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#### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The State Board of Management of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at 2:15 P.M., April 15, 1958, in the Carlton Room of the Sheraton Carlton Hotel, Washington, D. C. Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent, presided.

Mrs. L. St. Clair Allen, State Treasurer, led the Board in prayer in the absence of the state chaplain.

Mrs. Phillips explained the change to a tea instead of a luncheon. Mrs. Phillips announced that the Jackson's Mill will be July 5, with Elizabeth Ludington Hagans Chapter, Mrs. Charles Seibert, Regent, as hostesses. It was impossible to change the date away from the holiday weekend.

Mrs. Phillips has requested the organization of a new chapter in the Charleston area which will be the fourth chapter as William Morris Chapter is located at Pratt, W. Va.

The state has pledged \$2500 for the ampitheater stage at Cedar Lakes. \$1629.05 has been paid with almost \$300 outstanding in pledges. Approximately \$640.06 is still needed. \$1323.02 is in the Contingent Fund plus \$175 due from the sale of postcards, making a total of \$1498.02.

The postcards of the West Virginia Room sell for  $5\phi$  each with the profits going to the West Virginia Room.

Mrs. Phillips suggested that the balance of \$640.06 due on Cedar Lakes be taken from the Contingent Fund. Miss Virginia B. Johnson moved that the balance for the ampitheatre stage be taken from the Contingent Fund and the Contingent Fund be reimbursed by the unpaid pledges to the extent of those pledges. Seconded by Mrs. S. J. Stagg. Carried by vote.

Mrs. T. B. Leith moved that the Board recommend to the Conference that a marker be placed on the ampitheatre stage in honor of Mrs. Edward S. Phillips, State Regent. Mrs. Grant P. Hall, Jr., was asked by the State Regent to take the chair in the absence of the State Vice Regent. The motion was seconded by Miss Virginia B. Johnson. Carried by vote. Mrs. Phillips thanked the Board.

Mrs. Phillips announced that \$1568.37 has been paid on the West Virginia Room in the Mechanical Arts Building at Kate Duncan Smith. Balance due is \$3431.63. She also announced that last November she invited Mrs. Ashmead White of Maine, to be the State Conference speaker. The Conference dates are October 16, 17, 17, at the Frederick Hotel in Huntington. Mrs. John Graham, Regent of Buford Chapter, is General Chairman.

Mrs. H. A. Beckwith, State Membership Chairman, has been asked to secure the state membership plaque voted by the State Conference. 3564 was the total membership on February 1, the highest ever and a net gain of 28.

Mrs. Phillips announced her resignation as State Regent, expressing appreciation and gratitude for the honor and the memories. Mrs. Phillips read the state by-laws concerning the succession of the State Vice Regent. The resignation becomes effective at the close of the Congress.

Mrs. Phillips recommended that Mrs. Rudolph S. Stoyer of Morgantown, be appointed as State Vice Regent by the Board until October. Mrs. Grant P. Hall, Jr., moved that Mrs. Stoyer be appointed by the Board. Seconded by Mrs. T. B. Leith. Carried by vote.

Mrs. Leith moved that the Board accept with deep regret the State Regent's resignation. Seconded by Miss Johnson. Carried by vote.

A letter from Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, State Vice Regent, who was hospitalized because of an accident, was read.

The minutes were read and approved as read.

#### **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

The Executive Committee of the West Virginia State Organization, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, met at 10:15 A.M., July 5, 1958, at Jackson's Mill with Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, State Regent, presiding.

Mrs. T. B. Leith, State Historian, read the prayer sent by Mrs. Russell J. Bergen, State Chaplain.

Mrs. Holcombe expressed her regret at Mrs. Phillips' resignation. Mrs. Holcombe asked the officers if they had reports. Mrs. Boggess reported having sent a letter to chapters regarding the new booklet. She has also been trying to locate wanted books.

The secretary read a message from Mrs. H. K. Owens, the permanent chairman for the Mill.

Mrs. Holcombe announced two new chairmen this year, Mrs. Dwight P. Cruikshank of James Wood Chapter has been appointed chairman of Insignia. Mrs. Isaac P. Long of Kanawha Valley Chapter will be special chairman of the Year Book Contest at the Conference. Mrs. E. L. Robertson of Mathew French Chapter is the new Chairman of Resolutions replacing Miss Anne Lloyd Baylor who resigned because of health.

Mrs. Holcombe announced receipt of a letter from the West Virginia Conference on Handicapped Children inviting West Virginia D.A.R. to a meeting September 24, 25 in Charleston.

Mrs. Holcombe displayed a model of the proposed ampitheater at Cedar Lakes prepared by Martens Architects. Mrs Leith moved that we have a ground breaking or presentation of check ceremony, preferably in Charleston, within the next ten days. Mrs. Boggess seconded the motion. Carried by vote.

Miss Virginia B. Johnson moved that Mrs. Allen, State Treasurer, be asked to write each chapter sending a contribution for the approved schools not designated for the West Virginia Room in the Mechanical Arts Building at Kate Duncan Smith D.A.R. School asking if the money could be so redesignated. Mrs. Boggess seconded. Carried by vote.

Mrs. Holcombe announced that Mrs. John E. Graham and the Huntington Chapter are making extensive Conference plans. Mrs. Groves, Mrs. Newland, Mrs. White and Mrs. Nash have been invited.

Mrs. Holcombe mentioned the recommendation of the State Board of Management that the Cedar Lakes stage be marked in honor of Mrs. Phillips.

Mrs. Holcombe announced Mrs. Stoyer's resignation at State Vice Regent and expressed her regret.

Mrs. Leith stated that she is the new Regent of her Chapter. Mrs. Holcombe read the state by-laws, Article V, Section 5.

Mrs. Holcombe announced that she had attended the June meeting of the National Board of Management. The Registrar General had verified 700 applications since April 19, Sixty-four were reinstated. Of these only eleven were West Virginians.

The minutes were read and approved as read. The meeting ad-

#### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

AUGUST 18, 1958

The State Board of Management of the West Virginia Organization National Society Daughters of the American Revolution met at the call of the State Regent, Mrs. V. Eugene Holcombe, August 18, 1958. at 1 P.M., in the Wilmar Restaurant, Parkersburg, West Virginia, with Mrs. Holcombe presiding.

Mrs. A. Keith McClung, Honorary State Regent, asked the blessing at the luncheon. After the luncheon, Mrs. Holcombe read the prayer sent by Mrs. Russell J. Bergen, State Chaplain.

"Our Heavenly Father, we assemble in the interest of work constructive to the welfare of our society, Daughters of the American Revolution. First, we pay homage to Thee, Thy wisdom and merciful goodness to us.

"We seek Thy divine guidance in all that we do. Give us a unity of purpose and an understanding mind as we go forward this day and every day of our lives. May our decisions be tempered with fairness and wisdom. Be Thou, very near our State Regent, that she may feel Thy presence as she carries on the duties of her office

"These petitions we ask in His name who taught us to pray, saying:

The Lord's Prayer.

Amen."

Mrs. Holcombe stated the purpose of the meeting was the filling of the vacancy of the State Vice Regency.

The State Recording Secretary called the roll of the Board with the following eleven members present constituting a quorum: Mrs. Holcombe; Miss Virginia B. Johnson, State Recording Secretary; Mrs. H. Paul Hite, Regent, Blennerhassett Chapter; Mrs. John E. Graham, Regent, Buford Chapter; Mrs. W. R. Proffitt, Regent Colonel Lewis Chapter; Mrs. Roy Lowther, Regent James Wood Chapter; Mrs. Charles F. McNutt, Regent John Young Chapter; Mrs. H. Braden Powers, Regent Kanawha Valley Chapter; Mrs. Arthur R. Ward, Regent Major William Haymond Chapter; Mrs. Harry F. Toothman, Vice Regent Matthew French Chapter representing the Regent; Mrs. Gaither W. Miller, Regent William Morris Chapter. Mrs. D. W. Snyder, State Parliamentarian, was present.

Mrs. Snyder instructed the Board reading the National By-laws, Article 14, section 7, regarding the succession of a confirmed State Vice Regent to the State Regency in case of resignation of the State Regent. She read a letter from Mrs. Roscoe C. O'Byrne, National Parliamentarian, regarding the confirmation of the State Vice Regent which cannot take place till the December meeting of the National Board of Management. The Vice Regent will have no vote at the Conference as a state officer until her confirmation, although she may be elected a delegate from her chapter. She also instructed the Board that immediately following her election a motion may be made that the State Vice Regent may take the chair when necessary during the Conference. Mrs. Snyder read the State By-laws regarding a quorum of the State Board of Management being ten members. Mrs. Snyder read Article 5, Section 4, regarding eligibility to the office.

Mrs. Arthur R. Ward nominated Mrs. Plumer Earle Hill. Seconded by Mrs. John E. Graham. The State Regent appointed Mrs. Snyder and Miss Johnson to phone Mrs. Hill. Mrs. Hill graciously consented to serve as State Vice Regent if elected.

Miss Johnson moved that the vote be by ballot.

Mrs. Holcombe announced that Hancock Pioneers Chapter has disbanded to clarify why there are 56 members of the State Board of Management.

Mrs. Holcombe asked Mrs. Snyder the voting strength.

10 members constitute a quorum.

11 members constitute the voting strength.

6 votes are required to elect.

Mrs. Lowther seconded the motion that we vote by ballot. Motion carried.

Mrs. Holcombe appointed Mrs. Ward, Mrs. Powers, and Mrs. Hite as tellers.

The tellers distributed ballots, collected them and retired to count. Mrs. Hite reported that 11 ballots were cast and Mrs. Plumer Hill received 11 votes.

Mrs. Holcombe announced the unanimous election of Mrs. Plumer Earle Hill as State Vice Regent and asked permission to wire Mrs. Hill. Mrs. Lowther so moved. Seconded by Mrs. Graham. Carried by vote.

Mrs. Ward moved that the ballots be destroyed. Seconded by Mrs. Graham. Carried by vote.

The minutes were read and on motion of Mrs. McNutt, seconded by Mrs. Hite, were approved as read. Mrs. Toothman moved adjournment.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 P.M.

Today we pay tribute to the memory of one of the Founders of our State Society Daughters of the American Revolution—Mrs. Baldwin Day Spilman, born Anna Gaither Camden, who passed away at her old home "Elway Hall", Warrenton, Virginia, last April, at the age of 96 years.

Mrs. Spilman organized the James Wood Chapter of Parkersburg, January 23, 1903, the became Regent of her Chapter. Later in 1906 she became the first State Regent of West Virginia. The crowning glory of her administration was the forming of the first State Conference held in Parkersburg, 1907, over which she presided. She resigned as Regent at this Conference to become the first Vice President General from West Virginia.

While State Regent she organized the West Augusta Chapter at Mannington and the John Hart Chapter at Elkins.

Our State Society owes a great debt of gratitude to these early Founders. They were women of the finest heritage, gracious and sincerely devoted to the traditions of their patriotic background. In their vision and courage they set a precedent for all to follow, their loyalty should be an inspiration for all who claim membership in our Society.

In her loss our sorrow finds comfort in the rich heritage she left for us. She was one who loved her country and served it well. Her work is finished but we must strive the more to carry on.

In view of the steadily rising cost of printing, postage, etc. your Finance Committee recommends the following per capita assessments:

This small advance of 8¢ in total per capita assessment should enable us to operate on a sound financial basis for the forthcoming year. We recommend this increase.

A request previously made to organize a chapter in Charleston was denied due to lack of fulfillment of all rules of contract. Mrs. Holcombe has granted permission for the chapter to be organized in Charleston and has presented the request to the organizing secretary general. This request is to be acted upon October 15th, 1958, at the National Board of Management Meeting.

Many letters of interest to the West Virginia Society have been received—one from Mr. Charles Hodel, Chairman of the West Virginia Centennial Commission; one from the Kanawha County Board of Education, enclosing pamphlet, "Educational Climate and Conduct," by Mr. L. Robertson accepted the Resolutions Chairmanship and Mrs. W. C. Bishop the Chairmanship of Student Loan. The Chairmanship of Insignia and a Year Book Chairman were added to the list of State chairmen this year. Mrs. Dwight Crulkshank accepted the Chairmanship of Insignia and Mrs. Isaac P. Long, that of the Year Book.

Three recommendations have come to the State Regent for consideration at the Conference. (1) to purchase a plaque to mark Cedar Lakes; (2) to request that the D. A. R. News devote a part of an issue to the different contests both state and national; (3) to award a radio and a television prize bond of \$25.00 in each category. This contest is to be on the college level and to follow the national plan in this field.

The membership reported on June 1 is 3,574. Let us look forward to building our wonderful organization; working together let us set

our goal for many new members.

Let us strive to organize a D. A. R. chapter in every county.

The "Fruits of Freedom" subject suggested by our President Gen-

eral Mrs. Frederic A. Groves for our state and chapter meetings has been adopted. The development of the various aspects of this subject will be reflected in the reports of all chairmen and chapter regents.

The planning of the 53rd State Conference, Huntington, West Virginia, has constituted a major part of the State Regent's duties. It has been a privilege to work with Mrs. John E. Graham, Chairman of the Conference; Mrs. B. D. Kraybill, Co-Chairman; and all the Conference Chairmen and their committees, all of whom have been gracious, earnest, cooperative and efficient in expediting their several duties. Mrs. D. W. Snyder, State Parliamentarian, gave generously of her time, edited our copy for the Conference Program, and by so doing reduced the printing bill materially. To the Hostess Chapters of the 53rd Conference goes a very special thank you; namely to Mrs. Alden Bryan, Regent, Barboursville Chapter; Mrs. Roy Proffit, Regent, Colonel Charles Lewis Chapter; Mrs. S. L. Miller, Regent, Ravenswood Chapter; and Mrs. John E. Graham, Regent, Buford Chapter, who also served as General Chairman of the Conference; and Mrs. H. E. Danford, Director of the Western District.

All chapters report meetings opened with Scripture and prayer or use of the D. A. R. Ritual, and letters sent to be reaved and indisposed members.

I am deeply grateful for having had this opportunity to serve you as Chaplain. I thank all chapter and state officers, and each of you for your friendly cooperation.

## STATE HISTORIAN

"If the proper study of mankind is man, then the proper study of a Nation is its own history, and all true patriots should encourage in every way the associations which record the great deeds, and the successes and failures alike, of the forefathers of their people."

These words of Theodore Roosevelt are as true on this day as when he uttered them in 1893. This being Theodore Roosevelt's Centennial year, we will cooperate with the National Society in commemorating this great man. We are promoting an essay contest for grades 5, 6, 7, and 8 on the subject of Theodore Roosevelt.

Last year we promoted an essay contest for High School pupils on James Monroe. I was pleased with the essays submitted and our State winner was sent in by the Borderland Chapter Historian. Though Miss Betty Prather's essay did not win in the National Contest, we are very proud of her.

I have contacted each Chapter in January and September and the reports are given here.

Anne Bailey—Celebrated all Historical anniversaries with appropriate programs. Promoted essay contest and entertained winners and their Mothers.

Ann Royal—Presented 3 Historical medals.

Barboursville—Gave 4 history awards and 4 certificates. Celebrated American History Month.

Blennerhassett—Gave 6 American History medals, 6 certificates, and Historian wrote and presented a paper on the white women of the Gennessee valley.

Bee Line-Presented 2 history medals.

Borderland—Gave essay material on James Monroe to 10 High Schools. Presented 30 history medals. Gave the essay winner five dollars.

Buford—Presented citizenship awards in Junior and Senior High Schools. Filled out 197 ancestral cards and mailed to State Historian.

Blackwater—Gave 4 history medals and 4 certificates.

Col. Andrew Donally—Is promoting the publication of a History of McDowell County.

Col. Morgan Morgan—Entertained 26 students who had been given American History Medals.

Col. John Evans—Presented 17 history medals and celebrated all historical anniversaries.

Col. Charles Lewis—Gave 10 history medals and observed 5 anniversaries.

Col. James Allen-Presented 8 history medals.

Elizabeth Ludington Hagens—Observed 3 anniversaries and marked 3 graves.

Elizabeth Zane—Gave cash awards for high grades in American History and observed 4 anniversaries.

Elizabeth Cummins Jackson—Presented 3 history medals, 3 certificates, marked 6 graves, and observed 4 anniversaries.

Gen. Andrew Lewis—Had 4 historical programs, marked 1 grave, and observed 2 anniversaries.

Daniel Davisson-Kept historical scrapbook.

Daniel Taylor-Members made a pilgrimage to Jamestown.

John Young—Presented a silver cup to the winner of the James Monroe Essay contest, presented 1 history medal, entertained State Historian and presented her with a silver DAR spoon.

James Wood—Presented 16 history medals, gave one American flag to school, distributed 1500 flag pamphlets, gave \$15.00 to essay winners and marked 5 graves. They also celebrated 3 holidays and gave 2 historical broadcasts.

John Hart—Presented 8 history medals and 8 certificates. Had 4 historical programs, marked graves of 5 deceased members, and observed 2 anniversaries.

John Chapman—Presented 3 history medals, had 2 historical programs, and members are buying an old home for museum.

John Minear—Gave 2 history certificates, had 4 historical programs, and marked 1 grave.

Jennie Wiley—Gave 4 history medals, 4 certificates, and marked one historic spot.

Pack Horse Ford—Placed flags on 28 revolutionary soldiers' graves and had 4 historical programs.

Matthew French—Gave 3 Good Citizenship pins in Jr. and Senior High School, 5 programs on historical subjects, awarded 33 High School students a 3 day trip to Jamestown for making high grades in American History.

Potomac Valley—Gave 3 American History Awards.

Spencer Roane—Gave 3 history medals and had a program on the history of the first President General and observed all anniversaries.

Shenandoah Valley—Gave 64 history certificates, presented 21 papers to archives and observed 3 anniversaries.

Trans-Allegheny—Gave 3 history medals.

Wheeling—Observed all historical anniversaries and gave 10 historical programs.

West Augusta—Presented 3 history medals and all programs were historical.

From our state funds, the two following books were sent: "Descendants of Edward Greenlee of West Virginia" and "William Ballard, A Genealogical Record of His Descendants in Monroe County, W. Va."

Miss Nellie Woods presented a copy of "Memoirs of Colonel Fred M. Woods" to the Library.

Kanawha Valley Chapter has given six West Virginia History magazines.

Elizabeth Zane Chapter reported giving a subscription for "Young Readers of America" to the Charles Gibson Library. They also gave books and magazines to rural schools and to The Merchant Marine Library. They are the only chapters reporting the sale of ten Library Booklets.

I wish to thank all the chapter Librarians who have sent reports of their work.

I am grateful to have had the opportunity of serving West Virginia Daughters and to work with the other state officers.

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## REPORTS OF STATE CHAIRMAN

## ADVANCEMENT OF AMERICAN MUSIC

"The Place Of Music In Our Daily Lives"

As State Chairman of the American Music Committee, I submit the following reports from Chapters reporting to me:

Barboursville—had one entire program on American Music; sing the National Anthem each meeting; gave prize in schools for study of early American composers; observed all red letter days with appropriate music.

- Borderland—sing "The Star Spangled Banner" each meeting; typed words of "The West Virginia Hills" were given to teachers in grade schools; gave a program of music at Veteran's Hospital in Beckley. Words of 26 songs were mineographed and given to veterans so they could all sing. The program lasted over an hour, and, since the patients took part. was very enthusiastically received; Borderland Chapter Guest Day had an outstanding program of vocal music which was presented by a member of the Chapter, Miss Nan Snyder, a recent graduate of New England Conservatory of Music. A hundred and sixty people were present for the program.
- Col. Charles Lewis—National Anthem used in opening Ritual and meetings often closed with singing of "America" or "The West Virginia Hills;" a program entitled "America Sings As History Is Made" was written and presented at the February meeting by Music Chairman, assisted by Music Instructor and Girl's Sextette of Point Pleasant High School; the High School Boy's Quartette sang at a dinner meeting in March; four Chapter members are active workers in the Community Concert Association; Chairman sang with Church Choir on television Chapel of the Air.
- Col. Morgan Morgan—had special music at each meeting in keeping with educational, historical and patriotic themes; had one complete program on music and sang the National Anthem at each meeting.
- James Wood—sings "The Star Spangled Banner" at each meeting; one Chapter member is Director of Church Choir, another working with Junior Choir; Four members assisting C. A. R. in preparing American Music program for D. A. R. Chapter meeting. Protest registered to sponsors of Shrine Circus over using "canned" music and soloist for National Anthem in crowd of ten thousand people. Shrine promised to have group singing of National Anthem in future.
- John Chapman—Music Teacher and Choral Director of High School presented program of vocal and instrumental numbers, giving interesting facts about the history of music in America; all public meetings opened with the National Anthem and the Chapter has had a number of outstanding meetings where American music is stressed; music by American composers used on several programs, including two solo numbers at Constitution Week luncheon.
- John Hart—has used the National Anthem at each meeting; an evening program on American Music was presented by voice students of Davis-Elkins College under the direction of Mrs. Claude King Davis of the College faculty.
- Mondongachate—planning for more music on the 1958-59 programs. Pack Horse Ford—sing the National Anthem at the meetings where a piano is available.
- Potomac Valley—sing "The Star Spangled Banner" at each meeting; had one program devoted to American composers; stressed history and development of American music; observed National Music Week; Chairman is assistant Church Organist.
- Princess Aracoma—A short talk was made by the Music Chairman on some phase of American music at each meeting; the National Anthem was used often.

- Shenandoah Valley—sing the National Anthem and has special vocal or instrumental music at each meeting; one meeting a year is given to music; have groups go to Veteran's Hospital and entertain the patients with music; each month a different Church in community is responsible for Radio Broadcasts; participated in National Music Week observance.
- West Augusta—"The Star Spangled Banner" or "America The Beautiful" is sung at each meeting; a member played a number of American Indian songs and gave their history at October meeting; dressed in colonial costume the grand-daughter of Chapter Regent sang several selections at November meeting; vocal or instrumental music was used effectively on many programs.

William Henshaw—Plans are made for a discussion on Modern American Music by Dr. Guy Frank, Chairman of Music Department of Shepherd College in near future.

Letters were mailed to all Chapter Chairmen asking for reports and passing on information from the National Chairman of the American Music Committee.

I attended the 52nd State Conference in Parkersburg and led the National Anthem at all the sessions and group singing of American songs on Friday evening. I attended the Western District meeting at Cedar Lakes, giving report of Music Committee, and was a guest of Borderland Chapter for musical program in June. I led the National Anthem at the C. A. R. State Conference dinner meeting and have been appointed Senior State Chairman of American Music.

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## AMERICAN INDIANS

West Virginia as yet has no Department of Archeology and no official research on Indian life has been done.

One Chapter chose "The American Indian" for its theme for this year. Materials utilized consisted of numerous publications of the U.S. Government, including the Office of Indian Affairs, the St. Mary's Bugle, letters from St. Mary's School and Bacone College, Mission Study books of the Methodist Church and a film on Bacone College.

Contributions were sent to both Bacone College and St. Mary's School for their work and some sent contributions earmarked "Indian Work." Beads and used clothing were sent to the Schools and various articles of Indian Craft from St. Mary's were placed on display.

Book review on *Indians of the United States* written by Clark Wissler was given. This book describes the Indian's mode of life and account of Indian personalities of the time. It understandingly describes the way the Indians now live, their contributions to our culture and their role in our future. The book *The Black Dog Trail* written by Tillie Karns Newman and the authentic history of Jennie Wylie were also reviewed.

Slides were shown of the St. Mary's School and some had movies shown by people who had visited the Indian Reservations, with displays of pottery and blankets.

One Chapter sent a contribution to the St. Mary's School with money raised through a doll project.

West Virginia is one of the States in which few Indians remain. The last census gave the Indian population of our State at 160.

## COMMUNITY SERVICE

April 1958—The N.S.D.A.R. dissolved the Community Service Committee as such. The Clearing House Committee recommends that the Occupational Therapy contributions be reported to the Committee on Americanism. The money is to be sent to the Treasurer General as usual, for the Occupational Therapy Scholarship Award. The work of the Red Cross will be reported under the Americanism Committee; the girl homemakers work will be reported within the states only.

The filing of Community Service Hours will not be reported henceforth, for D. A. R. credit as the N. S. D. A. R. feels that an accurate re-

port is almost impossible to achieve.

Many of the West Virginia Daughters through their chapters have reported interest in one or more of the above named services, and a few have sent in reports for this year. Therefore, I submit the following record of their services. Barboursville, 65 hours; Bee Line, no hours given; Borderland, 573 hours; Captain James Allen, 2 homemaker awards; Daniel Davisson, \$5. to Occupational Therapy; Jennie Wiley, 500 hours; John Hart, \$5. Occupational Therapy; Mondongachate, small contribution to Occupational Therapy; William Henshaw, 889 hours, contribution to Occupational Therapy.

In the summer of 1957 serving as Chairman of the Community Service of West Virginia, I compiled a booklet of facts and figures in an effort to help the Community Service Project in West Virginia. The cost of which was \$75.00. This booklet was distributed to Chapter Regents and Chapter Chairmen. From October 26, 1957 to February 14, 1958 the Chairman served on the Common Pleas Court Jury, Kanawha County.

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#### MUSEUM

As we come to the close of another year, we proudly report the additions to our West Virginia Room in Continental Hall in Washington.

A small plaque, in a beautiful shade of pink, showing the raising of the American flag in 1812, was presented by the Southern District in honor of the State Chairman.

Your State Museum fund was used to purchase a small ornate coffee pot in early Sheffield silver. This is used on the round table with two cups making a more homelike atmosphere in the room. Also from this fund was bought a lovely figurine, a man in Colonial costume with rich coloring of purple which harmonizes with the other colors in the room. This is Majolica ware and a real collector's item. For the silver coffee pot, and the Majolican figurine, the State paid \$60.00 which I have been told by three people who have dealt in antiques was an extremely low price.

John Chapman Chapter, honored the State Chairman, who is also a member of that Chapter by purchasing a large chop plate in early Cottage ware. It has a scene in subdued grey shades and will be used on the wall with the Staffordshire pink one now on the wall.

Your Chairman presented a small pink jug, or pitcher-Worcester ware which was made for the American market in 1820 in England. It is decorated in gold and takes its place in the shell cabinet with other items of interest.

At the State Board meeting last October, it was decided to have post card pictures made of our West Virginia Room. During this year, the cards have been made, and are indeed beautiful. In order to sell them at 5 cents each we had to have 5000 made. To date we have sold 1400 leaving on hand 3600. \$175.00 was taken from the State Treasury to pay for the cards, with the understanding that this amount would be replaced. The amount of \$75.00 has been sent to our State Treasurer, and with your help we will pay the balance of \$100.00 before the National Congress in April.

Many Chapters have shown much growing interest in the Museum and the W. Va. Room. For one dollar per year, you can be a "Friend of the Museum." Anne Bailey Chapter has the record for having last year the largest number of "Friends of the Museum" with 18 of their members being enrolled. James Wood Chapter contributed \$12.00 to the Museum Fund, which was the largest amount reported as a gift from the Chapter to be used in Museum work.

Let us keep up the good work in keeping for posterity the priceless objects which have had a part in the culture of America.

My sincere thanks to the Chapter Chairmen for making the above report possible. Four volumes of material and the seven photostats were sent to our National Chairman which represented many, many hours of hard work, many miles of travel, quite a little expense and the missing of quite a lot of pleasure, I expect, but I believe you will agree that it is a report of which we can be justly proud.

Thirty-four chapters replied to a questionaire sent out in January as follows: thirty chapters had active chairmen for this committee, three regents had not yet appointed a chairman and one chairman had resigned.

A letter was sent to each of the 48 chapters in August, outlining our work and aims for the coming year. Since then eighteen chairmen have either sent a report or their name and address to me. In all, I have heard as of this date, from thirty-six chapters in the state. Every chapter must have a chairman and so help West Virginia be 100 per cent in that phase of the work. To date, one chapter, Col. Charles Lewis, has reported \$29.00 contributed to the Genealogical Records Bibliographical Index Project. This contribution came from the Chapter and individual members. Shenandoah Valley Chapter has reported several hundred pages of material completed on their project. Many other chapters have reported progress on their projects. West Virginia is well aware of the great importance of the work of the Genealogical Records Committee for the records we collect and file are the basis for the work of many other committees and without them we would in time have no more members and no more Society.

I had the honor of representing the regent of my chapter at Continental Congress in April. While there it was my privilege to attend a most informative meeting of the Genealogical Records Committee, presided over by Dr. Jean Stephenson, our National Chairman. It was a privilege, indeed, to represent West Virginia as State Chairman, at a beautiful luncheon given by Dr. Stephenson at the Washington Club in honor of all visiting State Genealogical Records Committee Chairmen.

I have carried on correspondence relative to the work of the J. A. C. Clubs and sent pins, handbooks and study guides when requested. Occasionally I am asked to speak to groups about the program of the Junior American Citizens Committee.

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## JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP

Since May, 1958, I have written to all Chapters twice, and to 27 of them a third time, asking for reports of Junior Membership activities. Thirty-four Chapters have responded to my requests for reports.

Based on replies from 34 Chapters, we have 220 junior members. This is far short of the goal of  $15\,\%$  of the total membership set by our President General. To meet this goal we should have 535 junior members.

Of the junior members reported, 41 were new since last year; 14 are serving as Chapter officers; 25 are serving as chairmen of Chapter committees; 5 helped with Junior American Citizens Clubs; 9 helped with C. A. R.; 5 helped with Good Citizens; 6 with American Red Cross. Ten junior members subscribe to the D. A. R. Magazine; 6 Junior Chairmen have D. A. R. Handbooks.

Three Junior Membership Committees reported contributions to the Helen Pouch Scholarship Fund, 4 to Kate Duncan Smith, 1 to Tamassee and one chapter contributed to the Girl Scouts.

Outstanding activities reported by Junior Membership Committees were: distribution of flags to first graders, along with patriotic program; presentation of Good Citizenship pins to civics students in 9th grade; program for Girl Scouts on the Constitution and on George Washington at Valley Forge; Flag Day Program. Money-making ventures included a benefit bridge, white elephant sale, and Colonial Silver Tea at the Governor's Mansion.

The Junior Membership Committee of West Virginia conducted its annual bazaar during the State Conference in Parkersburg in October, 1958. With sixteen chapters contributing either saleable items or cash, plus two personal donations, the bazaar netted \$238.73. This amount, added to the proceeds of the previous year's bazaar, paid for the watering pond for the West Virginia beef herd at Tamassee in the amount of \$243.00. From the balance, \$50.00 was used to purchase a marker to identify the beef herd and the watering pond. Any money left in the Junior Membership fund will be added to this year's project.

October 1, 1957 there were 48 Chapters of the National Society, D. A. R. in West Virginia.

October 1, 1958 there were 47 Chapters of the National Society, D. A. R. in West Virginia, one, Hancock Pioneers, having dissolved.

I am informed unofficially, however, that the members are being received into other chapters of the N. S. D. A. R.

Nov. 1, 1957 there were 3516 members, with 24 at large, total 3540, June 1, 1958 there were 3548 members, with 26 at large, total 3574. An increase of 32 members, with 2 at large increase. We are not receding—but I can't say we are proceeding at a very fast gait.

During that period I received reports of the deaths of 55 members (which I sent to Mrs. Russell J. Bergen, State Chaplain.

Those Records are from the Treasurer-General's Office.

In July I note there were only 25 at large members (we lost one at large member somewhere along the way).

During this fiscal year of Oct. 1, 1957 to Oct. 1, 1958 I have received many fine reports from a large number of the Chapters—very complete—and showing a marked increase in interest and membership over those of '56-'57.

17 Chapters made gains—14 Chapters lost—17 stood still.

Ravenswood Chapter has 5 groups of 2 sisters only—2 groups of Mother and 1 daughter—7 members of the Charles Parsons line—6 members of the McKay line—6 members of the George Warth line.

I have had no other records from any of the chapters in regards to this type of reports.

It is my sincere wish that our State NEWS (D. A. R.) will devote a part of an issue SOON to the different contests—both State and National, together with a complete statement of the rules concerning same. Three years ago I had a short blank for reports published in the NEWS and it brought gratifying results. The expense of sending special blanks to each chapter Membership Chairman is too excessive for your State Chairman to bear.

Later I found that the Anne Bailey Chapter was not organized until February 23rd 1957, so had to leave it off the list as a contestant for the period of February 1, 1957 to February 1, 1958. However, I wish to say that Anne Bailey has made a wonderful increase in membership and in the coming year will be among those at the top.

Another chapter that I should mention as having a fine increase in membership is the Buford. They should be very proud of their reports. If all their increase in membership had been as of February 1, 1958, they would have been in top line. Others to do fine were the John Chapman, James Wood, Col. Charles Lewis, Wheeling, Blennerhassett, and others, and their reports after February 1st, 1958, are fine and will make the next contest for the Plaque a very interesting one. # MOTION PICTURES

There is a need for good motion pictures in schools and in chapter meetings to present visual American History, thereby making a lasting picture on the minds of children and to revive in the minds of adults historical events which will create a feeling of patriotism and love of country. One means of accomplishing this end is the showing of patriotic films wherever and whenever possible.

Ann Bailey Chapter sent monthly copies of "Motion Picture Review" to two leading newspapers, asking the editors to use the information when possible. Civic Clubs, Business firms and churches were given lists of available films which could be used when planning programs. At chapter meetings rating of films was reported. The chairman plans to duplicate a summary of the picture reviewed and distribute the summary to members to be used as a reference sheet concerning movies coming to local theatres.

James Wood Chapter, with the cooperation of the U.S. Marine Corps and the American Legion, presented 45 minutes of 16 m m sound films on "The Constitution" and "The Bill of Rights" to 400 high school students. The films were shown during Constitution Week. Spot slides

of the American Flag were also shown in local theatres during the same week. The high school will select a list of 5 patriotic films, one of which will be purchased by the chapter, to be shown at a school assembly this spring.

Buford Chapter requested information on a film about Williamsburg. This request was forwarded to Mrs. Herbert Nash, National Chairman, who sent the material direct to the Chairman. The chapter also showed a film on Jamestown, Virginia at a meeting. Wheeling Chapter took a vote on the best films of the year. Those chosen were "Ole Yeller," "The Ten Commandments" and "Around The World in 80 Days." Though not historical, John Hart Chapter showed a film on "Temperance and Drug Addiction" in schools and churches throughout the county.

Major William Haymond Chapter reported the purchase of a film-strip on Conservation from the Conservation Foundation of New York which will be shown in elementary and junior high schools in the county. The film was selected by the superintendent of schools, at the request of the chapter. This film will become a part of the permanant film library of the county schools. Col. Morgan Morgan Chapter showed a film on National Defense at a chapter meeting. This film was secured through the National Committee.

The awards at the 67th Congress for the best children's film and best patriotic films were given to "Escapade in Japan" for children and "Johnny Tremain" for patriotic films.

Again it is urged that all chapter chairmen subscribe to "Motion

Picture Review."

## NATIONAL DEFENSE

Forty-three of the forty-six active chapters in West Virginia responded to my request for names and addresses of their national defense chairmen, and thirty-nine sent annual reports. Thirty-six reported they devote from five to twenty minutes to national defense. Three chairmen said their chapters omit national defense at some meetings. \$43.76 was forwarded to the National Society to aid in wider distribution of defense material.

Resumes of Continental Congress resolutions were presented in twenty-two chapters. Nine reported watching subsequent legislation related to them. Forty letters were sent to Congressmen to influence legislation, and fifteen chapters noted sponsorship and voting record of their representatives. Eight chairmen noted subversive trends in civic, political, social and religious groups, but ten reported observing none. Some community activities participated in by chapters were civil defense, Girl State activities, patriotic window displays, restoration of an old cemetery, and establishment of a ground observer group. Most chairmen encouraged members to fly their American Flag on all holidays and throughout Constitution Week, and some influenced business houses, churches and residents to do likewise.

In cooperation with the Daughters of the American Revolution, Governor Underwood and Mayors of twelve towns issued proclamations setting September seventeenth to twenty-third as "Constitution Week," in West Virginia. Chapters contacted school authorities and secured the cooperation of many schools in studying the Constitution, memorizing parts thereof, writing essays, giving patriotic assemblies, setting up patriotic displays, and preparing programs for radio, television, and D. A. R. chapters. To further stimulate the youth, chapters presented 140 good citizenship awards, History awards and gifts for contests. One class translated the preamble into Latin. Many teachers interested students in flying the American Flag at their homes. Speakers were sent by one chapter to seven schools to present the history of the Flag in replica and story. Five chapters presented patriotic books to school and public libraries. Twenty-six hundred pieces of patriotic literature were distributed to students. One large flag was presented to a Jr. High School for Auditorium display, and twenty-two students were taken on a patriotic tour of Washington, D. C.

Hundreds of spot, radio and television announcements, speakers, forums, plays and interviews on both, made the listening public "Constitution Conscious." One Mayor, speaking on television, asked the public to support efforts to preserve our Constitution, the safeguard of our freedom. Newspapers, through editorials, patriotic articles, reports of chapter activities, pictures and ads helped to alert the public to our patriotic endeavors.

Your State Chairman asks your continued cooperation and renewed effort to stimulate the youth to patriotic endeavors, to create an enlightened public opinion, and to help fight communism and world government, to assure the preservation of our democratic form of government. Show your interest by voting and urging others to do likewise.

## 다 다 다 PRESS RELATIONS

The State Press Relations Scrap Book sent to the Continental Congress in April again won Honorable Mention. It was the only book of its kind to win an award in the Eastern Division. All clippings sent to me cannot be used in the State Press Relations Scrap Book but I want them sent to me every three months in order to secure the lineal inches of publicity the Daughters of the American Revolution receive in our State. We had an increase of over 2,000 inches this year, three chapters, James Wood, Buford and John Young having over 1,000 inches with Borderland, John Chapman and Anne Bailey almost a thousand.

The Press Books prepared by the Chapters in the State will be judged at the Fall Conference by National Officers attending the Conference. Awards will be made at the Chairmens' Luncheon on Friday.

Our State Press Relations Scrap Book will be entered in the National Contest at the D. A. R. Continental Congress in April 1959 and it is earnestly hoped that every Chapter in the State will be represented in this book.

Please remember that I have to have the date of each article and the name of the newspaper in which it was published, also that there cannot be any writing of any kind or scotch tape used on these articles.

Thanking you for your co-operation in making this, the third Press Relations Scrap Book of the three years I have been Press Relations Chairman the best one.

## RADIO AND TELEVISION

This year, in addition to our regular activities, we have been working on setting up the Radio and Television Contest which is being sponsored by the National Society. As all accredited colleges are entitled to compete, we have written personal letters to the President of each such school in West Virginia, and have also sent the material and rules to each. The response has been good and several schools have indicated they plan to enter. However, the results will not be known until January. The State Society plans to make an award to the winner in each category. The National prize is to be a trip for each finalist to Washington, D. C., during our next Congress.

We have nineteen (19) Chapter Chairmen in West Virginia. I have received reports from these: Buford, John Chapman, John Hart, James Wood, and John Young. Eight Radio and Television stations in Charleston, Huntington, Elkins, Parkersburg, and Bluefield gave time for fifteen (15) different programs which amounted to 260 minutes at a cost of \$2,871.50. The programs honored the following dates: Flag Day, Armistice Day, American History Month, and Constitution Week. There were more than twenty (20) D. A. R. members taking part.

Also, the Past Regents Club of Charleston, was on the air for 25 minutes when nine (9) members were interviewed concerning our work. Our State Regent was on this program.

There were over 200 spot announcements during Constitution Week.

The Listening Post reports were not complete so it is impossible to tell how much of that program is going on.

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## WEST VIRGINIA D.A.R. NEWS

West Virginia D. A. R. News has published its customary four issues this past year although not on the customary date. We have been late because of labor difficulties both on the editorial staff, and the composing staff. We believe those difficulties have been resolved, and trust that they will not re-occur. The Spring issue came out purposely one month late because of a suggestion that perhaps the March 1 issue should be moved closer to the Continental Congress date. However, we found this position untenable, because April 1 brought it too close to the national meeting. We are not sorry we tried the experiment; we feel that we have learned.

We tried one other experiment. We did not write to any Chapter

asking for news. Personally we think this is an important source of information. Whether a Chapter is 200 or 20 there can be a sharing of ideas. However, it is your paper and your decision.

A heart warming thing occurred in September when John Chapman Chapter sent us a check for \$36.80 which covered a year's subscription for each and every member, 180 strong. We could remember when that same Chapter bought 40 copies when the paper cost twenty cents each. In almost the same mail we received a note from a national committee woman praising us on the judicious and dignified handling of news in our paper.

### BY-LAWS

## THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

## ARTICLE I

The name of this body shall be the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

## ARTICLE II OBJECTS

The object of this Organization shall be to bring into closer relationship the Chapters of West Virginia and to promote the three objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of the American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in

securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

## ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All Chapters in the State in good and regular standing in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, shall be

eligible to membership in this Organization.

Section 2. Any Chapter after confirmation by the National Society may become a member by sending to the State Registrar and the State Recording Secretary the name of the Chapter, the names of its officers. the names of its members and by sending the State assessments to the State Treasurer.

Section 3. A member-at-large of the State shall not be eligible as a delegate or an alternate to the meetings of the National Society or State Organization, or hold a National or State Office or serve on a

National or State Committee.

## ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

The Officers of this Organization shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State

Corresponding Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian and a State Librarian. No two State Officers shall be members of the same Chapter except the State Regent and State Corresponding Secretary.

### ARTICLE V

### ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of this Organization shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the State Conference, every third year.

A majority vote shall constitute an election.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee shall be elected at the State Conference preceding the Conference at which the State Officers are to be elected. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the five districts. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent out with the call to Conference. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 3. The Officers of this Organization shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected. All State Officers shall assume office when the Continental Congress confirms the election of

the State Regent and State Vice Regent.

Section 4. To be eligible to the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent a member shall have held membership in the West Virginia State Organization at least five years prior to her election. To be eligible for any other state office a member shall have held membership in the West Virginia State Organization two years prior to her election. No member shall be eligible to the same State Office for two consecutive terms and no member who has served one term in any State Office shall be eligible to any other State Office, except that of State Vice Regent or State Regent until the expiration of at least one year.

Secion 5. No member shall hold at the same time two offices

carrying a vote at the State Conference.

Section 6. No member shall be eligible to the State Regency who has not served previously as a State Officer. No Chapter shall be eligible to representation on the Board for more than three consecutive terms,

exclusive of Chapter Regents.

Section 7. Should the office of the State Regent become vacant the State Vice Regent shall accede to that office for the remainder of that term. Other vacancies occurring in office shall be filled by the State Board of Management until the next annual meeting of the State Conference. Any member having served in a vacancy for more than one-half term in any office, except the office of State Regent and State Vice Regent, shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 8. In recognition of valuable service to the State Organization, the title of Honorary State Regent may be conferred for life by a majority vote at any State Conference upon a member who has held the

office of State Regent.

Section 9. Nominations for a candidate for the office of Vice President General from West Virginia shall be made by the Nominating Committee at the annual meeting of the State Conference. There may be nominations from the floor. The vote shall be by ballot; a majority vote shall be necessary for endorsement.

### ARTICLE VI

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Organization, of the Board of Management and of the Executive

Committee, appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, authorized by the State Conference, call all special meetings and perform any other duty required of the State Regent by the National Society. She shall be ex-officio a member of all Committees except the Nominating Committee. The State Regent shall be vested with the State Regent's pin during her term of office.

Section 2. The State Vice Regent, in the absence of the State Regent shall perform the duties of the State Regent.

Section 3. The State Chaplain shall open all State Meetings with the reading of Scripture and prayer and shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall conduct the Memorial Service at each State Conference and prepare the necrology for the State.

Section 4. The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the State Organization, the State Board of Management and of the State Executive Committee. She shall keep a roster of the State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapters of the State Organization and shall notify all Officers. Chairmen and Chapter Regents of all decisions, orders and proceedings affecting or pertaining to them.

Section 5. The State Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of her office and such other correspondence as the State Regent, State Organization, the State Board of Management and the State Executive Committee may direct. She shall send out the notices of all meetings and shall distribute all literature.

Section 6. The State Treasurer shall have charge of all funds and securities of the State Organization which she shall deposit in a bank approved by the State Board of Management. She shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and pay by check all bills duly authorized by the State Conference or the State Board of Management or on warrant drawn by the State Regent. All bills shall be countersigned by the Chairman of the Finance Committee prior to their payment. The Treasurer shall render an audited report in chart form to the annual meeting of the State Conference. She shall submit a statement of the finances of the State at any other meeting of the State Conference, State Board of Management or Executive Committee. The books shall close on the fifteenth day of September each year. An Audit of her account shall be made before each State Conference by a Certified Public Accountant or by an Auditor approved by the Board of Management. She shall within thirty days of her retirement turn over to her successor all monies, accounts and books of the State Treasury with the Auditor's report to be placed in the State files. In case of the inability of the State Treasurer to serve, the Chairman of the Finance Committee is empowered to sign all checks for payments of bills duly authorized.

Section 7. The State Registrar shall assist applicants in proving eligibility claims in towns where there are no chapters and shall give assistance to Chapter Registrars in verifying lineage records and shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Registrar General, by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. The State Registrar shall keep a card file containing the name, address, name and rank of Ancestor, National Number, date admitted to the National Society, date of transfer, re-instatement, resignation, marriage and death. She shall keep a roster of State Officers, State Chairmen and Chapter Regents. She shall be custodian of application papers of members of Chapters that disband.

Section 8. The State Historian shall direct and encourage the Historical work in West Virginia through Chapter Historians and shall incorporate in her annual report such outstanding report from Chapter Historians as may be of future value to the State. She shall perform

such other duties as may be designated by the Historian General by the State Organization and by the State Board of Management. She shall prepare for the Reporter General to the Smithsonian Institution the State Reports of grave locations, dates and service records of Revolutionary soldiers, sailors and patriots. She shall have custody of all historical or biographical manuscripts of which the State Organization may become possessed, and shall arrange and preserve the same.

Section 9. The State Librarian shall have charge of all books and magazines of which the State Organization may become possessed, with the exception of those provided for elsewhere. She shall have charge of soliciting gifts, negotiating exchanges and purchasing new volumes for the Library of the National Society. She shall perform such other duties as may be designated by the Librarian General and the State Or-

ganization.

Section 10. All Officers shall submit, in duplicate, a brief narrative report of their work to the Annual Conference.

### ARTICLE VII

### MEETING OF THE STATE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Annual Conference of the West Virginia State Organization shall be held in October during the week including the day of October the tenth, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference or the State Board of Management; the exact date shall be left to the discretion of the State Regent. The place of meeting shall be determined by the State Board of Management unless previously named by the State Conference. This meeting shall be for the receiving of reports of officers, State Board of Management, the chairmen of committees, the election of officers and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. The report of the Program Committee when adopted shall become the order of Business for the annual Conference. A vote of a majority of all registered delegates is necessary to make a change

in the program.

Section 3. Each Chapter shall be entitled to be represented at any meeting of the State Conference by three times as many delegates and alternates as at the previous Continental Congress, one of whom shall

be the Regent, Vice Regent or Regent's representative.

Section 4. The voting members of the State Conference or at any special meeting of the State Organization shall be its Officers, the Officers and Honorary Officers of the National Society whose membership is within the State, the Honorary State Regents of West Virginia, the Chapter Regents, or in their absence, the First Vice Regents, or alternates, and the delegates or their alternates from the Chapters of the State that are entitled to representation at the Continental Congress or special meeting of the National Society.

Section 5. One credential blank must be sent to the Chairman of Credentials Committee and the other tothe State Regent not later than

ten days before the annual meeting of the State Conference.

Section 6. Twenty (20) voting members present at any meeting of the State Conference shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE VIII

### FEES AND DUES

Section 1. The fiscal year of the State Organization shall be Sep-

tember 15th to September 15th.

Section 2. To defray the expenses of the State work, each Chapter belonging to the State Organization shall pay annually to the State Treasurer on or before the first day of January, thirty-five cents (35c)

per capita for each member on the Chapter roll the first day of January, and any additional assessments based upon membership of Chapters as of January 1 presented by the Finance Committee and approved by the Conference, said dues and assessments shall be remitted in one payment.

Section 3. The Chapters shall send to the State Treasurer, the State dues and assessments for the current year for all members accepted to membership by the National Society between January 1, and October 1 of each year. Such members shall pay the required dues and

assessments again the following year.

Section 4. The dues and assessments of all members accepted by the National Society after October 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding calendar year.

Section 5. One-third of the State dues shall be paid to the State Regent to defray her expenses to the National and State Meetings and for expenses pertaining to her office to the amount of the above sum.

Section 6. The remaining State dues may be used for printing, stationery for State Officers and State Chairmen and necessary expenses incurred by other State Officers and State Chairmen. All bills which the State is liable shall be itemized and presented to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not later than September 1 of each year in which the debt is incurred.

\*Section 7. Each Chapter in the State Organization shall pay to the State Treasurer, not later than September 15, the sum of two dollars for each representative to which the Chapter is entitled at the meeting of the State Conference, this amount to be used in defraying all expenses in connection with the holding of the State Conference. No Chapter whose State or Conference dues are not paid shall be entitled to representation at meetings of the State Conference.

### ARTICLE IX

### STATE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization and the Chapter

Regents shall constitute the Board of Management.

Section 2. The State Board of Management shall meet at the call of the State Regent. One meeting shall precede the State Conference and one meeting shall follow the State Conference. Special meetings may be called by the State Regent upon written request of five members of the Board. At least five days notice of the time and place of meeting shall be given all members of the Board.

Section 3. The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the State Organization during the interim between its meetings, except that of modifying any action taken by the State Conference. The Board of Management shall make an

annual report to the State Conference.

Section 4. Ten members shall constitute a quorum for the State Board of Management.

### ARTICLE X

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Officers of the State Organization shall compose the Executive Committee. The State Board of Management may authorize this Committee to perform such duties of the Board between its meetings as it may from time to time deem expedient. The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the State Regent or upon the written request of five members of the Committee. This Committee shall act as adviser to the State Regent and it shall make a complete report

at each meeting of the State Board of Management.

Section 2. A recommendation for a project to be considered by the State Conference must be submitted to the Executive Committee on or before September 1. If the proposal meets with the approval of the Executive Committee and the State Board of Management it shall be submitted to the Finance Committee presented to the State Conference for adoption.

Section 3. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Ex-

ecutive Committee

### ARTICLE XI

### COMMITTEES

Section 1. At the close of the State Conference the State Regent shall appoint the following committees: Finance, Resolutions and Credentials.

Section 2. The Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and four members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds, plan a budget and recommend to the State Conference such

expenditures as the committee deems expedient.

Section 3. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of three members appointed by the State Regent. All resolutions to be presented at the State Conference must be sent to the chairman at least two weeks before the meeting. The name and address of the chairman shall be included in the call for the State Conference. The committee shall consider all resolutions sent to the chairman and shall recommend suitable action thereon when presenting the resolutions to the meeting.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall consist of four members, the chairman, to be appointed by the State Regent, the State Treasurer and two members to be appointed from the Hostess Chapters.

### ARTICLE XII

### CHAPTERS

Section 1. Chapters forming the State Organization shall elect Officers at the time of, or previous to, the May Meeting of said Chapters.

Section 2. The retiring Regent of a Chapter shall notify promptly the State Regent, the State Recording Secretary and the State Treasurer of the election of Officers.

Section 3. The Regent of each Chapter in the State Organization shall send to the State Regent annually on or before March 1 a type-

written report of the work of her Chapter for the year\*

Section 4. The Regent of each Chapter shall prepare a report of the work of her Chapter from October 1 to October 1. This report must be typewritten in triplicate and shall be limited to five hundred words, one copy to be handed to the State Recording Secretary at the State Conference, one copy to the State Regent and one copy to be kept in the Chapter files.

### ARTICLE XIII

#### DISTRICTS

Section 1. The State organization may be divided into the following districts: Northern, Central, Eastern, Southern and Western, each district having a Director and a Secretary and other necessary officers.

February 1st is date requested by this administration for Chapter Regents. Officers and State Chairmen to send State Regent their reports—to be used in her State Report at Continental Congress.

Section 2. Each district shall elect its own Director and Secretary and other necessary officers, the election taking place at the District Meeting. The term of office shall be one year. No member who holds a State Office or the office of Chapter Regent shall be eligible for the office of District Director.

### ARTICLE XIV

### PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised, shall govern this State Organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### ARTICLE XV

### AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual State Conference by a two-thirds vote, provided that a copy of the amendments has been sent with the call to the annual meeting. Amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the meeting at which they are adopted.

Section. 2. Amendments may be proposed by the State Conference, by the State Board of Management, or by a committee authorized by the State Conference, or by a Chapter.

Section 3. Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the State Organization shall become a law of the Organization without notice of the amendment.

\* RESOLUTION No. 4 ADOPTED AT THE 48th ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE IN CHARLESTON, WEST VIRGINIA

Whereas, The State Regents of the West Virginia State Organization of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution are finding it difficult each year to secure a place in which to hold the Annual State Conference due to the lack of hotel accommodations in certain sections of the State, and

Whereas, The traditional custom of holding the Annual State Conference in the Sections of the State which can accommodate the delegation is becoming a financial burden on many of the Chapters, be it

Resolved, That the State Regent and her Executive Committee shall have the authority to select the place in which to hold the Annual Meeting, unless otherwise ordered by the State Conference, and that the Regent, aided by the General Chairman and Chapter Regents in the respective cities shall plan the program without elaborateness for the Conference, be it

Resolved. That the Annual Conference Dues be increased to two dollars (2.00) per delegate. to be used in defraying all of the expenses in connection with the holding of our State Conference, be it

Resolved, That the Conference expenses shall not exceed the Conference Dues, that no additional fees be added to the cost of the meals as served by the hotel and that all bills for Conference expenses be approved and countersigned by the Finance Committee.

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
