ANTHONY MORGAN OF OLD RAPPAHANNOCK CO.

We do not know the antecedents of Anthony¹ Morgan, but he was very likely from Bristol, and closely related to the Charles Morgan of Bristol, mariner, whose power of attorney from Edward Fielding, also of Bristol, administrator of Ambrose Fielding, late of Northumberland Co., Va., is recorded in Old Rappahannock Record D. B. 6, p. 60, in 1679. There may have been a connection between the Fieldings and Morgans, but so far no proof has come to light.

Anthony¹ was living in the part of Old Rappahannock Co. lying on the north side of the river as early as 1665, for in that year he was witness to a deed (*Ibid.*, W. & D. 1, p. 1). In 1669 he bound himself to Mrs. Sarah Walker, widow of Lieut. Col. John Walker, to serve an apprenticeship of seven years "from the 24th day of March next ensuing" (*Ibid.*, Rec., 1668-1672, p. 188). By 1679 he had presumably served this apprenticeship, and acquired land, for he then, with consent of wife Elizabeth, whose parentage is so far unknown, sold 137½ acres to John Riley of Westmoreland Co. (*Ibid.*, D. B. 7, p. 237).

From North Farnham Parish Register we note the births of four children to Anthony¹ and Elizabeth Morgan, viz: Charles² Sept. 28, 1680, Bridget² Sept. 4, 1682, Anny² March 14, 1684, and Anthony² Nov. 20, 1686. No further record of Anthony¹ has been found, and he probably died a year or so later.

On Sept. 3, 1690, the cattle mark of Charles² Morgan was recorded in Old Rappahannock Co. Court (D. B. 8, p. 229) probably to protect the estate which, since he was the oldest son, fell to him by law. His mother Elizabeth married (2) John Ware of Westmoreland Co., whose will, dated July 24, 1703, mentions Wife Elizabeth, son John, daughter Elizabeth Ware and sons-in-law (stepsons) Anthony² Morgan and Robert² Morgan (Fothergill's "Westmoreland Co. Wills," p. 37.)

No particular effort to trace any of the Morgan children, except Charles² has been made, the Anthony² Jr. has been noted in Richmond, Westmoreland and Prince William records. He died prior to 1752 as the first extant Order Book of Prince William Co. (1752-1753), p. 188, July 24, 1753, cites a suit brought by Willoughby Newton against Anthony² Morgan, ex^{or} of Anthony² Morgan. In 1755 (*Ibid.*, O. B., 1754-1755, p. 221), Anthony² Morgan was appointed constable in the room of Lazarus Taylor. He probably went across the mountains into Frederick Co. as there is no Anthony² Morgan in Fauquier Co. deeds nor wills.

Charles,² son of Anthony¹, Sr. appears in Richmond Co. records in Will Book #3, p. 123, when he comes into court to testify that he wrote Thomas Taylor's will on Mar. 29, 1713, "by the direction of said Thomas Taylor." Incidentally a specimen of Charles² Morgan's firm clear handwriting is extant among the loose papers of the State Land Office, when he signs his name as witnessing the assignment of a patent by William McBee to Thomas Stamp, Dec. 3, 1730. In 1717 he patented 83 acres of waste or ungranted land surveyed by William Thornton, lying near the Great Marsh at a place called the bushy ridge adjoining the land of Morgan Darnell (S. L. O., N. N. Patent, Book 1713-1719, p. 165). A few years later he bought from Alexander Beach, both parties being described as of Hanover Parish, King George Co., 150 acres, beginning at his own line and adjoining the lands of Morgan Darnell, Edward Price, Alexander Scott and Mark Hardin (King George D. B. 1, p. 31). Hanover Parish, it may be mentioned, was formed 1712 out of St. Mary's Parish and embraced land that had been in Old Rappahannock, was later in Richmond Co., still later in King George and Prince William and now is in Fauquier County. Other patents in the same neighborhood followed until by 1737 the Quit Rent Rolls for Prince William Co. show that Charles² Morgan owned 650 acres. In 1749 (Prince William D. B. M, p. 55) he deeded land to his sons Benjamin³ and James³ and probably about the same time made similar provision for sons William³, Charles³ Jr. and Simon.³

Though past military service, Charles² Morgan furnished supplies for the French and Indian Wars (Boogher's Va. Gleanings, p. 99). His will, dated Dec. 5, 1758, proved Sept. 22, 1766, is in Fauquier records (W. B. 1, p. 107). In this, he mentions wife Ann, the seven children already provided for, namely: Charles,³ Simon,³ William,³ Benj.,³ James,³ Alice,³ and Mary,³ and his son John,³ who, having so far received none of the estate, is bequeathed two-thirds of it. Ann was probably dead when the will was probated, as we have no mention of her receiving her dower. No clue to her maiden name has yet been found.

With regard to the children of Charles² and Ann Morgan, the fragmentary Prince William records prevent our knowing much about them, hence the sketchiness of the following notes. When we come to the grandchildren, we are on firmer ground, for by then, Fauquier had been formed and those records are almost intact. 1. Benjamin,³ by 1753, was married, for in that year, he and wife Phebe acknowledged a deed in Prince William County Court (Prince William O. B., 1752-3, p. 181). He does not appear in the 1770 Fauquier Quit Rent Roll so was presumably out of the county by that time.

In William and Mary Quarterly (2), vol. 11, p. 17, among the Revolutionary soldiers buried in Davidson Co., Tenn., is listed a Benjamin Morgan. He is said to have been born Oct. 10, 1762, in Virginia, died Sept. 29, 1841. He married 1782 Elizabeth Kemper of Fauquier Co. They moved to South Carolina in 1805 and she died there 1821. About 1825

he removed to Tennessee. (The full inscription is given in Virginia Magazine, vol. 14, pp. 89-90.) Fauquier Co. Marriage Bonds show that Elizabeth was the daughter of Peter Kemper. Confirmatory of this is a deed (Fauquier D. B. 10, p. 313, Jan. 24, 1791) from Richard Rosser and Judith his wife, Benj. Morgan and Betty his wife, Daniel McKoy and Agnes his wife, Sally Kemper and Alice Kemper, all of Fauquier to Charles Kemper, schoolmaster, conveying a tract of land formerly the property of John Peter Kemper, decd. This Benjamin⁴ may have been a son either of Benjamin³ or of Charles³ Jr., but he was certainly a grandson of Charles² Morgan, Sr. 2. Charles³ Jr. in 1741 patented 341 acres (S. L. O. N. N. Patents, Book E, p. 328) lying "in Prince William Co. on the north branches of the Great Run beginning at a corner of Charles Morgan, Sr.'s and Thomas Acres' lands, adjoining said Morgan's ancient tract." He appears several times in the Prince William order books between 1752 and 1757 as a witness, surveyor of highways, or appraiser of estates. By the death of his father about 1766 he became Charles³ Morgan Sr. and is so listed in the 1770 Quit Rent Roll. In 1764 he, with consent of his wife Elizabeth, sold to Bushrod Doggett the 341 acres he had patented in 1741 lying on the north branch of Great Run. (Fauquier D. B. 2, p. 119.) The next we hear of him is in 1796 (Fauquier Miscellaneous Records, p. 67) when his brother-in-law, Daniel Bradford, deposed that Charles³ Morgan Jr. bought a certain tract of land about "40 years ago," that he died when his son Joseph⁴ was under age, but that when Joseph⁴ came of age, he went to George Hardin and wife and made a second purchase of the tract, having been informed that his father had omitted having his deed recorded. Joseph⁴ was now (1796) dead and his heir, Thornton J.⁵ Morgan, was a minor, Lewis Jennings being his guardian. Other Fauquier records show that Joseph⁴ son of Charles³ and Elizabeth Morgan, married Nov. 26, 1774, Elizabeth Bradford, daughter of Alexander and Jemima (Jones) Bradford, by whom he had issue, Thornton, J.,⁵ Lisa⁵ or Eliza,⁵ Sarah⁵ and Joseph.⁵ Joseph⁴ died intestate about 1785 and the inventory of his estate was returned August 22, 1785, by Daniel Bradford, John Ashby and John Shumate. (Fauquier W. B. 2, p. 68.) In 1809 (D. B. 17, p. 492) Elizabeth Morgan, her daughter Eliza⁵ and son Joseph⁵ agreed on certain boundaries with Thomas Knox. The witnesses were William Keirns, Thomas Hord, Will Bradford, Charles Kemper and Lewis Sudoth. It would seem these were Joseph's⁴ widow and surviving children. Besides Joseph⁴, whose line is traced in Mrs. White's "The Bradfords of Virginia," we know of no other children of Charles³ Morgan, Jr. 3. In the Fauquier Co. Historical Society's Bulletin, p. 507, we are told that James³ Morgan married Elizabeth, daughter of Benjamin Taylor of Lancaster Co.; that he fought in the French and Indian Wars, and died 1763, leaving a daughter Elizabeth⁴ (July 21, 1759-May 30, 1860), who married John Kemper. The appraisement of James³ Morgan's estate was returned to Fauquier Court (W. B. 1, p. 94) on Sept. 24, 1765, by Francis Bronaugh, Vincent Garner and William

Settle. On July 23, 1765, his widow, Elizabeth Morgan, entered into a marriage contract with Henry Mauzy (D. B. 2, p. 345) who agreed to maintain two of the children of the said Elizabeth by her deceased husband, James³ Morgan, during their minority. Their marriage bond is dated the same day. In 1768 Henry Mauzy returned the account of James³ Morgan's estate (W. B. 1, p. 138). In 1770 Spencer⁴ Morgan, with consent of his mother, Elizabeth Mauzy (D. B. 3, p. 545) apprenticed himself until 21 to Thomas Hathway, saddler. On Oct. 14, 1780, Spencer⁴ gave bond to marry Susanna Kenner, and in 1783 (D. B. 8, p. 38) they conveyed to Gavin Lawson 143 acres, part of the 173 acres that had belonged to James³ Morgan, "father of said Spencer." This tract appears in the Prince William Quit Rent Rolls for 1753 as belonging to James³ with the notation: "Given by his father Charles Morgan, Sr." Besides Spencer⁴ and Elizabeth,⁴ we have record of no other children of James.³

4. In Fauquier Quit Rent Roll for 1770 John³ Morgan is listed with 166 acres. Three years before, John³ and Elizabeth Morgan had conveyed to Peter Pearce 136 acres, part of a greater tract adjoining the lands of Sturdie and Fowke and Morgan Darnell's patent (D. B. 3, p. 28). In 1781 (D. B. 7, p. 453) John³ and Elizabeth Morgan conveyed to William Smith of Frederick Co. 100 acres lying on Licking Run whereon said Morgan now lives which he purchased of John Spilman. No John³ appears in the 1782 tax list, indicating that the sale in 1781 was in preparation for a move elsewhere.

5. William,³ also son of Charles² and Ann Morgan, married Elizabeth and remained in Fauquier until shortly before his death, when he removed to Lincoln Co., Ky. In 1767 (D. B. 3, p. 107) he received from Lord Fairfax, Proprietor of the Northern Neck, a lease for 200 acres effective for the lives of himself and his sons Charles⁴ and John.⁴ A few years later (D. B. 4, p. 424) he received 219 acres on the same condition for the lives of himself, wife Elizabeth and son James.⁴ In the 1788 tax list, William³ Morgan is charged with 365 acres. In 1796 (D. B. 13, p. 119) he and his wife Elizabeth conveyed to Robert Rose, Gent. 374 $\frac{3}{4}$ acres whereon said Morgan now lives, lying on the Great Run, being part of a grant Sept. 26, 1724, to Charles² Morgan, part of another grant to Charles² Morgan the elder on Sept. 24, 1741, and part conveyed April 3, 1765, by Bushrod Doggett and Nanny, his wife, to said William³ and part a grant of waste land to said William.³ Following this sale, William³ removed to Kentucky, where he died 1797. His will (McAdams' "Kentucky Pioneer and Court Records," p. 56) is abstracted as follows: To wife, to son Joseph,⁴ to my 5 children James,⁴ William,⁴ Joseph,⁴ Daniel,⁴ and Sally,⁴ and my daughter Hannah⁴ Bruce's children. To daughters Mary⁴ Settle and Elizabeth⁴ McCormick, to son Charles,⁴ to daughter Phoebe⁴ Fishback, to daughter Alice⁴ Fishback, to daughter Rosamond⁴ Settle and her daughter Polly⁵ Settle, to William Bruce, to James Withers, husband of my daughter Frances⁴ Withers. Ex^{ors}, sons James,⁴ William,⁴ Joseph⁴ and Daniel.⁴ Wit: Wil-

liam Spillman, John Dodds, Luke Robinson. Dated April 29, 1797, proved Oct. 10, 1797. Fauquier Marriage Bonds contain the following: Phoebe⁴ Morgan and Jacob Fishback Feb. 18, 1771, Alice⁴ Morgan and John Fishback June 17, 1771, Rosanna⁴ Morgan and Edward Settle Sept. 28, 1772, William Bruce and Hannah⁴ Morgan Nov. 28, 1791, James Withers and Frankie⁴ Morgan Nov. 12, 1792.

With reference to the sons of William³ Morgan, we have scanty information; the William, who married in Fauquier in 1760, Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Hudnall (D. B. 8, p. 103) may be the son of that name mentioned in his will. Similarly the Daniel Morgan of Fauquier, who in 1802 (D. B. 15, p. 195) conveyed certain property, "my right being 1/3 of the following property," to Joseph⁴ and William⁴ Morgan may have been William's³ son of that name. In regard to William's³ son Charles,⁴ we have more data.

In Shenandoah Co. Records, D. B. C, p. 190, Aug. 26, 1779, Chas.⁴ Morgan and Susanna, his wife, of Fauquier conveyed to Michael Keppel of "Shennando" for 1,100 pounds current money 430 acres granted to William³ Morgan, father of said Charles.⁴ In 1771 (Fauquier D. B. 4, p. 378), Charles⁴ received from Lord Fairfax a grant of 197 acres effective for the lives of the said Charles,⁴ Sukey his wife and Elizabeth⁵ his daughter. In 1783 (Ky. State Hist. Reg., vol. 30, p. 82) Jacob Fishback and Charles⁴ Morgan took up 40,000 acres in Kentucky and in 1800, Charles⁴ with wife Susanna of Campbell Co., Ky., and Jacob Fishback with wife Phoebe⁴ of Clark Co., Ky. sold 35,570 acres of this tract to Humphry Marshall. Jacob Fishback was born April 14, 1749, died Sept. 14, 1821, while Phoebe⁴ was born Sept. 15, 1751, died Aug. 16, 1837 (*Ibid.*, vol. 6, p. 48), Jillson's "Old Kentucky Entries and Deeds" list many tracts of land taken up either jointly or separately by Charles⁴ Morgan and Jacob Fishback. Charles⁴ Morgan was at Strode's Station in Kentucky in 1783. (Ardery's "Ky. Rec.," vol. 2, p. 113.) In line with this is a bond (Fauquier D. B. 8, p. 137) dated Sept. 1, 1783, from Charles⁴ Morgan of Fauquier to Thomas Massey to secure for the said Massey 614 acres of good land in Kentucky, "the land shall be as good as the land on Shenandoah River at Joseph Berry's landing." From Burgess's "Virginia Soldiers of 1776," pp. 218 and 841, we learn that Charles⁴ Morgan's wife was the daughter of Bushrod Doggett and sister of Capt. Richard Doggett, a Revolutionary soldier, and that Charles⁴ was the eldest brother of John⁴ Morgan who entered the army Dec. 16, 1776, and served until his death. John⁴ Morgan was "killed in battle or died in the Siege of Quebec." Charles⁴ Morgan died testate in Muhlenburg Co., Ky., in 1822, leaving several children, Willis⁵ being the oldest son.

6. Simon,³ son of Charles² and Ann Morgan was content to remain in Fauquier and let his brothers roam afield. In 1784 tax list he has 486 acres. In 1787 (Fauquier D. B. 10, p. 47) Joseph Blackwell and Ann his wife conveyed to him 80½ acres bought by said Blackwell of Thomas Edwards, the land adjoining said Morgan, Waugh Darnell's original patent, Jonas

Williams, etc. The will of Simon³ dated Nov. 10, 1792, proved Feb. 25, 1793, is in Fauquier W. B. 2, p. 260. He devised to son Joseph⁴ 162 acres, being $\frac{1}{3}$ "of the plantation whereon I live," also $77\frac{1}{2}$ acres in Fauquier purchased of Mr. Joseph Blackwell, also 200 acres on Pignut Ridge; to son Charles⁴ $\frac{1}{3}$ of the tract of 486 acres whereon I live, the line to be in accordance with the desire of my late wife whose property it was; to son Simon⁴ the remaining third of this tract adjoining his brother Charles⁴, according to the desire of my late wife whose property it was; son Jeremiah⁴, daughters Sucky⁴ Clark and Caty⁴ Bradford; to William⁵ Cockrum, son of my beloved daughter Rosey⁴ Cockrum 10 pounds cash; and to daughter Rosey⁴ Cockrum 1 shilling. Sons Simon⁴ and Joseph⁴ to be exors. Of the children mentioned, Simon⁴ Jr. married in Fauquier March 14, 1786, Elizabeth Pickett; Charles⁴ married (1) Jan. 1, 1781, Mary Robinson, (2) Frances; Catherine⁴ married William Bradford (1760-1831), son of Joseph Bennett Bradford and George his first wife; Susanna⁴ married Feb. 15, 1791, John Clark.

In Simon³ Morgan's will the intriguing phrase is the division of the home place "according to the desire of my late wife whose property it was." In an attempt to identify her, the following notes are given. In 1798 her sons Joseph⁴ and Simon⁴ sold $80\frac{1}{2}$ acres lying on the southeast side of Piney Ridge, formerly Waugh Darnell's land (D. B. 14, p. 195), in 1804 her son Charles⁴ sold 462 acres "taken up by Waugh Darnell" (D. B. 15, p. 636). Waugh Darnell in 1724 took up 1,205 acres on Indian Cabin Branch and in 1726, 916 acres on the north branches of Cedar Run south of Pignut (Fauquier during the Proprietorship, pp. 100, 103). He died 1726 in what was then King George Co., leaving widow Elizabeth (King George O. B. 1721-1734, p. 325). In Prince William Quit Rent Roll for 1737, Waugh Darnell's orphans are charged with 2,121 acres, evidently the sum of the two grants just mentioned. In Prince William W. B. C, p. 476, is the will of Thos. (x) Deakens, who, like the Darnells, had lived in the parent county of Richmond (Tyler's vol. 4, p. 229). In this will, dated Feb. 10, 1744, he names three legatees, John Wright, Margaret Morgan and Morgan Darnell. Also in Prince William W. B. C, p. 473, is the will of Jonas Williams dated Jan. 30, 1744, in which he devises to son David 111 acres adjoining John Wright, Jr. and Simon³ Morgan. None of the foregoing is absolute proof, but it seems likely that Simon³ married a daughter of Waugh Darnell.

Charles⁴, son of Simon³, by 1804 was in Alleghany Co., Pa., as, in that year and so described, he deeded (Fauquier D. B. 15, p. 636) to Walter A. Smith, William B. Smith, Jams D. Smith, Mary W. Smith, Nancy A. O'Bannon, Elizabeth D. Smith and Kitty H. Smith, the heirs of William Smith, deceased, 462 acres lying in Fauquier Co. adjoining Joseph Blackwell, etc., being land taken up by Waugh Darnell excepting the graveyard "where my parents and brethren are buried." By 1810 Charles⁴ had died, and William Ash, as his administrator, gave a receipt to Walter A. Smith

(*Ibid.*, D. B. 17, p. 500), one of the administrators of William Smith, decd., evidently for the purchase price of the land Charles⁴ Morgan had sold some years before.

In 1789 (*Ibid.*, D. B. 10, p. 200) Simon³ Morgan, for love and affection, gave to his son Simon⁴ Jr. 332 acres on Pignut Ridge. In 1796 Simon⁴, with consent of his wife Elizabeth, conveyed to George Pickett a tract granted said Simon⁴ by Gov. Isaac Shelby of Kentucky, in part of a military warrant for 1,000 acres surveyed Mar. 2, 1785, in the district set apart for officers and soldiers of the Continental line (*Ibid.*, D. B. 13, p. 241). Simon⁴ Morgan was a Captain in the Revolution and an original member of the Cincinnati in Virginia (*Va. Mag.*, vol. 6, p. 27). In 1794, he was Adjutant-General of Virginia, and a letter from him in this capacity, addressed to the Generals of Division, regarding the number of men each district should furnish, is given in the Calendar of Virginia State Papers, vol. 7, p. 191. The letter has this postscript: "N. B. Your returns or any other business with me respecting the militia will be directed to me in Fauquier Co. or Mr. Samuel Coleman in Richmond." Simon⁴ died testate in Fauquier 1810. His will (Fauquier W. B. 5, p. 167) directs that his sons, Charles W.⁵ and Daniel⁵, who are to be the exors, shall sell his lands in the states of Kentucky and Ohio and in the Virginia counties of Louisa, Hardy, Hampshire and Frederick; provision is made for wife Elizabeth and the estate is ordered equally divided between the children, Lucy P.⁵ Morgan, Charles W.⁵ Morgan, Daniel⁵ Morgan, Nancy T.⁵ Morgan, Elizabeth M.⁵ Morgan, Maria M.⁵ Morgan, George⁵ Morgan and William⁵ Morgan.

No particular effort was made to follow in more detail any of the sons of Charles² and Ann Morgan. Alice,³ the older daughter, married about 1745 Daniel, son of John and Mary (Marr) Bradford, and their children will be treated in a Bradford article now in preparation. Mary,³ younger daughter of Charles² Morgan, born Dec. 2, 1737, died Sept. 5, 1818 or 1819. These dates are taken from a Bible once owned by her and were furnished thru the courtesy of a descendant, the present owner, Mrs. U. O. Musick, of Colorado Springs, Colo. Mary³ Morgan married (1) William, brother of Daniel Bradford, who had married her sister. Their children will also be treated in the Bradford article. After his death, she married (2) in Fauquier, Feb. 3, 1764, William Nash (Feb. 2, 1741-July 31, 1822) son of William and Elizabeth Nash of Culpeper Co. (Culpeper W. B. B. p. 79) by whom she had the following children: Cornelius⁴ born Nov. 9, 1767; Betty⁴ born Nov. 16, 1771, married Orville Parry; Ira⁴ born June 14, 1774, married Anna; William, Jr.⁴ born Nov. 27, 1777, married Rebecca Litchworth (Hartford, Conn., Times, Gen. Dept., July 13, 1940). By 1786, William and Mary³ Nash were living in Sullivan Co., N. C. (Fauquier D. B. 9, p. 461) which later lay in Tennessee (*Ibid.*, D. B. 14, p. 715). In this and other counties of Eastern Tennessee, many members of the Bradford and Morgan families later established themselves, but to quote Kipling, "that is another story."

The County was establish-
ed by the Md. Legislature
in ^{Dec. 25} 1787, with Cumberland as
its county seat. I was
carved out of Washington
County, which had been
erected in 1776 (Records
extend from 1781) and Garrett
County, on the west was

p. 9 - Indians

Belonged to the Shawanese group, a branch of the Algonquians, and one of the most war-like.

They moved here from the Suwannee River, Florida. Their settlements extended a considerable distance up and down the Potomac. Their principal town was at the mouth of Wall's Creek, on the Potomac - later known as Fort Cumberland. They are known to have been there as early as 1701, but had left before Fort C. was built and had gone toward the Ohio River, and Monongahela.

The earliest map of the region, now in the Library of Congress marked the territory occupied by them as "abandoned Shawanese lands."

12

They were a party to Penn's Treaty of 1782, in common with other tribes of the great Algonquin nation, and preserved the treaty, (and produced same written on parchment, in 1701, at the conference between them, the Mungoes, and the Governor of Pennsylvania.

The Iroquois claimed sovereignty over the Shawanese, and it would seem shortly after the latter date (1701) drove them westward, where they took active part, in the various Indian wars which from time to time broke forth in attempts to stay the progress of white civilization. As late as 1854, the Shawanese, then numbering only about nine hundred, were living in what is now the State of Kansas.

A few friendly Indians remained around Fort Cumber land, about 100 of them.

described them ^{as dressing} in the usual

section) They were so attracted
to Braddock's men, that he
ordered all intercourse stopped
but finally had to drive (ordering
the Indians to leave the
neighborhood, the Indian
men being fervently jealous.

"Of all the officers of the Revolution, it would seem that the one who was the greatest natural genius was Daniel Morgan. Held prisoner during 1776, after being captured at Quebec, he suffered much from ill health throughout the Revolution; but when active his services were always distinguished and usually crowned with success - as in preparing for Saratoga, in following the British after Monmouth, and finally in the campaign that forced Cornwallis from the Carolinas. It was he, probably more than any other American officer

who appreciated the service of
cavalry, which he called "the
eyes of the infantry."

Arnold and Morgan were
the leaders in the midwinter
