV from Wheeling.

General Andrew Lewis Chapter, Lewisburg, presented a radio program and spot announcements during American History Month.

James Wood Chapter, Parkersburg, sponsored a telecast featuring Paul Harvey and had 6 spots on TV during Constitution Week at a total value of \$360. Also ten minutes of coast-to-coast time on 3 Paul Harvey broadcasts on the ABC Network, would be valued at several thousand dollars to purchase. A fifteen minute program on radio plus 60 spot announcements were given.

John Hart Chapter, Elkins, gave a 15 minute radio program on Constitution Day.

John Young Chapter, Charleston, reported a total of 2 hours airtime worth \$547. During Constitution Week this chapter presented two radio programs, two television programs and sponsored 65 spot announcements.

Kanawha Valley Chapter, Charleston, arranged for spot announcements during Constitution Week.

Matthew French Chapter, Princeton, arranged for spot announcements and gave 2 radio programs—one each for Independence Day and Constitution Week.

Two Chapters, John Young and Buford, arranged for tape recordings of their broadcasts to be sent to the National DAR Library.

There is no way to total the amount of airtime and the expense involved in this report as several of the reports sent to me were not

summarized in this manner. But we did have more than 700 minutes, or over 10 hours of airtime for our projects.

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#### THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Our committeee has a New Look in its name—The Flag of the United States of America. It also has a Forward Look: Patriotism in Action.

Our objective-more flags flying, displayed properly.

Our slogan—RESPECT THE FLAG: ALWAYS DISPLAY IT

Early in September I mailed to each chairman (or regent if I did not have the chairman's name and address) a letter with suggestions for committee procedure. In the near future each chairman will receive a state questionnaire.

I have received twenty-two splendid reports from chairmen of this committee, the majority reporting the display of the flag at each meeting and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The following chapters reported: Colonel Andrew Donally, Pack Horse Ford, Ann Royall, Trans-Allegheny, Kanawha Valley, Blennerhassett, Colonel Charles Lewis, Borderland, Wheeling, Buford, General Andrew Lewis, William Henshaw, James Wood, John Hart, Ravenswood, Hancock Pinneers, Colonel John Evans, Elizabeth Ludington Hagans, Shenand of Valley, Princess Aracoma, Daniel Taylor and Matthew French. Compters not mentioned did not get their reports in on time.

Special emphasis was placed on Constitution Week. Chapter members and merchants in towns and cities were asked to display the flag each day (weather permitting) during the week. Schools were asked to have appropriate patriotic programs and displays. Several chapters reported television and radio stations giving information through spot announcements and newscasts. Ministers were also asked to cooperate. Flag Codes were distributed and competent speakers were heard at chapter meetings.

The majority of chapters reported a Flag Day program at regular June meeting. "The Flag Quiz" from *D.A.R. Magazine* for September 1954 was very popular. Programs over radio stations consisted of music, discussion of the Bili of Rights and Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. American Flags were displayed by merchants and film strips were shown. Schools were visited by chairmen to see if they had flags and to see if they observed the Pledge of Allegiance.

A flag presentation was made in memory of a chapter member's son. Another flag was purchased and presented by a Chapter Regent to a Boy Scout Troop.

An interesting program, "Flags That Have Flown Over the United States", was presented at Jackson's Mill. Several chapters have used the flags.

Flags were placed on the graves of Revolutionary soldiers in five different graveyards—about thirty in all.

One chapter is always represented at the Naturalization Ceremony in Welch and presents a small flag and a copy of the Constitution to each new citizen.

It is the goal of one chairman to have each chapter member own and display the American Flag on all national holidays. It is my sincere wish that each chairman will accept this as her goal and keep "Old Glory" flying.

# BY-LAWS

# THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

#### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of this body shall be the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II

#### OBJECTS

The object of this Organization shall be to bring into closer relationship the Chapters of West Virginia and to promote the three objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of records of the addividual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object, of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of the American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

#### ARTICLE III

#### MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All Chapters in the State in good and regular standing in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, shall be eligible to membership in this Organization.

Section 2. Any Chapter after confirmation by the National Society may become a member by sending to the State Registrar and the State Recording Secretary the name of the Chapter, the names of its officers, the names of its members and by sending the State assessments to the State Treasurer.

Section 3. A member-at-large of the State shall not be eligible as a delegate or an alternate to the meetings of the National Society or State Organization, or hold a National or State Office or serve on a National or State Committee.

### ARTICLE IV

#### OFFICERS

The Officers of this Organization shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State

Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian and a State Librarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary.

#### ARTICLE V

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of this Organization shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the State Conference, every third year.

A majority vote shall constitute an election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. All State Officers shall assume office when the Continental Congress confirms the election of

the State Regent and State Vice Regent.

Section 4. No member shall be eligible to any State Office until she has been a member of the West Virginia Organization at least two years. No member shall be eligible to the same State Office for two consecutive terms and no member who has served one term in any State Office shall be eligible to any other State Office, except that of state Vice Regent or State Regent until the expiration of at least one sear

Section 5. No member shall hold at the same time two offices car-

rying a vote at the State Conference.

Section 6. No member shall be eligible to the State Regency who has not served previously as a State Officer. No Chapter shall be eligible to representation on the Board for more than three consecutive terms.

exclusive of Chaper Regents.*

Section 7. Should the office of the State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall accede to that office for the remainder of that term. Other vacancies occurring in office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next annual meeting of the State Conference. Any member having served in a vacancy for more than one-half term in any office, except the office of State Regent and State Vice Regent, shall be deemed to have served a term.

Sction 8. In recognition of valuable service to the State Organization, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a majority vote at any State Conference upon a member who has held the

office of State Regent.

Section 9. Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General from West Virginia shall be made by the Nominating Committee at the annual meeting of the State Conference. There may be nominations from the floor. The vote shall be by ballot; a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive

^{*} National By-laws, Article XIV, Section 6: "To be eligible to the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member shall have held membership in a chapter within the state organization for at least five years prior to her election." The provision for two years of membership is therefore null and void.

Committee, appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee. authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Regent shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Section 2. The State Vice Regent, in the obsence of the State Re-

gent, shall perform the duties of the State Regent.

Sction 3. The State Chaplain shall open all State Meetings with the reading of Scripture and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall conduct the Memorial Service at each State Conference and prepare the necrology for the State.

The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of Section 4. all meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers. State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers, Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings affecting or pertaining to them.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of her office and such other correspondence as the State Regent, State O ganization, the State Board of Management and the State Executive Committee may direct. She shall send out the notices

of all meetings and shall distribute all literature.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the state pard of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of a received and disbursements and pay by check all bills duly authorized of the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. All bills shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee prior to their payment. The breasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The books shall close on the fifteenth day of September each year. An Audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management. She shall within thirty days of her retirement turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and books of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for payments of bills duly authorized.

Section 7. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligibility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Registrar General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keep a card file containing the name, address. name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, re-instatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband.

Section 8. The State Historian shall direct and encourage the Historical work in West Virginia through Chapter Historians and shall incorporate in her annual report such outstanding report from Chapter Historians as may be of future value to the State. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Historian General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. She shall prepare for the Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution the State Reports of grave locations, dates and service records of Revolutionary soldiers, sailors and patriots. She shall have custody of all historical or biographical manuscripts of which the State Organization may become possessed, and shall arrange and preserve the same.

Section 9. The State Librarian shall have charge of all books and magazines of which the State Organization may become possessed, with the exception of those provided for elsewhere. She shall have charge of soliciting gifts, negotiating exchanges and purchasing new volumes for the Library of the National Society. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Librarian General and the State Organization.

Section 10. All Officers shall submit, in duplicate, a brief narrative report of their work to the Annual Conference.

#### ARTICLE VII

## MEETING OF THE STATE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Annual Conference of the West Virginia State Organization shall be held in October during the week including the day of October the tenth, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board of Management; the exact date shall be left to the discretion of the State Regent. The place of meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Management unless previously hand by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the receiving of reports of officers, State Board of Management, the chairmen of committees, the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The report of the Program Committee when adopted shall become the order of Business for the annual Conference. A vote of a majority of all registered delegates is necessary to make a change in the program.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates and alternates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall be the Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.

Section 4. The voting members of the State Conference or at any special meeting of the State Organization shall be its Officers, the Officers and Honorary Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents of West Virginia, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents, or alternates, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society.

Secion 5. One credential blank must be sent to the Chairman of Credentials Committee and the other to the State Regent not later than ten days before the annual meeting of the State Conference.

Section 6. Twenty (20) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### FEES AND DUES

Section 1. The fiscal year of the State Organization shall be September 15th to September 15th.

Section 2. To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January, thirty-five cents (35c) per capita for each member on the Chapter roll the first day of January, and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chap-

ters as of January 1 presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference, said dues and assessments shall be remitted in one

payment.

Section 3. The Chapters shall send to the State Treasurer, the State dues and assessments for the current year for all members accepted to membership by the National Society between January 1, and June 30 of each year. Such members shall pay the required dues and assessments again the following year.

Section 4. The dues and assessments of all members accepted by the National Society after June 30 of each year shall be applied to the

next succeeeding calendar year.

Section 5. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent to defray her expenses to the National and State Meetings and for expenses pertaining to her office to the amount of the above sum.

Section 6. The remaining State dues may be used for printing, stationery for State Officers and State Chairmen and necessary expenses incurred by other State Officers and State Chairmen. All bills which the State is liable shall be itemized and presented to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not later than September 1 of each year

in which the debt is incurred.

*Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all the expenses a conference with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State and Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

#### ARTICLE IX

# STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization and the Chapter

Regents shall contitute the Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall meet at the call of the State Regent. One meeting shall precede the State Conference and one meeting shall follow the State Conference. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent upon written request of five members of the Board. At least five days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given all members of the Board.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Organization during the interim between its meetings, except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board of Management shall make an

annual report to the State Conference.

Section 4. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE X

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization shall compose the Executive Committee. The State Board of Management may authorize this Committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent or upon the written request of five members of the Committee. This Committee shall act as adviser to the State Regent and it shall make a complete report at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 2. A recommendation for a project to be considered by the State Conference must be submitted to the Executive Committee on or

before September 1. If the proposal meets with the approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management it shall be submitted to the Finance Committee for consideration and if recommended by the Finance Committee presented to the State Conference for adoption.

Section 3. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Ex-

ecutive Committee.

#### ARTICLE XI

## COMMITTEES

Section 1. At the close of the State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following committees: Finance, Resolutions and Credentials.

Section 2. The Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and four members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds, plan a budget and recommend to the State Conference such

expenditures as the committee deems expedient.

Section 3. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent. All resolutions to be presented at the State Conference must be sent to the chairman at least two weeks before the meeting. The name and address of the chairman shall be included in the call for the State Conference. The committee shall consider all resolutions sent to the chairman and shall economend suitable action thereon when presenting the resolutions to the meeting.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall contact of four members, the chairman, to be appointed by the State E gent the State Treasurer and two members to be appointed from the Hoste's Chapters.

#### ARTICLE XII

#### CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Organization shall elect Officers at the time of, or previous to, the May Meeting of said Chapters. Section 2. The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary and the State Treasurer of the election of Officers.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter in the State Organization shall send to the State Regent annually on or before March 1 a type-

written report of the work of her Chapter for the year.

Section 4. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the work of her Chapter from October 1 to October 1. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words, one copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference, one copy to the State Regent and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

## ARTICLE XIII

#### DISTRICTS

Section 1. The State organization may be divided into the following districts: Northern, Central, Eastern, Southern and Western, each district having a Director and a Secretary and other necessary officers.

Section 2. Each district shall elect its own Director and Secretary and other necessary officers, the election taking place at the District Meeting. The term of office shall be one year. No member who holds a State Office or the office of Chapter Regent shall be eligible for the office of District Director.

#### ARTICLE XIV

#### PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this State Organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE XV

#### AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual State Conference by a two-thirds vote, provided that a copy of the amendments has been sent with the call to the annual meeting. Amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the meeting at which they are adopted.

Section 2. Amendments may be proposed by the State Conference, by the State Board of Management, or by a committee authorized by

the State Conference, or by a Chapter.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the State Organization shall become a law of the Organization without notice of the amendment.

# * RESOLUTION No. 4 ADOPTED AT THE 48th ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE IN CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA

Whereas. The Sine Regents of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution are finding it distault each year to secure a place in which to hold the Annual State Conference due to the lack of hotel accommodations in certain sections of the State, and

Whereas. The traditional custom of holding the Annual State Conference in the Sections of the State which can accommodate the delegation is becoming a financial burden on many of the Chapters, be it

Resolved. That the State Regent and her Executive Committee shall have the authority to select the place in which to hold the Annual Meeting, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference, and that the Regent, aided by the General Chairman and Chapter Regents in the respective cities shall plan the program without elaborateness for the Conference, be it

Resolved. That the Annual Conference Dues be increased to two dollars (\$2.00) per delegate, to be used in defraying all of the expenses in connection with the holding of our State Conference, be it

Resolved. That the Conference expenses shall not exceed the Conference Dues, that no additional fees be added to the cost of the meals as served by the hotel and that all bills for Conference expenses be approved and countersigned by the Finance Committee.

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
